An autopsy has been performed in connection with the death of a 45 year old Copperas Cove man.

Gatesville, after losing many talenteed players via graduation, returns only five starters from a 5.5 club. And with only eight let termen in camp, District 13-AAA coaches picked the Hornets to finish fifth.

But district foes should not take the Hornets so lightly. Among those returninng are two boys with abundant talent. Fullback Bobby Cole (180) and tackle Stanley Ko- [juniors off the B team. pec ((200) are the regulars Coach Jack Gunlock is counting on to upset the form chart.

To complement them, Gatesville will field an offensive team composed of 8 seniors and 3 juniors. The only flaw is that five of these players have logged only B-team experience.

If Gunlock can get good performances from hese newcomers, Gatesville could be a serious contender as in years past.
