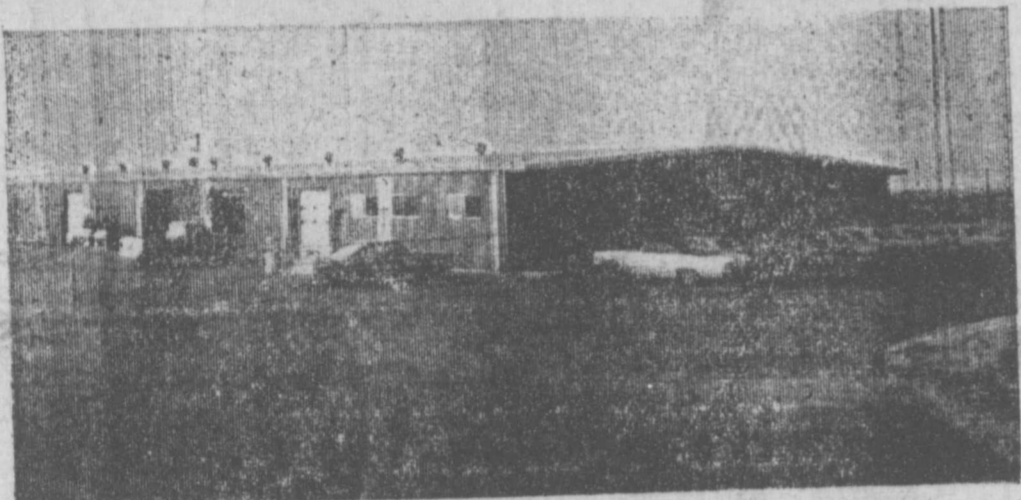

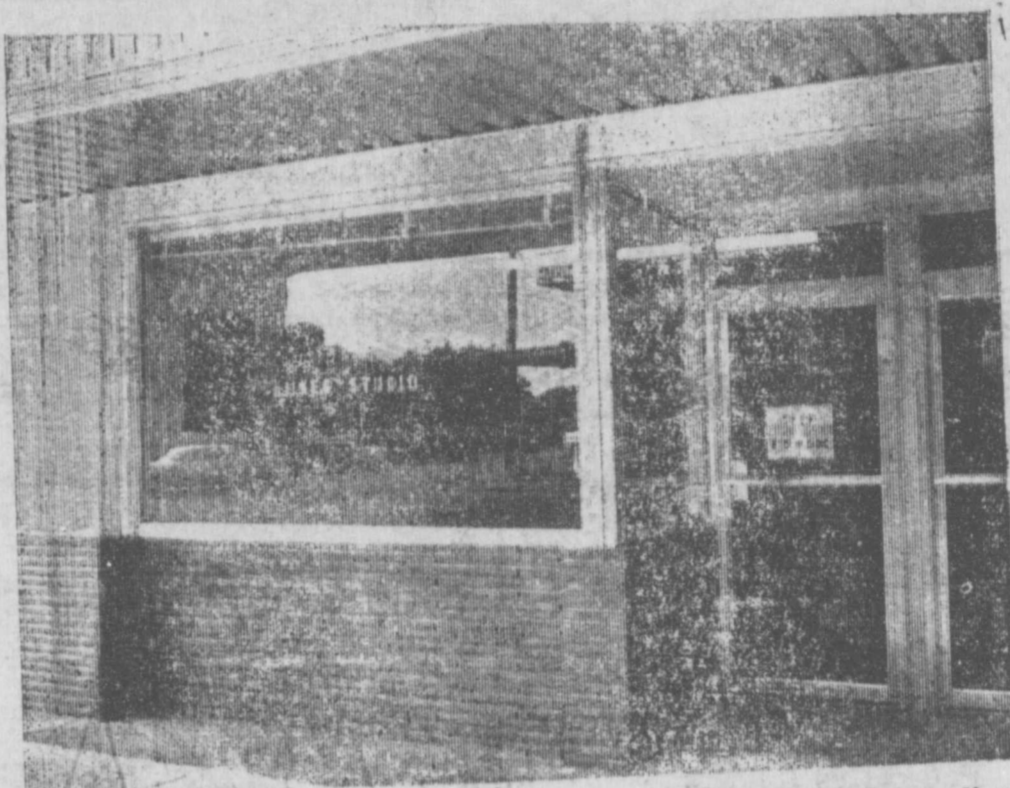
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OPEN HOUSE AT ANCHOR PLASTICS

POOR REFLECTION



NEED FOR A CHANGE—Over the years there have been numerous proposals for revision or elimination of the electoral college system under which the President of the United States is elected. Some proposals have called for pledged electors selected by the people within districts, others for a direct popular election, and still others for a proportional plan of casting electoral votes.

Hearings have been held by the Constitutional Amendments Subcommittee of the Senate on these various plans for electoral reform. But to date no action has been taken beyond the hearings. Additional hearings are planned by the Subcommittee and when they terminate, it is believed that some form of reform proposal will be approved for consideration on the floor of the Senate.

We would favor improving the modus operandi of the electoral college rather than abolishing it altogether. The faults of the present method supply compelling

reasons for change.

It is time for a Constitutional amendment under which the electoral college system would more genuinely reflect the difference of opinion and the preferences of those voting within each state with respect to the election of the President and the Vice President.

The most effective plan would be the District plan introduced by Senator Mundt (R-S.D.). A plan that provides for the election of presidential electors by the people within single-electoral districts that would be established by the state legislature.

An Apple a Day

For all the burnished beauty of a bowl of red apples, for all the appetizing flavor of apples cooked or fresh, I've long felt that it's the smell of the apple that is a secret tool of the good cook. What better way to welcome family or friends on a brisk fall day than with the warm, spicy fragrance of apples baking with cinnamon? Memories are made from just such cozy, homey, tantalizing smells. Which types of apples are best for baking and cooking? Look for Rome Beauty, Jonathan or McIntosh. Use them in this Brunch Cake that will bring Saturday sleepy-heads running or will wait a special "glad you came" to that committee you've invited to meet in your living room.

APPLE CHIP BRUNCH CAKE

- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 3/4 cup milk
- 2 tablespoons salad oil or shortening
- 2 cups Bisquick
- 1 cup finely chopped pared apples

Topping (below)

Heat oven to 400°. Grease layer pan, 9x1 1/2 inches, or square pan, 9x9 inches. Mix all ingredients except apples and Topping. Beat vigorously 30 seconds. Fold in apples. Spread in prepared pan. Sprinkle with Topping. Bake 20 to 25 minutes. 3 servings.

Topping: Mix with fork 1/4 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons Bisquick, 2 teaspoons cinnamon and 2 tablespoons soft butter until crumbly.

How many apples for a recipe? One pound of apples (3 medium apples) yields about 3 cups of diced apple. To store apples, place in a plastic bag in your refrigerator. They'll keep 2 to 3 weeks.

But first, do an autumn centerpiece of bright red apples in a wooden bowl. Then for dessert, try this:

APPLE BETTY

- 5 apples, pared and sliced
- 1 cup Bisquick
- 1 cup brown sugar (packed)
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- Butter

Light cream
Heat oven to 375°. Place apples in loaf pan, 9x5x3 inches. Mix Bisquick, sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle over apples. Dot with butter. Bake about 30 minutes. Serve warm with cream. 4 servings.

Dear Friends:

This week I visited Texas A&M University. A&M is not only a great educational institution, but it is the center of tremendous research activities. I think it is unfortunate that our people are so prone to discuss scientific research as something impractical and visionary. How many times have you heard someone say that our tax money studying the love "those scientists are spending life of a bunch of bugs?"

Possibly this was true, but did you ever think that this study of the love life of a fly was exactly what enabled us to eliminate screw worms? Did you ever think of the fact that it was the work of the plant scientists which produced "combine maize" — a \$300 million per year crop in Texas alone? Surely a large part of our increased agricultural productivity of the past twenty years has the direct result of scientific research. This research has probably been the most profitable activity in which we have engaged, even though we have not been able to use nearly all of it because the present low prices of farm products do not enable farmers to use all the new methods with which they are acquainted.

Right now we are very hope-

ful of making Temple a center of Grassland and Forage research. The House has voted the money. The matter is now in "Conference". I feel very hopeful that the Senate will agree. If they do, Temple will become one of the major centers of this important work on which our livestock industry is becoming more and more dependent.

Another phase of research relates to new and exotic developments. Right now, the use of "Laser" is, I think, in its infancy. I have heretofore pointed out that Baylor University and Connally Tech might very well "team up" to make Waco a center of this new development. Baylor has strong Physics and math Departments. I am hopeful that we can get some of the top authorities of the world here on the Baylor faculty. Tech can and will establish courses to teach the practical uses of Laser.

As I see it, the opportunity is here for us to develop a great new force. If we do, we can surely make Waco and all Texas the home of vast new industries. It seems to me not only to offer a great challenge, but a great opportunity which we simply must not let slip by. I can assure our people that our office will be happy to help secure the maximum of Federal cooperation.

The Freedoms Council is an organization composed of twenty-five students from each grade level. The purpose of the organization, as stated in the Constitution of the Freedoms Council, is "to study the American way of life, attempt to instill into our youth the importance of our American heritage, and to promote a better understanding among the youth so that each will realize that with privileges go responsibilities."

In order to carry out such high ideals, we have decided to turn to the news media as one phase of our program. The free press, an important symbol of freedom, must not be underrated in our society today. 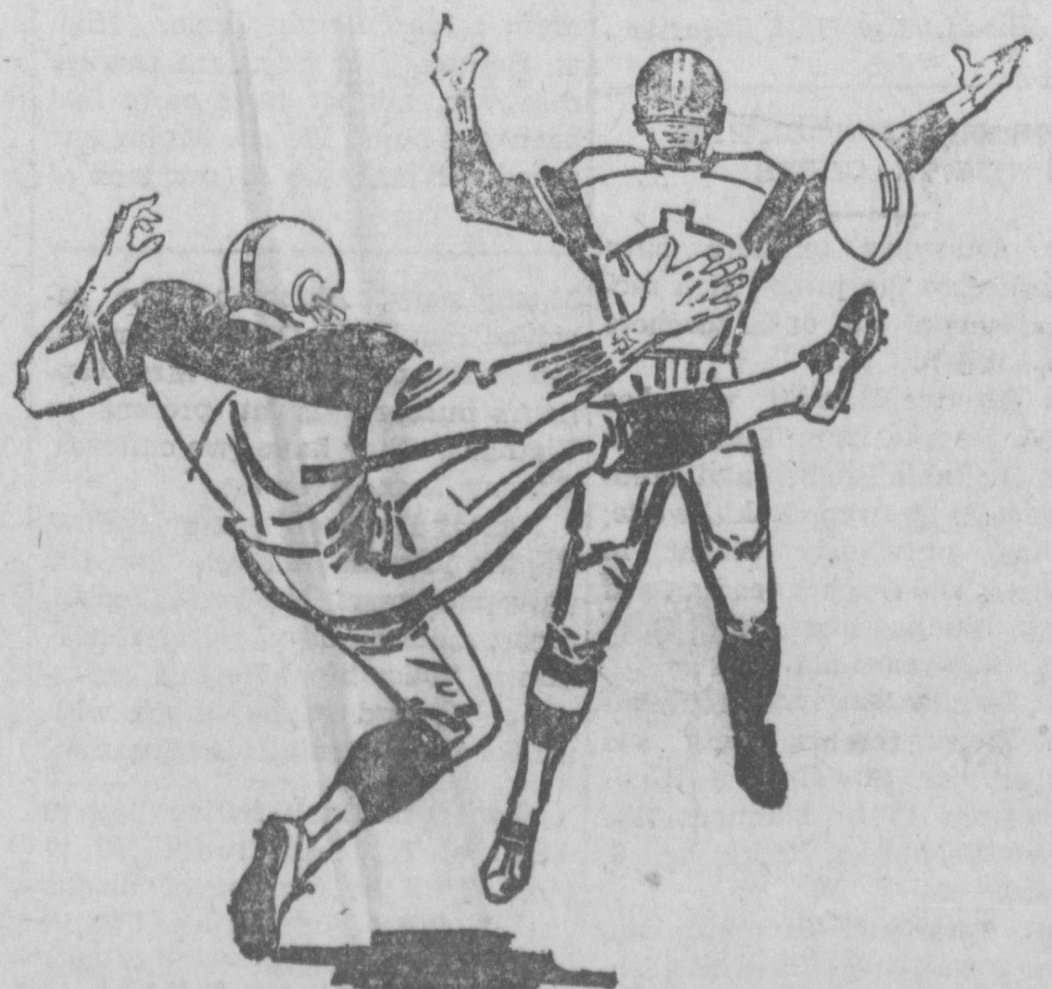

SPRING IN THE AIR; DAD'S IN THE WORKSHOP

Spring is in the air, and Dad is in the workshop. Once again, it's time for the annual project — tuning up the faithful kicker.

Like most things, tuning up your outboard motor can be done easier, faster and more efficiently if you have a step-by-step checklist. Bill Spaeth, manager of engineering for Evinrude Motors, has come to our aid with this nine-point guide:

(1) Fouled spark plugs cause more headaches than everything else combined. It's faster and easier to replace worn plugs at the start of the season. This insures a hot, clean spark for quick starts.

(2) Spark plug connectors and ignition wiring should receive a thorough going-over. Cracked or frayed wires can cause hard starting and create a potentially dangerous situation. Use electrician's tape for a temporary repair but plan to replace damaged wires.

(3) Follow your owner's manual carefully when adjusting the carburetor. When in doubt, consult a qualified marine mechanic.

(4) The entire fuel system — fuel bowl, filter and tank — should be drained and cleaned. Gummy deposits can be removed with acetone and lacquer thinner. Stale fuel — left over from last year — should be thrown away.

(5) The lubricant in the lower unit should be changed. When draining it, check for traces of water. This indicates a leak in the housing that could lead to serious problems and a big repair bill. When refilling the housing, use the lubricant recommended by the manufacturer.

(6) A damaged propeller can cause performance problems. Minor nicks or bent blades can be repaired by your marine dealer. Better yet, purchase a new prop and carry the old one as a spare.

(7) Consult your owner's manual for lubricating fittings and connectors. Remaining metal surfaces should be covered with a light coat of oil.

(8) Give your engine a "brand new look" with touch-up paint. Matching colors are available in spray cans. After it dries, bring it to a high gloss with regular automotive type waxes.

(9) Give the entire engine a close look. Make sure all screws are tightened down and wires properly connected. Don't ruin a good job by making a careless mistake.

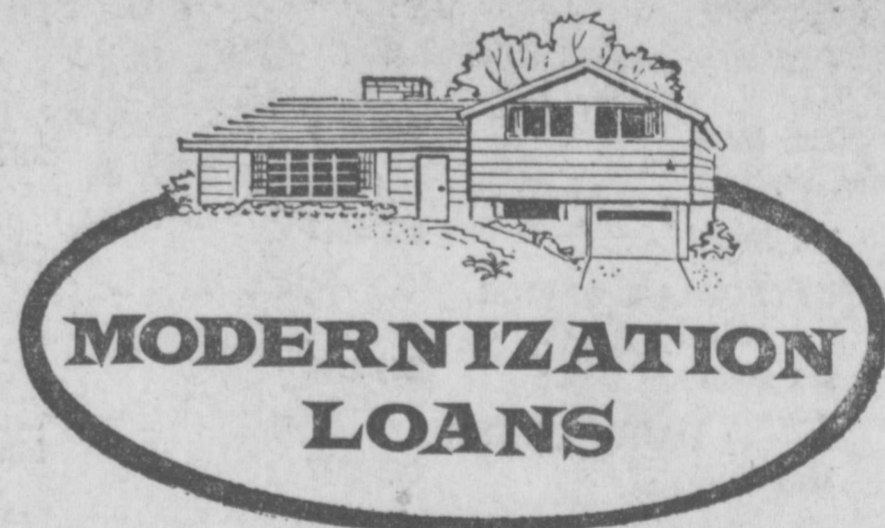
