CORYELL PURCHASES LAND FOR HOSPITAL EXPANSION

Purchase of a large tract of land adjoining the Coryell Memorial Hospital site has just been completed by the county, and on Monday the commissioners court is expected to pass a formal order approving issuance of \$150,000 in time warrants to finance expansion of the hospital.

The property will provide space for such expansion.


The newly-acquired tract, described as Lots 5 and 6 in Block 3 of Lutteroh Addition to Gatesville was bought from Billy Ray Davis for \$20,000. The site was paid for with hospital funds and no tax money was involved, County Judge Norman Storm said.

Revealing Survey

Millions Supplementing Medicare

Eight million people aged 65 and older have private health and accident insurance to supplement Medicare benefits.

Men in the over-65 age group show more interest than women in purchasing insurance

Finally, Medicare eligibles are more in favor of health plans which fill the gaps in Medicare coverage and provide cash benefits while sick than they are in benefits for specific out-of-hospital medical expenses not covered by Medicare.

These are some of the findings of a national survey conducted recently by one of the country's leading insurers of Casualty Co.

Projected on a national scale, Continental Casualty reports that the survey indicates that as many as eight million older Americans carry some form of private health and accident inrance to supplement Medi-re. This is a drop of about 19 or cent from the pre-Medicare rel, according to Henry A. es, Director of Retirement maing for Continental asualty.

Of those surveyed who did not have private coverage, but who expressed interest in purchasing a private plan, 8 per cent more men indicated inerest than women. Of everyone

indicating an interest in purchasing supplementary coverage, younger people aged 65 to 70, are more interested in pur-

chasing than those over 70. Almost one-third of the over-65 group surveyed who were interested in purchasing pri-vate insurance indicated family approval as a factor, while only about 15 per cent indicated disapproval of purchasing. The remainder either had no family to discuss the matter with. or the family was neutral in its feelings.

The survey clearly showed that people like the supplementary private plans mainly for the reason that they "com-plete Medicare." Rating of the major types of plans being offered in preference depends on how effectively each "completes Medicare." There were indications that

many people recognized that Medicare, with its various benefits, does not cover many of the medical expenses incurred. (The Social Security Administration estimates that Medicare covers about half of the average older person's total medical expenses.)

Jones predicted that the volume of Medicare-eligible people who look to supplementary protection will mount.

"As more people become aware of the limitations of Medicare," he said, "they will seek a supplementary plan to pick up where Medicare stops and to fill in the gaps in coverage." He cited the variety of types

of plans available from companies who have stayed in the over-65 field, including Continental. The company, which now offers three such supplementary plans, will introduce a new one this year.





Proposed Dam To Open Scenic Way

If Congress Approves . . .

PAGE, ARIZONA - If Congress approves pending Colorado River Basin Project legislation to improve water supplies for seven Southwestern States, an extra dividend of increased pleasure for vacationers from all 50 states will be a popular by-product.


A new dam on the Colorado River is proposed by a bill which will create a new lake on which boaters can smoothly and safely reach spectacular scenery now denied to all but a reckless few. Wild and muddy rapids now make the Colorado River perilous for nearly 200 miles between Lake Powell and Lake Mead. One year 3,594,100 people enjoyed Lake Mead, formed by Hoover Dam, but only 1,300 travelled the untamed river.

At Lake Powell the recentlyopened Wahweap. Lodge and Wahweap Marina near Glen Canyon Dam now help thousands of families to enjoy in comfort a trip to Rainbow Natural Bridge. For every single mountaineer who once struggled to reach the site, hundreds now can see it easily.

Visitors are welcomed at Wahweap by Art Greene. For 50 years before the dam was manner as did Lake Powell. built he piloted small parties of daredevils down the turbulent stream for dangerous thrills. He knows from experience whereof he speaks.

'For every point of interest which was covered by waters of Lake Powell, 10 more were brought into view by the reservoir," says Greene. "Our boats now can explore new canyons where there are revealed formerly hidden glories. This past year we have located new cliff dwellings, pictographs, rock paintings, arches, new waterfalls—canyon scenes never viewed before.

"In the clear, cool waters of this newest Colorado River reservoir the bass have grown to 10 pounds. Trout, Kockonee salmon and bluegill also are plentiful in water no longer too muddy for game fish. "From the new lake shore

It will enable all Americans to enjoy their scenic heritage in Grand Canyon National Monument, a treasure now iso-lated in forbidding wilderness.

Hualapai Indians whose tribal reservation borders the proposed new reservoir have asked Congress to authorize the development. The Hualapai Tribal Council at Peach Springs, Arizona, says the reservation now offers little economic opportunity to impoverished Indian families.

Sens. Carl Hayden of Arizona and Thomas Kuchel of California have heard Indian arguments that service to tourists attracted to the proposed reservoir would give Indians a chance to earn a decent living.
