## 'Caballo blanco' Army

EXERCIQE OPPENED MONDAY
FT. HOOD - An exercise involving 6,000 trocps and 2,000 vehicles and which has been in the planning stage since early July opened Monday morning at Ft. Hood.
"Caballo Blanco" (Spanish for White Horse) will be III Corps and Ft. Hood's first command post exercise since May, 1965. It will be a five-day map exercise ending Oct. 20.
The area will be bounded by the neighboring cities of Georgetown, Llano, Goldthwaite and MicGregor.
The main function is to test mobility and communication systems of the units involved under simulated combat circumstances, and over realistic distances.
Since the major portion of the operation will be conducted off the military reservation, it was necessary to obtain permission to use land occupied by troops.
The project will include units from III Corps, 1st and 2nd Armored Divisions, 13 th Suppori Brigade, and 12 th U. S. Air Force from Waco.
There will be three claims offi cers who will visit all sites. They personally will coittact each individual who has permitted use of his land as soon as possible after trocps have moved and will ask the tandowner if he is satistied the the manner in whirith the

erate 1,000 degrees cooler, and do not have projecting electrodes subject to corrosion and fouling. Electronic ignition systems have additional benefits, say the Evinrude points to wear and the system reduces problems caused by moisture and vibration.
Because of the extremely hot and fast spark, the system is more tol-
erant of carburetor settings and fuel mixtures and gives, vastly improved slow speed operation even at extremely low throtile settings.
