
SERVICES HELD TUESDAY



Is breakfast a hectic rush now that the children are back in school? Then do try to take advantage of Saturday or Sunday for a leisurely brunch when everyone can relax and catch up on family activities. Just for fun, turn the brunch table into a Pancake House!

Start brunch with a special fruit . . . fresh pineapple or a fall fruit cup. Have lots of Canadian bacon or thick ham slices. To capture more autumn flavor, try the Pumpkin Puff Pancakes (below). Or fold the grated peel of an orange and 1/3 cup of finely chopped pecans into the basic Pancake recipe. Try the syrups, too!

PUMPKIN PUFF PANCAKES

2 eggs

- 1 cup milk 1/3 cup cooked pumpkin
- 21/3 cups Bisquick
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon each cinnamon, nutmeg and ginger
- 1/4 cup salad oil or melted shortening

Beat eggs with rotary beater until soft peaks form. Blend milk and pumpkin into eggs. Add dry ingredients; mix only until thoroughly dampened. Fold in oil. Spoon on heated ungreased griddle. When puffed up and bubbles break, bake on other side. Serve with one of these toppings below.

Maple Whip: Cream 1/2 cup soft butter; add 1 cup mapleflavored syrup gradually. Beat until smooth. Serve on hot pancakes.

Maple-Nut Syrup: Heat 1 cup maple-flavored syrup and 1 tablespoon butter; remove from heat and stir in 1/4 cup chopped pecans.

Maple-Apricot Syrup: Heat 34 cup maple-flavored syrup, 1 tablespoon butter and 1/4 cup apricot nectar. Serve warm on hot pancakes.

And here's your basic Pancake recipe which you can vary by adding fruit, nuts or bacon crumbles.

BISQUICK PANCAKES

2 cups Bisquick

1 egg

1²/₃ cups milk

Beat ingredients with rotary beater until smooth. Grease griddle if necessary. Turn pancakes when bubbles appear and before they break. Makes about eighteen 4-inch pancakes.

When boating enthusiasts talk about accessories they usually mean a new convertible top or special lights or horns. Many ignore the world of less "glamorous" accesso-ries that can add measurably, if not visually, to your boating fun.

Sailboat owners will be pleased to Sailboat owners will be pleased to know about "top-mounted controls" that make for easier operation of auxiliary outboards. The kit consists of extension arms for the throttle, starter and choke. The kit, priced from \$5.00 to \$25.00, is available for four Evinrude outboards, the 3, 5, 6, and 9.5 hp models.

Cruising enthusiasts will be inter-ested in 18 and 24 gallon permanent fuel tanks. The units come complete with all hardware and safety items, plus a dash-mounted fuel gauge, for about \$120.00. Both horizontal and vertical style tanks are available.

A tachometer provides outboard and stern drive owners with a constant checking device for engine performance. All transistorized units are available for about \$45.00, which includes a dash-mounted gauge for easy reading.

One of the most practical accessories is a power tilt mechanism for larger outboards, usually in the 60 and over class. With a flick of a switch mounted on the dash, you can raise or lower the unit for beaching, docking, trailering or shallow water running. It prices at around \$125.00.

Most medium-size outboards, 33 through 75 hp, do not come equipped with a generator. It usually isn't needed but it's a must when you start adding electric items - radio, hilge pump or electric starter, A complete generator kit can be installed for about \$90.00.

If you enjoy listening to your radio program while boating, you'll be interested in a radio noise suppres-sion kit. Prices vary widely from as little as \$10.00 to as high as \$95.00 for outboards. The suppression kit will climinate electrical interference in ship-to-shore communications and 8 gnerantee accurate performance from depth finders, radio direction finders equipple.ent.

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
