NEW FIRE TRUCKS FOR COUNTY

COUNTY OBTAINS FOUR FIRE TRUCKS

After about a year in materializing, the dream of new fire equipment for the county has come true. Four new fire trucks for Coryell County arrived in Gatesville Tuesday, October 17.

The new trucks cost the county a total of \$31,428.04. An additional \$2,000.00 is needed to equip the trucks with the necessary radio systems. The overall total will probably reach \$33,000.00.

The low bidder for the fire truck chassis was Erwin International of Gatesville. The fire fighting equipment was made in Wichita Falls.

Coryell County Judge Norman Storm said the fire trucks would be stationed at the most effective points in the county for complete, county-wide availability — one truck to Gatesville, Copperas Cove, Eva and Oglesby. Judge Storm also stated that the county approved \$35,000.00 in time warrants to pay for the new, badly needed fire trucks.

CITY POLICE REPORT A BUSY WEEK

Gatesville Chief of Police Gene Goins reported 5 automobile mishaps during the last 6 days in the city. Although no major accidents occurred, Chief Goins cited total damages at \$980.00.

Friday, Oct. 13 at approximately 11:25 p. m., Kenneth Don Wright of Gatesville was involved in a minor smashup at the intersection of Main and Park Streets.

The accident occurred when Wright was attempting a left turn off of Main and was struck in the side by Ray Dale Summer-

Saturday about 1:25 p. m. another accident occurred at the same street corner, Main and Park. Herbert L. Vernon of Harper, Kansas, driving a 1966 sedan, collided with Earlene Neeley of Gatesville.

Chief Goins cited damages at \$50 to the sedan and \$75 to the Neeley automobile.

Sunday, Oct. 15, at 9:30 a. m., a 1962 Chevrolet driven by Willie Blanche Walters collided with a 1954 Chevrolet driven by Lydia S. Patillo.

The accident occurred as the Patillo vehicle was turning off of Lutterloh onto Leon Street. Chief Goins said that the Patillo woman failed to yield right of way. Damages were assessed at \$70 to the Walter's vehicle and \$25 to the Patillo vehicle.

TWO FUGITIVES RETURNED TO GATESVILLE

Coryell County Sheriff Windy Cummings and Deputy Sheriff Roland Burk went to Lubbock this week to pick up a colored man charged with forgery.

Sheriff Cummings and Deputy Sheriff Burk returned the prisoner to Gatesville where the crime occurred. The 20 year old man led Waco officers to his accomplice, a young colored girl.

Sheriff Cummings said the pair had resided in Gatesville at one time and forged a check on a Gatesville man.

COVE CITIZENS AIR PROTESTS AT ZONING HEARING

Approximately 25 Copperas Cove citizens jammed the City Council room Tuesday night for a public hearing on the new zoning ordinance proposed by the City Planning Commission.

The council was still in session late Tuesday.

Numerous residents along Robertson Avenue expressed a desire to be put in a light business zone because it appeared that a funeral home was to be built in the area. The residents objected to the funeral home.

The council took each request separately for study later in the meeting.

The council passed a new gas rate, at the request of Lone Star Gas Co., similar to the new rates passed recently in other area cities. Councilman Clyde Godwin cast the only dissenting vote in the gas rate vote.

The council accepted an audit for the fiscal year ending June 30 from L. Tombs, Dallas certified public accountant. A representative of the Workable Program Branch of the Department of Housing and Urban Development spoke to the council in regard to low rent housing.

WASHINGTON AND

"SMALL BUSINESS"

Many economists have long decried as uneconomically sound the principle of pegging wages to the cost of living index as is done in the auto industry. The viewpoint of this school is that wages should be pegged to productivity.

Although this position has apparently not permeated Detroit, at least one union, the International Garment Workers Union got part of the message.

However, there seems to have been only a partial understanding of this economic principle, or perhaps too broad a definition has been attached by the garment workers union to the term productivity.

For in a new contract just entered into with the New York area suit makers, there is a provision that any time a male worker becomes a new father, the employer shall pay him a paternity bonus of \$150.

Obviously, this is pegging pay to production, but it can be wondered if this is precisely what the economists have in

mind as production.

In addition, it is also quite possible that this may lead to further demands from many union leaders.

It was not too long ago that the grocery clerks union in Los Angeles negotiated for free psychiatric services for its members paid for by the employers. It is possible that this will be the next demand of the garment workers' union which will be based on a real proved need.

For after all, most mental doctors from Freud on claim that mental problems are created by emotional disturbances, and insecurity in arriving at decisions.

Thus, the new paternity bonus, in this age of The Pill can conceivably result in substantial psychiatric trauma among the male members of the lady's garment workers union who presumably must be married to qualify for the paternity bonus.

Obviously, it can be suspected that there will be the agony of decision over the question of what shall it be—the paternity bonus or The Pill? Many nervous and mental breakdowns have been created by agonizing over decisions on far less minor questions.

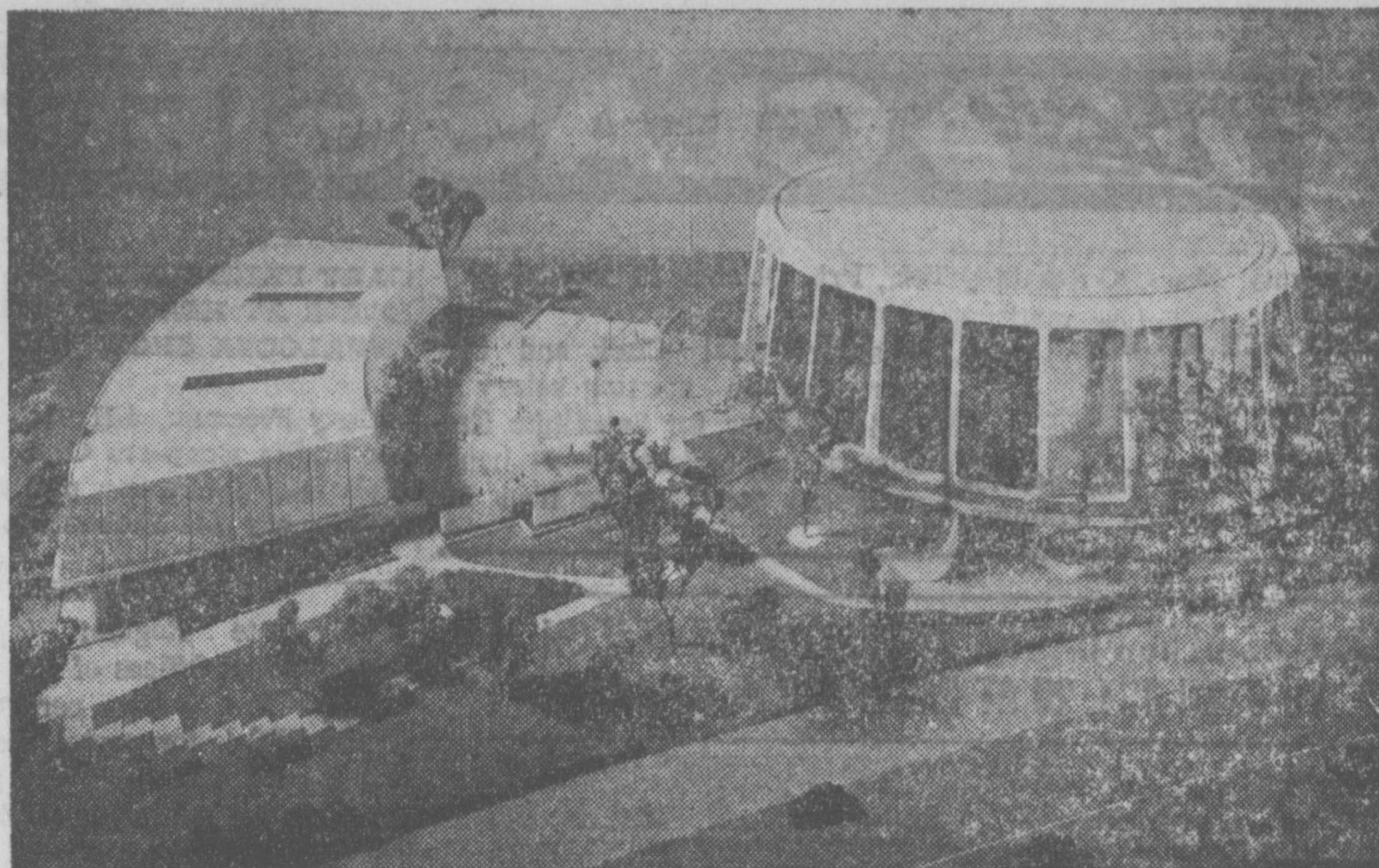
Mr. Bray, a retired farmer, was born in Corsicana and had lived in Waco since 1945. He was a Baptist.

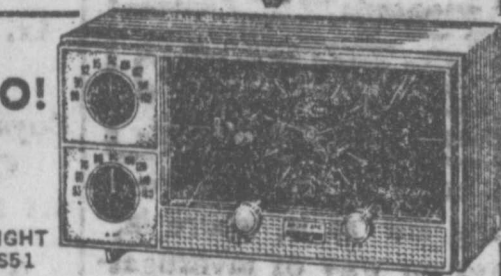

Pancake Time

PUMPKIN PUFF PANCAKES

- 2 eggs
- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 cup cooked pumpkin
- 2 2/3 cups Bisquick
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon each cinnamon, nutmeg and ginger
- 1/4 cup salad oil or melted shortening

Maple-Nut Syrup: Heat 1 cup maple-flavored syrup and 1 tablespoon butter; remove from heat and stir in 1/4 cup chopped pecans.

Maple-Apricot Syrup: Heat 3/4 cup maple-flavored syrup, 1 tablespoon butter and 1/4 cup apricot nectar. Serve warm on hot pancakes.

Beat eggs with rotary beater until soft peaks form. Blend milk and pumpkin into eggs. Add dry ingredients; mix only until thoroughly dampened. Fold in oil. Spoon on heated ungreased griddle. When puffed up and bubbles break, bake on other side. Serve with one of these toppings below.

And here's your basic Pancake recipe which you can vary by adding fruit, nuts or bacon crumbles.

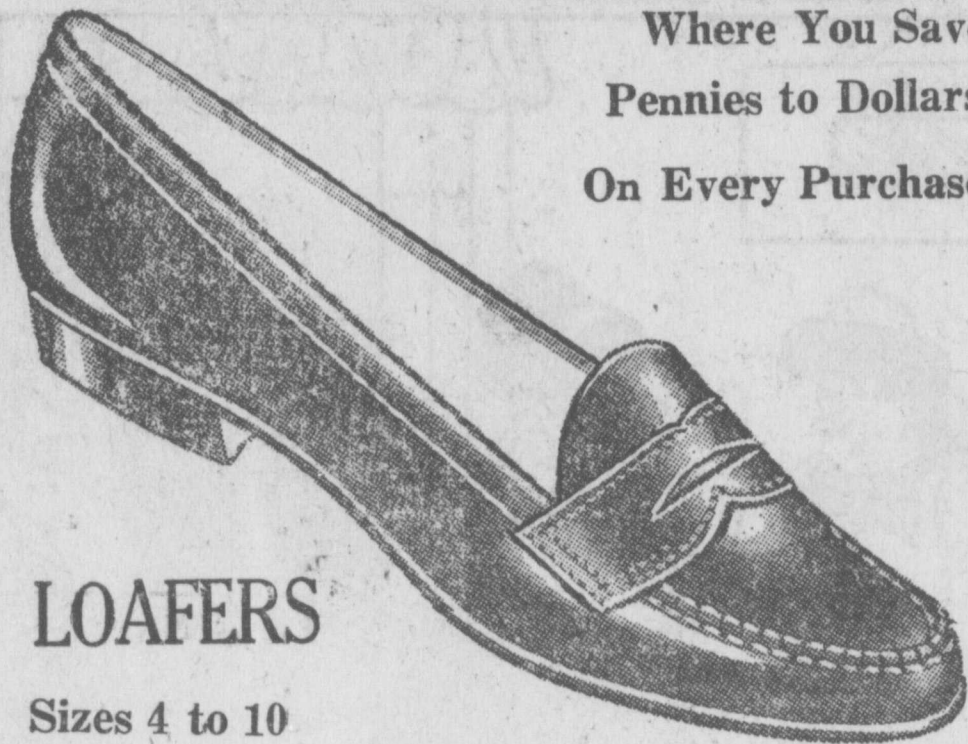

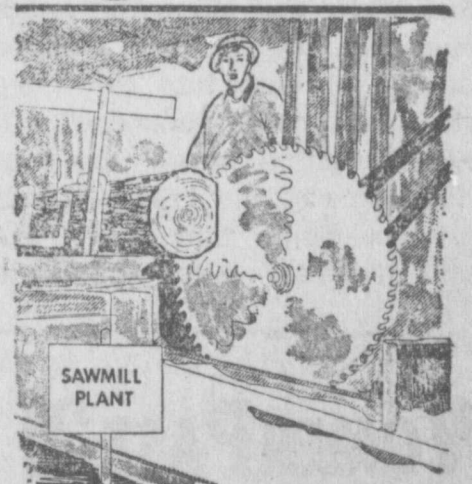

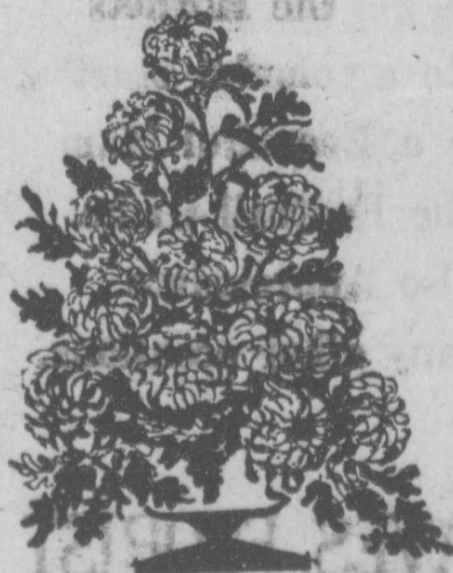

PRACTICAL ACCESSORIES FOR OUTBOARD OWNERS

When boating enthusiasts talk about accessories they usually mean a new convertible top or special lights or horns. Many ignore the world of less "glamorous" accessories that can add measurably, if not visually, to your boating fun.

Sailboat owners will be pleased to know about "top-mounted controls" that make for easier operation of auxiliary outboards. The kit consists of extension arms for the throttle, starter and choke. The kit, priced from \$5.00 to \$25.00, is available for four Evinrude outboards, the 3, 5, 6, and 9.5 hp models.

Cruising enthusiasts will be interested in 18 and 24 gallon permanent fuel tanks. The units come complete with all hardware and safety items, plus a dash-mounted fuel gauge, for about \$120.00. Both horizontal and vertical style tanks are available.

A tachometer provides outboard and stern drive owners with a constant checking device for engine performance. All transistorized units are available for about \$45.00, which includes a dash-mounted gauge for easy reading.

One of the most practical accessories is a power tilt mechanism for larger outboards, usually in the 60 and over class. With a flick of a switch mounted on the dash, you can raise or lower the unit for beaching, docking, trailering or shallow water running. It prices at around \$125.00.

Most medium-size outboards, 33 through 75 hp, do not come equipped with a generator. It usually isn't needed but it's a must when you start adding electric items—radio, bilge pump or electric starter. A complete generator kit can be installed for about \$90.00.

If you enjoy listening to your radio program while boating, you'll be interested in a radio noise suppression kit. Prices vary widely from as little as \$10.00 to as high as \$95.00 for outboards. The suppression kit will eliminate electrical interference in ship-to-shore communications and guarantee accurate performance from depth finders, radio direction finders



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
