Jaycees Hear Morris Antonoff

Tuesday evening, November 14, the Gatesville Junior Chamber of Commerce held its monthly meeting at the Chateauville Restaurant. However, this Jaycee meeting was not a discussion of minutes and Jaycee business, for this meeting could be termed as the highlight of the year.

Among the guests for the evening were the Gatesville High School Freedoms Council, sponsored by the Jaycees all over the world through the Valley Forge Freedoms Foundation; Mr. L. C. McKamie, Mr. Leland Dyess, Mr. Morris Antonoff, the press, the Jaycees and their wives.

The evening began with the invocation given by Jaycee John Easley and Jaycee Royce Rhoades read the minutes of the last meeting. After introductory remarks by Jaycee President Damon Wicker, the President of the G.H.S. Freedoms Council, Jerry Ashby spoke to the group. Mr. Ashby thanked the Jaycees on behalf of all the Freedoms Councils and pointed out the many times the Junior Chamber of Commerce has been instrumental in the progress of the Freedoms Council.

After Mr. Ashby's brief address, Jaycee President Damon Wicker presented the 306 rifle won at the Jaycee Turkey Shoot to Mr. Foster Williams of McGregor. Mr. Williams is an employee of the Gatesville State School for Boys.

Mr. Antonoff is an accomplished linguist, speaking, writing and reading seven different languages. Due to his mastery of European languages, Mr. Antonoff served as interpreter and interrogator for the United States Army Intelligence Corps and was instrumental in many documentary films about World War II and the aftermath of World War II and the plight of the masses. Mr. Antonoff has lived in America about 5 years and is presently employed at A. O. Smith Corporation in Waco.

Mr. Antonoff discussed the Russian Civilization from all viewpoints, from the working class to the aristocracy. He spoke of the government so well-known of Russia. The speaker discussed the complete absence of the individual man and his personal liberties. Even the children of Russia are taught to be independent of their parents at the youngest age. According to program chairman Bill McGlothlin, "the high point of the speech was Antonoff's thorough discussion of the life of the masses".

Mr. Antonoff was so well received by the Jaycees, Freedoms Council and guests that he will return to Gatesville in the near future to speak and to show his five documentary films on the rise of Communism--Lennin to Castro.

Pallbearers were nephews. The body was at the church an hour before services. Harper-Talasek Funeral Home was in charge.

R.E. BLAIR

R.E. Blair 71, of Gatesville, former superintendent of Gatesville State School for Boys and former Coryell County school supervisor, died at 1:30 p.m. Monday in a Gatesville hospital after a long illness.

Mr. Blair was born at May, Texas, February 13, 1896 and was the son of Robert Alexander Blair and Fannie Bell Green Blair.

He moved to Midlothian, Texas at the age of three and graduated from Midlothian High School in 1914. He stayed on the farm in Brown County until Jan. 1916 when he entered Daniel Baker College. After graduating in June 1917 he went to Blake to teach school until called into the Army in 1917.

Mr. Blair was trained in San Pedro, California. He was attached to the 53rd Ammunition Train Coast Artillery Corps, which landed at Brest, France on June 19, 1918 and took part in the battles of St. Michiel, Argonne Forest and the Meuse River. He was discharged in Ft. Worth Texas, Feb. 7, 1919.

He then worked at Hemphill Fair in Brownwood until the Fall semester at D.B.C. Married in Brownwood on May 27, 1920 to Theadotia Freeland of Turnersville, Texas.

Mr. Blair was Elementary School principal in Coleman in 1920-21 school term and re-entered D.B.C. in the Fall of 1921. The following year Mr. Blair was graduated with a B.A. in Math and History (June, 1922).

He taught school, coached baseball and basketball and served as Principal of Brownwood Jr. High School for two years.

In June 1925 he went to Daniel Baker as Athletic Di-

rector and coach for nine years. Attended Texas Technological College during the summers, and graduated in 1936 with a Master of Arts Degree in History. He was head of the History Department of D.B.C. for six years.

On Dec. 1, 1941, he became Educational Director at State Orphan's Home at Corsicana, Texas. On March 16, 1943 he came to Gatesville State School for Boys as Assistant Superintendent and became Superintendent six months later where he remained until December 1949.

He was the County Supervisor of the Coryell County Schools from Jan. 1950 until Sept. 1959, at which time he resigned to teach in the Junior High School. He retired because of ill health in Feb., 1967.

He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Gatesville and served as an Elder in the Presbyterian Church for 28 years. He was a past President of the Gatesville Lions Club and Postmaster of the Gatesville Masonic Lodge Number 197.

Mr. Blair is survived by his wife, Mrs. Theodotia Blair, three daughters, Mrs. Doris Denman of Thousand Oaks, California, Mrs. Roberta Powell of Gatesville, Texas, and Mrs. Eleanor Ashby of Dallas, Texas; two brothers, W.L. Blair of Andrews and L.B. Blair of Briggs, Texas, two sisters, Mrs. O.L. Killion and Mrs. W.L. Keeler of May, Texas; five grandsons, Jerry, Wendell, Randy, and Douglas Ashby of Dallas and Billy Denman of California and two granddaughters, Kerry and Marcia Denman of California.

Over the past few years the Congress of the United States has passed a score of bills to guarantee every American the right to work and make a living. But one problem that Congress has never faced is the problem of discrimination against working men and women who are past the age of 40-- people in the 40 to 65 age bracket.

Last week, however, the Senate passed my bill to outlaw that discrimination. The first law treatment to workers and job applicants without regard to age cleared the Senate without opposition.



This bill makes it against the law to fire a worker, or to refuse to hire a man or woman, because he is more than 40 years of age. It doesn't give preference to older persons, but it does guarantee the right to work without being shoved into pasture at the age of 40 or 45, to live an idle and unproductive life.

Some say today's world belongs to the young, and certainly young Americans enter-

ing into the labor force today are better educated and better equipped to work than ever before. This is the Space Age. But I still believe in the old saying that "Life begins at 40" in many respects.

Today we have more than 40 million Americans between 40 and 65 years of age in the United States, 20 per cent of our whole population. More than two million of them are in Texas, and with their dependents they represent 4 1/2 million Texans. These men and women have seen America move. They have survived a great world war, some of them have survived two wars, and have seen our country pass through the bleak years of hunger and idleness of the 1930's into the dynamic days of the 1960's. It is tragic, and absurd, to tell a man who has experienced these years of change, and learned from his experience, that he is "too old" to work. My bill makes it illegal for an employer to tell a man or a woman who is qualified and wants to work: "Sorry, but you're too old to work for us."

Certain jobs, of course do require younger and stronger workers than others. A jet pilot on a big trans-oceanic plane must have lightning-fast reflexes. My bill makes exceptions for physical and mental alertness, but in most jobs no such life-or-death reflexes are involved.

The bill applies to all employers and all labor unions with more than 50 workers and also to employment agencies. Next June coverage will be extended to companies and unions with 25 workers or more. It means companies cannot fire a man when he turns 40, and tell him he's too old. It means labor unions cannot discriminate in favor of younger members, if older members are just

as capable of doing the job. And this law means employment agencies are forbidden to tell a mature man or woman who wants to work and needs a job, "we won't have anything for anyone over 40."

The bill cannot guarantee any one a job. But it is my hope that my Age Discrimination in Employment Act will put an end to that sad phrase: "Sorry, we'd like to hire you, but you're too old."

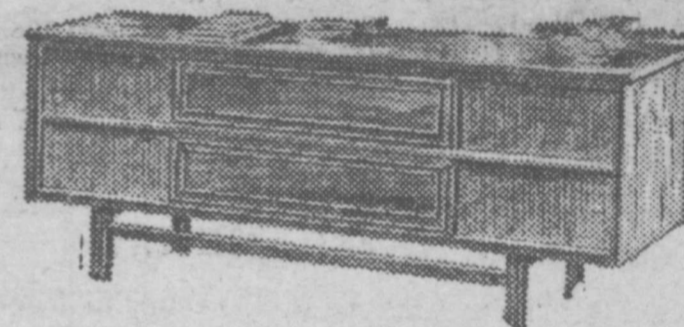

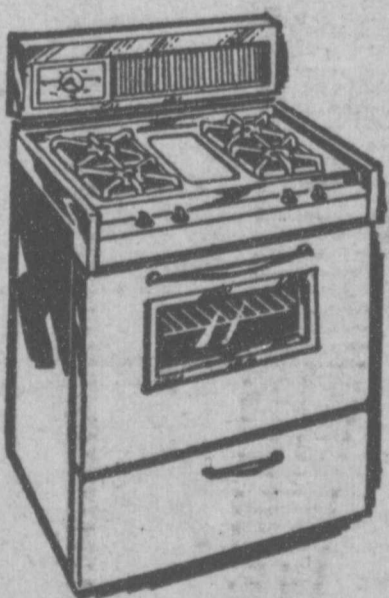
