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Hemisfair Seeks Employees

The fun and excitement of employment at a World's Fair is available to more than 1,500 young Texans.

B.F. Agee, manager of personnel for HemisFair 1968, has announced that a statewide recruiting program has started to hire at least that many young persons for employment form March 15 to October 6, 1968.

Agee is working with Texas Employment Commission offices throughout the state to find accountants, ticket sellers, ticket takers, hostesses, security guards, maintenance personnel, secretaries, general clerical help, writers, guides, ushers and parking lot attendants.

Another 1,500 employees are being sought by restaurants, concession stands and exhibition halls on the 92.6 - acre site of the international exposition.

Texas Employment Commission offices in alllparts of the state will accept applications for HemisFair work, and for-

ward them to Agee. TEC applicants also will be available for consideration by exhibitors, concessionaires and restauranteurs who are hiring their own help.

"Since the goal of Hemis-Fair is to be the best international exhibition ever held," Agee said, "we will need people who are young in heart and spirit, energetic, not afraid of hard work and who enjoy being of service."

The need now is for workers who can work from March 15 to October 6, 1968. The program has not yet been worked out for college students seeking employment for only the sum employment for only the summer months, Agee said.

Applicants seeking employment form March 15 to October 6 should apply at their Texas Employment Commission now. They sould be 18 years of age, bondable, have a high school education or equivalent expericent, be neat, have

INDIAN TOURIST PROGRAM TO RECEIVE HONORS

Texas only Indian Reservation tourist development program of the Alabama-Coushatta Tribes will receive honors on a National basis for what can be done through assistance of the Small Business Administra-

Donald Grose, Regional Director of the Small Business Administration in Houston told the Texas Commission of Indian Affairs and the Tribal Council of the Alabama-Coushattas in a joint meeting this week that the tourist program at the Reservation would be nominated for national honors.

The Tribal Enterprise prounder 100,000 visitors for 1967 to the Reservation between Liningston and one in Woodville, and underwritten in part by S.B.A.

The joint meeting report presented by Superintendent Walter W. Broemer showed that some 80 part time jobs were offered during the season to bring Reservation citizens a \$50,000 payroll. Broemer projected the 1968 season payroll at \$80,000 to more than 100 employees. The projected 1967 visitor number had been set at 100,000 and fell short some 3,200 but the dollar income estimated exceeded the figures \$6,000.

The Texas Commissioners gram which has attracted just and Tribal Council have given approval for the expanded pro-

gram to develop a major tourist attraction addition and phase one of the project is expected to be underway next year. Immediate plans to be undertaken call for improvements to the Reservation camp grounds and trailer area, the building of an animal compound for Texas Wild Life and animals of bygone days, a kiddie pony ride and improvements to the present activity area to care for the expected additional visitors. The major project includes a lake, recreation area, additional activity areas for the expanding present attractions and an outdoor theatre. The project calls for the Tribal Enterprise to operate its own arts and crafts plant where Reservation citizens will find employment in making the items now sold in the Museum arts and crafts store. Projections indicate that every member of the Alabama-

Coushatta Tribes will find gainful employment on the Reservation.

The joint meeting business session gave approval for the program ahead in setting schedules of operation from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on week days and on Sundays from 12:30 p.m. to

The winter operation is scheduled only on Saturdays and Sunday afternoons. Opening date for the Spring Season has been set for Saturday March 2nd.

Dempsey Henley, Chairman of the Texas Commission of Indian Affairs, stated at the joint meeting that "Texans could be proud of the performance of Tribal Enterprise as a business operation and that with the continued progress would bring about the goals that had been set by both the Commission and the Council."

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Care For Your Fishing Gear

With sportsmen heading for the woods for hunting instead of lakes for fishing, it's a sure thing that fishing gear will be neglected for a spell.

To make sure your fishing gear is ready for use when the rivers, lakes and streams beckon again, a major fishing equipment manufacturer recommends certain procedures prior to storage or long periods of non-use.

However, most Texas fisherman fish all winter long. The suggestions below should be followed throughout the yearevery two or three months, recommends the Texas Parks

1. Wash the rod thoroughly with soap and water, using a small brush (toothbrush will do) on the line guides. Rinse the rod and let it dry complete-

2. Clean the ferrules and grease both male and female. This will help prevent oxida-

3. Using auto body wax, apply a light coat to the entire rodnot including the grip- and buff to a high gloss.



4. Put the rod in its container and store it flat, if possible. This is a "must" if you have bamboo rods.

REELS AND LINES
Retire the worn lines. If one end of the line has taken all the abuse, reverse it with the aid of an extra spool. Follow this brief check list for reel care:

1. Release drag tension on

all reels to eliminate spring

2. Check the opeation of each reel. Now is the time to send reels to the factory for repair.

3. Cover reels with a light film of grease and store in a cloth bag. Cloth allows the reel to "breathe" whereas leather shuts out the air.

TACKLE BOX

"Trying to get the tackle box in order can be a frustrating

experience, as any angler knows," the manufacturer said.

1. Pick out all lures and hooks and lay them out on the table. Don't just dump them in a pile.

2. Clean the box, using a vacuum cleaner to reach into the corners, first make sure all the hooks are out. Wives object to such items turning up inside the vacuum.

3. Wipe the inside of the box with an oily rag and lubricate the hinges.

4. Go through the lures and eliminate all those beyond repair and those that simply didn't catch fish. Replace the lures you lost while they're still fresh in your mind.

5. Check for broken barbs on hooks and plugs. A flat stone can be used to sharpen barbs on a plug you want to

6. Coat all hooks with light oil to prevent rust.

receive the same care as basic tackle. Landing net fibers should be washed with a mild detergent. Boots and wadders should be rolled into a compact package, wrapped in newspaper, and stored in a cool, dark area.

To conplete the check, flashlight betteries should be removed to prevent corrosion, the first aid kit re-equipped, and a list of tackle items needed in the spring prepared now, while you rmember.

STATE CAPITOL NEWS

By Vern Sanford AUSTIN, TEXAS.

A massive new realignment of the Texas National Guard will increase its strength by 500 and add a new parachute unit serving the southeast and central parts of the state.

Reorganization will insure better operational capability and improved riot control potential, according to Maj. Gen. Thomas S. Bishop, the adjutant general.

Texas' two Guard divisions-the 36th Infantry and the 49th Armored--will be replaced by the 72nd Mechanized Infantry Brigade and the 71st Airborne Ingantry Brigade, plus miscellaneous units.

Headquarters of the 72nd, covering North Texas and the Panhandle, will be in Dallas. Headquarters of the 71st Airborne will be in Houston, Present 36th Infantry Brigade will maintain its headquarters in San Antonio and cover all of South

Guardsmen from Fort Worth-Dallas and Odessa-Midland areas will form two new types of command units, called "emergency operations headquarters."

Canyon, Clarksville, Belton, Dumas, New Boston and Rusk will lose their guard units in the reorganization, Anartillery battalion with headquarters in El Paso and betteries in Odessa, Midland, Pecos, Lamesa and Big Spring will be separate from the three brigades. So will an engineer battalion in Abilene, a tank bettalion in the Brownwood-San Angelo area and an armor group in Fort Worth.

Bishop says other specialized units will be placed throughout the state within areas of the brigades, but not as a part of them.

Total authorized strength will be increased to 17,375. Although the number of company-sized units will be reduced from 189 two and three cities.

While general recruiting is banned for new Guardsmen without prior experience, enlistments are wide open for the new airborne brigade with units in Houston, Columbus, Brenham, Orange, Austin, Port Arthur, Beaumont, Port Neches, Waco, Whitney, Stephenville, Clifton, Hillsboro, Cleburne and Corsicana.

Sustained lower courts in denying injunction to Bishop R.E. Ranger to prevent his removal as bishop of Texas southwest division of Church of Christ in God.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith named Senators William N. Patman of Ganado, Charles Herring of Austin and J.P. Word of Meridian to the Senate's "little Hoover" commission to promote economy and efficiency in state government.

Smith placed Clint C. Small Jr. of Austin and Reverend J. Carroll Chadwick of Center and Sens. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo and Charles Herring of Austin on the legislative committee looking into exemption of charitable organizations from liability for acts of employees and agents. AIRPORT AID SOUGHT

Texas Aeronautics Commission will seek \$500,000 in federal aid for airport construction in 1968, an increase of \$50,000 over this year.

Sixty-seven Texas communities are on the waiting list for airports and 23 more are ready to start construction.

At its meeting here, Commission heard an application by Miller Aircraft Company for a route from McGregor to Dallas and set an additional hearing to find out if Hood Airlines intends to use its permit for the same schedule.

Hearing originally set for December 18 on Air Southwest Company's application to operate an economy service between Dallas-Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio was postponed until January 15.

NEW TEXAS TRAVEL HAND-BOOK

Texas Highway Department has released an expanded version of its 208-page travel handbook.

Publication new lists 400 cities and towns, more than 2,500 individual items and contains 112 photographs, including such attractions as El Paso's aerial tramway and restored Predidio La Bahia near Goliad.

Special sections are devoted

to recreational facilities in Texas forests and parks and hunting and fishing regulations are summarized.

west texas sulphur --Sulphur blew into the Texas economy last week, and the University of Texas and West Texas in general can only bene-

fit from it.

UT Board on Regents collected \$766,124.43 from the sale of mineral leases on 20 university-owned tracts in a bidopening. Bid on one tract alone almost equaled the total minimum that the University expected on the sale.

"All indications point to the birth of a new industry in West Texas," James B. Zimmerman of Midland, geologist in charge of University lands, said. Oil and gas, of course, will remain the financial backbone of West Texas, but in some areas, sulphur is the object of most of the present exploration.



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

IN SPRING VEGETABLE ACREAGE

It will take 296,600 acres planted to the 13 principal spring vegetables to supply the commercial market needs of these crops, points out John Larsen of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

This is the same acreage as was grown last year, he says, as he calls attention to the acreage-marketing guides just released by the Consumer and Marketing Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Texas and Louisiana are among the states that produce most of the spring vegetables.

If growing conditions are normal in 1968, the recommended acreage will provide 3 percent more than last year. This acreage would provide a crop just slightly smaller than in 1967 but well above 1966. Output of late-spring watermelons on the recommended 63,800 acres would be 13 percent
