





Use the finest needles available for the sewing machine, and the sharpest dresmaker pins. These go in smoothly and thus have less tendency to cut and weaken the fibers of the fabric. Make sure, too, that all "findings" are wash wear to match fabric. Since the idea is to skip ironing after laundering, every little detail must come out of the washer and dryer as smooth as the Bromser? Doyce Wright's girl garment itself.

Proper sewing machine adjustment is all important. If in doubt, test the tension on a scrap of the material. Cut a six - inch square, then fold it over exactly from corner to corner so the base of this triangle is a true bias fold. Now stitch a seam on the machine, a quarter inch from the fold and pull the bias until the
