Bob Miller Wins Mayor's Race

Tuesday's city election produced a surprisingly large voter turnout with 899 votes being cast. Gatesville citizens, in large numbers, elected Bob Miller, Mayor for 1968 and 1969. Voting for the mayor position was

almost exactly three to one for Miller. Miller indicated Wednesday that he had anticipated a very close race with Bromser. The last large turnout of voters was in 1960 when Mr. Dan McNeil and Mr. Charles Powell were candidates for mayor. In that race, some

1048 voters, by a narrow margin of 22 votes elected Mr. McNeil. In the councilman races, all announced candidates were elected to two-year terms on the council. Francis Ward received 861 votes for Ward 2, Place 6; Gene Chitwood received 878 votes for Ward 1, Place 4 and Dave McCallister received 870 votes for Ward 2, Place 2.

Several write-in votes were cast, with only one vote being acceptable. Write-in candidates must live in the Ward-Place you designate on the ballot to be counted. Bob Miller will take his position as mayor at next Tuesday night's council meeting.

Present Mayor, Wendell Lowrey, will retire at that time. The new council will include Fred Dyer, W.E. Poston, Creston Brazzil, Francis Ward, Dave McCallister, Gene Chitwood and Bob Miller, Mayor. Future programs to be considered by the council possibly will include library expansion, street improvements, recreation facilities and city sales tax.

Tuesday's election judge was Mrs. Irene Bradford. Her assistants were Mrs. E.L. Stewart, Mrs. Oscar Russell and Mrs. Bessie Earl Preston. All balloting was completed at 7:00 p.m. and the election officials completed the tabulations by 7:46 p.m.

Annual County Report Released

County Auditor, Newlan Sanford, released the annual report for Coryell County. The 67 page report, a complete breakdown of the financial position of the county shows that during 1967, Coryell County earned approximately \$560,000 compared to \$466,397.39 in 1966. Of this \$94,000 increase, 61% is reimbursements from the Federal, State, City and sale of property for the City-County airport. Federal funds amounted to \$24,000. State funds \$12,000 and Gatesville funds \$4000.00.

Other major increases in revenue were \$25,358.81 from taxes and penalties, \$16,339.42 from fees of office and \$5,800.14 increase in motor registration fees.

On the expenditure side of the fence primary, additional expenses were for the airport and county fire equipment. Fire equipment, amounting to \$31,627.80 was put in service and airport construction accounted for \$69,004.14. Coryell County citizens have

in the past and in 1966 proved to be capable and willing to pay taxes. Mr. Sanford pointed out that the percentage of taxes collected on a state-wide average was 93%. However, County citizens continually pay taxes totaling 95% of the taxes levied.

It seems that the 2% is insignificant, however, when you consider all counties collect a high percentage, small differences take on special magnitude. The county had \$1,000,000 in the bank at the end of 1967 which is approximately \$40,000 more than the cash position at the end of 1966. Time warrants have risen to \$83,340.33 as compared to \$54,382.81.

Total expenditures for Coryell County in 1967 were \$572,288.75 compared to earned revenue of \$599,189.55. Expenditures from precinct road and bridge funds for the year were \$56,186.79 in Precinct 1; \$62,554.92 in Precinct 2; \$61,242.80 in Precinct 3; and \$64,352.70 in Precinct 4.

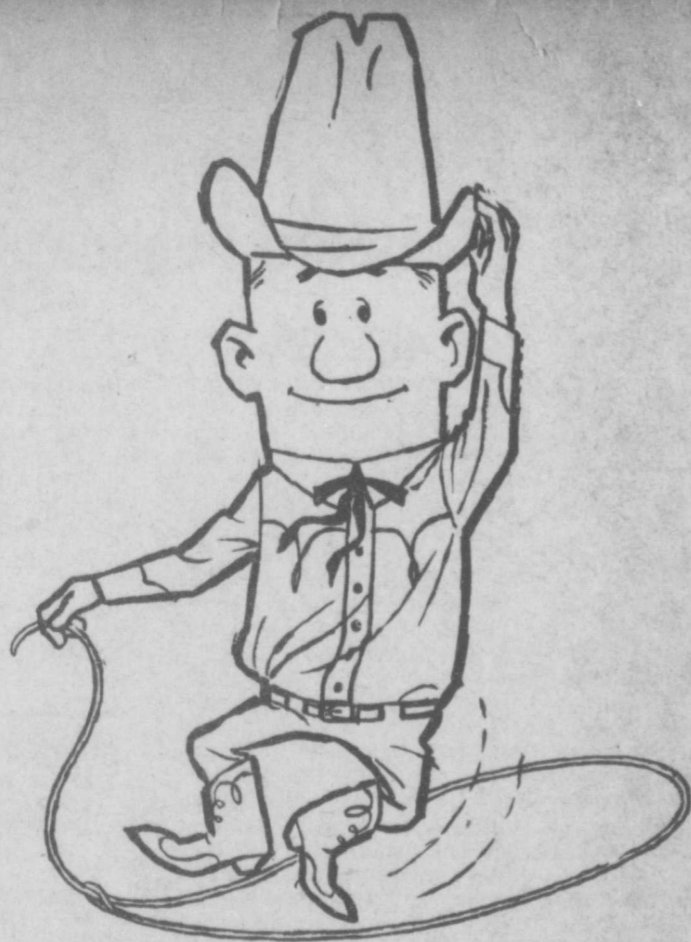

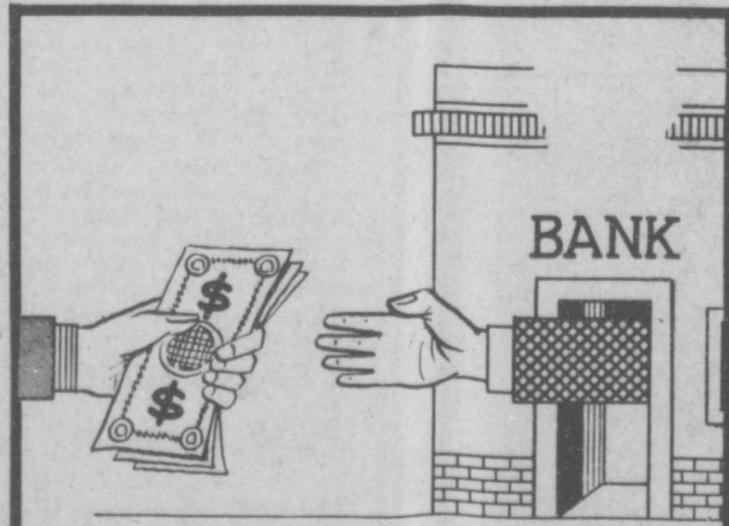

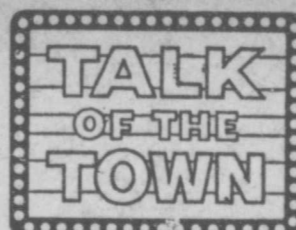
