

on Saturday, April 20 at Waco, The Peace Corps uses the Placement Test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. The test requires no preparation and is non-competitive; an

applicant can neither pass nor Persons interested in serving with the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before the test. Application forms are available from post offices or from the Peace Corps in

Washington, D.C. 20525. Twelve thousand volunteers are currently serving in Asia, Africa, Latin America and the Pacific Islands, working with the people of those nations in self-help projects ranging from agriculture and nutrition to auto mechanics, education mechanics, education health. He noted that cancer will claim more than 15,000 Texans this year, but that 1,500,000 Americans are alive today, cured of cancer. Governor Connally saluted the volunteers of the American Cancer Society for their work. He said the Society's programs are necessary for the final

Geraniums Excellent - Durable

Geraniums are excellent plants for mass effects in the landscape. They may be planted any time after the night temperature remains above 50 degrees Fahrenheit, says E.E. Jaane, Extension landscape horticulturist at Texas A & M University. Geraniums are easily grown

and will tolerate a wide range of conditions providing sound, healthy plants are obtained, Janne adds. Plants of the new All - America seed selections shoudl be available in the nursery and garden center outlets at this time. Plants grown from seed will usually provide a souce of disease - free plants for the garden. These All-America Seed selections include the following varieties. Care-free Bright Pink, Carefree Deep Salmon and Carefree Deep Scarlet.

peat moss spaded into the top six inches should produce good geraniums, advises the horticulturist. Two to three pounds of complete fertilizer per 100 square feet, such as 8-8-8 or 12-12-12, should be incorporated into the soil with the peat moss, he adds.

Even though the plants are small when set, be sure to allow ample space for their growth and development.

A minimum of 15 inches should be allowed between plants. If the plants are watered and fertilized at regular intervals, they will soon provide a solid blanket of green foliage topped with attractive flowers over the entire bed. Although it is often advocated, pinching the top out of geranium plants is not necessary if ample space is provided. It is only crowded plants that produce the tall, leggy growth, re-

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FORECAST Some Varieties Of Range **Grasses Can Survive Flooding**

Bermudagrass, buffalograss, vine - mesquite and knotgrass can survive more than 20 days of flooding, according to a U-nited States Department of Ag-

riculture agricultural engineer. E.D. Rhoades, working at the Oklahoma Agricultural Experiment Station at Chickasah, said these flood - tolerant varieties are suitable for plainting in detention reservoirs.

Hundreds of retention dams have been built on upstream tributaries of United States rivers in recent years, and the acreage flooded at times is considerable.

Teh reservoirs store excess runoff water during flood seasons: at other times they are used for grazing livestock.

B. J. Ragsdale, Extension range specialist, said the engineer built six impoundment basins that simulated field conditions. Grasses in basins were established and flooded with water from five to 20 dyas at

depths up to six feet.
Tests were run in early spring, midspring and late spring to correspond to normal flood seasons, Ragsdale

Varieties which survived up to 20 days of flooding were Kanlow switchgrass, lowland switchgrass, Reed canarygrass, prairie cordgrass, and Florida paspalum.

Caddo switchgrass, upland switchgrass, western wheatgrass, rice cutgrass and smooth seedpaspalum survived 15 days of flooding while big bluestem and sand bluestem, rice cutgrass and Virginia wildrye and beaked panicum survived for 10 days. Varieties that survived up to five days of flooding were

Incentive payments under the National Wool Act were mailed to wool and mohair producers on April 1 by the Coryell County ASCS Office. Four hundred ninety - four checks, totaling \$125,123,66 were mailed to producers who had filed applica-tions on their 1967 sales of wool and unshorn lambs. The wool payments were based on 65.8% of the net proceeds from the wool. Unshorn lamb payments were based on \$1.05 per cwt.

Three hundred fifty - eight checks were mailed to mohair producers. These payments totaled \$198, 799.35. Mohair payments were computed at 86.8% of the net proceeds from the sale of the mohair.

As authorized by a referendum of wool and mohair growers, a promotion fund deduction of 1.5% per pound was made from wool and mohair payments and 7.5¢ per cwt. on unshorn lambs.

Producers may file applica-tions on their 1968 sales of wool, unshorn lambs, and mohair from the date of sale through January 31, 1969.

R.E.A. Old Friend Of The Farmer

Dim, flickering and smelly oil lamps were the only source of light in all but a handful of farm and ranch homes when the Rural Electrification Administration was established as a lending agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture in 1935.

Farmers and other rural residents needed electric power, but they had no way of getting it because of distance and prohibitive costs. When the rural electrification program offered a solution through lowinterest loans and advice on how to master technicalities in constructing and operating electric systems, response was immediate and widespread.

From this grassroots movement emerged the electric cooperative --- a service organization created, owned and operated by the people it serves. As a group, electric cooperatives have received about 93 percent of almost \$5 billion in electrification loans made by REA and, as a result, have been largely responsible for the extension of electric ser-vice into the rural areas of the nation.

Today, more than 96 percent of all U.S. farms have central station electric service. In Texas, 96.8 percent of the rural residents are serviced efficently and economically by 77 REA-financed electric distribution cooperatives and other suppliers.

Farmer-owned cooperatives have proved themselves equal to the challenge of serving once neglected rural areas and making it pay. They have wisely invested the REA funds entrusted to them and are paying off their loans faster than they become due.

Texas farmers, ranchmen, country schools, hospitals and small businessmen have at their fingertips the electric energy they need for a better life, increased productivity and opportunity for economic advancement.

In 1949, success of the rural electrification program prompted congressional authorization. for REA to make loans to improve and extend telephone service in rural areas. Under this newer program, modern telephone service is becoming a reality for more than 1-1/2 uation, says Box. million American farm and rural families.

Late Planting of Grain Sorghum May Cause Problem

Planting grain sorghum and corn this late in the season may present problems to many Central Texas producers who have been hampered by the wet, cool weather, says John Box, Extension soil management specialist at Texas A & M University. Although many producers have had little chance to pre-pare their land for planting, there is still time to do the job correctly without disturbing the

soil too much, says Box. Care should be taken not to overwork the soil and possibly lose necessary moisture which may lead to problems in getting a good stand. A minimum of tillage should be the rule in readying the land for planting,

A regular medium-late maturing variety should be planted at a rate of six to eight pounds of seed per acre. The seed should be planted when the temperature reaches 60 degrees or more when taken about eight inches deep at 7 or 8 in the morning. With the weather in the Central Texas area as it is, the seed planted now should produce a good stand in five to seven days, says the specialist.

If a fertilizer has not already be added later. From the time the plants emerge until they reach 10 to 14 days old, a complete fertilizer can be chiseled into the soil about 10 inches from the young plants. If it is not possible to get into the field for three or four weeks after emergence, then nitro-gen should be sidedressed instead of a complete fertilizer. The nitrogen should be chiseled about 20 inches from the plants and about four to six inches

If weeds become a problem in he growing plants, it may be best to use a rotary hoe, depending on the individual sit-







WHAT'S THE MOST IM-PORTANT PART OF A GOLFER'S DRIVE? Arnold Palmer says it's the 12 inches away from the ball at the start of the swing. To improve your drive take the club back slowly, parallel to the ground for the first 12 inches; let your hands do all the work. Then, in unison, turn your shoulders, hips and knees - with the left shoulder and arm bringing the club back to the top of the back-



WHICH OF THESE TENNIS MISTAKES DO YOU MAKE? Does your elbow have a tendency to lead? Are you bending from the waist rather than from the knees? Is your racket head dropping below waist level? To correct all these, use both hands when hitting a backhand



WHEN BOWL-ING, DO YOU HAVE a difficult time bringing the ball forward with accuracy? To improve your aim, don't let the ball loop behind you. Your arm should travel like a pendulum in the backswing.
