## Two Men Charged In State School Threat

Two San Antonio men have been charged with threatening to take the life of a human being in an incident at the State School for Boys, Wed-nesday morning at 7:30.

James David Lane, 18, and Charles Edgar Doyle III, 24, both of San Antonio, allegedly pointed a Springfield rifle at Bill Carter, a State School Guard in a planned attempt to secure freedom for a boy at the school.

County Sheriff, Windy Cummings reported that the boys fled the school, heading last through Coryell City and O-Between the two communities, the suspects disposed of a 22 caliber pistol, double barrel shotgun and the Springfield rifle.

Cummings reported that the men were picked up between Valley Mills and Waco on Highway 6 by Texas Ranger Captain

The two suspects were returned to County Jail at about 11:00 a.m., Wednesday. Bond was set at \$2,000.

No connection has been found between the Miller incident and the State School threat.

Sheriff Cummings began conducting a complete investigation early Thursday.





The Senior Class of Evant High School presented its 1968 Senior Class Play, "Aunt Su-sie Shoots the Works" in the Evant High School gymnasium





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

Only California comes close duplicating the wonderful display nature lavishes on the citizens of Texas. Although spring is the most obvious season for wild flowers, our own Central Texas area hastthem blooming all twelve months of

That people from other states appreciate this wild beauty is evidenced in the comments you will hear from tourists passing through at this time of the year and also by the fact that in East Texas, the Dogwood Trails attract around 100,000 visitors in the spring and the Autumn Trails at Winnsboro registered 15,000 visitors in one six-week period. I found the seeds of twelve Texas wildflowers listed for sale in just one of my seed catalogs, as more proof of their popularity.

With ever increasing land use for building, farming and livestock, our wild gardens are disappearing. It is up to our generation to begin the conservation practices that will provide a permanent place for these flowers in our landscape or "acres of bluebonnets" will mean no more to our grandchildren that "a sea of grass as high as the stirrups" means to us. Our new multi-laned highways with their broad shoulders and wide median strips offer one of the likeliest areas for native plants to be protected and displayed in addition to locally sponsored parks, trails and reserve areas. It is up to us to guarantee future generations the same privilege of enjoying this wild free beauty as we ourselves
