

The May 4th Democratic Primary is the first big political day of the politically packed year, 1968. In Coryell County, like many Texas counties, the Democratic Primary is the Democratic Primary is the main line to the November general elections.

On the state-wide scene and on the local level, some of the races will probably be narrowed to two contestants for a special June run-off primary. To receive the Democratic nominations on the first primary ballot, a candidate must have a clear cut majority of all votes cast in the primary.

Because of the Democratic Party's domination of the Texas and county political scene, it is often overlooked that the Republican Party is holding its first primary election, Satur-

day, May 4th.

The polls will open in all voting boxes at 8:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m. Citizens must vote in the voting precinct where they live.

On the county level, six contested races have developed. The race drawing the most candidates is for County Commissioner, Precinct 2. Pat Hollingsworth of Gatesville, Ben E. Mickan of Copperas Cove, J.C. Tennison of Gatesville and Mrs. Ruby Evetts of Flat are all seeking the nomination.

The only county-wide elec-tions will be for the nomination of County Tax Assessor-Collector with Holice B. Barton and the incumbent, Jack B. Whigham both running for

In Precinct 1, two races have developed. Three men are Ed Spradley and P.R. (Slim)

Commissioner, Precinct 1 will also be decided Saturday with Otha Medart and Curtis Smith both seeking the position. In Commissioner's Precinct 3, the ballot will have a selection between incumbent Jim Searcey and Rolan d Wright.

At the state level, there are Democratic candidates seeking the gubernatorial nominations: Preston Smith, Edward L, Whittenburg, Eugene Locke, Pat O'Daniel, Don Yar-borough, Waggoner Carr, Al-fonso "Al" Veloz, Johnnie Mae Hackworthe, Dolph Briscoe and John Hill.

For Lieutenant Governor, Don Gladden, Gene Smith and Ben Barnes are seeking the

State Representative Bob Salter is unopposed for his seat in the Texas House. Three referendums are to

be voted for or against. Voting on the referendums is only to determine public opinion and will have no effect on legis-

Question number two seeks public opinion on whether the State should legalize horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering ona a local option basis.

Question number three asks the public to say whether a state commission should be created to fix the wholesale and retail price of milk.

Completed Thursday

The Texas Railroad Commission held a hearing to determine whether or not to discontinue the Gatesville Agency.

The St. Louis Southwestern Railroad's Attorney presented their case for a non-agency station, first claiming that local merchants wishing to use the rail facility can complete the necessary communications with the Waco office as conveniently as with a local agent.

The Cotton Belt representatives pointed out that a 24 hour office was available to shippers using the Waco office with complete tariff schedules and routing information as opposed to the present "skeleton schedules" maintained at both Gatesville and McGregor.

A discussion concerning the condition of the track between Gatesville and McGregor was raised by Attorney, Bob Cummings for the Chamber of Commerce and Gatesville. Trains traveling to Gatesville have a minimum speed set at 20 mph.

Railroad officials pointed out that track maintenance depends upon volume of traffic. It was pointed out that the "local" is scheduled for three round trips to Gatesville each week, since May 1, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

Information furnished during Cotton Belt officials testimony pointed out that the North Ft. Hood - Gatesville area had net income for two years, 1966-67 of \$44,562.79. A monthly breakdown of the net income show that at no time did the St. Louis Southwestern railroad lose money. The lowest single month was July, 1967 with \$23,01 and the biggest single month was October of 1966 with \$13,276.95.

A family receiving a pander-ing advertisement which it finds offensive now has authority under a recently passed Federal law to ask that its members receive no more mail of any kind from the sender. An advertisement is considered pandering if it offers to seel material which is, in the opinion of the recipient, "erotically arousing or sexually provocative."

Under this new law, the mail patron is the sole judge of whether an advertisement is offensive to him and whether he wants to continue to receive that sort of material from the sender. Last year the Post Office Department received some 140,000 complaints -we handled about 25 of those at the Gatesville post office --from those offended by pander-ing advertisements. In most cases those ads were not legally obscene and were therefore mailable. Because the new law gives a mail patron the sole right to decide what is offen- The NEWS Is \$1.00 sive, and does not deny others

the right to receive the same mail, the Congress felt it does not violate Constitutional guaranttes of freedom of speech. If a person receives an ad-

vertisement through the mail which he considers to be pandering, he should bring it and the envelope in which it was mailed to the post office. It is important that we have the envelope as well as the advertisement. He will be asked to sign a request that the mailer refrain from mailing further advertisements to him. The mailer is then ordered to remove that person's name from his mailing list. If the mailer does not comply, a Federal Court order may be obtained directing compliance. Failure to observe the order may be punishm may be punishable by a fine

or imprisonment. While thep patron's complaint will only be directed to the sender, we believe that one or two complaints will provide substantial protection because the bulk of this advertising comes from fewer than 20 socalled "smut dealers" who are frequently swapping mail-

THE ROAD AHEAD

Steel labor negotiations this summer will have an important effect on the national economy, and could very well determine to what extent Uncle Sam will become the ultimate arbiter at the negotiation table.

As R. Conrad Cooper, Executive Vice President-Personnel Services United States Steel Corporation, said in a recent address: "Let us start with my oftenexpressed belief that we have concentrations of collective bargaining power in this country which are unwieldy, unfair, unmanageable, economically unhealthy, and strategically not in the public interest.

"We see too little evidence of good-faith collective bargaining in practice today. Instead we see a succession of massive power plays, tactics which I believe are heading us in a direction that endangers both collective bargaining and the competitive free enterprise system of the country.

"We of steel management constantly strive to vehicle. The investigation was encourage traveling the road of a more constructive use of collective bargaining power. We see little evidence of congressional will to legislate the second road-namely, to establish a proper balance of collective bargaining strength as between management and labor."

> Any shutdown in this key industry would materially affect our balance-of-payments problem, through the increase of imported steel. In any settlement where wage increases exceed productivity, an inflationary spiral of the entire domestic economy is the end result.

> Let's hope this is given serious thought and consideration by both parties.

Nation's Capital Railroad Terminal to be United States Visitors' Center

A new National Visitor Center is being constructed in Union Station, Washington, D.C.

The conversion of the railroad station into visitor facilities is expected to be completed within 20 months, according to Rep.

Kenneth Gray (D.-Ill.).

The Washington Terminal Company will spend up to \$16 million to alter the old station to serve tourists and to construct a 4,000-car garage. The Interior Department will lease the property from the company. It has been recommended that the exhibits and information services encourage tourist travel throughout the United States.





I do not believe there are very many people in the 11th District who are seriously hungry and who can't get a job to pay for their own food or assistance from a re-lief agency to meet their im-

As a matter of fact, just yesterday I received copy of an advertisement placed in a local paper on April 6th in one of these counties which are supposed to have a large number of starving people. The ad sought to get someone "with or without experience" to work raising broilers. I also have a letter from the businessman who put the advertisement in the paper stating that he had only had one call with reference to the advertisement and that the party already had

I know there are people who need help. I know there are people who are disabled, or who for some reason can't get a job, and I think we should help all those who can't provide for their own needs. But most peo ple in Central Texas can get a job if they want to. If they can get a job, there is no need for them to starve, and I believe that if an able-bodied man can get a job, he ought to have to do so rather than to have the government support him. I think it is much more important to build new industries and new business and to support him. I think it is much more important to build new industries and new business and to support a prosperous agriculture and to thus create more jobs than it is to duplicate and, indeed, triple our food distribution programs.



Packaging is lightening the load of the American combat soldiers in Vietnam. Soldiers on long-range patrols carry their meals in lightweight vacuum-packed pouches containing new freeze-dried entrees. This new food and package form is not a replacement for canned "C" rations, nor hot food served to soldiers in the field, but is being employed by special action forces in remote areas where resupply may not be possible for at least 10 days.

Each canvas pouch weighs about 12 ounces. Available freeze-dried meals are: beef hash, beef stew, beef with rice, chicken stew, chile con carne, and scalloped potatoes and spaghetti with meat sauce, plus seasoning.
