It was the first time a Baird player had been named to the District team since it was the first year for the Bears in 1-A competition.

Governor Ask Law Officials For Support

Governor Price Daniel said today he had written all Texas sheriffs and chiefs of police asking that they join Col. Homer Garrison, Director of the Department of Public Safety, in assigning "every available man to streets and highways during dangerous holiday traffic periods. Our hope is that careful driving and extra law enforcement will hold the traffic death toll below the 92 fatalities estimated by the Department."

The Department of Public Safety has officially estimated that the 11-day "Operation Deathwatch" would produce 92 traffic deaths between 12:01 A. M., Saturday, Dec. 22, and 11:59 P.M., Tuesday, Jan. 1.

The Governor said he was pleased by the announcement from Col. Garrison that the regular manpower of the Texas Highway Patrol would be augmented by 150 uniformed men from the License and Weights and Motor Vehicle Inspection Divisions to assist with holiday traffic.

"I feel sure that our Texas sheriffs and chiefs of police will cooperate with Col. Garrison and his men in holding down traffic violations this year, as they have in every holiday season in recent years," the Governor said.

"Because excessive speed and driving while drinking were the two principal causes of fatal highway crashes, both last Christmas and last year, I am asking all law enforcement agencies to crack down especially hard on these violations," the Governor added. "Our highways are built to provide maximum safety for all highway users, and we should not permit a dangerous few to wreck the safety and enjoyment of the many."

The Baird High School Band and the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse have been invited to participate in the opening day parade of the 1963 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, the nation's oldest major livestock exposition and home of the world's original indoor rodeo.

The parade will step off at 2 p.m. Friday, January 25, in downtown Fort Worth. The 1963 Southwestern Exposition is scheduled January 25 through February 3.

There will be 20 performances of the Fort Worth Rodeo during the Southwestern Exposition; this year featuring a unique new setup in which three major rodeo producers will furnish their toughest broncs and bulls at Fort Worth — voted rodeo's roughest by the cowboys themselves.

Minnie Pearl, popular country-style comedienne of "Grand Ole Opry" fame, will join the precision — riding Side — Saddle Susans, trick riders, The Flying Cimarrons and the comedy act of Ken Boen and the New Gray Mare as Fort Worth Rodeo specialty attractions.

Well over 10,000 livestock entries will be on exhibit at the 1963 Southwestern Exposition, founded 67 years ago in 1896.

Mrs. A. H. Hagar this week received an interesting letter from Barbara Holmes Worchester, formerly of Clyde, now residing

in the Philippines: "Dear Mrs. Hagar, "I am in the Philippine Islands and, as I promised, I will write and tell you a few things about the area. "I have a lovely, modern

(American style) house. From my front yard, I can see wild pigs and caribou running past the fence. The animals run wild and if we don't close our gate, they will come into the yard.

"From the kitchen window, in back of the house, I have a view of an inactive (I hope) volcano and a group of Philippine huts built from bamboo up on posts above the ground.

"I have some American neighbors who seem very friendly. Almost all of them have house girls and yard boys. The maids and yard boys keep things very clean and appear to be a happy bunch of people.

"Something that amazes me is the peddling and the things one can buy standing in the street or yard. Yesterday, I was offered rugs, lanterns and "Klees-mos trees" (Christmas trees). The market down town is hard to describe. I suppose one could buy almost anything standing there.

"Speaking of Christmas, it is very much celebrated here but the decoration would seem so different to us. There are tissue paper stars about the size of a small tire with long streamers and different colors interwoven through them. There are also huge white balls hanging from the walls and ceilings with large red poinsettia type flowers stuck on it or into the balls. There are also the traditional manger scenes and a few Santas.

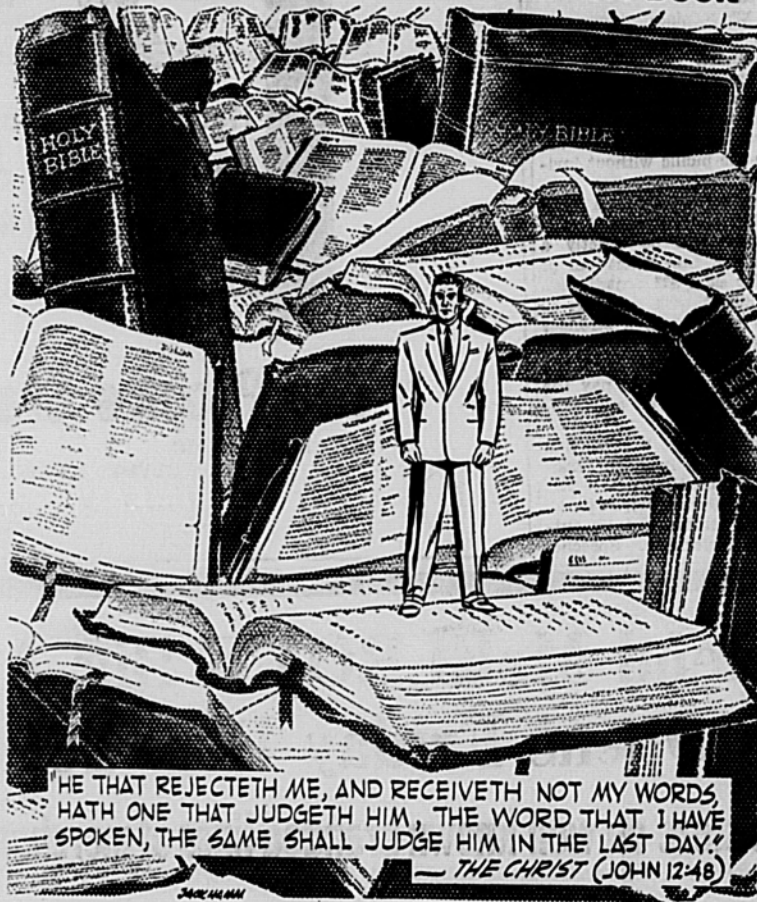

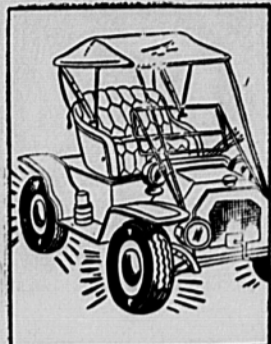

**From the Discipline of the Methodist Church,
Paragraph 2022**

TEMPERANCE AND PUBLIC MORALS

The Methodist Church reasserts its long-established conviction that the legalization of intoxicants as beverages violates the Christian standards of morality and social concern which this nation claims to accept. Alcoholic indulgence inflicts serious loss to the community in damage to health and efficiency, death through traffic accidents, the creation and intensification of poverty and economic waste. It contributes to the public disorder, crime, and moral deviation now threatening the welfare of the nation, and the life of the church. It keeps alive the alcohol industry, with its insidious influence on social and public affairs.

The Methodist Church is in militant opposition to the liquor traffic also because its product assails the highest centers of personality and its procedures contribute greatly to the sickness and degradation of people, leading to deterioration of character, discord in family life, neglect and suffering of children. The use of alcoholic beverages adds serious and avoidable hindrance to our fellowship with God and creative helpfulness to men. Therefore, the church continues its unceasing battle against intoxicating liquors.

Because the church seeks to lead believing souls into fullness of life in Christ, our appeal is for total abstinence from all uses of intoxicants. Methodists, in refusing alcoholic beverages, should regard this as an essential part of their witness to the faith they profess and as evidence of loyalty to the highest. The practice of total abstinence should also be thought of by Methodists as a matter of stewardship concern for our brothers, for the inevitable influence of personal life imposes a solemn responsibility on each one.

Legislation as an effective means to outlaw beverage alcohol is a natural outgrowth of the concern of informed citizens. We desire to protect individuals, families, and communities from the pressures of the organized traffic in beverage alcohol.

We denounce the continued invasion of the American home by liquor advertisers who seek through magazines, radio, television, and other media to indoctrinate even our children in the use of alcoholic beverages. We deplore governmental toleration of this practice and call on the Congress of the United States to enact legislation to prevent the use of radio, television and other interstate means of advertising for such purposes.

We call upon good citizens to inspire and support legislation that will effectively control and prohibit the traffic in alcohol.
