

The council discussed sources of funds for the operation of the city and saw no reason for a change at the present time. The City Sales Tax is a possibility for new funds, however, the City probably could not benefit from the tax until May

TODAY IS LAST DAY TO VOTE ON TRANSFER

If you are a cotton producer in Coryell County, Robert L. Melbern, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, wants you to remember that Friday, May 17, is the last day to vote on the transfer -- by sale or lease -- of 1969 upland cotton allotments outside the county. Ballots were mailed early this month to all cotton producers of record and the

referendum started May 13. Ballots may be mailed or delivered in person to the ASCS county office, but they must be in the office or be postmarked not later than TODAY, May and mailed ballots must arrive at the county office before ballots are counted on May 22. A ballot in an en-

velope, postmarked after May 17 will not qualify as "eli-

The vote will decide only the question of whether a farmer in this county can sell or lease his 1969 - crop upland cotton allotment to someone who would use it in another county of this State. A two-thirds affirmative vote will permit such transfers. In no case can transfers be made outside the

Farmers are cautioned to fol-low all instructions in marking their ballots. They should be sure to sign the certification -- or the producer's mark should be witnessed -on the back of the envelope sent to them by the ASCS county office. This serves as evidence that the ballot was mark-

ed by the producer personally without undue influence by any person. Ballots are kept secret, although the counting of the ballots is public.

The public counting of the ballots will take place on May 22 at 9:00 o'clock in the ASCS county office. Anyone who wishes, may watch the counting. Because the transfer of cotton allotments is so important to growers, it is hoped that a large percentage of the cotton producers will cast their ballots. Any cotton producer in the county who has not received a ballot by mail is urged to get in touch immediately

with the ASCS county office.






Freedoms Council





at their top blooming period. This is a time when many rose lovers turn a light shade of envious green as they spot some new or different varieties in the garden of a friend or neighbor. Space, time and money are the main reasons we don't all have more roses than we do. As a help for the last reason, have you ever tried growing a rose bush from a slip off the plant of a friend?

Choose a piece about six inches long from the end of a woody stem, not the new light green shoots. This may be cut off at a slant or the bottom end may be slit up the middle about half an inch. Remove all flowers and buds from this stem, and all but the top three or four leaves. Find a spot in your garden that has good fertile soil and can be somewhat sheltered from the sun in the hot summer and protected from frost in the winter. A corner of a cold frame is

a very good place. Water the ground thoroughly at the spot you have chosen, then insert the rose stem into the ground about two inches and place a clear quart fruit jar over the top, being sure the neck of the jar is firmly in the ground. This makes a small green house to keep in the warmth and moisture needed to induce your rose cutting to make roots. The ground around the jar should be watered when needed but don't keep it soggy. If there are beads of moisture on the inside of the jar no additional

water is needed, Usually all the old leaves will turn brown and drop off, but don't be discouraged and do not remove the jar. When three or four new leaves sprout you may be sure the roots also are developing and it is time to take away your portable green house. Before removing the jar, water the ground thoroughly and be careful lifting it so as not to pull up the whole mass of dirt, roots and all. Your small rose bush should now stay where it is until of a good size to set out in the regular garden. If this is inconvenient, it can be transplanted to some other sheltered spot where it can be tended carefully and protected from hot sun and freezing weather. I like to remove most of the buds as they begin to form the so the rest of the plant has a chance to gain vigor.
