GULF STATES UNITED STRIKE IN 5th. DAY



... Night Vigil

The strike continues at Gulf States United Telephone exchange in Gatesville, now in the fifth day. Pickets man their post day and night. The employee walkout began Monday morning, May 20th at 10 o'clock. There has been no bargaining sessions scheduled between union and management at last report.

The Gulf States United Telephone Company strike is now into its fifth day with no development toward the essential Labor - Management bargaining tables.

The strike (employee walk out) began in Gatesville, Monday morning, May 20th at 10:00 o'clock when the employees staged a nearly 100% walkout and began picketing the local telephone office.

The Gulf States United Telephone System manager of Public Relations, Mr. W.H. Rafferty, released the following statement:

"Employees at some exchanges operated by Gulf States Telephone Company have walked off their jobs in violation of the collective bargaining agreement with International Brotherhood Electrical Workers, Local 1692. This is a valid and existing agreement which provides that during its term, there will be no strikes or work stoppages. Both IBEW Union and Local 1692 have told the company they did not call the strike and they disavow the strike. Local 1692 has agreed with the company that the strike is illegal. The strikers have not contacted the company or presented any demands. The company has advised strikers and union that failure of employees to report for their regular work will subject them to disciplinary action, including discharge or replacement by newly hired employees. Some employees were discharged today for refusal to report to work and for engaging in the illegal strike. The company also announced that permanent replacements have been hired for some strikers and others are now being hired through its District Managers.

The company is experiencing no substantial interruption in service and all call are being put through.

The company expressed its appreciation to the telephone using public for the courtesy and cooperation given to personnel during this illegal strike."

In talking with employee representative, Harold Cook, Wednesday, it was reported that Gulf States had shown no interest in talking at all with the employees.

Mr. Cook said, "They (management) are standing fast on what they believe". Cook pointed out "The employees believe that the company must realize that there is something wrong if all the employees in a telephone exchange can get up and walk out in unison".

Mr. Cook pointed out that his purpose was "to keep people on the job and prevent them from walking off the job". He stated that "all attempts to get the employees back to the job have been met by employee grievances.

Employees point out that "we do not have a comparable wage in this area". We felt that the company used bad judgment in proposing a four year contract."

The Labor-Management contract presently in effect, began in July of 1966 and does not expire until July of 1970.

Mr. Cook pointed out that "no provision was made in the contract for cost of living increases or for a "reopener clause" to allow reconsidering the agreement".

Management has begun to make replacements of the striking employees with an unofficial dismissal of 15 workers in the local exchange.

Employees and their representatives have stated that their first demand will be the reinstating of the dismissed employees.

Gatesville and Coryell County have never been confronted with this type of employee-management struggle. The company and labor union, likewise, have not experienced much in this area, having had sixteen years of routine contract agreements, with only one other wildcat strike and that strike in only one subsidiary of the system.

The most essential action, before normal operation can begin is effective communication between labor and management.

Country Club Will Seek \$85,760 Loan

The Gatesville Country Club Board of Directors, headed by club president, Louis Bone, will propose at a Friday evening, May 31 meeting, that the club authorize the board to obtain a \$85,760.00 loan from the Farmers Home Administration.

Mr. Bone announced the meeting to the 104 voting members of the club in a letter setting up four areas of discussion for the meeting.

The business meeting will be held in the Gatesville High School auditorium at 8:00 p.m.

Second order of business following a vote on the proposed loan, will be the incorporation of the club under the provisions of the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act. This is a requirement of all recreation

Provisions have been made for the business meeting to discuss any suggested amendments to the club's by-laws and any other business brought before the membership.

School Board Hears Citizens' Wishes



... COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD

The Coryell County School Board met Wednesday in the County Courtroom to allow the citizens of the Turnersville School District to state their preferences as to which of the four school districts they wish to affiliate with.

Approximately thirty-five interested citizens were on hand and a petition containing a list of other names and preferences was presented to the board.

County School Superintendent W.H. Donaldson, remarked to the group that "We, (the school board) will have to take these preferences and draw up boundaries taking into consideration your wishes as much as possible". "Where we possibly can, we will follow your wishes".

The county board has been

unable to set boundaries to date due to some legal questions, Mr. Donaldson stated Thursday morning that a trip to Austin would be necessary to clarify several points.

The board will consult with Mr. Leon Graham, assistant Commissioner of Education in Austin and return for another County School Board meeting, Monday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock.

Preliminary canvassing of the list of preferences shows the bulk of the school age children families are interested in going to Clifton, while the bulk of the land for tax purposes will lean toward Jonesboro.

During the Wednesday meeting, Superintendent L.C. McKamie of the Gatesville Independent School District, pointed

ed out to the group that the bonded indebtedness of the Turnersville School District would probably be prorated among the four school districts, according to land and children affiliating with each school.

Present indebtedness of the Turnersville School District is \$15,500, and this amount would be divided between the four schools.

A question as to the use of the Turnersville School Buildings was discussed and for community activities it was pointed out that it would be easier to maintain only one of the buildings for such purposes.

Mr. Donaldson reported from his preliminary review of the preferences of the citizens of the area that "we are not going to be able to satisfy too many".

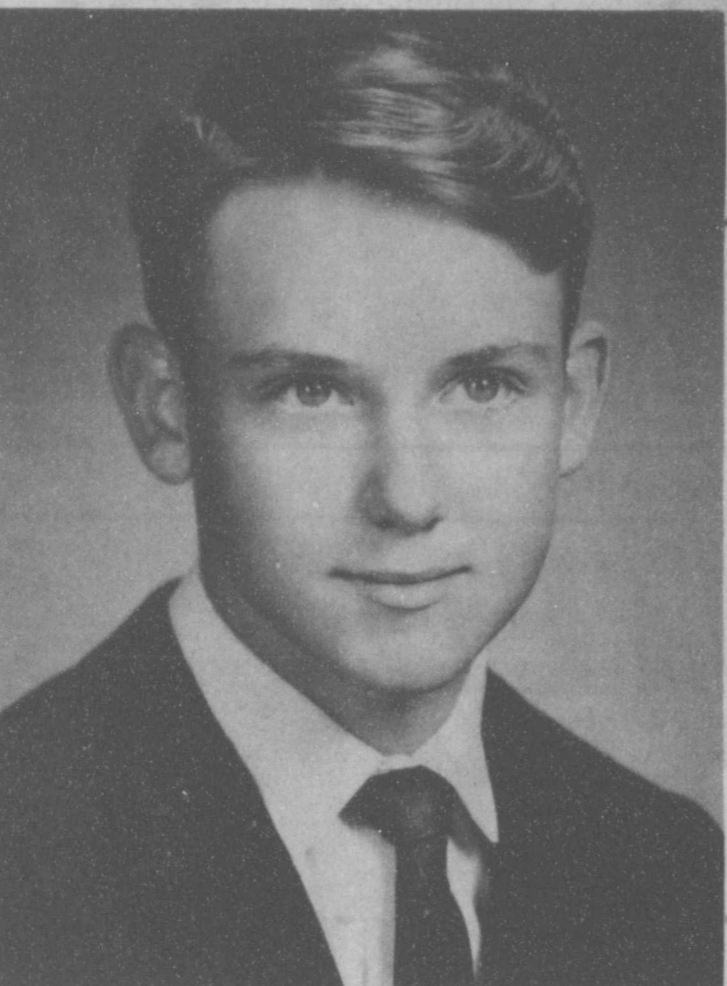

County Agent Report

It is time to control the number one enemy of the pecan, the Pecan Casebearer, said Don Callahan, County Agriculture Agent. Through information received from the Brownwood Experiment Station and Pecan Growers, May 24, 25 and 26 are the days for spraying.

The mixture for spraying should contain 2 pounds of Zinc Sulfate, 2 pounds of Sevin and 1-1/4 pint of Malathion per 100 gallons of water. The Zinc Sulfate is to prevent Rosette disease (a Zinc deficiency) common to pecan trees. The malathion is to

give quick kill of the pecan nut casebearer and the slower acting Sevin will give a larger more residual control.

Be sure and wet the foliage of the tree thoroughly, taking care and making certain that the nut clusters are treated. Due to the cool weather and the irregularity of the hatching of the casebearer moth, a second application should be applied in 5 to 6 days after the first spraying to get an effective control.

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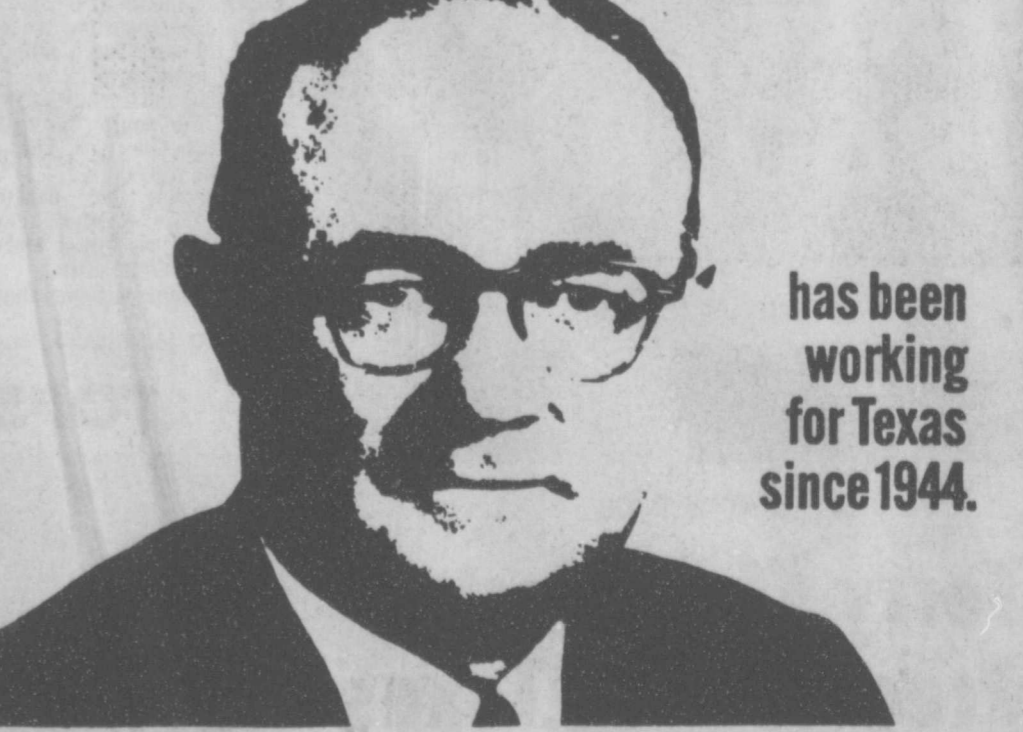

Now that our abundant spring rains have put a goodly amount of moisture into the ground, it is time to spread some kind of mulch around flowers, vegetables, trees and shrubs. This will not only save a lot of hoeing and weed pulling, but will stop most of the water evaporation from the soil and keep plant roots cool during the hot weather that is fast approaching.

Almost anything handy can be used for a mulching substance. In your flower beds and front yard area, you may want to use some of the commercially prepared materials such as a peat moss, cocoa hulls or even coffee grounds as these are more earth colored and present a neater appearance.

In larger areas and back yards, you can use rotting hay, leaves, grass cuttings, cottonseed hulls, ground corncobs or sawdust. All of these materials will also aid your garden when they are plowed into the soil in the fall. Sometimes the decomposition of the sawdust or corncobs will use up some of the nitrogen in the soil. This can be remedied by scattering a little cottonseed meal down the rows before laying the mulch.

Layers of newspapers or magazine pages can also be used and are especially good for keeping down the weeds. These should be put down the middle of the rows, leaving the area right around the plants open to receive future rains. The biggest disadvantage of paper or the new plastic materials is having to remove them after the garden season is over. Whatever you use, be generous with the amount you spread and you should be able to enjoy a more carefree garden.

HOME DEMONSTRATION REPORT

by Grace Chandler

Pampering your laundry goes a long way towards saving ironing time. Here are ways to get good results from easy-care fabrics and prevent laundry wrinkles:

Wash in small loads -- big loads can compress garments and wrinkle them.

Wash easy-care fabrics often. Don't wait for heavy soil to build up. Fresh soil and stains are easy to remove. The longer the delay in washing, the harder it is to get out stains.

Pretreat greasy soil with cleaning fluid, full strength liquid detergent or detergent paste. Work detergent into fabric and soak 10 to 15 minutes for color fast fabrics.

Use cool or warm water. If necessary to soil removal, you may use hot water for washing, but do not spin out the

wash water until it feels cool to the hands. Adjusting controls by hand -- if necessary -- can save ironing.

Wash only long enough to remove soil.

Rinse in water that feels cool or cold to the hands (below 98 degrees F.). Shorten the water extraction time after wash and rinse cycles, if not automatically done by your machine.


When clothes are nearly dry, tumble for ten minutes without heat.

Remove immediately and hang.

Many new models of washers and dryers have durable press or wash and wear settings, which automatically regulate or "program" short cycles and desirable temperatures for washing, spinning and drying. This makes hand regulations of controls unnecessary.
