14,520 National Guard Troops To Train N.F.H. Temporary Restraining Order Against Strikers

The First Armored Division Site Support Unit, commanded by Lieutenant Col. Kenneth L. Chesak has been busy opening North Fort Hood for another summer of National Guard Training.

The 130 men and 37 officers of the 4th Battery of the 3rd Artillery Battalion have been assigned the job and have been at work since April 15.

The job of opening the post for summer camp is 80.9% complete and has consumed 41,794 man hours. Some 1200 tents will have been erected by mid-June and 588 mess tables. Countless odd jobs, such as cleaning of 37 headquarters unit offices, 49 kitchens and grass cutting in the tent area must receive attention.

The 4th Battery will not train National Guard units, but will support the 14,520 two-weekers in three groups.

The first group to train this summer, the 36th Separate Infantry Brigade, will begin Sunday, June 2 and break camp on June 16. The 36th is headquartered in Fort Sam Houston and the Brigade is composed of 4218 South Texas guardsmen.

The second encampment will begin June 23 and continue through July 7. The 5062 men of the 72nd Separate Infantry Brigade will train in a similar manner as the 36th Brigade. Both units will train in the Army's third stage of training, B.U.T., Basic Unit Training. Training in B.U.T. is in Brigade size unit operations.

The third and final unit of this year's training program, the 71st Star Emergency Operation Headquarters Brigade, consisting of 5250 men will occupy the camp from July 14 to July 28.

The Star Emergency Operation units is comprised of smaller units with special capabilities. Many field service units will be involved in a variety of training programs including an air mobil unit, Air Mobil is an outgrowth of the Vietnam War and is especially adapted to helicopter maneuvers.

The First A.D.'s job ends in early August when North Fort Hood is laid to rest for another year.

Gulf States - United Telephone Company announced today that on May 23rd it had filed for and been granted a temporary restraining order prohibiting use of physical violence or threats of violence, intimidation of employees, supervisors or officers or customers. The order further prohibited intimidating, abusing or threatening any person or persons leaving Plaintiff's premises or servicing its equipment and named the Company's offices in Gatesville, Hamilton, Athens, Commerce, Overton, Stephenville, Cooper, Grosbeck, Kaufman, Troup and Tyler, Texas. The order was entered by T.E. Roberts, Judge of the 52nd Judicial District and was sought after numerous acts of sabotage and threats of violence had occurred, especially in the Coryell County area. The action is in response to a Wildcat Strike of some Gulf States employees beginning on May 19.

The Company has reported finding nails in the driveways and entranceways to some of its plants, and damage and sabotage to some of its lines which have caused interruptions of local and interstate telephone service. The Company has photographed and documented these occurrences and has requested investigation by the

State Authorities. The order named the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, AFL-CIO, Local #1692, as well as its business agent and numerous other individuals as Defendants.

The order further enjoins all Defendants from doing any act which would either injure or destroy property, equipment of Gulf States - United Telephone Company or which would otherwise obstruct, hinder or delay service and operations.

Attorneys for the Company stated that such legal recourse was not sought until it became apparent that the Wildcat Strike was resulting in threats and abuse to employees and in destruction of the Company's property which interfered with telephone service.

The boundaries set will place the Turnersville School plant in the Gatesville section.

The County School Board attempted to establish the boundaries on roads, therefore, allowing two school systems to service the people along the boundary road.



CAPITAL BRIEFS

FEDERAL AUSTERITY—In speaking about austerity, Rep. H. R. Gross (R-Iowa), said, "Take the Bureau of Mines in the Interior Department. There, \$20,188.07 has been spent for fresh paint, rugs, drapes, furniture and lighting for the director's office. Included in this is \$1,500 for the services of an interior decorator. Although the director's office was already equipped with six expensive oriental rugs, wall-to-wall carpeting had to be installed and now the oriental rugs will be laid right on top of the new carpeting. Rug-on-rug is said to be the latest

fashion in Washington these days and of course, no government executive could be expected to settle for less even though the federal treasury is busted, and even though this is the glorious year of 'Austerity.'"

GRANTS APPROVED

Planning grants for two more State Regional Sewage Treatment Facilities were made by the Texas Water Quality Board. Approved was a \$300,000 grant for the Alamo Area Council of Governments (San Antonio River Basin) and one for \$95,650 to the Coastal Bend Regional Planning Commission (Corpus Christi region). 
After Superintendent McKamie's address, the class of '68 rose and sang the Gatesville High School Alma Mater for a final tribute to their school.

Vast federal areas fail to serve the public unless developed and available for family enjoyment.

PARKS NEED PEOPLE

During the summer, we look forward to enjoying the beauties of nature and wildlife in the world around us. It may be bird-watching, a drive through the woods, a row across the lake or a walk along a nature trail.

The beauty of our natural resources and our wildlife is almost lost when they are too remote from many people who are locked out by distance.

The average American does not travel for vacations more than 500 miles from his home, if that far, according to the Outdoor Recreation Resources Review Commission Report. Further transportation improvements may extend this: 11 per cent may go 500 miles; 6 per cent, 750 miles; 17 per cent, 1,000 miles; and 10 per cent may reach 2,000 miles or more. It seems safe to say that most of the people will never see many of the federal parks.

About a third of the national land area has been acquired by the federal government down through the years, and the government continues to acquire more land supposedly for recreational purposes rather than develop the land it already owns.

Great emphasis has been placed on preserving vast roadless wilderness areas in the West. None of us would argue with the preservation of certain areas outstandingly superior in scenic quality and beauty. However, proper balance in land use policies would give appropriate weight to the factors of accessibility and availability. For example, a vest-pocket park in a congested city may make more sense than tremendous remote acreages beyond the viewing horizon.

Let's develop local recreational areas, oriented to people.

Auto Thefts Cost Americans More Than \$650 Million

In the past year, 671,700 automobiles were stolen in the United States with an estimated value in excess of \$650 million, according to William J. Davis, Western Division manager of the National Auto Theft Bureau.

Mr. Davis noted that the figure does not include the value of a large number of auto accessories such as batteries, radios and tires, or of personal belongings stolen from automobiles. In 1967 this loss to American car owners was over \$104 million, he claimed. In terms of economic losses resulting from unrecovered cars, the total was more than \$238 million in 1967, Mr. Davis stated.

Highlights and Sidelights

Your Capitol is bursting with life on the eve of the most significant political and governmental events -- the June 1 runoff election, the June 4 beginning of a special session of the Legislature and the June 11 conventions of State Democratic and Republican parties.

Although there are 15 runoffs in Legislative races to be decided Saturday, the main bout, of course, is that between Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and Houston Attorney Don Yarbrough.

Probably no more than a million voters will decide whether moderate - conservative Smith or liberal Yarbrough will be the Democratic nominee for governor.

Each is reaching for the other's voter potential. Smith boasts of his 18 years' governmental experience; Yarbrough, without governmental experience, urges his own "fresh approach" and "constructive programs", including lower auto insurance rates and consumer protection.

Even name identification -- usually considered the well-spring of political success -- won't be the deciding factor between these two. Both have been in statewide races nearly a decade and are well-known names on the ballot.

Incidentally, the winner may find surprisingly tough opposition in November from Republican nominee Paul Eggers of Wichita Falls.

Regardless of whether Smith, Yarbrough -- or Eggers -- is the next governor, the battle-wise Democratic legislative presiding officers, Lt. Gov., nominee, Ben Barnes in the Sen-

ate and Speaker-to-be Gus Mutscher of Brenham in the House, will be powerful figures to be reckoned with. Barnes admittedly aspires to higher office and Mutscher reportedly is interested in a long tenure in the House.

LEGISLATIVE RACES

There are few district races on the June 1 ballot and no other statewide contests. However, as far as professional politics go, the legislative races are very significant -- especially where the incumbents are concerned. This because "lame ducks" often vote differently from those re-elected.

Many eyes will be on the races between Sen. Burce Reagan and Rep. Ronald Bridges of Corpus Christi for the State Senate seat for that area; Rep. John E. Blaine versus Ramon Ramos of El Paso; Rep. J.E. Miller of Burkeville versus Don Adams; Rep. Bob Hendricks versus former Rep. Bill Dungan of McKinney.

Other runoffs involve top vote getters in local races where incumbents lost altogether or were not running for re-election.

LIQUOR LEGISLATION

DUE

Gov. John Connally's June 4 special session of the Legislature almost certainly will come to grips with important liquor legislation, probably including a mixed-drinks bill. A House study committee's report on how to improve present statutes has been promised before the special session begins. Rep. R.H. Cory of Victoria, chairman of the panel, and House Speaker Ben Barnes have indicated the report will contain major, controversial recommendations.

Results of the investigation made by Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin -- and his recommendations -- are also due by June 4.

Connally has strongly indicated he will urge the lawmakers to come up with a mixed - drinks bill as a part of his tax program. Observers believe that, instead of a straight booze-over-the-bar measure, he will ask for legislation permitting the sale of liquor in small, one-drink-sized bottles on a local option basis. This would mean that, if the bill passes, Texans still

will have to mix their own but at least they won't have to bring their own bottles.

STATE CONVENTIONS

Every even-numbered year state political parties hold two conventions. In presidential election years the June convention, customarily, is called the "presidential convention", and the September convention is known as the "governor's convention".

This year since the big issue in the State Democratic convention in Dallas on June will be whether Governor Connally is picked as the "favorite son", both Democratic party conventions will be "governor's conventions". If Connally is chosen as "favorite son", the first vote of the Texas delegation at the national convention in Chicago will go to Connally, the second to whomever he likes of the major candidates -- probably Hubert Humphrey.

Republicans, who will hold their convention in Corpus Christi on June 11, doubtless will pick US Sen. John Tower as their "favorite son". State GOP Chairman Peter O'Donnell of Dallas, and other southern GOP chairmen, met in New Orleans with hopefuls Gov. Ronald Reagan and Gov. Nelson Rockefeller. But O'Donnell is not expected to talk about a second ballot alternative to Senator Tower until he has conferred with Richard Nixon and considered results of talks with all three.

PORNOGRAPHY

WAR MAPPED

Attorney General Martin has mapped a drive against "lewd" movies and pornographic literature.

His office has received frequent complaints about circulation of obscenity, so he will ask the Legislature to tighten its control laws.

Specifically, Martin said he will ask for repeal of a portion of the penal code which exempts from control foreign films and movies that are in interstate commerce. Many of the complaints he receives concern pornography originating in Mexico and other foreign countries.

Martin will also seek legislation to include the attorney general among those granted authority to enforce the law by civil injunction. He criticized US Supreme Court decisions as having "torn down virtually all standards in judging pornographic materials".

SALES TAX

Board members of the Texas Municipal League will meet at El Paso on June 6. They are expected to discuss Gov-

ernor Connally's plan to abolish the city sales tax.

Connally's plan would raise the state sales tax from two to three per cent and funnel part of this money back to incorporated cities.

There is a difference of opinion among legal experts on the constitutionality of such a plan. Texas' Constitution may forbid the state from giving money to municipalities when there is no return to the state. Governor's advisors apparently feel the courts would be hesitant to deny funds to the state and cities with both in dire need.

Still, the sales tax change is quite likely to be sent to the Legislature when it convenes in special session next Tuesday.

ATTORNEY GENERAL

RULES

School districts are not authorized to issue time warrants for the purpose of purchasing unimproved land only. So held Attorney General Martin in a recent opinion. However, he stated that warrants can be issued to purchase school buildings and equipment.

State officials may be reimbursed by the government for expenses incurred in delivery of veterans land bonds to out-of-state banks, said Martin in another opinion.

Company Gives \$2.65 Million in Education Grants

A \$2,650,000 program of aid to education was announced by Roger M. Blough, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of United States Steel Foundation, Inc. The program comprises grants to 740 liberal arts colleges, institutes, and universities and to approximately 25 educational organizations and educational research projects concerned with raising the quality and improving the effectiveness of teaching and learning in America. "As in prior years," Mr. Blough stated, "our program is strongly related to our belief in the importance of the opportunity for the colleges and universities to pursue excellence in their own ways -- including the opportunity to experiment and innovate with new patterns of thought and knowledge transmission."

The Foundation's 1968 grants fall into four major categories: (1) about 46 per cent of the total, \$1,225,000, represents unrestricted operating grants to colleges, universities, and institutes; (2) about 23 per cent, \$610,000, is restricted for use by recipients only as to their institutionally chosen major-purpose or capital priorities; (3) about 10 per cent, \$500,000, is allotted for national and regional application toward research or projects designed to improve educational methods and administration; (4) about 19 per cent, \$500,000, is allotted for graduate-level fellowships and for other programs of manpower and womanpower development, and for institutional departmental grants. The balance of 2 per cent, or \$50,000, is for other educationally related uses.

We are beginning the best gardening season of all, when fresh vegetables are ready for our dinner tables. There is now an abundance of fresh green beans, to have by themselves, or with new potatoes, either creamed or buttered. Both of these dishes can be enhanced by a sprinkle of finely chopped parsley or dillweed.

Green beans are an excellent source of vitamins A, B1, and C, so be sure your family gets a lot of them while they are at the peak of goodness. If they tire of the usual way of serving the, try this sweet-sour sauce on them. Fry three slices of bacon until crisp, remove from pan and pour out all but two tablespoons of drippings. To these add a tablespoon of chopped green pepper and one small onion, chopped, and fry until the onion is clear. To this mixture, add two tablespoons of vinegar and two tablespoons of sugar, salt and pepper to taste and about 1/2 cup liquid from the cooked beans. Bring to a boil and pour over the beans, simmering a few minutes to blend the flavors.

While you are canning or freezing the surplus beans in your garden use a few of them to make Dilled Green Beans. Take about two lbs. of young, tender beans, wash, stem and blanch in boiling water for about three minutes. The pack uniformly in hot, sterilized jars. To each pint add 1/4 teaspoon red pepper, 1 clove garlic, 1 large head of dill and 1 small onion. Heat together two cups water, 1/4 cup salt and 1 pint vinegar. Bring to a boil and pour over beans. Seal at once. Makes four pints.



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


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
