Jaycees Have Approval On Lighting Program

The Gatesville City Council approved the Jaycee lighting project in their Tuesday night meeting.

The Jaycees, represented by Club President, Mike Blanchard, and interclub director, Damon Wicker, reviewed the proposed project with the councilmen.

The City Council agreed to accept the cost of maintaining the fixtures and pay the bills on the operation.

Jaycee President, Blanchard, pointed out to the council the estimates on electricity used in the project would not run over 21 kilowatt hours which would mean the display would cost only 31 to 35 cents per hour.

The Jaycees propose to use the display for an average of 4 - 5 hours per night, setting cost per day at about \$1.25.

Damon Wicker pointed out to the council that the most expensive replacement bulb for the fixtures cost \$17.50. Estimated life of the bulbs will be 5,000 hours.

Following the council's vote to accept maintenance and operating cost, the Jaycee organization began efforts to complete the final stage of the project construction.

Community Development Chairman for the Jaycees, Tom Kennedy, reported Thursday that the Jaycees would probably contact Verdi-Ray before Saturday and complete the contract for the fixtures.

Kennedy reported that the Jaycees will handle much of the

installation of the display with technical assistance from the Community Public Service and Verdi-Ray. The Jaycees, with their many varied talents, will be able to find specialists in all areas of installation, to donate their time for ditch digging, electrical wiring, masonry and management.

The project is expected to be complete by mid-July and the Jaycees are planning for a formal ceremony to celebrate the completion of the installation.

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Telephone Strike In 25th Day

The Gulf States Telephone Company strike continues into its 25th day with no settlement in sight.

Wednesday, both sides testified in 52nd District Court, in Hamilton, concerning a temporary restraining order issued by that court.

The Wednesday hearing ruled to continue the temporary restraining order into a temporary injunction.

Wicker's resignation is effective June 30, at which time the Wickers will move to their new home in New Mexico, where Damon will be employed in a similar capacity.

Two Taken to Texas Dept. of Correction

Thomas Harrelson and James R. Hall, both have been sent to the Texas Department of Correction in Huntsville, for five years.

Thomas Harrelson was indicted by the June Grand Jury for three felonies - burglary, escaping jail and theft. The charges were dropped of escape and theft, while Harrelson received five years on the burglary charge.

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City Council Raises Garbage Rates

The Gatesville City Council voted unanimously in favor of Sanitation Committee Chairman W.E. Poston's proposal to raise garbage collection service fees from \$.50 to \$1.25 per month on the residential rate and a new schedule of commercial pickups with increases ranging from no increase to more than 400% increase. The new rates will go into effect July 1st with first bill collection due August 1.

Poston reported to the council Tuesday night, that the sanitation department was operating at a loss and had been doing so for sometime. Poston said "We are not out to make money on the service, but just to break even."

The new rate will be in line with neighboring communities, such as Hamilton, \$1.00; Georgetown, \$1.00; Copperas Cove, \$1.25; Belton, \$1.25; Killen, \$1.25; Meridian, \$1.00 and West, \$1.00.

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collection rate. However, no action was taken. Asked the reason for the delay and size of the increase, Poston replied: "We voted to raise the service charge, however, action was delayed because of other fund raising measures. We have reached a point where we will need new equipment for "sanitation fills" by June of 1969 and the increase is calculated to include some of the new equipment."

Councilmen noted during the discussion that, at the new rate, cost per pickup would be approximately 12.5 cents.

The Sanitation Department will begin trash collection, as an additional service program, as a result of the increased rate. Trash collection will include pickup of items presently not permitted in garbage collection. Such items as grass clippings, scrap wood, tree and shrub trimmings and other items will be included.

The new service will promote a cleaner community by providing an easy method of disposing of rubbish.

Trash collection will be maintained on a twice monthly schedule with the city divided into two sections, alternating pickup on Wednesday. One week, collection will be on the north side and the next week, collection will be on the south side.

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Coryell County's Courthouse has been the subject of many discussions and photographs. Soon it will be an attraction and night-time spectacle for all to see.

The Jaycees will complete the project to light the courthouse by mid-July.

Phase II of Library Connally Bid Successful

Chairman of the Library Committee, O.D. Bates, met with the City Council to inform the council on a present action being taken by his committee on the new library.

Bates reported that the project is near the end of phase II of a three phase program need to receive the 50-50 Federal funds available for such projects.

The project is expected to cost \$86,000 for construction and will house 25,000 volumes of books in an air conditioned building.

In other council discussion, the council began studying a proposal to install mercury vapor lights along Highway 36 from the intersection of Highway 36 and 84 to the intersection of Lovers Lane and Highway 36.

City Manager, Eiland Lovejoy, reported Thursday, that the city would contact the Community Public Service Company for help in setting up a plan for lighting the section of highway.

No cost estimates are available at present on the project.

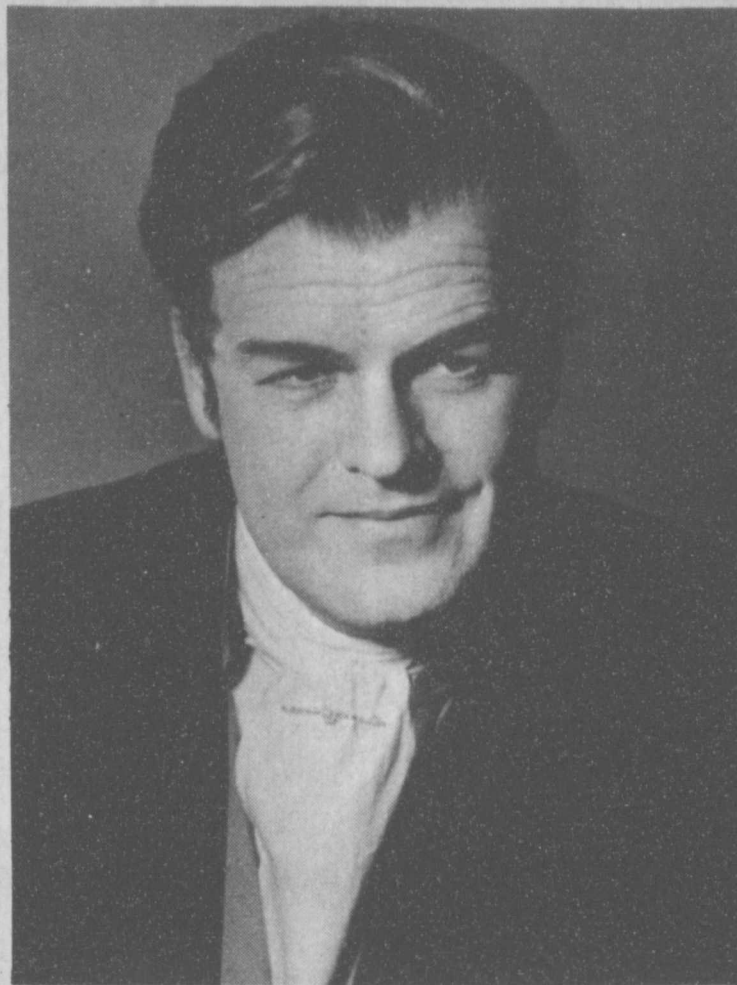
Don should be in his best years. He's capable of being great."
