## Lincoln Pays Farewell Visit To North Fort Hood

FT. HOOD, Lieutenant General Lawrence J. Lincoln, commanding general of Fourth U.S. Army, will make a farewell visit to Ft. Hood, July 2, prior to his scheduled retirement in August.

Gen. Lincoln and his wife are scheduled to arrive at Robert Gray Army Airfield at 10 a.m., where they will be met by Major General, J.A. McCristian, acting III Corps and Ft. Hood commander, and his wife.

Following the Fourth U.S. Army commander's arrival there will be an honor guard at the airfield. General Lincoln will "Troop the Line" comprised of two companies from the 13th Support Brigade. Music will be provided by the 1st Armored Division Band.

The general will then fly by helicopter to North Ft. Hood where he will visit the 72nd Brigade (Mechanized), a unit of the Texas National Guard. After touring the brigade, Gen. Lincoln will be guest of honor at a luncheon at the Ft. Hood Officers Open Mess.

Following the luncheon, the general will proceed by car through a cordon of guidons and colors from units at Ft. Hood to the helipad east of the Officers Open Mess. A salute battery will fire a 19-gun salute in the general's honor.

Also included in the cordon will be a static display of representative vehicles from the 1st and 2nd Armored Divisions and the 13th Support Brigade. The vehicles include an M-60 tank, 105 mm howitzer, armored personnel carrier and an Honest John Rocket.

The general and his wife will then go to Robert Gray Army Airfield where they will leave Ft. Hood.

Prior to his assignment as commanding general of the Fourth U.S. Army, Gen. Lincoln was deputy chief of staff logistics, Headquarters Department of the Army.

In 1963-64 he served as deputy commander of U.S. Army Ryukyu Islands and IX U.S. Army Corps, Okinawa.

He was named commanding general U.S. Army Engineer Center, and commandant, U.S. Army Engineer School, Ft. Belvoir, Va., in 1962.

In 1958 Gen. Lincoln was assigned to the Department of the Army, first as director of plans and material in the office for the deputy chief of

staff for logistics, then as assistant deputy chief of staff for logistics (programs and budget).

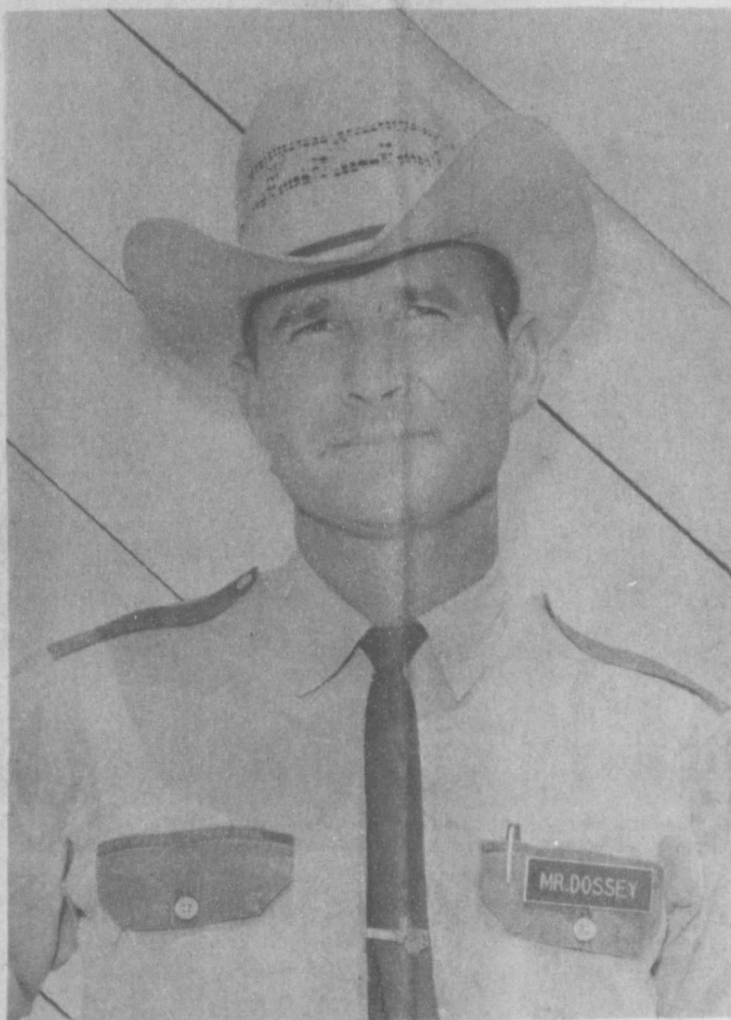
On graduation from the Army War College in 1954, Gen. Lincoln was assigned to Fourth U.S. Army, Ft. Sam Houston, as an engineer and subsequently deputy chief of staff for operations. He departed in 1956 to serve as division engineer, Mediterranean Division, Corps of Engineers, Morocco and Italy.

He has also served on the U.S. - Soviet Commission in Korea and as deputy chief of staff for Joint Task Force Seven which conducted the U.S. Pacific atomic tests in 1948.

In 1943-44 he was on the planning staff of the Supreme Allied Commander, Southeast Asia Theater and in 1945 became chief of the Asiatic Theater section, operations division.

Gen. Lincoln was graduated from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., and was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Corps of Engineers. He received his degree in civil engineering from Princeton (N.J.) University in 1937 and was an instructor at West Point until 1941. General Lincoln's citations and decorations include The Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit, Army Commendation Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, and the Special Breast Order of Pao Ting (Republic of China).

Li. General Harry H. Critz, who presently commands the 1st Corps in Korea, has been named to succeed General Lincoln.

### Chamber of Commerce Donates \$150 to Courthouse Lighting

The Gatesville Chamber of Commerce held its regular monthly meeting of the board of directors, Thursday morning at 8:30.

The board voted to donate \$150 to the Gatesville Junior Chamber of Commerce Courthouse Lighting fund. The Jaycees project is nearing completion with light fixtures due to be received this week.

The Chamber board also voted to donate \$50 to the Miss Gatesville Pageant Corporation and to share the cost of publicity in the Miss Texas Pageant program with the corporation.

The Chamber of Commerce has taken into consideration a proposal to sponsor the Evelyn Wood Reading Dynamics Course for local citizens. The proposed program is an eight-week course, guaranteed to improve reading ability by 300%.

Sheriff Windy Cummings announced this week that Lonnie Elmo Dossey will join his staff on July 1, 1968, as deputy sheriff in the Gatesville area.

Dossey, 39, is a Coryell County native, is married to the former Miss Norma Yvonne Holden and they have five children, three girls and two boys, ages 16, 14, 12, 6 and 5.

Mr. Dossey has been employed with the Gatesville State School for Boys for the past 10 years. He spent six years in the U.S. Army prior to working with the State.

Dossey reported, "I am ready to go to work for Windy." He is a good man to work for and I have had contact with him concerning State School escapees for many years."

Mr. Dossey will fill the post left vacant following Roland Burke's resignation.

### Jerry Noles Speaks To Lions At Wednesday Luncheon

Lions Club regular Wednesday luncheon's guest speaker was Jerry Noles, the new game management officer of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Lion Dale White introduced Mr. Noles to the club. Mr. Noles came to Gatesville from Waco, where he has been stationed since 1965.

Noles reviewed some of the new water safety laws established by the Texas Water Safety Act. Regulations of boats includes all aspects of the equipment, number of life preservers on board a boat, gas tank ventilation, lights, registration and many other areas.

The Water Safety Act can be enforced by any law enforcement officer, but the Game Management officers have assumed the major roll in its enforcement.

Noles pointed out that the latest deer census indicated the possibility that sections of Coryell County would possibly receive doe permits during the coming season.

Lions asked questions of Noles concerning illegal methods used in catching yellow catfish in the area. Noles pointed out that sportsmen interested in stopping such injustices should contact their state representative and ask for legislation.

Sheriff Windy Cummings picked up a local man on a Plainview, Texas felony check warrant. The man was released after making restitution.

Sheriff Cummings returned a man to Gatesville from Denver City, in lieu of \$1500 bond, charged with theft by bailee.

Cummings reported that last Saturday, investigation began on a 1957 Oldsmobile 88 which was discovered on the Royalty Farm, stripped of most of the equipment.

Thieves had removed the radiator, battery, generator, starter and all of the lights. The Sheriff's Department officers are still investigating the incident.

### Belton Rodeo Boosters To Stop In Gatesville

Belton's 45th annual July 4th Rodeo will be dedicated to nine Belton men who were rodeo "greats" and who have gone on to the "Last Round-Up". Each night's rodeo will open with a memorial to these men. Rodeos are July 2, 3 and 4, starting at 8:15 p.m. in the rodeo arena in Confederate Park on Interstate 35.

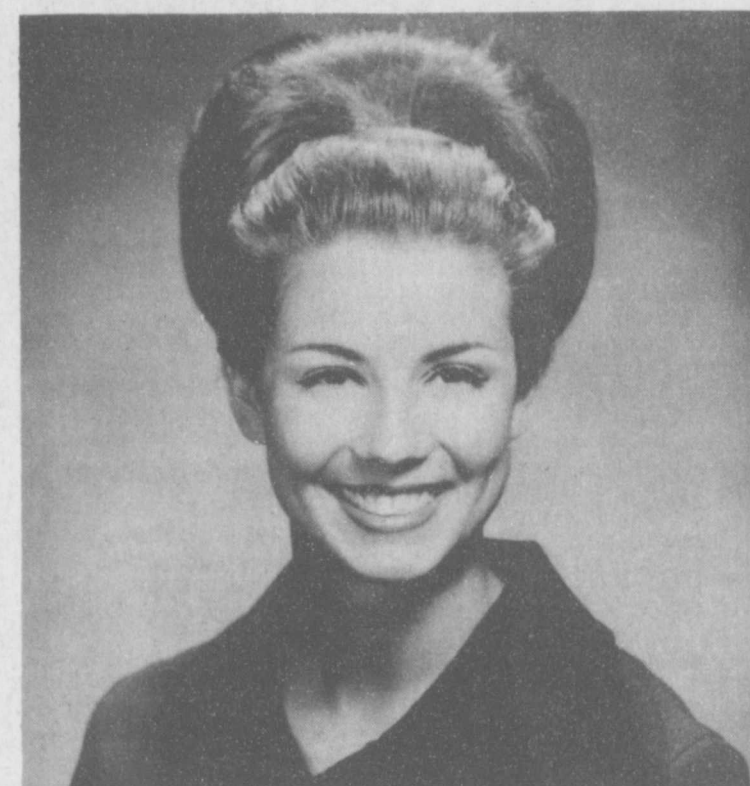
The seven performers are Johnny Mellon, known far and wide for his shirt-tail draped saddle, and Cotton Proctor, who died within a few days of each other this spring; Bill Proctor, who died on the opening performance day last year; Doc Lucas, who was killed in Madison Square Garden in 1933; Dan Utley, one of the first local riders and Paul Humphrey and Orville Thomas complete the list.

E.W. Holland, Sr., founder and producer of the rodeo in 1924 and Dub Spence, the producer who helped spread Belton's July 4th Rodeo into three and four performances, are the producers to be honored.

Stock for the 1968 event will be furnished by Tommy Steiner's X Bar S Ranch of Austin. Specialty acts will include "Pat" a gigantic trained buffalo and Billy Bushbaum's strick horse. A special added attraction on July 4th will be the drill routine performed by the Bell County Sheriff's Posse.

The Belton Rodeo Boosters will take a swing through Coryell County, Friday, June 28, with Copperas Cove as their first stop, at 10:30. From there they will go to Lampasas, where they will have lunch and arrive back in Coryell County for a 15-minute stop in Evans, arriving there at 1:00 p.m. The Boosters will be in Gatesville from 1:45 until 2:00 p.m., to give Gatesvillians an invitation to their rodeo.

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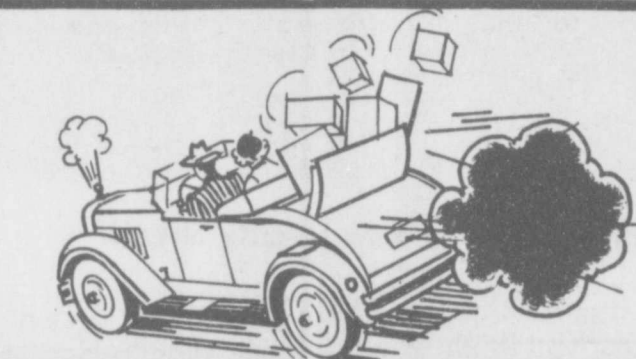
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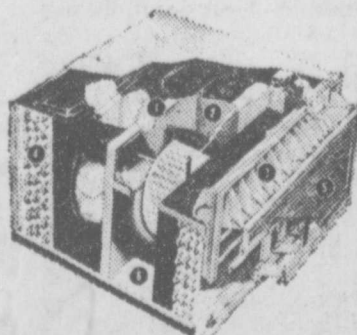


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# EVANT NEWS

The death of Mrs. Tom Hale, age 97 and one day, which came June 21, brought to the end a life of a Hamilton County pioneer. Born in Hill County, Mrs. Jamima Hale, was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. A.J. Wilcox, who was married to Mr. J.W. Kincheloe in Hamilton County, in 1887, near Shive. They purchased a section of land near McGirk before the turn of the century for \$1.00 per acre. He only lived ten years and left his wife with young children. In 1913, Mrs. Kincheloe married Mr. Tom Hale, who was an outstanding father to her children and together they became parents of one daughter. Moving several times, but living chiefly in Hamilton County, this marriage remained, faithfully, through many experiences of joy and sorrow, until 1961, when Mr. Hale died. She spent several months with her children, until she became completely disabled and moved to the January Care Home, six years ago. In addition to her two husbands, this pioneer lady was preceded in death by seven of her thirteen children. Three of the surviving ones were unable to be present for the final services, conducted by Rev. Bob Stokes, pastor of Evant Baptist Church, in January Care Home, at 3:00 o'clock Saturday, June 22, 1968. Buried between her two companions, Mrs. Hale was laid to rest in Cottage Hill Cemetery, Hamilton County. Surviving generations included sons, Jackson, China Springs; Alton, Floydada; Jim, Evant; and Paul, Moline. Two daughters, Mrs. Clarathay Newton, Tulsa; and Mrs. Betty Ellsworth, Pasadena, California also survive. She was grandmother to eleven, great-grandmother to twenty-five and great-great-grandmother to four. ## Food For Thought

"Thou art weighed in the balances and art found wanting" Daniel 5:27.

We are living in an age of specialized training; a man can hardly get employment, until he has passed some kind of test. We have college entrance exams; civil service tests; drivers tests and many, many kinds of tests. In other words, their knowledge and experience is weighed, so to speak, against the requirements made for the job.

The scripture that I've chosen to think about this week, has to do with a King, Belshazzar, of the old Babylonian Empire. He was the son of Nebuchadnezzar, who had besieged and captured Jerusalem, taking captive certain children of Israel, among whom was Daniel, and the three Hebrew children, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego.

God had blessed Nebuchadnezzar, and had given him a Kingdom of great power, strength, and glory and continued to give him rule and power until his heart became lifted up and exalted, and he thought he was the one who should have the praise and glory for his kingdom, and for this he was brought low and abased, Daniel 4th Chapter. He had failed to recognize God.

The son, Belshazzar, knew all about this; he knew that his father was a great success, as long as he revered God and he also knew how his father

was brought low and humbled, because he boasted within himself, but Belshazzar would not humble himself before God, Dan. 5:22

This is what brought destruction upon him and his kingdom was given to the Medes and Persians. His reign followed that of his father, and he decided to give a big party, inviting a 1,000 guests. They were drinking and having a big time, when he decided to send down to the Temple of the house of God, and have the golden vessels brought up; and they gave no thought of the disrespect to the house of God. The word of God says "They praised the Gods of gold, of silver, of brass, of iron, of wood, and of stone," Dan. 5:4

This brought the judgement of God down upon him; the fingers of a man's hand began to write upon the wall.

The old King couldn't interpret the writing, he began to have great fear, his knees smote together, he wanted help at once to know what the writing meant - among his own wise men he couldn't find an interpreter. His wife sent him word, not to be worried, that they'd find out what it meant - but God's word teaches us that the things of God cannot be understood by the means of higher learning, it cannot be bought with money, it has to be spiritually understood. We have a reasoning among some people that if we can get the people educated, and solve the poverty problem, the discord and riots, and marches in our country will be all worked out, but the problem goes deeper than that!

The hearts of men and women must be changed! It has to be the making of new creatures out of men and women, before the problem is solved. Hate must be changed into love, doing unto others as we would like to be treated. This cannot be done until men realize the sovereignty of God and humble themselves before Him! Belshazzar and his party were not recognizing God, they were praising the gods of other things, gold - silver - wood, etc. This brought death to the king and his kingdom was destroyed.

But you say Why fight it? What can we do? But we love our country and its constitution and the principles upon which it was founded! We grieve at the deteriorating from within. The average age of the world's greatest civilizations has been 200 years. Each one has progressed from bondage to spiritual faith - to great courage - to liberty - to abundance - to selfishness - to complacency - to apathy - to dependence - back to bondage. In eight years our country will be 200 years old.

Of all 22 civilizations in history, 19 collapsed when they reached our present moral state.

Quoting the scripture we used in the heading of this writing "Thou art weighed in the balances and art found wanting" is something we all need to be thinking about.

Can we, as individuals, measure up to God's standards? As the old king praised the gods of silver and gold, who could not see or hear, which brought his own death, and the downfall of his kingdom, do we regard the abundance of our lovely cars and beautiful homes, and other material things above the necessity of conforming to God's eternal word?

Let us remember that all scripture is given as examples unto us and for our admonition, 1 Cor. 10:11

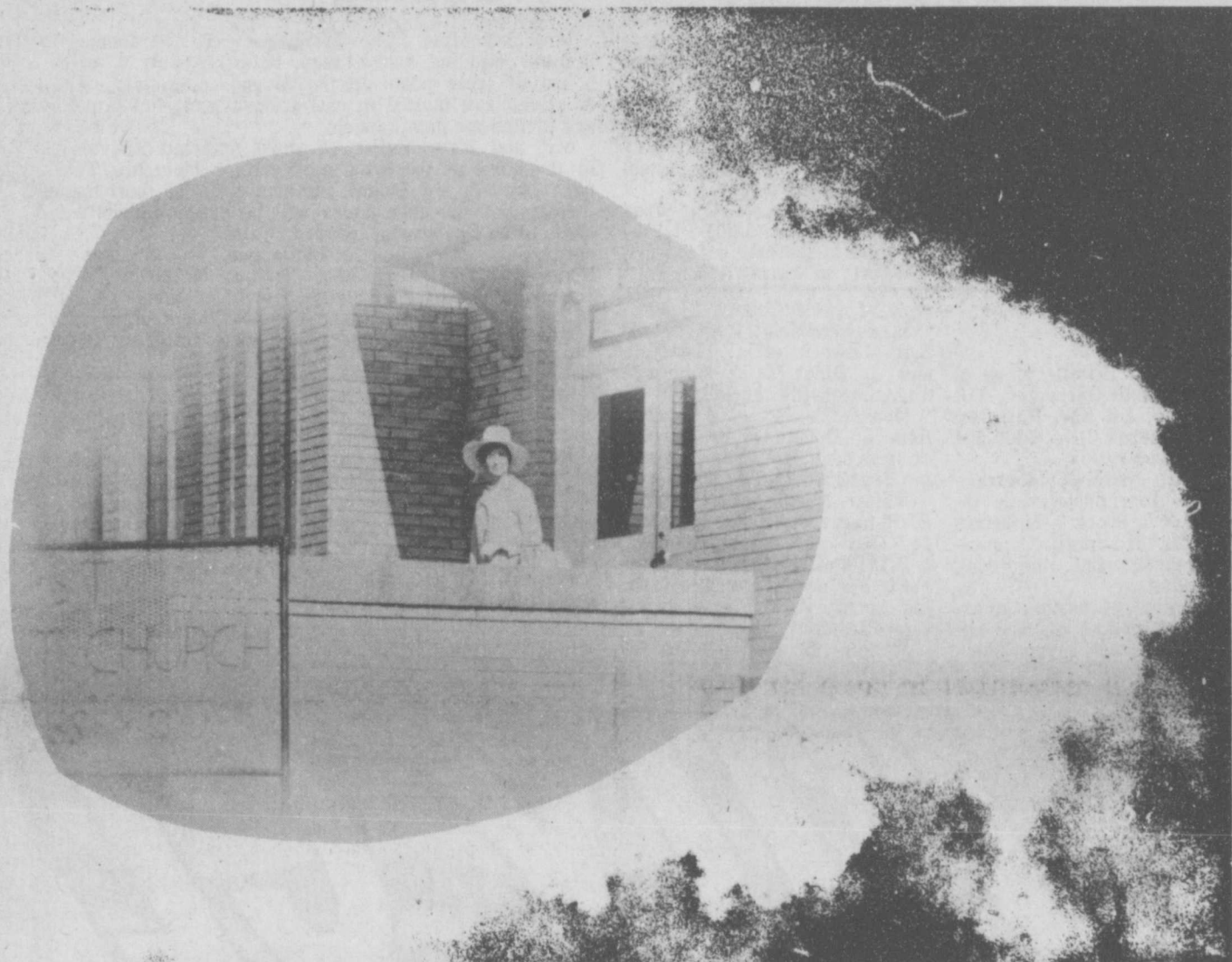

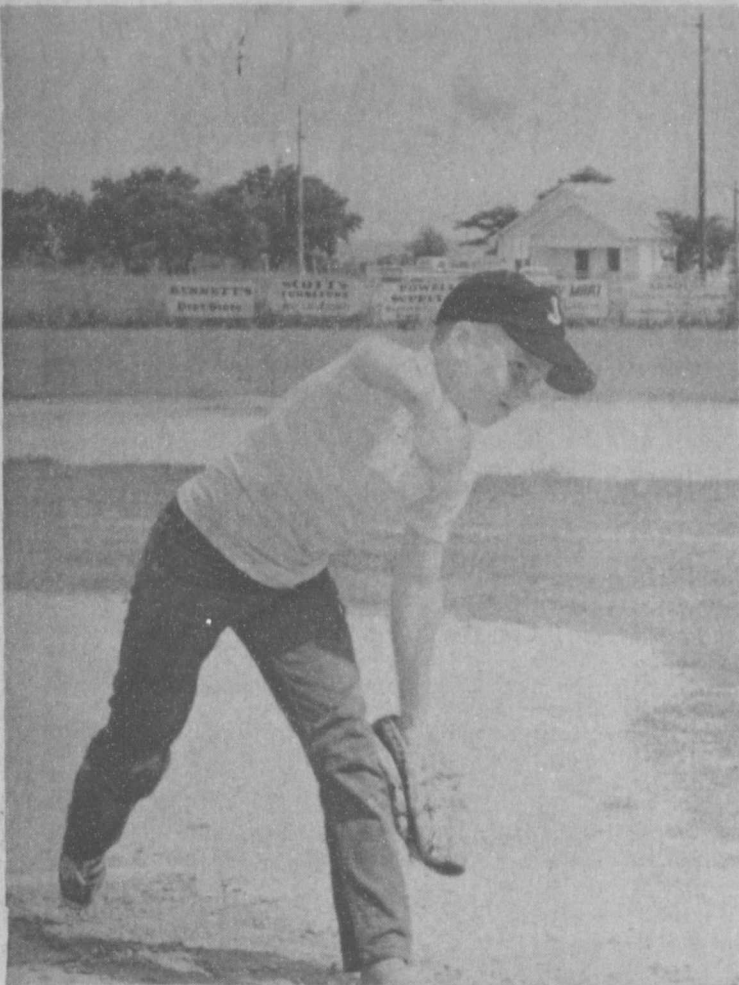
