## Trash Service Successful Collections Larger Than Expected

The City Sanitation Department new trash pickup service can be termed very successful. The once-a-week pickup of items not suitable for garbage collection has prompted many local residents to prune trees and general clean up of homes. City Manager, Eiland Lovejoy, reported Thursday that in the first two weeks of service, the crew working the truck, has had to work overtime to complete their work. Lovejoy pointed out that Wednesday, July 24, the truck covered the north side of Main Street, working twelve hour shift and returned on Friday, July 26, and worked another

half day. This week, the trash truck covered the South side of Main Street, with a twelve-hour shift Wednesday and another half day shift on Thursday. Mr. Lovejoy expects the large volume to gradually decrease as homeowners complete their clean up campaigns. Lovejoy said "we hope after a couple of runs, that we will catch up." Asked about the condition of the trash, Lovejoy reported, "as a whole, trash was in good containers." He did caution residents to place their trash out early on Wednesday to assure pickup by the truck.

Concerning tree limbs, Lovejoy said, "it is easy to handle limbs in lengths up to four feet." He urged persons to help the trash service by making pickup as easy as possible. The new trash service is highly successful and will be a service available to Gatesville citizens all the time. We will have a cleaner town because of it.

## COUNTY BUDGET PROPOSAL SET AT \$22 MILLION DOLLARS

The 1969 Coryell County Budget has been prepared and a budget hearing is to be held in late August, reports County Judge, Norman Storm. The new budget has been estimated at \$599,045.23, which is

an \$18,136.50 increase over the 1968 budget of \$580,918.73. The increase in budget is approximately 3.1% (probably enough to take care of inflation). The State Budget Law calls for a Commissioners Court

hearing to be held on the proposed budget sometime after August 15 and prior to setting of the tax base. Storm predicted that the court would probably take up the proposed budget either Au-

gust 19 or August 26. A breakdown of revenue for the county, shows that approximately 40% of the county operation is financed by ad valorem taxes; 30% by vehicle registration; 15% by fees of office; 8% by state refunds; 4% by fines and court cost and 3% miscellaneous revenues. The 1969 budget estimates an overall expected available resources of \$608,252.00 from all sources.

The primary item in the county budget is the road and bridge fund, taking approximately 55.2% of the estimated budget. The road and bridge fund is divided five ways, each commissioner receives an equal part of the fund with a fifth account set up for joint use of the four commissioners. Judge Storm estimated that each commissioner would receive approximately \$76,705 for improvements for the fiscal year, which is added to the cash balance at the end of the year. Storm pointed out that the 1968 car registration fee set the limit for the first time in history. He explained that county governments are expected to retain 100% of the \$50,000 of vehicle registration and 50% of the fund for the next \$250,000 in registrations. All registrations over \$300,000 go 100% to the State. In 1968, the county registered approximately \$305,000 in licenses and received \$175,000 of the registration.

Storm noted that large counties, like Harris, Dallas and Tarrant, all were turning in millions of car registrations to the state and only retaining the same \$175,000 maximum available to counties. Tax evaluations for the 1969 budget have been set at \$22,000,000 up 2.5% from the \$21,443,735, 1968 evaluation. The tax rate will be set at official court session set for the second Monday in September. Last year's rate was \$95 on a \$100 evaluation and the 1969 budget is based on the same \$95 per \$100 base.

Mr. Hix said, "I have always wanted to attend one of the National Conventions and a good friend was able to arrange for two tickets." The Hix's will spend two weeks in Florida and the Bahama Islands. The tickets will locate Mr. and Mrs. Hix in the balcony of the fabulous convention center, where they will be eye witnesses to the complicated and intricate procedures leading to a nomination of someone for President of the United States.

Following the convention, the Hix's will vacation in the Bahamas, with Florida friends. The GOP Convention shapes up with three major runners heading the competition for the nomination.

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—California's Ronald Reagan performed in Miami Beach Wednesday, acting like the presidential candidate he said he is not—and confiding that Republican supporters are "springing up around the country."

While political proxies argued

the causes of Republican front-runner Richard M. Nixon and campaigning challenger Nelson A. Rockefeller, Reagan plowed through crowds in the lobby of the Fontainebleau Hotel, talked with Florida delegates to the GOP national convention, and insisted he would not solicit the presidential nomination. "This movement has come from other people," he said. "I myself would not seek the nomination from my party as a newly elected governor of California."

At a news conference, Reagan recited his political litany: he is a favorite son candidate from California, he is not actively pursuing the nomination, but if the delegates want to consider him, that is their decision. And Reagan said no man could refuse to serve if summoned. "I think he would have to accept," the governor said. "That's a responsibility of citizenship."

Reagan political lieutenants seemed to be taking this responsibility quite seriously. One of them estimated that the Californian now has 180 to 200 delegates on his side, and said Reagan will decline no invitation to address delegate caucuses in advance of the convention. That is standard procedure for a man hunting support.

Coyne certainly was no mark of the Nixon and Rockefeller camps. Herbert G. Klein, Nixon's top spokesman, announced that his candidate is actively soliciting the opinions of party leaders as to who would make his best vice

presidential running mate. Klein said Nixon is looking for an able campaigner who would be qualified to succeed to the White House if necessary. The Nixon organization claims more than the 667 delegate votes needed for nomination. Reagan disputed that account, and said he does not think a winner will be named on the first convention ballot. He estimated Nixon's strength at "500 plus" when the roll is called next Wednesday night.

Rockefeller supporters voiced confidence the New York governor could win, and denied they are considering New York Mayor John V. Lindsay as a possible fallback candidate. "Mr. Rockefeller is a sure winner," claimed Leonard W. Hall, once GOP national chairman, now a Rockefeller adviser. Hall said a Rockefeller-financed poll showed the New York governor would capture 226 electoral votes in nine major industrial states if he became the Republican nominee. It will take 270 electoral votes to elect the next President.

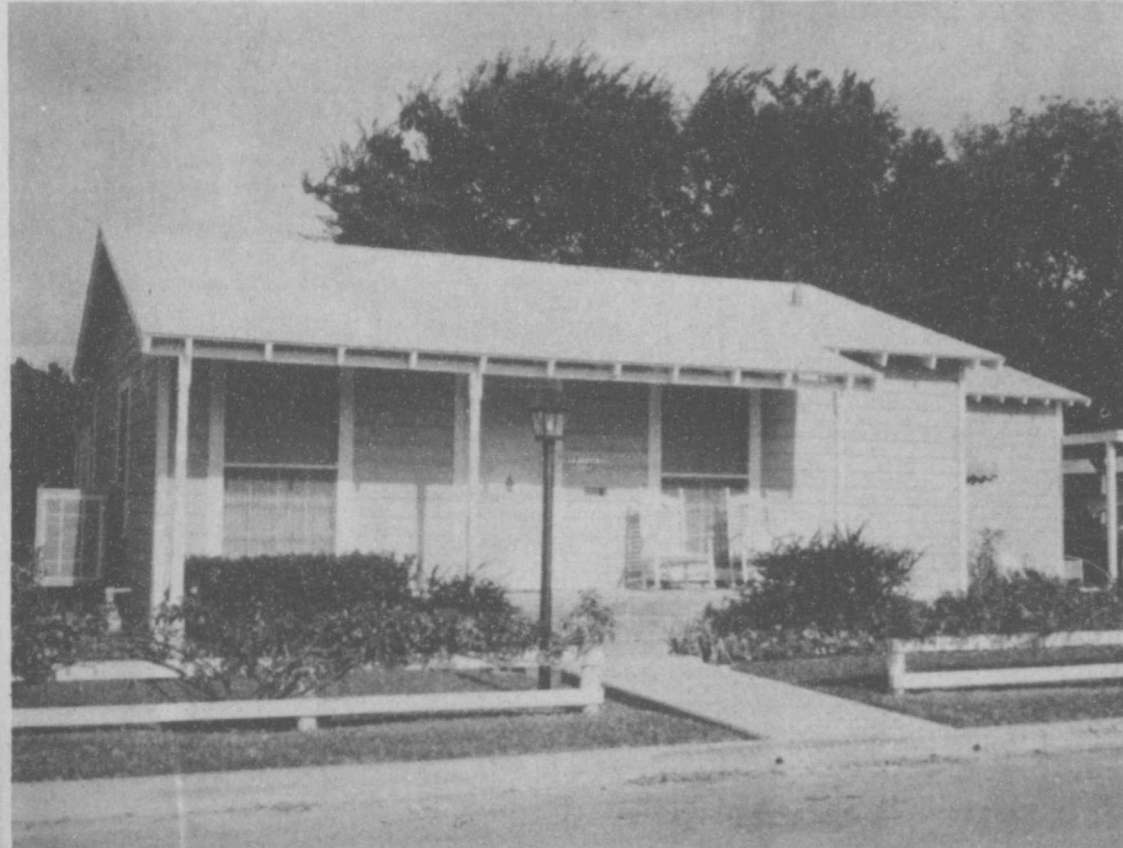

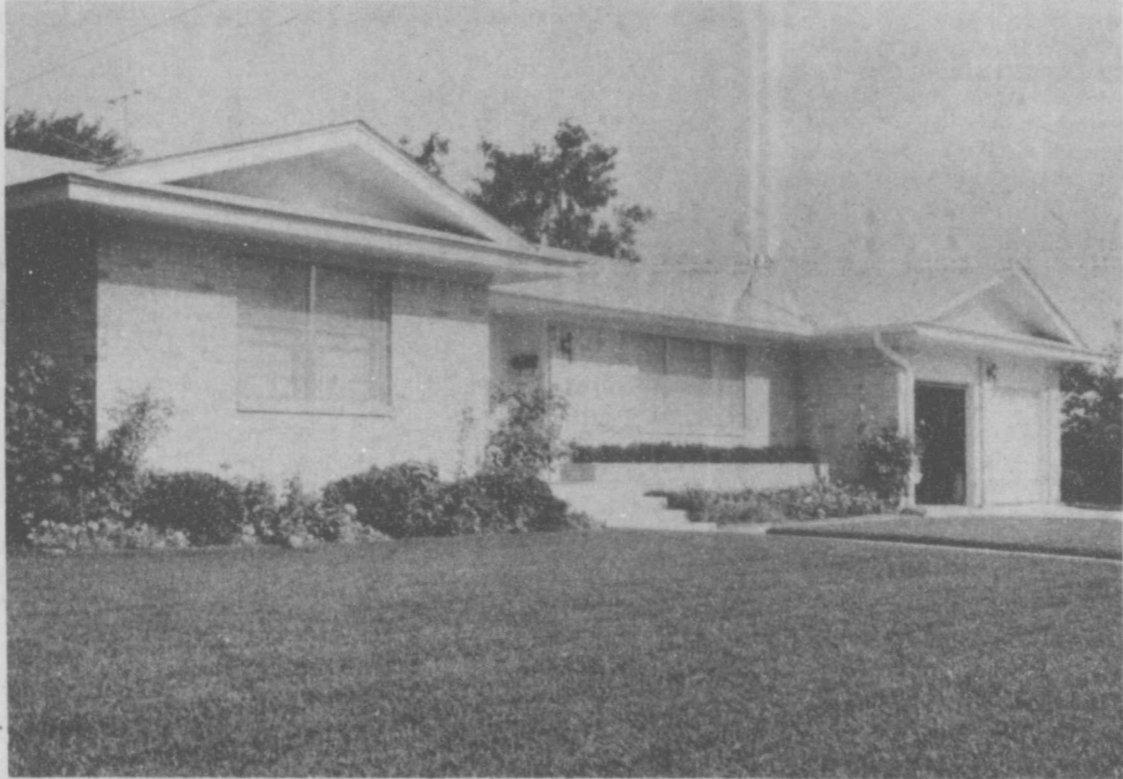

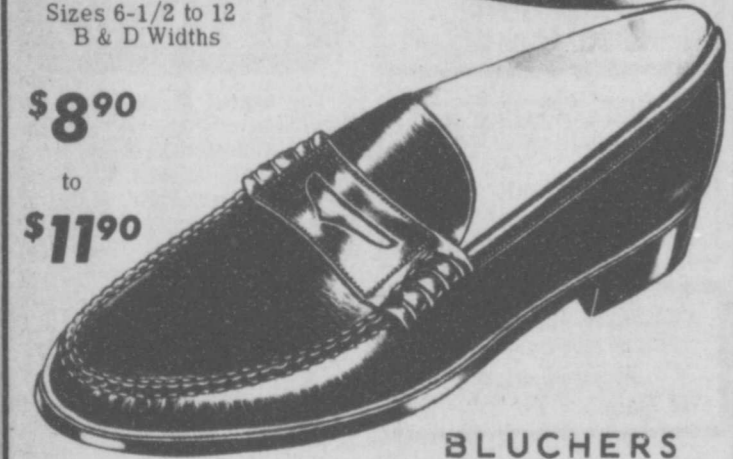

# U.I.L. Largest Reports T.U. Administrator

"Captain" Kidd may be turning the tiller over to someone else, but he certainly isn't abandoning ship.

Rodney J. Kidd, University Interscholastic League director since 1948, goes on modified service Sept. 1. Mr. Kidd has reached the compulsory retirement age for University of Texas administrators.

"Summer is the time when the League starts all over again," Mr. Kidd says, "and I can't wait until September."

This fall, Mr. Kidd's time will be dedicated to the U.I.L. Foundation scholarship program which he helped to institute. The program, organized in 1959, has grown from no funds at all to more than \$229,000, and Mr. Kidd hopes to see it develop even further.

"Think of the scholarship in terms of some boy or girl going to school for a year," he says, adding:

"It is most rewarding to see these kids come in and out of a University. They may be entirely different; they may even have a new mission in life."

Mr. Kidd is never hesitant to brag on the League or the Texas high school students who make it outstanding.

The Texas U.I.L., Mr. Kidd says, is the "biggest and best" in the United States because it reaches many more students and has the only scholarship program for "blue chip" academic champions.

Before the League initiated its scholarship program, students who were state winners in literary and scientific contests were virtually ignored in favor of talented high school athletes.

"We have all kinds of champions from football to poetry reading, and their accomplishments tell the true story of the League," Mr. Kidd emphasizes.

Mr. Kidd's own contact with the League began on the participant level. He lettered in football, basketball, baseball,

and track as well as competing in debate at Kingsville High School.

During his senior year at Southwestern University in Georgetown, he was Georgetown High School coach. Upon his graduation in 1925, he became principal and county athletic director. In 1926 he accepted the position of physical education director of the U.I.L. in 1938.

"When I came, there were

only A teams came to a state meet," he recalls.

Today there are 52 Class B districts, 32 in Class A, 32 Class AA districts, 16 Class AAA districts and 20 Class AAAA district.

And the guiding force behind such a large organization: "We try to make sure that contests are current and challenging," Mr. Kidd says, "and most important of all, we want to keep the contests fair."

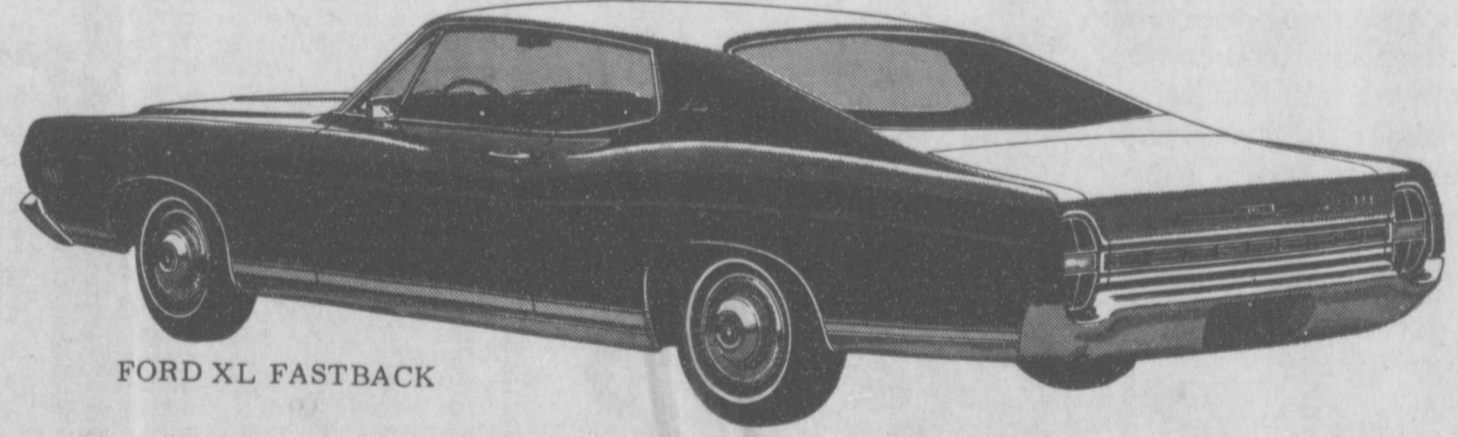
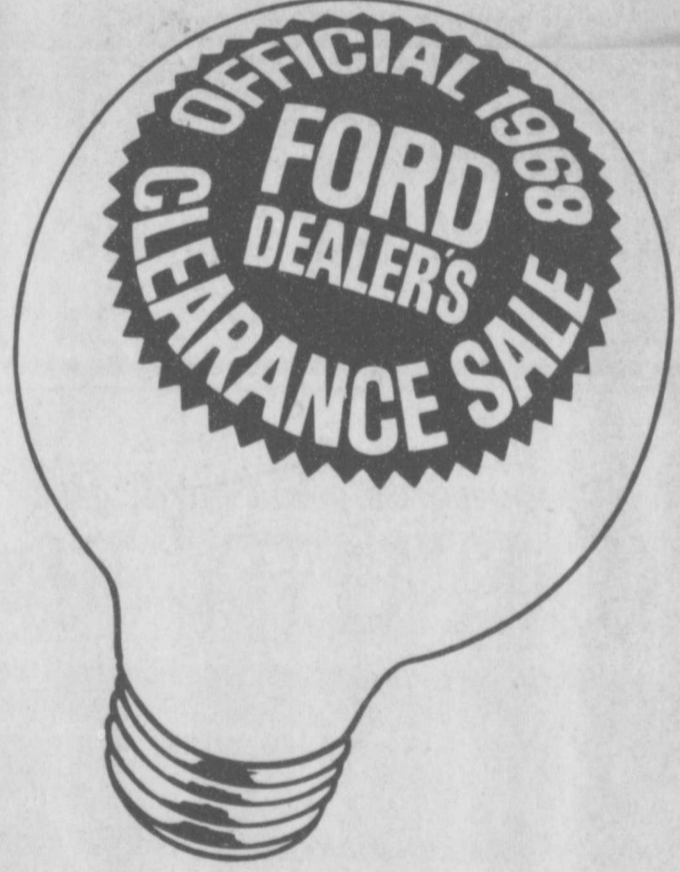

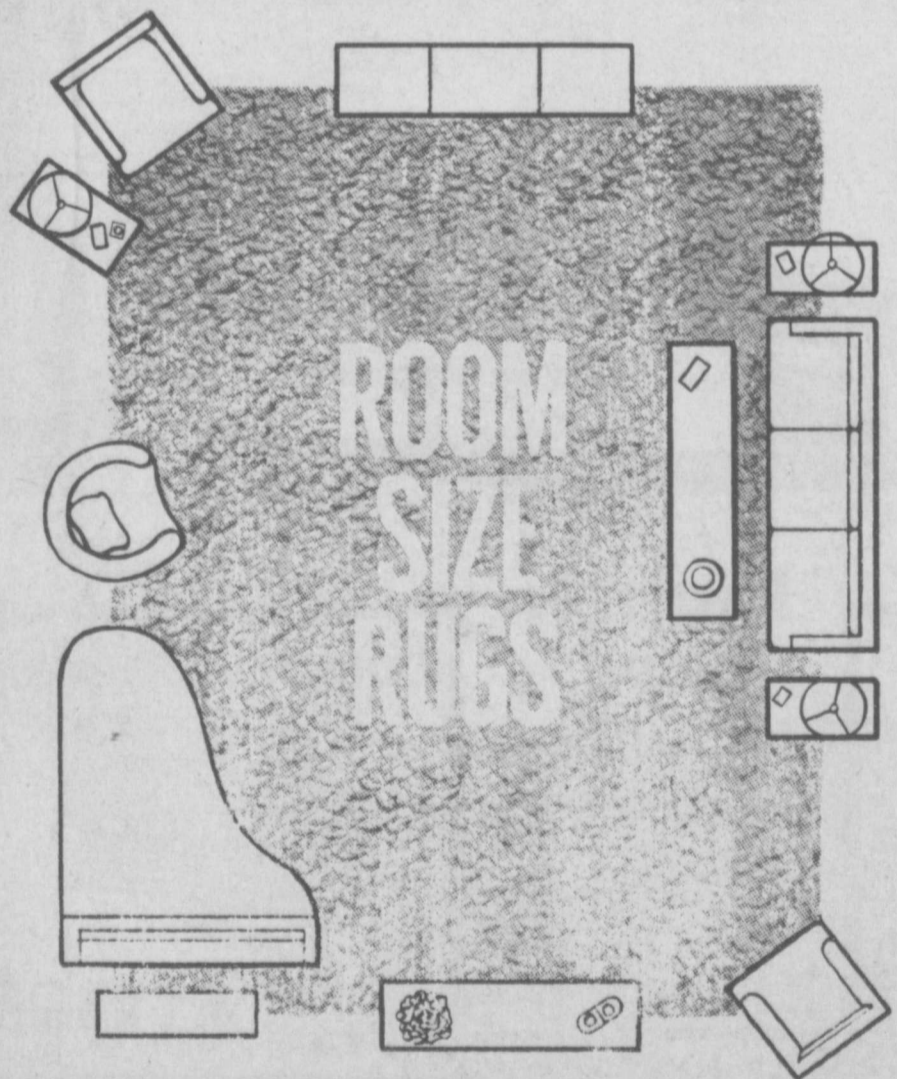
