The Associated Press reported the following action in the Cu Chi area, Thursday:

U.S. Air cavalrymen forced surrounded North Vietnamese battalion to stand and fight Thursday after tactical jets and helicopter gunships softened up the dug-in enemy with strikes

A U.S. spokesman said 93 of the estimated 300-plus North Vietnamese had been killed, 22 had been captured and one had defected in the battle that began Air Cavalry Division were put at eight killed, 26 wounded.

The fighting near Trang Bang - halfway between Saigon and the Cambodian border - and another action several miles to the north strengthened speculation by the U.S. Command that the enemy is trying to manuever troops into position for an-

In the second battle, U.S. 25th Division Infantrymen reported killing 19 of an estimated 200 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong before the enemy broke off a three-hour skirmish seven miles southeast of Tay Ninh. Two U.S. soldiers were reported wounded.

Vietnam is an ever changing situation, with enemy for-ces located in all areas of the country. Mortar attacks are launched from positions much closer to Saigon than Cu Chi. Infiltration routes for enemy troops, aimed at Saigon, will pass near Cu Chi.







Modern hollyhocks are tall or short, single or double and include a rainbow of colors. August is a good time to plant for next year's garden. Seeds may be planted in frames, nursery plots in the garden or directly in the place you will want the plants next summer. As the seedlings sprout, thin them to one or two inches apart. They will grow quite rapidly in the warm days and cool nights of If they have reached a nice size before cold weather sets in they may be transplanted their permanent positions. 

One of my toppriority projects when Congress reconvenes will be a continued fight for bilingual education funds under by Bilingual Education Bill passed last year. The House recklessly cut out funds for this muchneeded program to better edunon-English-speaking homes, I succeeded in reinserting \$10 million in the Senate Appropriations Committee, not nearly enough for a national bilingual education program but at least a start. We authorized \$30 million for this year to serve three million children. I am hopeful that Congress will at least approve the \$10 million. After all, we spend that much every hour in our military budget.

waiting action is my worker safety bill. Un-the-job accidents and health hazards cause 14,500 deaths in the United States each year, and ove seven million injuries. President Johnson has endorsed my bill to create job safety standards protecting our 75 million workers.

As I mentioned in my last report, a constitutional amendment to give 18-year-olds the right to vote is before Congress. I am a cosponsor of it. With tens of thousands in the 18 to 21 bracket now fighting in Vietnam, it would be shameful to deprive them further of the right to participate in their government.

These are high priority bills which have been listed by the President as vital to the success of the 90th Congress. There are many others -- including local bills like my Big Thicket National Park Bill, my Palmetto Bend Dam proposal ind others.

It will be a busy period, I hope Congress will give these bills the attention they deserve before calling the 90th Congress to a close

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
