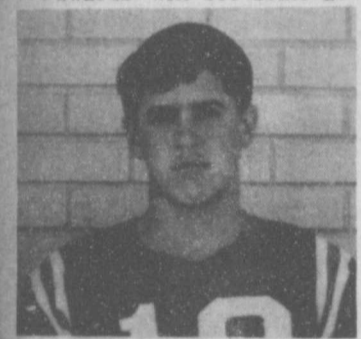
Furniture made in Finland will be among the new items in the General Exhibits Building.

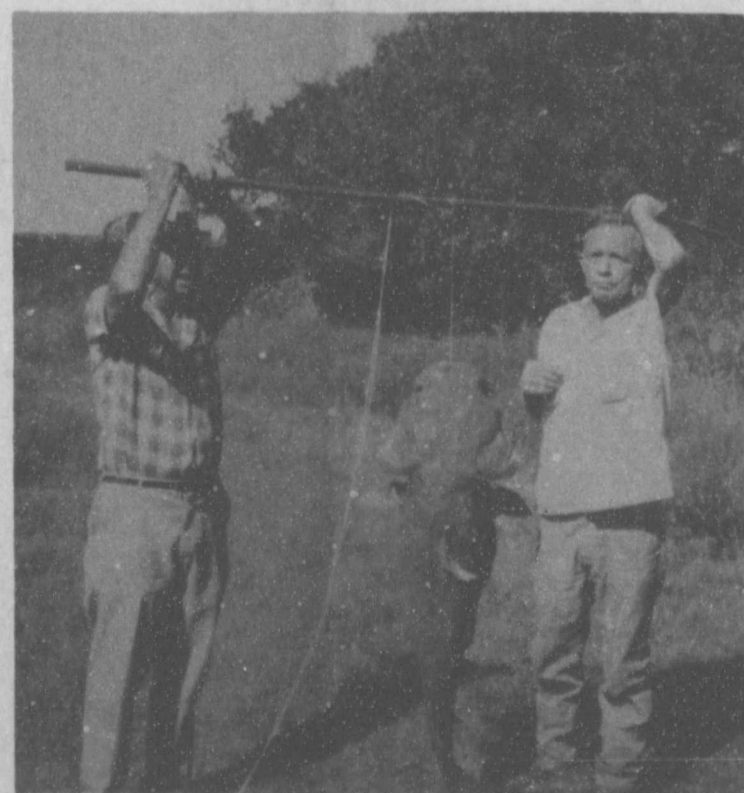
The convention was used as an orientation meeting for the new members of the ASC Community Committeemen and began discussion of regular business.

# WASHINGTON REPORT

We had to override the Bureau of the Budget and the White House to do it, but Congress has finally made good on its promises to the school children of 4,300 school districts in the United States. Texas, with its large number of military installations, is among the two largest recipients of impacted school aid. Our state officials often claim credit for improvements in Texas schools that are actually bought with federal money -- your tax dollars.

The Senate has restored \$91 million that was withheld from federal impacted school districts. I'm confident that the money will be released to the schools soon, including \$5 million for Texas.

Impacted schools are schools that serve areas with high concentrations of federal workers, including military families. For about 20 years, the national government has helped pay for educating children of military and federal families. In many cases these children live on military bases or federal reservations and their families do not pay school taxes. Without the impacted aid program, property holders who live near military bases and federal centers would have to pay such high local taxes that they would exceed Tex-

as Constitutional limitations. For fiscal 1968, Congress voted \$486 million to be divided among the 4,300 impacted school districts, but a general budget cutback reduced the payments to \$395 million. Many school districts had already approved their budgets, however, and they needed the full amount. That's why with several other Senators I introduced a bill to restore the \$91 million. I had dozens of letters from school officials in or near El Paso, Houston, San Antonio, Dallas, Fort Worth, Austin and many other Texas communities, urging that the funds be restored.

Congress passed that \$91 million with little opposition, but the Bureau of the Budget refused to pay it out. The freezing of that \$91 million was a ridiculous stab in the back to Congress and to the 17 million children attending school in impacted areas. The freeze meant a loss of \$5 million to Texas affecting 285 Texas school districts and 1-1/4 million Texas children.

Congress refused to accept the freeze. We overrode the Bureau by again passing the \$91 million and forbidding the Bureau to freeze the money. At last, after seven months of dilly-dallying, we are very near

paying these districts the money to operate their schools that was promised long ago.

The Budget Bureau is concerned, of course, with saving money and so am I. That is reasonable. But it is unreasonable and foolish to take money from our schools and deprive up to 17 million children of a quality education. We must not short - change our school children.

# Washington Views and News

This is one of those beautiful days which comes in Washington in the Fall. We know this weather will not last, but it is wonderful right now. I understand that we have had good rains at home so our weather is good and I am glad.

We have had a very active and eventful week on the Floor of the House. Some of you will recall that the House passed an extension of the present Farm Program before we recessed in August but that because of the objections of Mr. Findley (Republican of Illinois) we were unable to send the bill to Conference.

Lat Tuesday I made a motion to send the bill to Conference and got the House to agree. The Conference rather readily agreed on a straight one-year extension. The Senate has already approved the Conference Report. The Republican Leadership of the House had, before they had all the facts, advised members that the House would not vote on the matter this week and since next Monday and Tuesday are both Jewish holidays, there can be no vote until next Wednesday, September 25th. At that time we hope to vote both on this Conference Report and the Conference Report on the Food Stamp Bill.

I would not want to try to judge the outcome of the vote but we have moved the bill a long way and we are hopeful that we can put it over this last hurdle, in spite of the threat of one member of the

Conference to defeat the report on the Farm Bill, for which he had voted, because he thought we had "conceded too much to the liberals" in the Food Stamp Bill.

Our Committee has reported a bill which I introduced to require the Intermediate Credit Banks and the Banks for Cooperatives to retire all government capital. By doing this we would help the government and at the same time we will take these institutions out from under the "budget" control and greatly increase their lending authority from private funds.

I expect to be home this weekend and to speak in McGregor to the Annual Membership Meeting of the McLennan County Rural Electric Cooperative. I will of course be back in Washington on Wednesday for the vote on the Farm Bill. It has been many years since I had the opportunity to attend an R.E.A. Coop. Membership Meeting. I will have to spend the rest of the night on the plane to be back here in time for our morning Committee meeting but I feel that we are all getting too prone to overlook the fact that the need for electricity in rural areas is even more important today than ever before. Just as long as we can have two different sources of this power both will doubtless give good service. Therefore, I don't want to see either the Coops or the private power companies have all the business. We need them both.

"There now, just tie this in a paper sack and hang it up to dry and it'll be ready for your Thanksgiving Turkey," I told Mrs. Woolley as I handed her a big bunch of fresh sage. "My stars! What will I ever do with so much?" she asked. "We won't be eating more than maybe two turkeys in a year. Is it good for anything else besides dressing?"

"Of course, it's good in lots of things. Crumble some up in the flour you shake your frying chickens in, or make several slits with a sharp knife in a pork roast and tuck in a bit of onion and a leaf of sage, and see what a difference it makes. Sage goes well with any kind of pork dish. I like to add a little more to the sausage I buy, they don't seem to put in enough."

"Sage is one of the old time home remedy herbs. It was believed that sage eaten regularly would assure a long life. A syrup made of sage leaves is good for a cold or cough. Tea made from the leaves is not only an aid to the memory, but will 'cause the hair to become black'."

"I guess that is just what I need for this old grey head of mine," laughed Mrs. Woolley. But how can you eat it regularly? I'd get awfully tired of dressing all the time."

"Well, oatmeal herb bread is so good that my trouble is to keep from eating too much of it," I told her. "If you'll get a pencil, I'll tell you how to make it."

Pour two cups of boiling water over one cup of oatmeal and two tablespoons of butter and let it soak for about half an hour. Then mix two packages of dry yeast with 1/3 cup luke-warm water and let stand for five minutes. Add two teaspoons salt, 1/2 cup honey (that's good for long life too), three teaspoons of crumbled sage, one teaspoon leaf marjoram and one teaspoon of caraway seed to the oatmeal mixture and stir in the yeast mixture. Add six cups of flour two at a time, kneading in the last two cups. Let it rise about two hours. Knead down again and divide into two loaf pans and let rise again until double. Bake in a 325 degree oven for fifty minutes. It's better to wait till the next day to eat it (you might have to hide it though) and it makes marvelous toast.

**HOW TO PACK FOR A WRINKLE-FREE WEEKEND**

When it comes to packing, a weekend trip requires almost as much planning as a trip around the world. The traveler's goal is to include everything without arriving pack-horse style.

Mrs. Beth Frantz, Travel-Fashion Advisor for the Samsonite Company, logs over 100,000 miles a year. She can pack a weekend wardrobe in a 15 1/2" x 8 1/2" beauty case. Unbelievable? Not if you practice packing pointers like these:

- Pack travel-size cosmetics in the molded plastic tray on top. This is the spot, too, for small items that might be needed en route and immediately upon arrival. Something you'll want to keep, literally, in hand is to take excellent pictures from airplane, bus, car or train with a simple model like a Kodak Instamatic S-10 camera. These snapshots, taken enroute, will help create a full pictorial record of your holiday. Because the S-10 camera is compact and retracts when not in picture-taking position, it can be slipped easily into pocket or purse. If it's necessary to pack it temporarily, it fits neatly into the plastic tray of the beauty case.
- When it comes to selecting clothes, make a list of weekend activities. Then pack one, and only one, outfit for each occasion. There's a trick to fitting everything in and getting it all out wrinkle-free. Roll lingerie and soft items in sets and put them aside. Place slacks and skirts in the case with waistbands at the rear and the rest of the garment extending over the front of the case. Fold dresses lengthwise in thirds and pack at right angle to slacks with dress skirts extended over the short end of the case. Now place the lingerie rolls in the case using the little spaces between rolls for extra film cartridges, batteries and flashcubes.
- Next fold slacks and skirts over the lingerie. Leave the remainder hanging over the top of the case. Dresses are folded over the slacks. Continue this rotation - folding back and forth - until everything is neatly packed. One garment cushions the other to prevent wrinkling.

Refreshing Pineapple Pie

Great for Fall is this angel food type pie cooked on top of the stove and turned into a no-bake crumb crust. It is best served on the day it is prepared.

**Pineapple Pie**

- 1 no-bake (9-inch) crumb crust
- 2 tablespoons corn starch
- 1/2 cup sugar

**Dash salt**

- 1 cup water
- 1 (8 1/2-ounce) can crushed pineapple, drained
- 2 egg whites
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Combine corn starch, sugar and salt in a small saucepan. Gradually add water, stirring until smooth. Stirring constantly, bring to boil over medium heat and boil 1 minute. Cover with plastic film or waxed paper laid directly on surface of pudding. Cool. Stir in pineapple. Beat egg whites until stiff peaks form when beater is raised. Gently fold in cooled pineapple mixture. Pile into prepared crust. Sprinkle with chopped nuts. Chill. Makes one 9-inch pie.

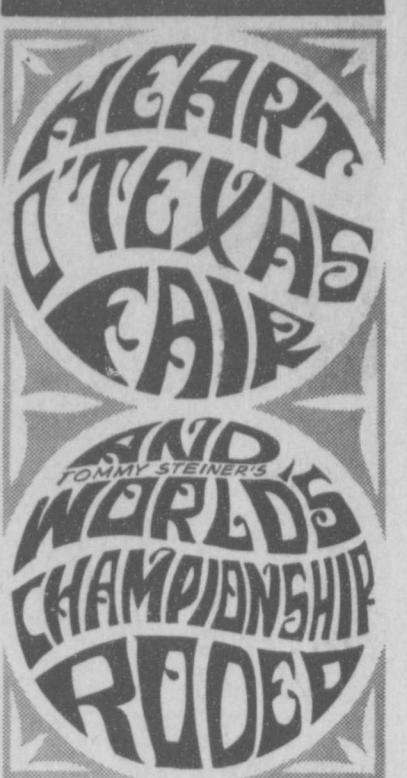
### Notes From The Principal To Parents

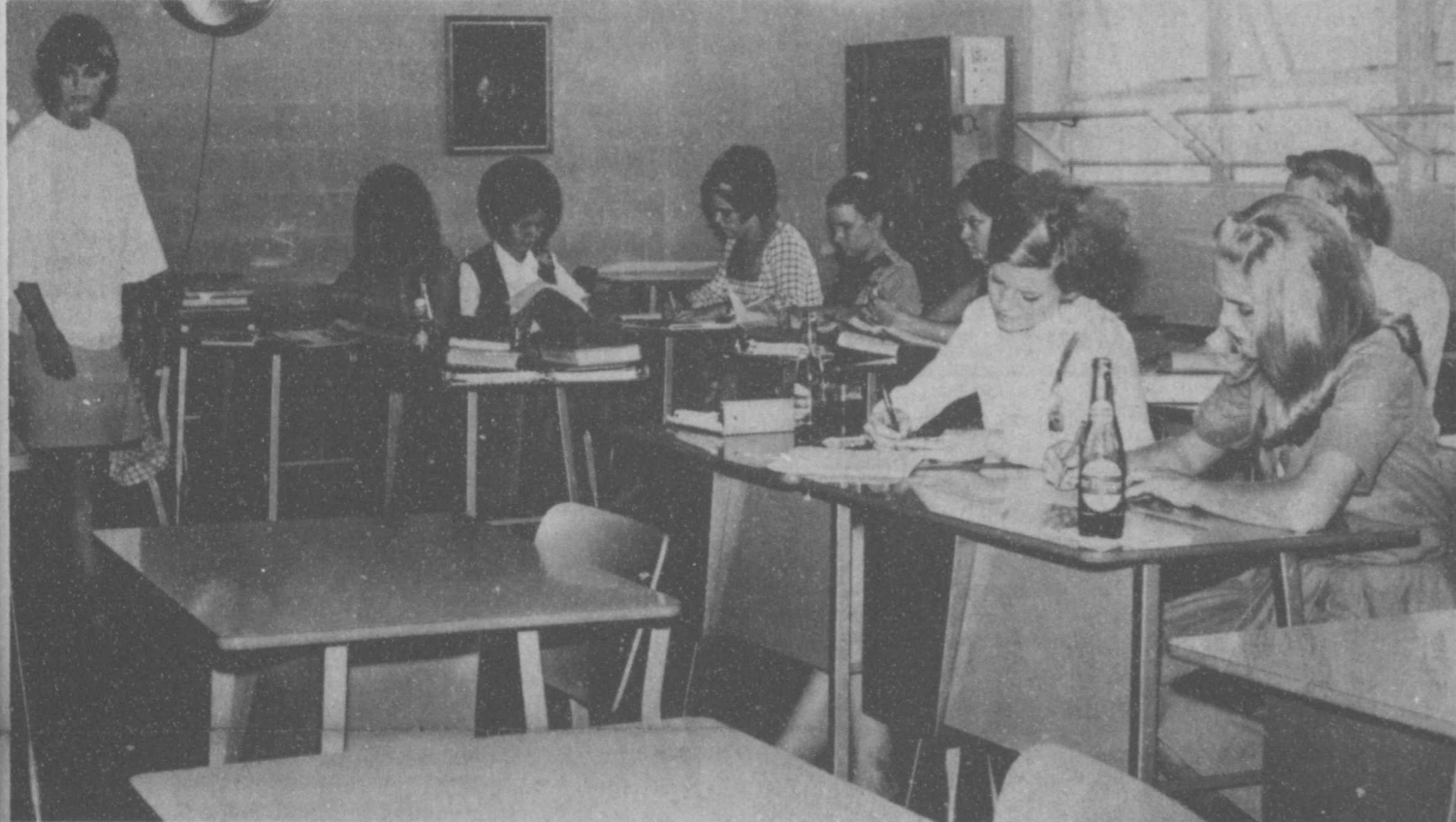

"Flowers" was released about a year and a half ago and it has been one of the Stones' biggest sellers. In the 1968 Playboy Jazz and Pop Poll, it was chosen as one of the best records of the year. Included in this album are several songs which were hits when released as singles, such as "Ruby Tuesday", "Lady Jane", "Let's Spend The Night Together", and "Mother's Little Helper". The rest of the songs are also first rate; the best of which are "Out of Time", "Take It or Leave It", "My Girl", and "Back Street Girl". The Stones will release their latest album very soon. The name of it is "Beggars Banquet", and many people in the music business say that it is one of their finest. As soon as I can get my hands on it, I'll tell you what I think of it.

If you like country and western music, don't fail to get "Johnny Cash at Folsom Prison". This may well be the best country and western album to come along in years. The big song is, of course, "Folsom Prison Blues". Cash originally recorded this song as a single when he was first starting his career nearly fifteen years ago. The tunes on this LP are mostly prison oriented, such as "Dark As A Dungeon", "Cocaine Blues", and "25 Minutes to Go". The fact that it was recorded before a live audience of prisoners at Folsom Prison gives it special power and impact. Pick hits of the week are: "On the Road Again", by the Band; "Time", by the Chambers Brothers, and "Fire" by 5 x 5.

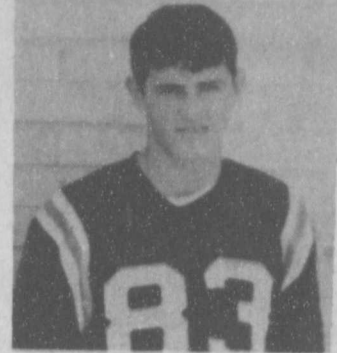
### B' Team Downs Temple Sophomores 12 To 0
