Deadlines Set For Overseas Parcels

The following periods have been designated for mailing Christmas parcels to members of the armed forces overseas: (1) Surface Transportation -- October 14 to November 9. (2) SAM (Space available Parcel Air Lift) -- October 21 to November 23. (3) PAL -- October 28 to November 30 to December 11.

The term "Armed forces overseas" includes personnel of the Armed Forces, members of their families, and U. S. civilians employed overseas who receive their mail through an APO or FPO, New York, San Francisco or Seattle.

The APO and FPO numbers are the same as zip code and must be shown on all mail, announced Hal N. Anderson, Postmaster.

Vocational Education Has Twenty-nine Seniors Enrolled

Vocational office Education, the newest vocational course to be introduced in Gatesville High School, has an enrollment of 28 senior students reports Mrs. Gail Callahan, coordinator of the unit.

Vocational Office Education is divided into two classes. The laboratory class, with an enrollment of 13 meets for two class periods each day and uses situations and jobs that would be completed in an office as its curriculum. The cooperative class meets for one period of class instruction per day and uses one period of the school day for on-the-job training in local business firms.

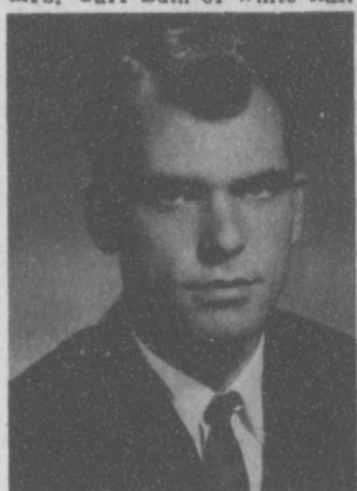

Charges were filed against Parkinson in May of 1968.

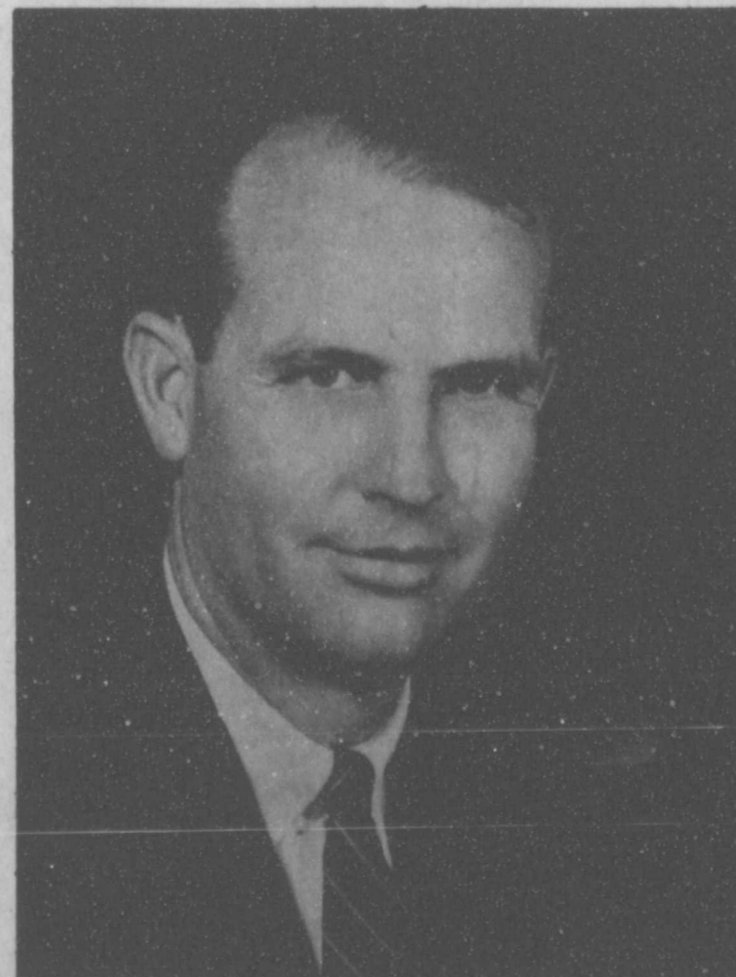
The jury was unable to reach a decision in the case and the trial has been reset for January, 1969.

The new plant in Gatesville will produce this one piece suit in the beginning, reported Walls. Sam said, "We will have some machines in operation in November."

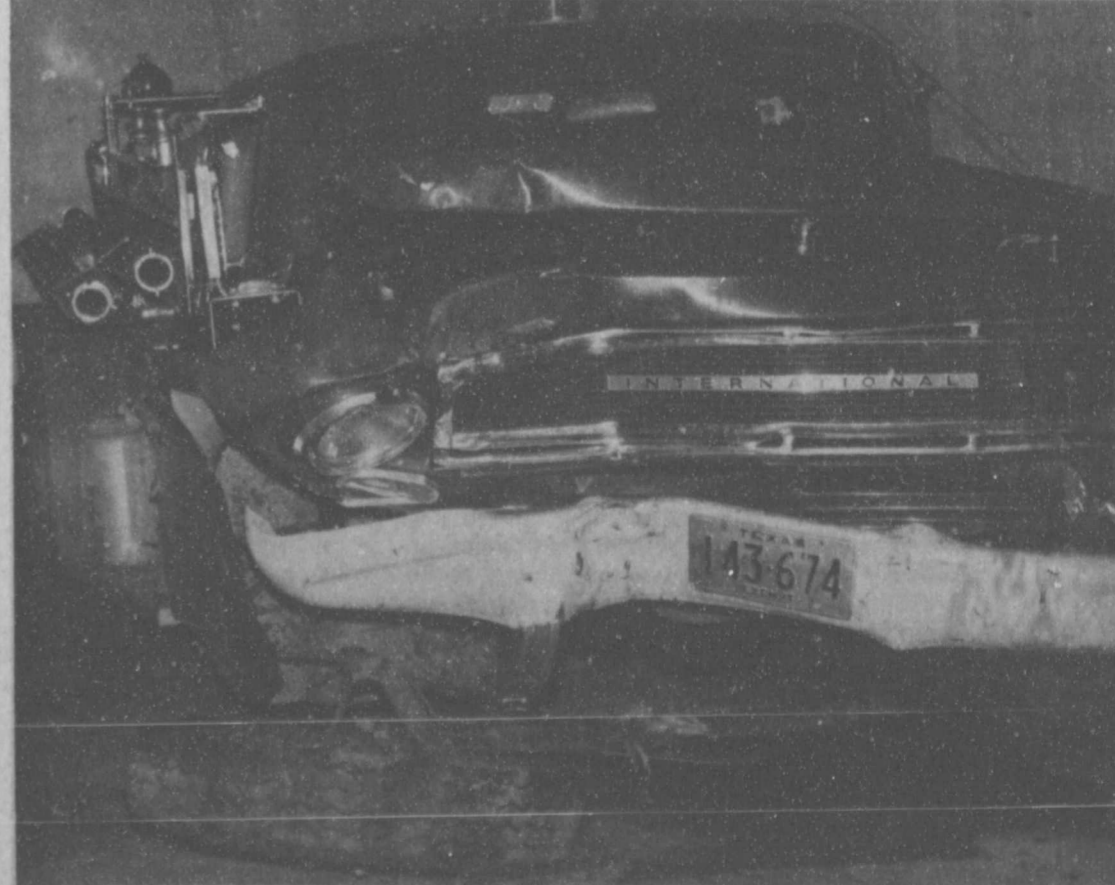

113th. Not Involved In Troop Release

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon has decided to return to civilian life some 16,000 Air National Guardsmen and reservists called up after North Korea's capture of the U.S. spy ship Pueblo and the enemy Tet offensive in Vietnam.

Sources said Wednesday the Air Guardsmen and reservists will be released starting in these last three months of 1968, with the last removed from active federal service by next June 30.

The phased release is designed to give the regular Air Force time to fill the slots out of its regular establishment.

Announcement of the move, under study for some six weeks, may be made Thursday.

Sources said that six Air National Guard squadrons will finish their normal overseas tours before being released.

These include four fighter squadrons in South Vietnam and two in South Korea.

The Vietnam squadrons, which arrived in the war zone in May and June, already have flown more than 6,000 combat missions inside South Vietnam.

The normal combat tour in Vietnam is 12 months.

The two fighter squadrons in South Korea were deployed there in late June and July. A final duty tour in Korea lasts 13 months.

One of the nearly 1,700 Air Guardsmen in South Vietnam is 1st Lt. Patrick J. Bennett, son-in-law of President Johnson.

On Sept. 16, the Navy announced that six of its Air Reserve squadrons called to active duty along with the Air Guard and reserve elements on Jan. 26, would be released by Nov. 1.

There are 600 men in the Naval Reserve squadrons. This leaves some 20,000 Army Guardsmen and reservists who entered federal active service May 13.

An Army spokesman said his service has no plans to free its called up guardsmen and reservists.

Several groups of Army reservists have carried to the Supreme Court their fight to avoid shipment to Vietnam.

They are attacking the legal underpinning of their call-up, ordered by Johnson under special congressional authority to muster men from the reserves for up to two years without declaration of war or national emergency.

Rep. Richard S. Schweiker, R-Pa. has claimed the call-up of Air Reservists was an "outrageous sham."

He contended the Pueblo incident was used "as an excuse to gain extra manpower, not to meet the Pueblo crisis but instead to increase military manpower levels for routine duty."

Some 5,000 of the Air Guardsmen and reservists have been taken out of their original units and used as replacements in regular Air Force units both in the United States and abroad.

This caused considerable unhappiness, but the Air Force took the position that it had the legal authority to separate reservists from their units and filter them into regular outfits as replacements, the same way regular airmen are assigned.

One complete General Motors V-8 engine, fully equipped and ready to operate, together with transmission, was presented to Mr. L. C. McKamie, Superintendent, and Mr. John N. Washburn, Auto Mechanics Instructor, by Mr. J. D. Mobley, area Service Manager, Chevrolet Motor Division, Dallas, Texas. Other equipment included a rear axle assembly and special tools and fixtures.

In making the presentation, Mr. Mobley said this contribution was part of General Motors' continuing aid to education and was one of many such donations throughout the nation to help train young men in the field of auto mechanics. In addition, he observed, GM provides grants of financial aid for research, provides special fel-

These bright cool October days fill us with vigor and we want to go outdoors and "do" something but don't know just where to start. It's too late to plant seeds for this year and too early to start planting trees and shrubs.

The squirrels will soon be helping us gather our pecan crop so why not take a hint from them and start gathering materials to be used for compost and mulch. What isn't used this winter will be on hand when needed in the busy time of spring.

There are more materials available at this time of the year too. The bins are overflowing with cottonhulls. New hay is filling the barns so last year's old hay should be cheap. And this fall's crop of leaves are just beginning to pile up in the yards of many friends who would be glad to have some help getting rid of them.

If it's compost you need, a shredding machine is handy but not necessary. Hay can be chopped with the mower. Pick an out of the way corner and layer the leaves, hulls or hay with dirt and fertilizer. Wet the pile down and leave it with a depression in the top to catch rain water. In the spring there should be a nice pile of good black compost.

If you are stockpiling mulch for the winter and next summer just stack it in that back corner until needed. You will probably come out ahead with a good layer of compost on the bottom of the heap as a bonus.

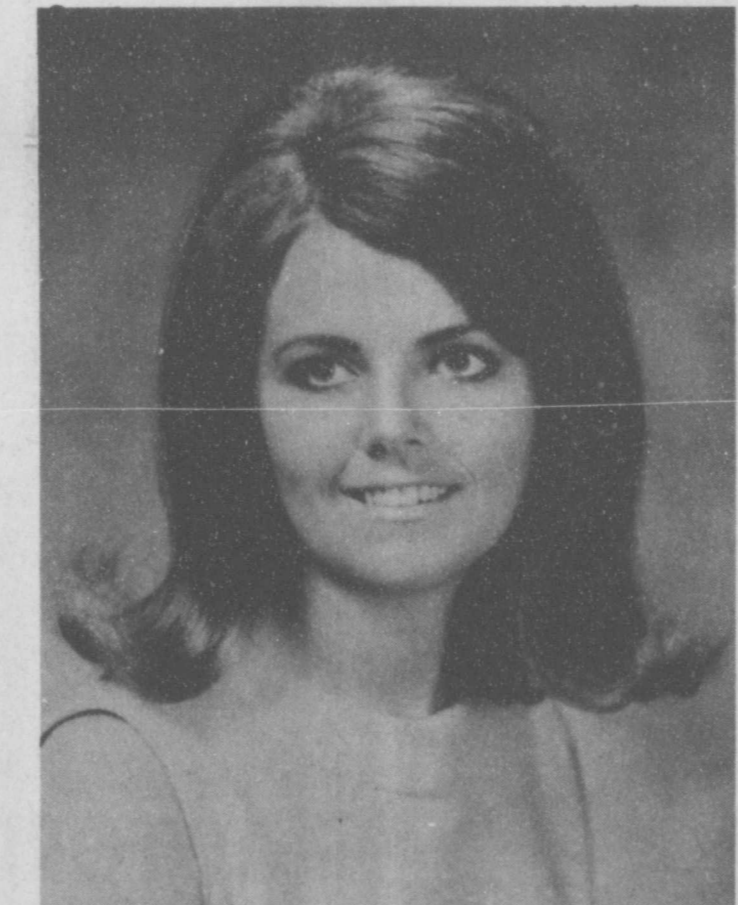

Last week the Hornets ran up against a really rough team when they played Killeen. Gatesville really didn't play as bad as the 46-0 score might indicate. Several of the Hornets' key players were slightly injured, keeping them from playing as well as they are capable of. The main factor, however, was the play of the Killeen Kangaroos. Several Hornet players said that the 'Roos were the best team that they had ever faced.

The Hornets have an open date this week, so that will give them some extra time to get ready for the Del Valle Cardinals. And you can be sure they will be ready

The 1968 World Series starts Wednesday, October 3. By the time you read this, the first two games will have already been played. It should be a

pitching battle, with the American League's top pitcher, Denny McClain heading the Detroit pitching staff and the National League's top hurler, Bob Gibson leading the St. Louis mound corps. The regular Chevy 427's crank out from 390 to 435 horsepower, but the L-88 has been tested and found to put out between 500 and 600 horses. With this engine in the already great Corvette, you should be able to blow the doors off any car on the street without any trouble. WHAT IS AMERICA

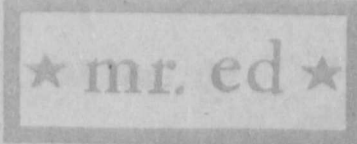

Like that Leather?

Try These Tips!

What is the newest, most fashionable in fabrics for fall? Leather like materials. It is showing up in skirts, vests, jackets and jumpers as well as rainwear and accessory items such as tote bags, hats, and belts.

Sewing techniques used on leather-like fabrics are similar to those for vinyl and real leather.

Select a pattern with simple design lines. Ragland and Kimono sleeves are easier than set in sleeves. In cutting the fabric pin pattern in seam allowances only. Use sharp shears and cut accurately. To mark the pattern, use dressmaker's carbon and a smooth edge tracing wheel to mark from the wrong side.

Stitch a test seam on the sewing machine before beginning. From this determine correct pressure and tension. It should be medium tension and light pressure. Use 8 to 12 stitches per inch for stitch length; a 14 size needle for medium weight fabrics and 16 for heavy weights; and heavy duty mercerized cotton thread for construction.

Plain seams will roll and they cannot be ironed flat. Flatten seams with rubber cement or adhesive.

Taper darts to a very fine point. The last three to four stitches should be on the fold. Don't backstitch. Use a tailor's hem, picking up one or two threads in backing. Don't pull the stitches tight or the garment will pucker on the right side.

Another tip: do not baste seams but pin them in the seam allowance.

If the leather sticks to the machine's metal surface when sewing use a strip of tissue paper between them.

Use reinforcement in buttons and neckline areas to prevent stretching.

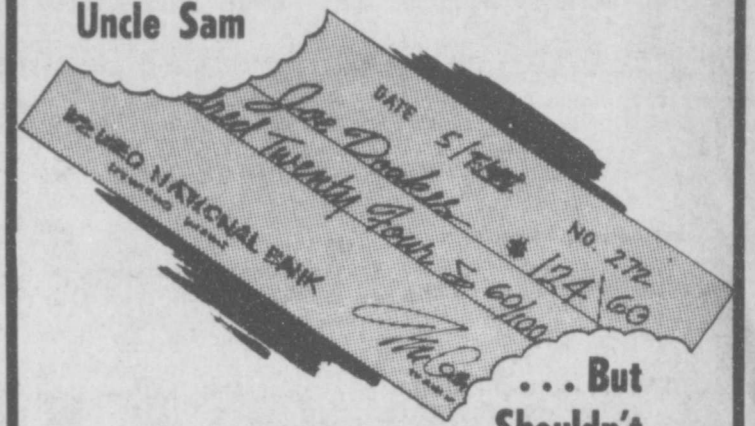
