



McKAMIE DISCUSSES BUILDING PROGRAM WITH LIONS

The Gatesville Lions Club had as their guest speaker, Wednesday, Gatesville School Superintendent, L. C. McKamie. Superintendent McKamie reviewed with the Lions the building program of the Gatesville Independent School District (GISD) for the near future.

McKamie reported to the Lions that the two major areas of construction would be in remodeling of the Elementary School building and construction of a new Vocational Building north of the High School Building.

The emergency work in the near future is the remodeling of the present Elementary building reported McKamie. The structure is 17 years old and major repairs are needed to the heating system, roof, and new class rooms. The project is estimated to cost \$50,000 with the burden falling on the tax payers completely.

The Gatesville Independent School District has been under the same tax rate for the last 19 years, McKamie reported this week, and 1968 dollars will not buy as much as 1949 dollars.

McKamie discussed the planned construction of a new Vocational Building, pointing out that the facilities depends upon the Texas Legislative Appropriation of funds to Texas schools. The Federal government has already made its commitments to education for the coming year, noted McKamie. The Federal Funds will be available to the Texas schools in a 3 to 1 ratio with funds provided by the State.

The Superintendent hopes for Legislative approval and appropriation of funds by February 1, 1969. The GISD is in a position to receive approximately \$75,000 in additional incentive aid this year due to recent consolidation.

McKamie explained that the citizens of the (GISD) would have to vote on a bond issue in the coming year for the needed building and remodeling. He explained that there may be misconception concerning bond issues. The schools have two taxes, Bond tax and Operating tax. McKamie reported that actual payment of the proposed bonds would be made with incentive aid and Federal aid funds and would not raise the bond tax "one penny." He voted that operating tax might be raised in the future.

Poage Is Top Vote

Getter in General Election

Central Texas Congressman W. R. (Bob) Poage (Dem.) won his bid for re-election by the greatest victory margin of any of the 391 incumbent members or soon-to-be members of the United States House of Representatives who had contests in the November 5 General Election.

That distinction for the 11th Texas District Congressman was disclosed in a tabulation published by the New York Times on November 10.

Setting forth the election results for the 435 House seats throughout the 50 states, the tabulation showed that 44 nominees won without opposition in the general balloting. Among the 391 who did have contests only 5 received 90% or more of the ballots cast in their particular races. Congressman Poage won his race by a margin of 96.5%. The runner-up received 94.8%.

While these election results are incomplete and unofficial, they are expected to stand up when the final results are tabulated.

Officials in the office of the Clerk of the House of Representatives said that the official count probably will not be known until in January.

While some contestants skimmed through by a fraction of 1% and many by only 1 or 2% winning ratio margin, the majority of victors appeared to have come through with an approximate 60 to 40% ratio.

Operating the school system has become more and more expensive each year and inflation has applied tremendous pressure on the present school tax rate.

McKamie pointed to the need for staff expansion, additional principals (presently one principal to 600 students) and need for a business manager (90% of McKamie's time spent in this area).

The need for vocational building stems from the school administration effort to provide educational opportunities to students of varying interests. The High School of a few years ago was preparing students for higher education with little effort to preparing students for occupational skills.

The new vocational program is an effort to broaden the view point of the local public schools.

Along with this broadening of view points the construction of the vocational building will relieve four class rooms for other uses.

The present vocational program at G. H. S. consist of five vocational training courses, Agriculture, Auto mechanics, general auto mechanics, Homemaking, Distributive Education and Vocational Office Education. Other courses are planned for the future.

The vocational curriculum at G. H. S. qualifies the school

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Gatesville's Opera Singer Praised in Berlin's Telegraf

The following article appeared in the Berlin (Germany) newspaper "TELEGRAF", October 23rd, 1969:

"WILLIAM BLANKENSHIP: A TENOR FROM TEXAS.

The tall, blonde artist is a tenor, who just came to us from Vienna. He made his way from a little Texas town, Gatesville, to the Vienna State Opera via New York's Julliard School of Music and the smaller German opera houses. William Blankenship did not build a hectic, but a traditionally classic career. This past Sunday

he sang the role of Alfredo in the 37th performance of "LA TRAVIATA", staged by Professor Selner. A year ago he helped out our opera house of quite dramatic circumstances in this same role; he was having Thanksgiving turkey dinner with his family and friends in Vienna, when the telephone rang and the German Opera Berlin asked him to come immediately because one of his colleagues fell ill.

This "TRAVIATA" is practically an unknown production for him with very little rehearsal. What does he think about such guest performances, we asked the singer. He simply answered: "The music is the main thing". He continued: "There are two kinds of singers, one who sings for money and the other who sings for the sake of art". Mr. Blankenship evidently belongs to the second group.

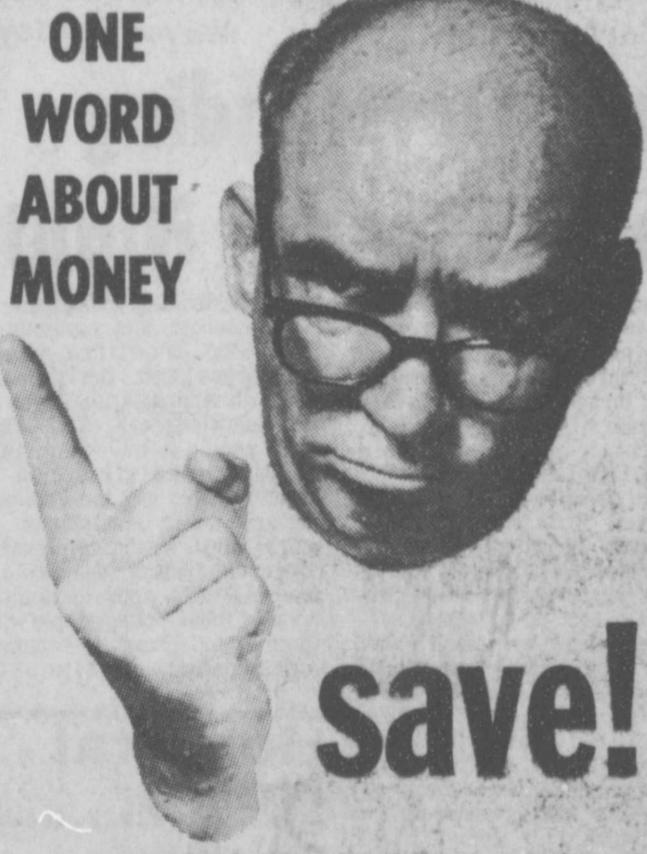

Lubbock Christian College expects to graduate its first four-year class in May, 1972.

Waco Production Credit Assn. To Meet in Clifton

The 34th Annual Stockholders' Meeting of the Waco Production Credit Association will be held in Clifton, on Saturday, November 23rd, 1968 at 10:00 A. M. The meeting will be held in the Armory located in the Clifton Park.

Flight Training Available Under GI Bill

Veterans taking flight training under the GI Bill will get Veterans Administration payments on a monthly basis starting in January 1969.

Payments have been made quarterly in the past, but the long period between payments often caused a hardship for both the trainee and flight school operator.

The new payment system was authorized by Public Law 90-631, signed by President Johnson last month.

The law, which contained several other provisions on veterans' benefits, becomes effective Dec. 1, 1968, but since payments for educational assistance are made at the end of the month, the first checks in the new program will be received in January.

The system of monthly payments is in line with most other payments for GI TRAINING. Veterans attending college on a full-time basis, for example, receive monthly payments of \$130 per month if unmarried; more if they have dependents.

Those in flight training are reimbursed at the rate of 90 percent of the cost of their flight training, but for each \$130 paid, their eligibility for educational benefits is charged one month. The \$130 rate applies regardless of marital status or number of dependents.

This system of monthly payments is in line with most other payments for GI TRAINING. Veterans attending college on a full-time basis, for example, receive monthly payments of \$130 per month if unmarried; more if they have dependents.

Another provision of the law raises to 48 months the maximum educational assistance entitlement that an individual can receive under two or more educational programs.

An eligible veteran may take an approved course of flight training under the educational assistance program if it is considered necessary to attain a recognized vocational objective in the field of aviation.

He must first possess a valid private pilot's license or he must have satisfactorily completed the number of hours of flight training instruction required for a private pilot's license.

Also he must meet the medical requirements necessary for a commercial pilot's license.

Prices are \$1.25 for Adults and \$50 for Students. Tickets will be available at the door.

Heavy Boll Weevil Infestation Noted in Area Cotton Fields

While most farmers in the area have already destroyed their cotton stalks and plowed under debris, many fields still have standing cotton stalks. Recent inspections of fields in Falls, Bosque, Hamilton, Lampasas, Coryell, Somervell, Hood and McLennan show that a heavy boll weevil and pink bollworm infestation is present and is building up. These fields are producing large numbers of those insects to overwinter and infest next year's crop.

Entomologists in charge of the U. S. D. A. Cotton Insect Laboratories urge all of Central Texas farmers to complete the cotton harvest as soon as possible and destroy stalks and plow under debris immediately thereafter. This can be the first step in reducing the number of such pests as the boll weevil and pink bollworm that would infest the 1969 crop. Stalk destruction destroys the food

County Agent Report

The end of the growing season is an ideal time for taking soil sample tests. Don't wait until the spring rush of field work to do this important job, reminds County Agent, Don Callahan.

Levels of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium are measured. In addition, suitable methods have been developed for the micronutrient zinc.

Soil Sample boxes, information sheets and tips on how to take soil samples are all available from the office of the County Agent. Callahan added that he would welcome the opportunity to discuss soil sampling and testing with interested persons. The value of soil testing he said is well known and demonstrations of results are available in Coryell County to further emphasize its importance.

The soil sample must be carefully taken if it is to reflect the actual plant food situation in a given field or pasture. Several samples must be taken at different spots over the field and then mixed into a composite sample. Each composite sample should be numbered and the information sheet covering the field completely filled out. This information is valuable to the soil scientist when he makes fertilizer recommendations, explains the County Agent.

Soil sampling is just as important for lawns, gardens, home orchards and flower beds as for field crops.

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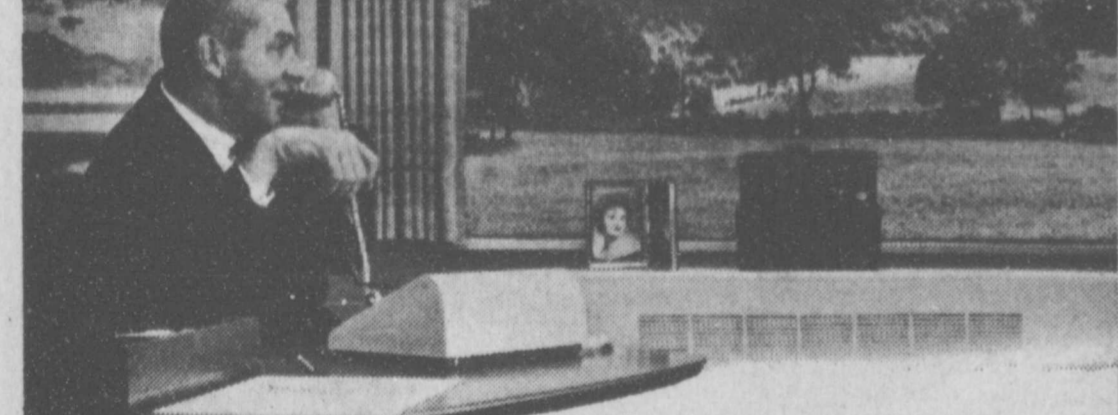

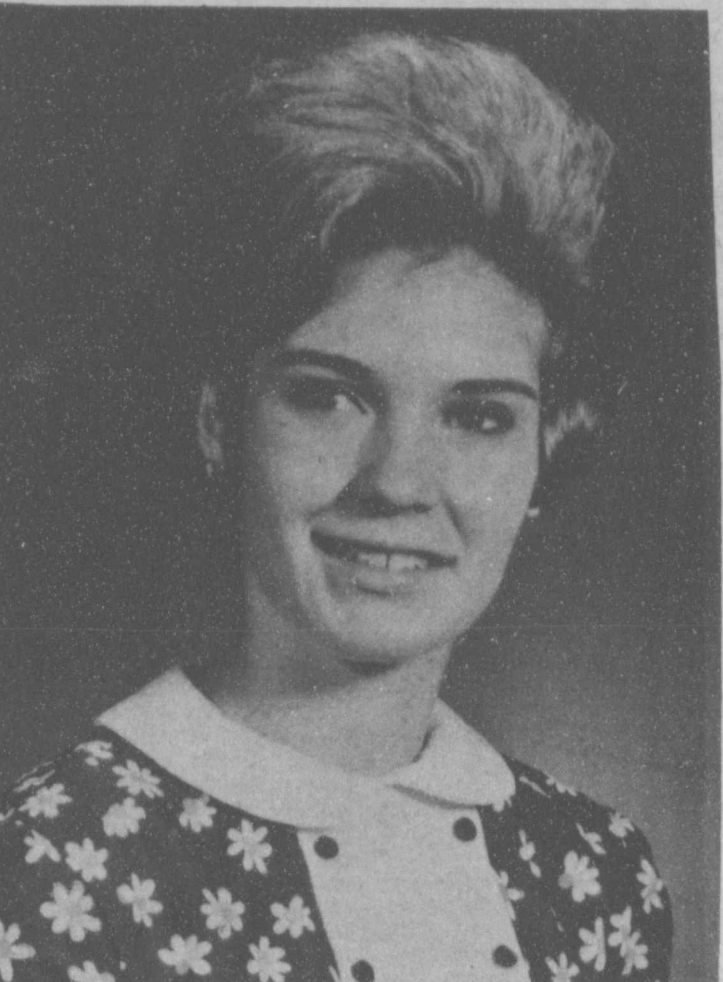
Additional scenes for "The Odd Couple" were shot in the Shea pressbox and featured Matthau with well-known baseball writers.

A new group which has burst on the scene this year is Steppenwolf. Their first album, Steppenwolf, is a successful venture into the field of hard rock music. Their sound is uniquely their own, even though at times it reminds you of the Beatles and the lead guitar occasionally sounds like Hendrix. The basis of the Steppenwolf sound is the strong vocal of lead singer and songwriter, John Kay. He really comes on strong and gets fine instrumental support from the rest of the group.

On this first album are two hit songs, their first, "Born to Be Wild", and a current top 40 tune, "Sookie, Sookie". Other good, solid songs are "Take What You Need", "Hootchie Kootchie Man", "Your Wall's Too High", "Desperation", and "Everybody's Next One". Two other notable selections are "The Pusher" which condemns the use of hard drugs, and "Barry Rides Again" which captures the old sound of Chuck Berry and Johnny Rivers (in his early Whiskey - A - Go - Go days).

Steppenwolf's second album, named accordingly Steppenwolf the Second, is almost a continuation of the first. There are a few small, subtle changes, but basically the sound remains the same. This album contains their latest hit song, "Magic Carpet Ride". Other selections are "Faster Than the Speed of Light", "28", "Spiritual Fantasy", and "None of Your Doing". There is one long cut on this album; on the stereo tape it is entitled simply "Long Song," but on the record album it has another name. It is noteworthy because in its entire 12 minutes of length, it does not have repetitions. It more or less builds and grows, featuring many different instruments and rhythm patterns.

Two new female singing stars have burst onto the scene lately with great songs. The first is Mary Hopkin with "Those Were the Days". She is one of the first artists to record on the Beatles new label "Apple". This is her record and it is really a smash hit. The other girl is Judy Collins. Her recently released smash song is sweeping up the charts. It's called "Both Sides Now" and sounds very much like the old Byrds' song "My Back Pages." Bobby Vinton has just lately recorded the old tune originally done by the Paris Sisters, "I Love How You Love Me". He does a fine job but he doesn't quite capture the softness and soul which made it such a great song when they did it.

The long-rumored and much publicized break-up of the Cream may not take place after all. Latest word from reliable sources has it that they decided at the last minute to stick together and may have a new album out on the Ato label sometime around Christmas.
