

Bee House Bridge Complete

County Commissioners Precinct 2, Pat Hollingsworth reported Wedesday the completion of a new bridge across Bee House Creek one mile west of Pidcoke off a county road, The new structure will make the road more reliable for school bus and commuter travel in the area serviced by the road.

The span is 180 feet long and a 20 foot wide road way with 10 feet wide sloping shoulder. The re-enforced concrete structure required 169 yards of concrete to complete. Three 44 foot tin horns were placed in the center of the span. Cost of the project is estimated at \$6000.

FHA Approves Supplemental Loan

Vance Stephens of the Farmers Home Administration announced, Tuesday that a \$6500 supplemented loan for the Flat Water Supply Corporation had been approved. The original grant involved an \$80,000 FHA

Stephens estimated that final closing procedures would be completed December 3 on a \$140,000 FHA Loan to The Grove Water Supply Corporation. The closing procedure is notification to the loan applicant to begin construction within a ten day period.

"The FHA has twelve of these association type loans' said Stephens, "ten of which are

closed and two open."

Near Lampasas

Paul January, age 63, died in Rollins-Brook Hospital, Lampasas late Saturday afternoon, following a serious automobile accident, which took him there some twenty four hours earlier. Losing control of his pick-up, near the Wagon Wheel Ranch, on the Lometa Farm to Market road, which connects to Highway 281, Mr. January suffered severe cuts, bruises and internal injuries, when his pickup overturned three times. He was tossed through the windshield and landed in a pasture, where he was found by a passing neighbor.
