Gatesville High School Receives

68-69 Accreditation

The Gatesville High School of the Gatesville Independent School District was accredited for the 1968-69 school year by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools at their annual meeting in Atlanta, Georgia, in early December. This school has been a member since 1930.

This school is among the 542 member schools from Texas that are accredited by the Secondary Commission of hte Secondary Commission of the Southern Association, This program is operating in 11 states and involves some 3000 secondary schools, or better than 30 percent of the secondary schools, in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana Mississippi North Caroana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia. It also has the responsibility for the accreditation of American Schools in Latin America.

Accreditation by the Secondary Commission of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools means that the school meets standards established by high school principals, school administrators, and college educators, describing a program of continuing self-improvement for teachers, materials, curriculum and facilities. Member schools have come to depend upon the mechanics of accreditation as the most effective means of achieving quality in their educational programs. Benefits accruing to a school, such as creating public confidence in its educational program and protecting it from groups or individuals who would use the school for their own personal gain or advantage, are inherent in the accreditation process.

Internal Revenue Announces Gun

The major restriction on sales in the new law forbids residents of one state from buying firearms, but not ammunition, in another state. One important exception to this rule permits a resident of one state to buy a rifle or shotgun, but not a handgun, in an adjacent state if certain procedures are complied with. The purchase can only be made if the buyer's state or residence enacts legislation that permits it to take place and the sale is legal in both states. A sworn state-

lations under the new Federal Gun Law was announced today by the Internal Revenue Service. They will appear in the Federal Register of December

The new gun law does not prevent sportsmen from buying firearms and ammunition in the states in which they reside. However, the sale and delivery must conform with state and applicable local laws. In addition, a retail purchase will usually have to be made in person and the buyer will have to show sufficient identification, such as a driver's license, to establish his name, address and age.



For 1969 the producer trustees of Cotton Producers Institute have budgeted \$10 million for research and promotion, contingent upon collections from the 1968-69 crop. This represents a 25 per cent increase over 1968.



to them; Palestine is located at a point of geographic, historic and political interest -- past, present and future. It has been called the cross roads of the nations. It has been the highway and the bridge between the most ancient seats of

The racial hatred, and bitter persecution has given the Jew great desire to go back to their homeland.

Palestine was once a land greatly blessed of God, with a population of more than three million people. A land flowing with milk and honey, so to speak.
But in AD 70, Titus and his

Roman army beseiged Jerusalem, destroyed the temple, and slaughtered hundreds of thousands of Jewish people. This was a fulfillment of what Jesus said to his desciples, just before his crucifixion, 'That there shall not be left one stone upon another that shall not be thrown down." Luke 21:6. From that time, until the recent return, of the Jews to their homeland, desolation set into the land, and the people of Israel scattered in all directions throughout the long centuries, although much suffering was experienced, many Jews still held to the hope of some day, returning to their

At the close of the 19 century amidst fiery new out breaks in Europe against them, the Jewish people again experienced a deep longing for their homeland, and several thousand left Eastern Europe to join some 25,000 Jews who were living in Palestine.

Theodore Herzl spearheaded the Zionist movement, working to the end that Palestine might be established by public law, as an official Jewish state. This was achieved in the Bal four Declaration in 1917. By this time some 7,500 Jewish

people lived in Palestine.

Many of us remember the thrilling report that General Allenby's capture of the Holy City December 11,1917, was made without the firing of a shot, nor was there any destruction to the city by artillery. Teh Turks had fled.

General Edmund Allenby, Commander in Chief of the Allied armies of the East, entered the city of Jerusalem We know this was the hand of God, working out his plan.

For centuries of time, the beautiful land of Palestine had me barren and desolate. der the rule of the Nomadic Arabs, and the four century reign of the Turks.

But the fig tree began to bud, to pour into Palestine, where the League of Nations, gave the British a Mandate over the country in 1923. Leaders of Zionism met with

Arab rulers, and purchased poor, barren land from Arab owners at a price far above its value. Jewish immigration continued to increase especially as Hitler's crimes started to fall across Europe. By the time of World War II there were over 500,000 Jewish people in Palestine, who worked diligently to make the land productive, and after the Arabs began to see the great changes made in the land which they thought was of no value, they began to demand that the land be returned.

The Arabs claim all of Palestine as their homeland, and so do the Jews. They both claim to be descendents of Abraham. In fact, the Arabs are descendents of Ishmael the son of Hagar, the bondwoman, Sara gave to Abraham, while the Jews are decendents of Isaac, and God said: "In Isaac shall they seed be called." Romans

The feud that existed between Isaac and Ishmael, back in Bible days still exists today between the Arabs and Israelis. Genises 21:9-12. But it was with Isaac and his seed that God established the everlasting covenant. Genesis 17:19.

to 11,000,000 in 1945. Favorable events have shaped up fast. On May 14, 1948, as the last British soldier left Palestine, the Jewish National Council, and the Zionist Council at Tel Aviv proclaimed the establishment of the Jewish state

After 1900 years the despised dispersed Jewish people could return home

The greatest exodus since the days of Moses could begin, All restrictions were done away with, and Jewry had the right ofimmigration in order to gather all the exiles in.

The infant nation Israel, under the leadership of its first President, Dr. Chaim Weizmann, and Prime Minister, David Ben-Gurion, saw the flag of David lifted for the first time since Titus removed it in A D
