Of course, when medical treatment fails, I still operate and also have to operate when an ulcer has healed but has left a mass of scar tissue blocking the passage of food from the stomach to small intestine."

The reason that more cures are being obtained by medicine, and fewer operations are being performed, is that both physicians and surgeons now realize that it is not the ulcer that needs to be treated but the patient himself,

No Treatment All-Inclusive Dr. Joseph Daly, Toronto, in the Canadian Medical Association Journal, states that it is now admitted that no treatment is suitable for all peptic ulcers. "The physician no longer aims to treat the ulcer but to direct the management of the patient who has an ulcer diathesis (predisposition or tendency to ulcer) and the surgeon confines his efforts to correcting the complications that arise during the course of the disease."
