COUNTY JOINS REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

Corvell County joined with Bell County to form the Central Texas Regional Planning Commission at a Wednesday organization meeting in Belton.

The Regional Planning Commission elected new officers during the day-long session of the new Commission. Judge J. F. (Jim) Clawson of Belton was elected president of the Commission and Judge Norman Storm of Gatesville was elected as vice-president. Killeen

The annual cost of membership was set at 6¢ per capita for counties and cities and a flat fee of \$300 set for other political subdivisions by the vote of all member organiza-

tions, Wednesday. The reorganization to include Coryell County and Copperas Cove prompted realinement of the board of directors to include the elected commissioners court of the two counties, plus an appointed member

for each 50,000 population. The board of directors are scheduled to meet once every six months.

> Judge Norman Storm reported Wednesday that joining the Regional Planning Commission is a step in the right direction, because of the common interest that exists between Bell and Coryell Counties.

> > Storm outlined the plans of the Planning Commission which include four other counties. Milan, Hamilton, Lampasas and Mills and all the political subdivisions within the area. The Planning Commission plans to employ a full-time director in the near future.

COMMITTEE REPORT

DISCUSSES

LONGTIME EDUCATOR

The Governors Committee on Public Education has proposed some drastic changes in the state public education system. The pro and con of the committee report will be heard many times in the near future.

Coryell County is scheduled for only one school district which will disolve Evant, Jonesboro, Oglesby, Copperas Cove, and Gatesville schools. The smaller schools are seen by many as the most likely to lose under the Governor's Com mittee Report.

Superintendent P. T. Lemmons of the Jonesboro School has provided the News with the following statement.

a superintendent of a small high school, I have been requested to express my opinion regarding the report of the Governor's Committee on Public School Education. As the people of this area know, I have spent my professional life time working in the small schools of Texas, not of necessity but choice, because I believe bv that in such schools a teacher is offered the greatest opportunity in the teaching field,

I also believe that the small school and the small community have been the very foundation of this country's greatness

I know that no one in this area can believe that my opinions in this matter are based upon a desire to keep a school and thereby keep a job. My career as a school administrator and teacher is nearing a close; however, my interest in the education of the children of Texas shall continue.

I am sure-that many of the recommendations of the committee are worthwhile and would be helpful in the educational system of the state; however there are several things that I believe should be studied seriously between now and the time this program comes under the consideration of the legislature.

First, I resent the label of "inferior education" placed upon the small schools by the advocates of the committee's plan. I feel that the small school and small community offer the best opportunity for the child to find himself and develop his own personality and leadership. The small schools has nothing to be ashamed of. Go into the cities and ask the lawyers, doctors, bankers and business leaders where they went to high school, and you will find that the small school has produced its share of leaders in every field. We have graduates from Jonesboro High School in almost every college and university in Texas, and they do not seem to be handicapped by the "inferior" education they received here.

Our seniors have averaged 18.5 on the A. C. T. college entrance tests as compared with the committee report of 13,4 for schools our size. In a







Mr. Litterst states that the field of beef cattle production must take a close look at efficiency of production in the future. With land prices, food, and taxes rising, the producer is meeting more and more competition for the consumers' dollar at the meat counter. From the economic view of the beef cattle business, there is every indication that in comparing the producer of yesteryear and the producer of tomorrow, beef must be produced to sell cheaper in order to be profit-making business. Mr. Litterst indicates that the beef production short course will deal with methods of producing beef at a lower cost and the ways of producing the kind of beef that the homemaker wants to buy. He also states that the course will include such important fields as cattle reproduction and pregnancy diagnosis, selecting bulls and replacement heifers, calf crop percentages, and supplemental winter feeding. The course can be changed to meet the wishes and interests of the farmers and ranchers enrolled. "Short courses in beef production, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the cooperative program between Texas Education A-

gency and Texas A&M University," states Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University, who coordinates the program for Texas

"This cooperative program," states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."






