### Planning Commission

#### Hires Charles Cass

#### As Director

The newly formed Central Texas Planning Commission which includes Coryell County, hired Charles A. Cass of Temple as executive director.

The announcement came during a Wednesday meeting of the executive board of the Planning Commission. Coryell Judge, Norman Storm and Commissioners, Pat Hollingsworth are members of the executive board.

Mr. Cass formerly of Lampasas has been secretary and a member of the Temple Planning Commission for the past three years.

The executive director salary has been set at \$10,000 a year with car expenses. Temporary offices will be located in the Bell County Courthouse in Belton. A full time secretary has also provided in the new organization.

In other actions, the Planning Commission discussed ways of securing state and federal planning funds. A committee including Judge Storm of Gatesville and George Leonhard of Copperas Cove was directed to confer in Austin for future funding of the C.T.R.P.C.

Norman Storm reported late Wednesday, that the committee has tentatively set up a meeting with members of the Governors Staff next week. The committee will be seeking recognition of the Planning Commission by the state, which will open purse strings to the organization.

Selection of a committee to investigate every avenue open for designation of the Central Texas area as a metropolitan center was delegated to Frank W. Mayborn of Temple. Efforts to have the designation of the area as a Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area (SMSA), have been projected under the Temple Chamber. The new committee will take over the project of being recognized as a SMSA.

The SMSA designation is beneficial to businesses and the area development, reports Norman Storm. The designation involves areas with over 50,000 population.

Dairy Superintendents are George Jageler and Clois Stone. Poultry Superintendent is Mr. C. D. Blackburn. Rabbit Superintendent is Mr. Ben Lee. Goat Superintendents are Fred D. Martlett and Bob Melbern. Horse Superintendent is Johnny Wood.

All Agriculture entries must be in the County Agents office or the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce office by 5:00 p.m. Monday, February 3.

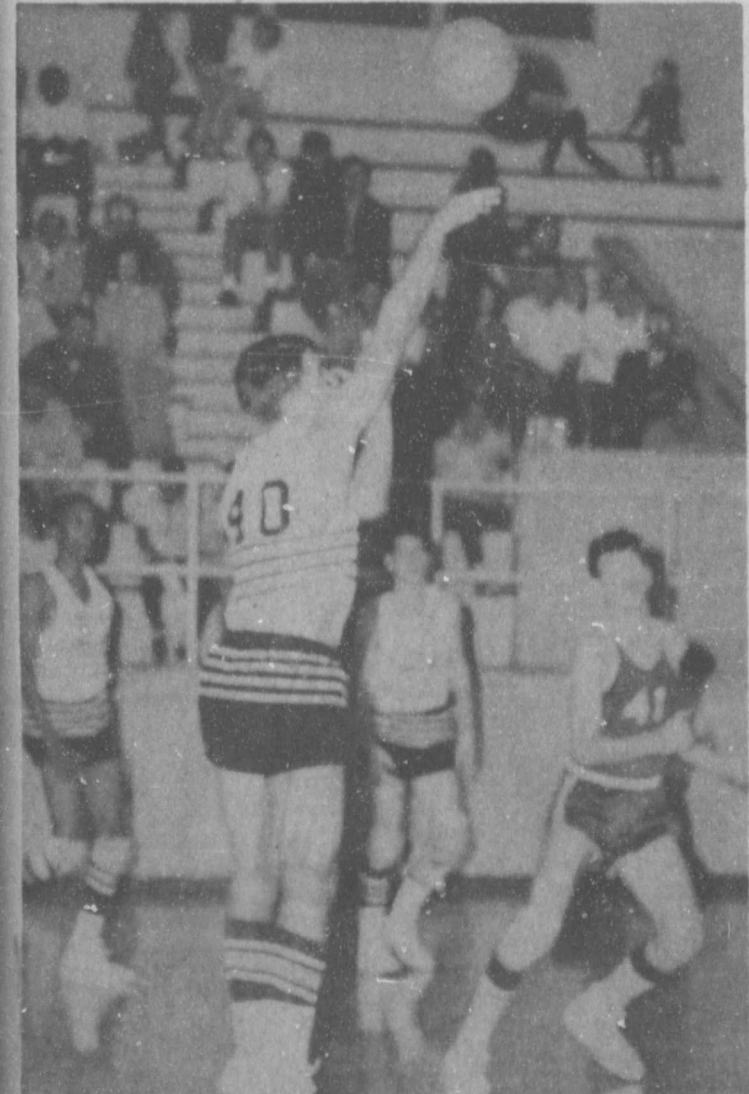
### National Bank Annual Meeting Held Tuesday

Record breaking increases in assets, deposits, and loans was reported to the stockholders by Andrew Kendrick, Chairman of the Board, at the annual meeting held in the bank's Civic Room Tuesday, January 21. Assets had increased \$1,764,733.00, deposits increased \$1,730,655 and loans increased \$340,232.

## COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD OPPOSES GOVERNORS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Coryell County School Board passed a resolution at the January 13 meeting listing seven points of disagreement with the Governor's Committee on Public School Education Report.

The recent supplement to the Governor's Committee report proposes one school district for Coryell County and gives a detailed breakdown of financial requirements of Coryell County. The Coryell County School Board consisting of H. R. Haase, Fred Homan, A. T. Hull, A. A. Watson and Gerald Cummings and County Superintendent, W. H. Donaldson plan to send copies of the resolution to Governor Preston Smith, Lt. Governor Ben Barnes and other legislative officials in the near future.

The resolution is as follows: The Coryell County School Board meeting in regular session on January 13, 1969 did among other actions unanimously pass the following resolution:

1. The consolidation of all school districts into one county-wide district as proposed would not serve the population of Coryell County as effectively as the multi-district organization. Such arbitrary action would not reflect the time-honored tradition of "home rule" and "local option of existing centers

The Rabbit Judges Conference in the past has been held at the National Rabbit Show each year, but attendance has been weak because of the long distance judges must travel, explained Lee.

The new regional arrangements will attract about 20 rabbit judges from a 10 state region.

Lee explained that rigid requirements of being a judge call for attendance at a judges conference every so often to review and discuss the characteristics of the many breeds of rabbits.

"Judges are judged" noted Lee. The conference will refresh and update the judge's knowledge of each breed of rabbit.

of population and community interests and needs.

2. Reorganization of school districts into a county-wide district would necessitate an extensive bonding program to operate efficiently as such.

3. Transportation in Coryell County would be extremely complex and difficult to operate with a "reasonable" length of time and distance traveled by many students.

4. The increase of 81.2 thousand dollars in Coryell County's Local Fund Assignment for 1969-70 would cause severe financial problems (103,7 thousand 1968-69 184,9 thousand 1969-70) whereas in 1970-71 the increase of 79,8 thousand total 264,7 thousand would require substantial assessment and tax rate increases.

5. Granted that some tax inequities exist in Texas and Coryell County, it is with apprehension that we view the theory of state versus local authority tax evaluation concept which estimates the market value of Coryell County property at 159,193 million dollars as opposed to locally assessed values of 27,288 million.

6. Historically Coryell County School Districts have voluntarily sought consolidation with other districts when said districts were unable to continue and offer quality education for the children in their home community. With a firm belief that the citizens of all School Districts are sincerely concerned with the best interests of their children's ed-

ucation, we feel that "forced" consolidation under any guise is unwarranted.

7. Believing that the interests of Coryell County will best be served in the field of public education by local leadership under the present framework of law, we urge your opposition to this committee report.

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## W-2 Form INCOME TAX ESSENTIAL

Tax refunds cannot be paid without required W-2 withholding tax certificates and credit cannot be given for taxes withheld, according to Stanley Ferguson, administrative officer of Internal Revenue Service, Waco.

Taxpayers were also reminded that in preparing a joint 1968 return, where both parties worked, W-2's for each must be attached. And when either or both parties filing a return

held more than one job during the year, all W-2's must be attached.

A taxpayer who has not received his W-2 Form should contact his employer before checking with IRS. If the employer has gone out of business, the taxpayer should contact him or the present owner of the business. If the Form W-2 is still not available, then the taxpayer should prepare his income tax return from the best information at hand, file his return by the April 15 deadline, and attach a note explaining why the Form W-2 is missing.

offered their cooperation in urging vehicle purchasers to register their vehicles in accordance with the law.

Cassidy said computerization of registration records in the Highway Department will be of significant help in enforcement of the registration law, because of the speed with which a patrolman can determine whether a vehicle is legally registered. "For example," said Cassidy, "one of our Highway Patrolmen who stops a vehicle

within a few minutes how it is registered and compare it with the owner's address. "This information will be immediately available from the computer at the Highway Department in Austin, and the patrolman can obtain it through the Department of Public Safety communications system very quickly. Cassidy said the computerization of the vehicle registration records also will be invaluable in criminal law enforcement work, pointing out that in the majority of crimes committed, the criminal uses an automobile in one way or another.

Kultgen said the modern system of record-keeping will be of considerable convenience to the individual motorist next year when he has to obtain new license plates for his vehicle.

"Instead of having to wait in long lines while clerks laboriously type the needed information, he will be provided in advance with a pre-prepared form containing such information which he simply will present when he pays his registration fee," he said.

Kultgen reminded that the period for registering vehicles is from February 1 through April 1, and urged motorists to be sure they are registered correctly and legally so as to avoid penalty under the law.

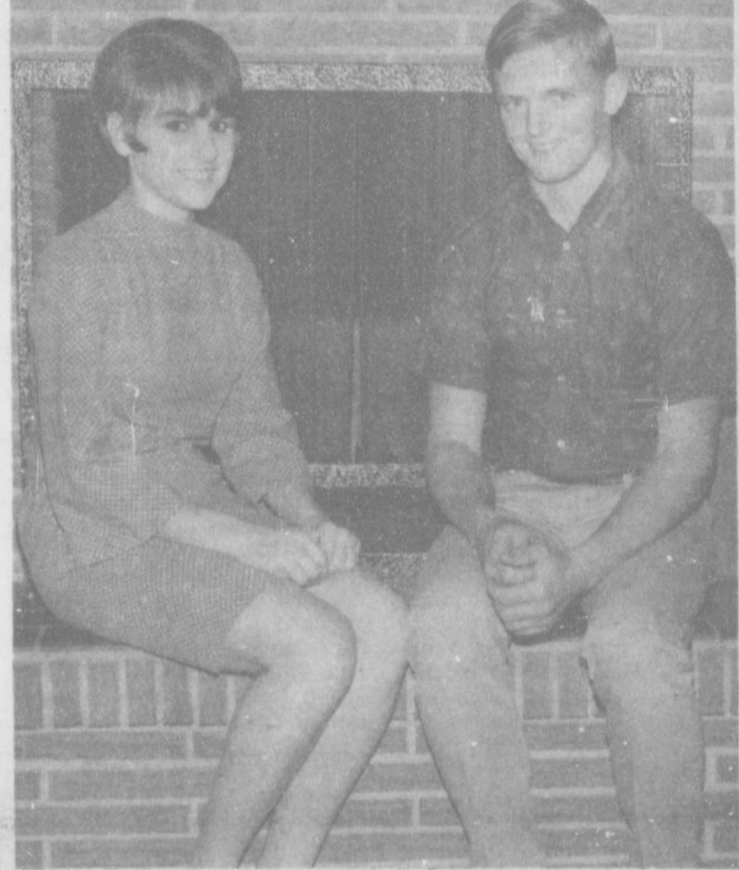

The mistakes or failures of the Johnson tenure were expressed in this way by the Texas public, in this case non-Democrats being understandably more critical than Democrats:
