Planning Commission

Hires Charles Cass As Director

The newly formed Central Texas Planning Commission which includes Coryell County, hired Charles A, Cass of Tem-ple as executive director.

The announcement came during a Wednesday meeting of the executive board of the Planning Commission. Coryell Judge, Norman Storm and Commissioners, Pat Hollingswirth are members of the executive

Mr. Cass formerly of Lampasas has been secretary and a member of the Temple Planning Commission for the past three years.

The executive director salary has been set at \$10,000 a year with car expenses. Temporary offices will be located in the Bell County Courthouse in Belton. A full time secretary has also provided in the

new organization. In other actions, the Planning Commission discussed ways of securing state and federal planning funds. A committee including Judge Storm of Gatesville and George Leonhard of Copperas Cove was directed to confer in Austin for future

funding of the C.T.R.P.C. Norman Storm reported late Wednesday, that the committee has tenetvively set up a meeting with members of the Governors Staff next week. The committee will be seeking recognition of the Planning Commission by the state, which will open purse strings to the or-

ganization. Selection of a committee to investigate every avenue open for designation of the Central Texas area as a metropolitan center was deligated to Frank Mayborn of Temple, Efforts to have the designation of the area as a Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area (SMSA), have been projected under the Temple Chamber. The new committee will take over the project of being recognized

as a SMSA. The SMSA designation is beneficial to businesses and the area development, reports Norman Storm. The designation involves areas with over 50,000 population.

Highway Commission and Public Safety

Commission Issued Joint Appeal

The chairmen of the Texas Highway Commission and the Texas Public Safety Commission today issued a joint appeal to motor vehicle owners to be sure they have their vehicles registered properly as required by State law.

J. H. Kultgen of Waco, Chairman of the Highway Commission, and Clifton Cassidy Jr. of Dallas, Chairman of the Public Safety Commission, said computerization of all vehicle registrations in the Highway Department, being completed now, will make enforcement of this law by highway patrolmen

"Many motorists, knowingly or unknowingly, have their vehicles registered illegally in counties other than where they reside, and others who live in cities show only a Post Office box number instead of their residence address, as required," Kultgen said.

Kultgen reminded that the eriod for registering vehicles from February 1 through pril 1, and urged motorists be sure they are registered orrectly and legally so as to void penalty under the law.



Hay quality in 1969 will de-end, in the main, on two about the time the last frost

is expected, he says. A soil test is the only sure way to tell how much fertilizer and lime will be needed this year. Approximately 80-100 pounds of nitrogen should be supplied for the first cutting in addition to the phosphorus, potash, lime and other nutrients recommended by the soil test. The agronomist says hay should be topdressed immediately after each harvest for maximum quality as rainfall can be utilized more efficiently when hay crops have been adequately fertilized,

Harvesting before plants mature is of equal importance for high quality, and Pratt suggests about every 25-28 days for permanent type grasses such as Bermuda grass. Johnsongrass and hybrid sorghums should be harvested before


seedheads emerge, he adds. Most areas in the state have the potential for producing five tons or more of good quality hay per acre--but the amount and quality produced are largedetermined by the amount of plant food and the state of growth when the crops are harrested, Pratt adds.

A forage test is a good way to determine the quality of hay being produced this spring and county agents can supply infor-mation on this as well as soil
