



Speaker Of House To Attend Mountain View Commencement

Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, Gus Mutscher of Brenham will be the speaker at the Mountain View Winter Commencement exercises Sunday, February 9, 1969.

The announcement was made this week by Representative Bob Salter in Austin. The exercise is scheduled for 2:30 p.m. with ten graduating seniors to be honored. Valedictorian of the class is Mark Richard Harris and Salutatorian is Robert Olin Bonham.

Speaker Mutscher is serving his first term as speaker of the House replacing Lt. Governor Ben Barnes at the post.

Mountain View School principal Robert L. Ballard will present special awards to the honorees followed by the introduction of the Re, Mutscher by Rep. Bob Salter.

School Superintendent George B. Adams will present the honored students. Dr. James A. Turman, Secretary of School

Board and Executive Director of the Texas Youth Council will

Rep. Mutscher is scheduled to tour the Mountain View complex and the Gatesville State School for Boys following the Commencement program.

Bob Salter reported Tuesday that Dr. Turman the Speaker and other officials would tour the entire facility in Gatesville.

Coryell County Youth Fair Begins Today

The 10th Annual Coryell County fair has attracted 419 youthful entries in nine different divisions.

The two-day show began today with livestock entries totalling 50 sheep, 20 cattle, 30 poultry, 12 swine, 24 horses and two sections of rabbits. The home economics division listed 39 entries in the adult division and 102 in junior division. The largest home economics division was the senior division with 140 entries.

The Youth Fair awards trophies, rosettes, ribbons and approximately \$700 in premiums, and money to the winners of classes.

The County-wide show is sponsored by the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce which raised \$600 in contributions from local business firms and individuals for the premium money and operating cost.

Cecil Neuman Cited For Respect For Law

The Optimist Club of Gatesville observed one of the most notable events in the history of the club in its Monday evening meeting at the Chateau Ville Restaurant. The organization awarded the Respect For Law Citation to a local citizen, Cecil Neuman. This is one of the highest honors the international organization can bestow upon any citizen.

Neuman was cited for his ac-

tions when he was called upon for help by a lady who was being threatened bodily injury. He went to the aid of the lady and received physical injuries during the resulting action. After the dispersion he continued with his task of delivering the milk to his customers without calling attention to his personal injury. It was not until later when the husband of the lady

in danger came and persuaded him to receive medical attention that his injury received attention.

Neuman was nominated by the local organization and submitted to Optimist International. A spokesman for Optimist International stated, "The actions of Mr. Neuman in going to the aid of this lady and attempting to assist in maintaining order within her business establishment indicated extraordinary unselfish concern, courage and dedication. As reported, nominee Neuman, even though fully realizing the existing dangers responded with courage and conviction. It is regrettable that he received injuries as a result of his fine actions, which were found to be directly related to the objectives of the Respect For Law Program."

The local club presented Neuman with a bronze, engraved medallion. The medallion contained the scales of justice with a Respect For Law title. It also contained the words "We should not be guilty of the good things we didn't do." Guests for the occasion were Neuman and his wife, Coryell County Sheriff Winfred Cummings, and three representatives from the Pure Milk Company with which Neuman is employed, Frank Cooper, Asst. Sales Manager, Shorty Waldrop, Wholesale Sales Manager, and Don Davis, Comptroller.

LEON RIVER BRIDGE WIDENING PROJECT FUNDED

The Leon River bridge west of the Gatesville business district will be widened as part included in a supplementary \$214 million consolidation program to update the state's highway system.

The Texas Highway Commission announced the approval of funds today. The bridge widening project has been on the drawing boards since last year and plans have already been submitted to the Texas Highway Department in Austin.

The .2 of a mile long river span was built in 1937, 24 feet wide to carry two lanes of traffic. The proposed widening will carry four lanes of traffic. The bridge width will be set at 68 feet.

Included in the additional program will be the construction of a four lane divided section of Highway 190 between Copperas Cove and the Bell County line a distance of four miles.

COUNTRY CLUB AWARDS

CONTRACT TOTALING \$64,355

Final agreement was reached Wednesday afternoon on the Gatesville Country Club renovation and remodeling program financed with Farmers Home Administration loan.

The Club Board of Directors headed by Joe Skelton voted unanimously to accept bids from local firms. The total construction cost of the project was set at \$64,355.97.

Gatesville Country Club Secretary, Curtis Logan reported Wednesday that final contract agreements are still to be

drawn up and signed. Final agreement on the landscaping and the parking lot has been completed with Cleo Woodard Construction bidding \$17,416.

The nine hole irrigation system contract was awarded to Whaley and Rutter Construction of Gatesville at the original bid of \$14,144.97.

Dixon Lumber Company will remodel the present clubhouse at a cost of \$31,595. Also Dixon Lumber Company will construct a cart shed west of the clubhouse at a cost of \$3200. The cart shed will be financed with \$1200 of the F.H.A. loan and \$2000 of local contributions.

The remaining \$20,644.03 of the \$85,000 F.H.A. loan has been used to clear up outstanding debts and other costs. The renovation and remodeling program will provide Gatesville and area citizens with one of the finest recreation facilities in Central Texas.

Mr. Logan reported Wednesday that estimates of a 20 percent increase could be expected in the first year following the construction project. He explained that presently the club directors had no plans to increase dues.

Rep. Salter To Sponsor Benefit Bill

A proposal that would provide state benefits for the families of volunteer firemen, members of police auxiliaries and Texas

Youth Council guards if they are killed in the line of duty has been introduced in the Texas Legislature.

State Representatives Dave Allred of Wichita Falls, Don Adams of Jasper and Bob Salter of Gatesville have introduced the proposals in the House of Representatives.

Under a recently approved constitutional amendment, paid firemen and policemen and Texas Prison System guards have been given certain death benefits. If a man is killed in the line of duty, his widow receives \$10,000 from the State of Texas and his children receive a pension to age 21. If there is only one minor child, the pension is \$100 per month. If there are two minor children, the figure rises to \$150 per month, and the amount is \$200 a month for three or more minor children.

The new proposal would provide this same coverage for members of volunteer fire departments, members of organized volunteer law enforce-

ment reserve units, and Texas Youth Council guards.

This new proposal will have no effect on the present provisions for paid policemen and firemen.

The proposal for a constitutional amendment is House Joint Resolution No. 4. Also, the representatives have introduced House Bill 96, known as "enabling legislation". That is, if the constitutional amendment is passed by the Legislature and approved by the voters, the enabling legislation will allow it to go into effect more quickly.

Hearings have not yet been scheduled on the proposals.

GHS 1968-69 Who's Who Announced

These were tabulated on a percentage basis as follows: 1. Student votes, 20%; 2. Grade averages, 20%; 3. School participation - each activity, 5%; 4. Teacher-pupil cooperation (Voted by Teachers), 15%; 5. General attitude about school work, citizenship and cooperation (Voted by teachers), 15%.

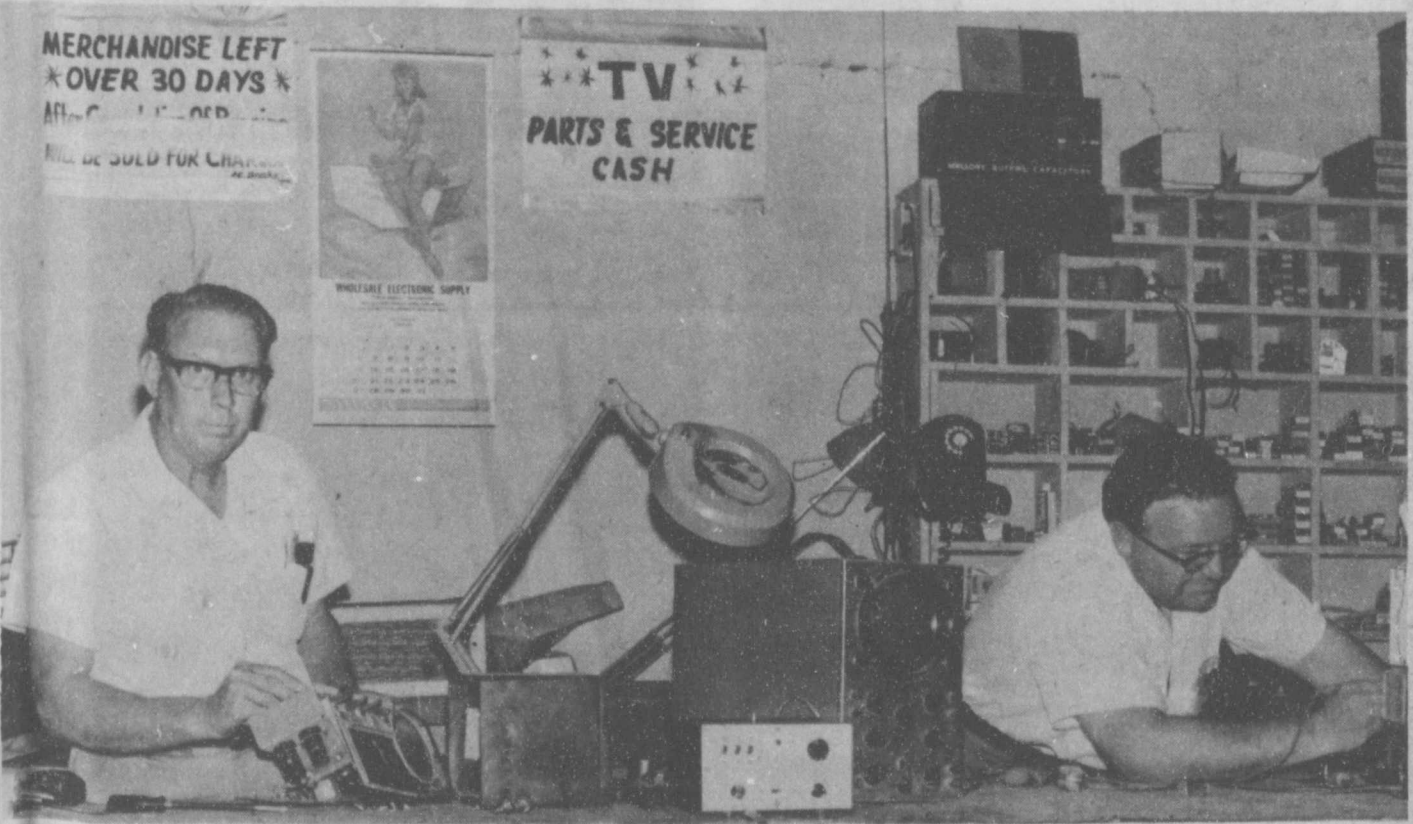

Over The GARDEN FENCE

As soon as I opened the door Mrs. Woolley said, "Come and look at my house plants, something terrible is happening to them, they look like they're moldy or something." Well, just one look at those little white cottony spots and I knew she had a bad case of aphids, and I told her she'd better do something about them before they got any worse. "But I don't know what to do," she wailed. "Luckily it's not too hard to get rid of them," I told her. "The best way is to take a bit of cotton on the end of a match or toothpick, dip it in plain rubbing alcohol and touch each little white spot." "That will be easy to do on those bigger plants but what about this poor little begonia, it's just about covered with them. Won't that much alcohol be bad for the plant?" "Yes it might be, but you can fill a bucket with just barely warm water and put that little plant, pot and all, in over its head and leave it for a little while. That should get rid of them too," I answered. "Just be sure to let it drain good when you take it out." "Where do you suppose these bugs came from, anyway?" wondered Mrs. Woolley. "They might have been on something you just bought or a few of them may have come in on some plants in the fall and just now found the right conditions to multiply faster. It's a good idea to spray all plants just coming into the house with some tepid water in which a little detergent, not enough to make suds though, has been dissolved. That will usually get rid of aphids, and mealy bugs or red spiders, too."
