ses until 2:30 in the afternoons and then go to their on-thejob training at various locations with local merchants. If a student so desires, he could continue his education at any of three colleges offering studies in marketing, Temple Junior College, McLennan Community College, or Central Texas College, and receive an Associate of Arts Degree, Sammy expressed his personal gratitude for the addition of the DE program, and explained that the youngsters who are involved in it are gaining valuable experience and training. Gor-don Smith is the teacher-coordinator of the Distributive Education classes.

Vocational Office Education (VOE) is the newest addition to the school family. Mrs. Gail Callahan is the teacher-coordinator for this course which is open only to senior students who are 16 years of age or older. Similar to the DE classes, one class is a laboratory class meeting for two periods each day, and the other class is involved in a cooperative program which places students in business offices in Gatesville. The classes study practices and gain skills that will be used in business offices, and try to use realistic office situations in filing, typing, applying for a job, and

lectric and manual typewriters, dictation transcription machines, duplicating machines, adding machines, and calculators. The VOE students in the cooperative class must take a regular course of study consisting of three other solid courses besides VOE, and they also receive two credits in this course, being involved in one class period per day plus working on-the-job for one period a day. A student is on the job outside of school for a minimum of 15 hours per week, and is paid for his work, The overall total of salaries of the VOE students employed in this program are: Eloise Washburn, Greenstein, Hawkins, and Logan; Delores Thorp, Powell Chevrolet; Pam Dixon, Dixon Lumber; Johnny Williams, County School Superintendent's office; Debbie Dyer, Gulf Serv-U Center; Suzanne Drake, Cummings Insurance Agency; Dolores Ortega, Medical Plastics
Lab; Jeannie Warden, Gatesville Public Library; Vicki Hollingsworth, City Office; Lynn Henson, Jones Clinic; Kay Spencer, A&P Food Store; Sharon Blanchard, City Drug; Sharon Brown, Coryell Memorial Hospital; and Martha Parrish, Gatesville Junior High School. 


