Ford's pick-up. Sheriff Windy Cummings re-ported Tuesday that law enforcement officers in the area were alerted and McGregor Police Department personnel intercepted the escapee four miles east of MCGregor.

The escapee was stopped only after a chase and threatening shots fired over the pick-up he was driving.

The youth escaped from a laundry detail Monday, reported Sheriff Cummings. Officials believe the escapee hid on cam-pus until early Tuesday, he en-tered the employee clothing is-sue room and mail room where a uniform was taken and mail a uniform was taken and mail was opened.



Senator Watson Proposes Tax Exemption

#### For Nonprofit **Rural Water Systems**

The hundreds of small rural water companies set up on a nonprofit base to provide water for rural homes all over Texas would be exempt from taxation under a pair of proposals by Senator Murray Watson, Jr. of Mart.

SJR 6 is a proposal to let the voters of Texas decide whether they want to amend the constitution to give the nonprofit water supply companies an exemption from taxes on their lines and water systems. SB54 would carry the consti-tutional provision into effect if it is voted

Under a program of the Far-mers Home Administration, hundreds of loans have been made for construction of water systems in rural areas. The loans are being repaid out of water sales.

Organizers used the voluntary water company system rather than creating water districts which would have been exempt from property taxes becasue they are governmental agencies. They found that orzanizing costs were simpler, and it was not necessary to Button Down

Lt. Governor Ben Barnes referred the proposed constitutional amendment to the Senate Constitutional Amendments Committee, and the enabling bill to the State Affairs Committee.

**DEFENSE CONTRACT PROFITS DROP** 

Many people find it easy to believe that with so much money being spent on "war contracts" profits are bound to be well in excess of those normally earned on private contracts.


How profitable is the multi-billion-dollar defense industry-really? How about those charges in Washington of excessive profits by government contractors who supply the tools of war?

The government asked the same questions and hired the private Logistics Management Institute to find the answers. After an 18-month study, the Institute reported that the profit level of big defense contractors-far from being shockingly high-is approximately half that for their commercial sales. Also, they are only half the percentage made by some 3,500 other companies used for comparison purposes. Moreover, profits on defense contracts have been going down for the last nine years, while there has been an uptrend in commercial profits.

The exact figures were that profits on defense sales since 1958 dropped from 2.7 per cent to 2.4 per cent after taxes, while the profits of wholly commercial companies were moving up from 3.6 per cent to 5.5 per cent.

How can this be? The report found a host of highly technical reasons, but some of the key factors included exceedingly tough competition, high risk, and rigid regulation under which the government won't pay many routine costs.

Again, we learn to look at the facts before we accept all the old myths about those "excessive war profits."



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
