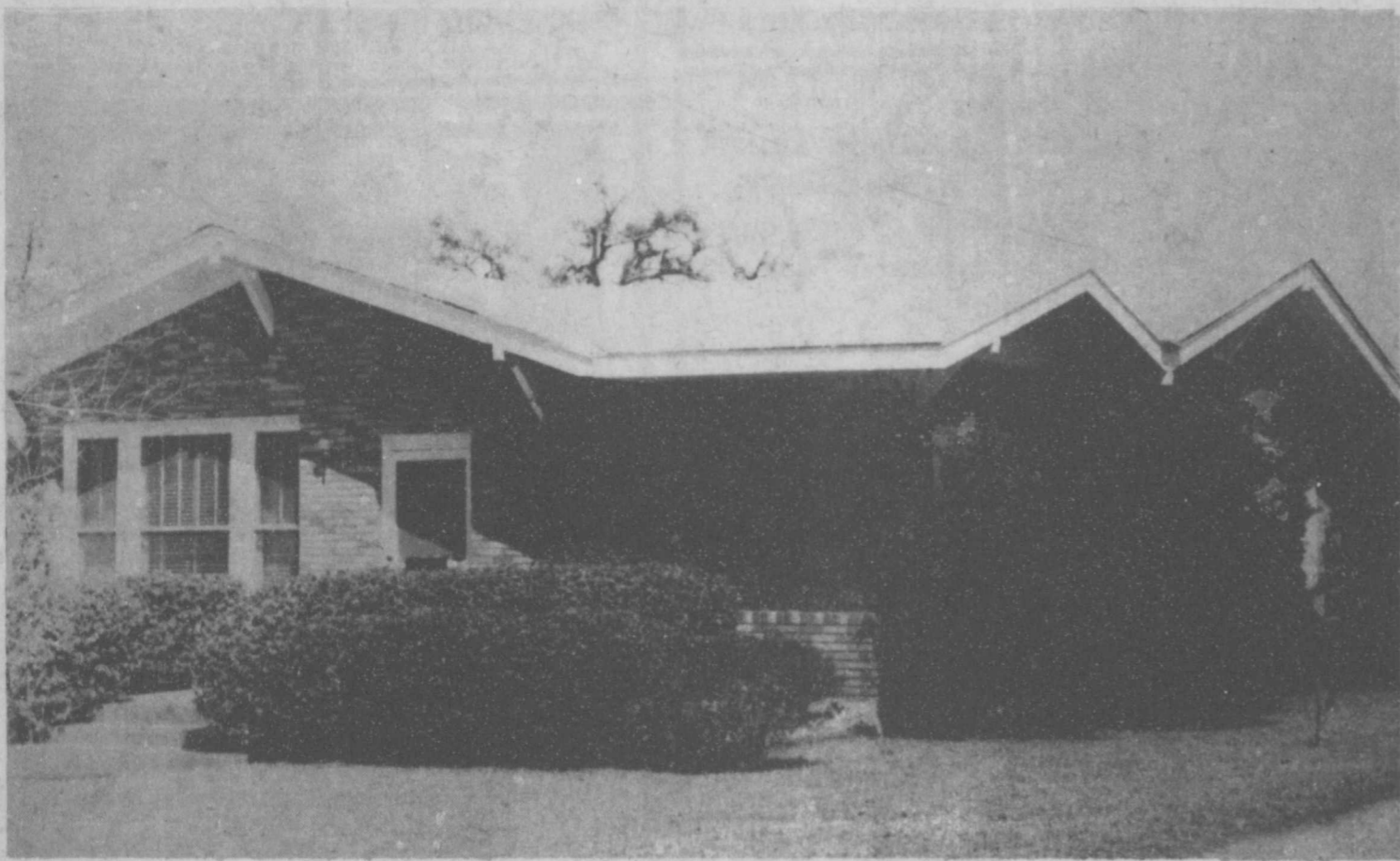

The Berry Beautiful



When strawberries are on the menu, dessert time is special. When you want it at its most elegant, as for a dinner party, make a bombe like this Strawberry Symphony. The ingredients are few - basically just fresh berries, ice cream, and Dream Whip Whipped Topping Mix, to give a light but velvety texture. Frozen strawberries can be used when the fresh berries are only memories.

Strawberry Symphony

- 1 envelope whipped topping mix
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon almond extract
- 1 pint vanilla ice cream, softened
- 1 pint fresh strawberries, mashed and sweetened

*Or use 1 package (16 oz.) frozen strawberry halves, thawed as directed on package, and omit the sugar.

Prepare whipped topping mix as directed on package, adding sugar before whipping. Stir in almond extract and ice cream; then stir in strawberries. Pour into a 1-1/2-quart mold. Freeze until firm - at least 8 hours or overnight. Unmold and garnish with whole strawberries and additional whipped topping, if desired. Makes about 5 cups or 10 servings.

Their name "Soul Society" really fits, and, as Willie said after he finished a song, "Soul has no racial boundaries, anyone can have soul." He was right.

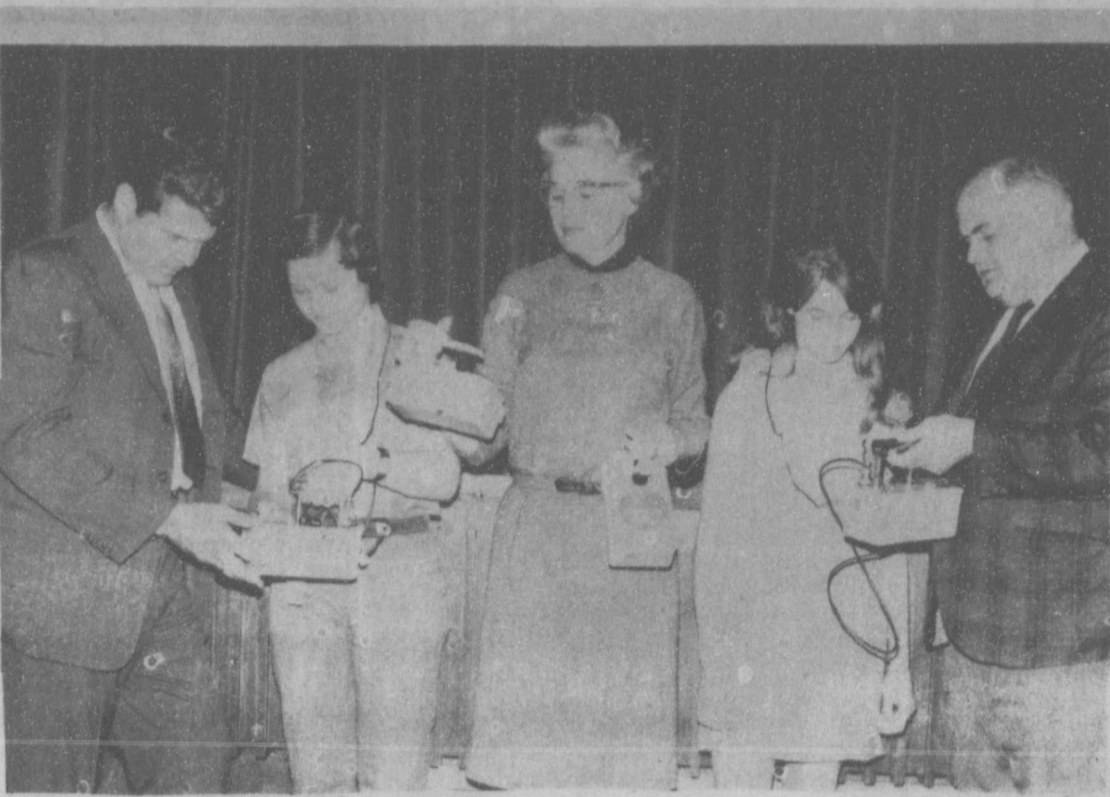
Two GHS Girls Attend State OEA Conference

In Time of Emergency Improvised Fallout Protection Could Prove Important Life Saver in Nuclear Attack

If a nuclear attack on the United States appeared imminent, people who had no public fallout shelter available and had not made advance fallout preparations in their homes could still improvise fallout protection.

An improvised shelter probably would not give as much protection as a permanent public or home shelter, but any protection is better than none, and might prove to be a life saver.

The best place to improvise a shelter would be a home basement or storm cellar, if one existed.

To improvise a shelter, radiation shielding materials would be needed such as concrete blocks, bricks, sand, etc. Other things that could also be used as shielding material, or to support shielding material, include:

- House doors that have been taken off their hinges (especially heavy outside doors).
- Dressers and chests. (Fill the drawers with sand or earth after they are placed in position, so they won't be too heavy to carry.)
- Trunks, boxes and cartons. (Fill them with sand or earth after they are placed in position.)
- Tables and bookcases.
- Large appliances, such as washers and dryers.
- Books, magazines, and stacks of firewood or lumber.
- Flagstones from outside walks and patios.

Improvising a Basement Shelter

Here are two ways of improvising fallout protection in the basement of a home:

USING A TABLE OR WORKBENCH. Set up a large, sturdy table or workbench in the basement corner that is most below ground level. On the table, pile as much shielding material as it will hold without collapsing. Around the table, place as much shielding material as possible, up as high as the table top. When family members are "inside the shelter"—that is, under the table—block the opening with other shielding material.

USING FURNITURE AND HOUSE DOORS. If there is no large table or workbench available, or if more shelter space is needed, place furniture or

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enough to accommodate all family members. The other side of the L can be shorter, since its purpose is to serve as an entrance way and to reduce the amount of radiation getting into the shelter area.

Cover the entire trench with lumber (or with house doors that have been taken off their hinges), except for about 2 feet on the short side of the L, to provide access and ventilation. On top of the lumber or doors, pile earth 1 to 2 feet high, or cover them with other shielding material.

If necessary, support or "shore up" the walls of the trench, as well as the lumber or doors, so they will not collapse.

Boats as Improvised Shelters

A boat with an enclosed cabin could be used as a fallout shelter.

In addition to emergency supplies such as food, drinking water and a battery-powered radio, items needed aboard include a broom, bucket, or pump-and-hose to sweep off or flush off fallout particles that might collect on the boat.

The boat should be anchored or cruised slowly at least 200 feet off-shore, where the water is at least 5 feet deep. This distance from shore would protect occupants from radioactive fallout particles that had fallen on the nearby land. A 5-foot depth would absorb the radiation from particles falling into the water and settling on the bottom.

If particles drift down on the boat, stay inside the cabin most of the time. Go outside now and then, and sweep or flush off any particles that have collected on the boat.

LEAN-TO SHELTER

Dig a shallow ditch, 6 inches deep and 6 inches wide, parallel to and 4 feet from the outside wall of the house.

Remove the heaviest doors from the house. Place the bottoms of the doors in the ditch (so they won't slip), and lean the doors against the wall of the house.

On the doors, pile 12 to 18 inches of earth or sand. Stack or pile other shielding material at the sides of the doors, and also on the other side of the house wall (to protect the shelter occupants against radiation coming from that direction).

If possible, make the shelter area deeper by digging out more earth inside it. Also dig some other shallow ditches, to allow rain water to drain away.

Improvising Shelter on the Ground Floor

If a home has no basement or storm cellar (and no crawl space that is surrounded by foundation walls up to the first floor), limited fallout protection may be improvised in a shelter on the first or ground floor by following the same technique described under the category of "Using Furniture and House Doors." The best place to set up this shelter is a hall, room or large clothes closet on the ground floor of a

TEXAS FARM BUREAU

The president of the Texas Farm Bureau has issued a statement clarifying Farm Bureau's stand on proposed national legislation pertaining to income taxes.

Sidney Dean of Victoria said Farm Bureau does not support the bill introduced by Senator Lee Metcalf (D.) of Montana which would disallow the offsetting of any farm losses against non-farm income of persons earning more than \$30,000 off the farm.

Instead, he declared, the Farm Bureau supports its own approach to the matter. Two bills incorporating Farm Bureau's stand have been introduced in the U. S. House of Representatives by Rep. William Scherle (R.) of Iowa and Rep. Guy Vander Jagt (R.) of Michigan.

The Scherle and Vander Jagt bills are similar in many respects to the Metcalf bill, the Texas farm leader explained. Both would eliminate a tax loophole, he said.

"However, the Scherle-Vander Jagt bills would treat all

taxpayers alike, by limiting the amount of farm losses which could be used as an offset to non-farm income to \$15,000 per individual return per year, regardless of the total earnings of the taxpayer," Dean said.

American Farm Bureau Federation policy on the issue, adopted at its annual convention last December, states:

"We favor enactment of legislation to place a limit on the amount of farming losses which can be used to offset non-farm income for federal income tax purposes, except in the case of taxpayers who file farm returns on an accrual basis."

phoned. Officers began a search of the immediate area and an "all points bulletin" was placed with Central Texas law officers.

The chase began as Temple Chief of Police, A. C. Berry and Capt. Joe Keifer recognized the white Ford pull out behind them south of the Grove.

The two officers wheeled around and chased the speeding white Ford to The Grove and turned south toward County Line School. Dirt roads at 90 mph took the two cars back toward Gatesville and Fort Hood.

The white car spun out on the east range road in Fort Hood and reversed its direction. Officers Berry and Keifer attempted to stop the car as it passed by them. Berry shot four times at the speeding vehicle.

The chase continued back down the same road (County Line Road) and turned on to another county road, leading into Bell County.

Following mostly by tracks the two officers later spotted the white car pulled off the road.

Officers from Gatesville, Belton, and Coryell County arrived on the scene in a short time. Sheriff's Deputy Lonnie Dossey tracked the fugitive about 100 yards from the car and found him hiding in a brush pile, unarmed.

The all points bulletin was canceled at 1:08 a.m., Tuesday less than two hours after the robbery.

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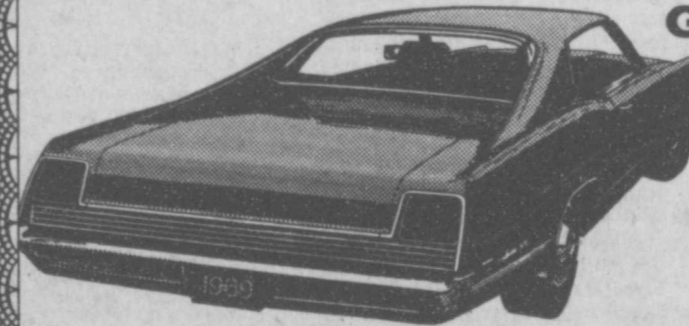
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
