If a nuclear attack on the United States appeared imminent, people who no public fallout shelter available and had not made advance fallout prep-ions in their homes could still improvise fallout protection. had no public fallout shelter available and had not made advance fallout preparations in their homes could still improvise fallout protection.

An improvised shelter probably would not give as much protection as a permanent public or home shelter, but any protection is better than none, and might prove to be a life saver.

The best place to improvise a shelter would be a home basement or storm

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
