Coryell County Cancer Crusade Set For Tuesday

Cancer research is the key which will unlock the door leading to the eventual conquest of cancer, Chaplain Walter Allan, President of the Coryell Coun-ty Cancer Society, said. From the 1968 Annual Report of the Society said 41¢ of each dollar given to the American Cancer Society last year by Texans is invested in Texas research institutions. The ACS actually spends more on cancer programs in Texas than it raises here. This is because the National Society has increased cancer research allocations in Texas

hospitals and medical schools. Approximately 58¢ goes to other programs, with only 14 ¢ budgeted for administrative and

fund raising costs. Last year the American Cancer Society assigned over \$22 million to all areas of research, an all time high. Funds for these vital research projects are raised by the Society's annual Crusade against Cancer held each April, and from bequests and legacies.

The area covered by cancer research is necessarily very broad, and comprises the financing of investigation into how cancer starts, how it can be treated and halted, and also re-

Gatesville PTA Hears Student

The Gatesville, PTA met Monday night, April 14th, in the Junior High School auditorium. The program for the evening was a discussion by members of the Student Council on "Living erty. with Discipline" (Tensions in Families). These young people stressed the importance of youngsters' being loved by their parents, that it was not always important to have "lots of things, such as fine cars, houses and etc." They pointed out that they needed to be loved for themselves and accepted on their own merits and not compared to brothers and sisters. It was brought out that there is a definite need for family rules and that when these rules are followed that discipline should be meted out fairly, justly, and immediately. These students also felt that parents should not be buddies to their children-----friends, yes; but buddies, no! They should 'Be a parent!' They also called for parents to do as they teach their youngsters to do and not be hypocritical. The example they used was parents who say drinking and smoking are harmful to your body but go right ahead and drink and smoke. They suggested, too, that teenagers need discipline --- that proper discipline as a small child evolves into proper selfdiscipline as teenagers and adults. Proper discipline brings about maturity and a sense of

responsibility. It was pointed out that parents should help their children become self-reliant, from teaching them how to tie their shoes as small children to making important decisions as older ones. Once they
