CURTIS DAVIS RECEIVES PROFICIENCY

CITATION An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Curtis A. Davis, manager of the Creek Cliff Estates, Inc., Gatesville. The citation reflects the regard in which Davis is held by state water officials. Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities Airman Brown is being assigned to Nellis AFB, Nev., for duty with a unit of the Tactithose utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and

Moving on a few years, in August of '52 he assumed command of the 187th Airborne Regimental Combat team in Korea.

Hearings On Rural

Water-Sewage Problems Slated

Chairman W. R. (Bob) Poage, D-Tex., of the House Commit-tee on Agriculture, announced today that hearings will be held Tuesday (10 a.m., EDT) June 17, on a bill (H.R. 5850) designed to help more rural communities finance water and sewage disposal projects.

The bill, amending the Consolidated Farmers Home Administration Act of 1961, would permit the Secretary of Agriculture to adopt a flexible interest rate in making such loans under existing loan and grant authority.

It is intended that the flexible rate will enable the Secretary to make more loans in lieu of grants, setting interest rates on the basis of the ability of the borrowers to pay, and thus extend financial aid to more communities with the amount of funds available for such improvements.

Poagesaid the hearing would be before the Conservation and Credit Subcommittee, which he heads, and that consideration also will be given to other suggestions offered by the Department of Agriculture and other to amend the Consolidated Farmers Home Administration Act of 1961 to improve its operations.

Dysinger Proficient In Identifying

Soviet Bombers

Iceland -- Chief Master Sergeant George E. Dysinger, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Dysinger, Gatesville, Texas, is a member of the Aerospace Defense Command (ADC) unit at Keflavik Airport, Iceland, that has received national recognition for proficiency in identifying Soviet bombers operating over the North Atlantic.

Sergeant Dysinger is an aircraft maintenance superintendent with the 57th Fighter Interceptor Squadron. The unit has received the Air Force Association (AFA) Citation of Honor for outstanding contribution to the nation in maintaining around-the-clock surveillance of potentially hostile aircraft flying in the area. The AFA, private organization of 100, 000 civilian and military members, honored the squadron at its recent national convention in Houston.

Ground crews provide essentail support for aircrews who fly F-102 Delta Daggers in some of the most adverse flying weather in the world while patrolling the northern approaches to North America.

Last year, fighter-inter-ceptor pilots in the 57th reported that Soviet flights in the area more than doubled those of 1967. Recently, the Soviets have conducted regular reconnaissance flights over NATO naval fleets in the vic-

Constantly testing our air defense responses over the North Atlantic, the flights of Soviet 'Bear'' bombers are intercepted at high altitudes. The Bear, capable of reaching any target in the United States without refueling, can carry air-tosurface missiles or a 25,000 pound bomb load,

The ADC squadron aircrews and support personnel, serving with the Icelandic Defense Forces, were cited for sustained superior operational efficiency in intercepting and identifying aircraft.


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

NOT TOO LATE - If you're a new home owner and plan to put the finishing touches to the yard next fall, because of hot weather being right around the corner, fear not, because it is not too late to beautify your grounds.

Choose healthy container grown shrubs, burlapped and balled. A little more water may be required at this stage of the season, but will be well worth it and you will be months ahead. Much of the time a screen of sorts is needed around a home to provide privacy or to hide an unwanted view, such as gar-

A board fence, brick, or something similar is often used for a screen, but for a change try a living screen of shrubs, unfortunately, this is slower, but often creats a , pleasing enclosure, depending on your likes and dislikes. In a large yard a combination of fence and shrubbery may be your choice. If a living fence is used and is large, use tree groupings in corners, especially flowering trees for a striking effect.



As a companion measure to my Endangered Species Bill, I have introduced in the Senate a resolution asking that the United States take the initiative in calling an international wildlife conference to bring nations together to cooperate in efforts to protect endangered species of wildlife. The Intern Union for Conservation of Nature and Natural Resources, in notifying me of their support of my bill, informed me that at least 66 nations are contemplating similar protective legislation and are only waiting for the United States to take the lead. This conference could be the first step in working towards international laws to prevent the importation of endangered species taken contrary to the law of the country where

captured, It is high time for the United State to promote the ideals in which we as individuals believe, In the past we have represented the cause of conservation to the world and have encouraged the protection of wildlife by their mother countries, but at the same time we have continued to buy most of the world's commerce in illegally taken animals, birds, furs, feathers and hides which is the basic cause of danger of extinction of these species. It is time we called a halt to needless killing of wildlife which may soon vanish from the earth.
