

## CITY TO BEGIN SANITARY FILL JULY 1ST.

Cities with population over 5000 will be required to stop burning refuse as of July 1, 1969. Regulation II of the Texas Air Control Board regulations sets up by the Texas Department of Health.

To meet the air pollution regulation the City of Gatesville will begin a sanitary fill operation in the next week before the July 1, deadline.

new practice reads as follows: SECTION IX. C. OF REGULATION II

Outdoor burning of the waste material of a city or town having a population of five thousand (5,000) or more, or an outdoor burning activity falling within the classification of Paragraph IV, K, which cannot comply with the conditions prescribed therein, may be continued either until there is a satisfactory and lawful method of disposing of the waste material in compliance with this Regulation or until July 1, 1969, whichever first occurs.

City Manager, Eiland Lovejoy, reported Thursday that "we hired Tommy Rawls to operate equipment needed in filling the operation. Lovejoy noted that Bill Walters would remain in charge of sanitary fill."

Mayor, Bob Miller, explained Thursday that there are several methods of fill operation depending to some extent on the terrain of the fill area. "The Gatesville operation," Miller explained, "will be a ramp type fill." Ramp type fills are set on sloping terrain and refuse is piled along the slope and covered after refuse is after refuse is compacted, it compacted.

The city recently purchased 4 acres of land northeast of

the present dump site for sanitary fill use. Plans will call for reworking the present dumping site for additional fill area.

Miller noted that the regulation called for "wet garbage" to be covered. He noted that all collections by regular garbage pickup will be covered while trash pickup is presently scheduled to be left uncovered.

Cost for a years operation has not been estimated but recent collection fee increases are expected to cover the operation cost.

## Murder With A Motor Vehicle Charges Filed

Charges of murder with a motor vehicle were filed Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 p.m. against Mrs. Frank Cowan, 27, of Evant.

Police Chief, Gene Goins, filed the complaint in Justice of the Peace, Stony Hammock's court after an investigation of a June 2 traffic accident on the Leon River Bridge on Highway 84 west of Gatesville.

The accident claimed the life of Kenneth Cowan, 8, who along with the four other Cowan children were riding in the vehicle. Presently two of the Cowan children are still hospitalized as a result of the accident. Glen Cowan, 20 month old son of Mr. and Mrs. Cowan is still in the intensive care unit of Hillcrest Hospital in Waco suffering from head injuries. Janice 6, has been transferred to Coryell Memorial Hospital this week after being in the Hillcrest intensive care unit for ten days.

The other Cowan children and Mrs. Cowan were hospitalized by the accident but have been released from the local hospital.

Police Chief, Gene Goins, reported this week that blood samples taken from the Cowan woman during the accident investigation were sent to Austin for analysis.

Goins said Wednesday that he received the results of the blood test Monday, June 16. Following the June 2 accident extensive questioning of persons coming in contact with Mrs. Cowan during the day of the

accident was conducted. Mrs. Cowan was arrested in Evant at about 4:00 p.m. Tuesday. She was released Tuesday night on \$3000 bond.

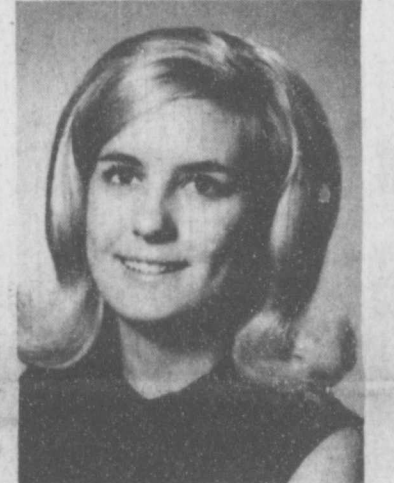
An aid fund started soon after the Cowan accident for the Cowan children has received \$392.47 in donation from area citizens.

The degree recipients com-

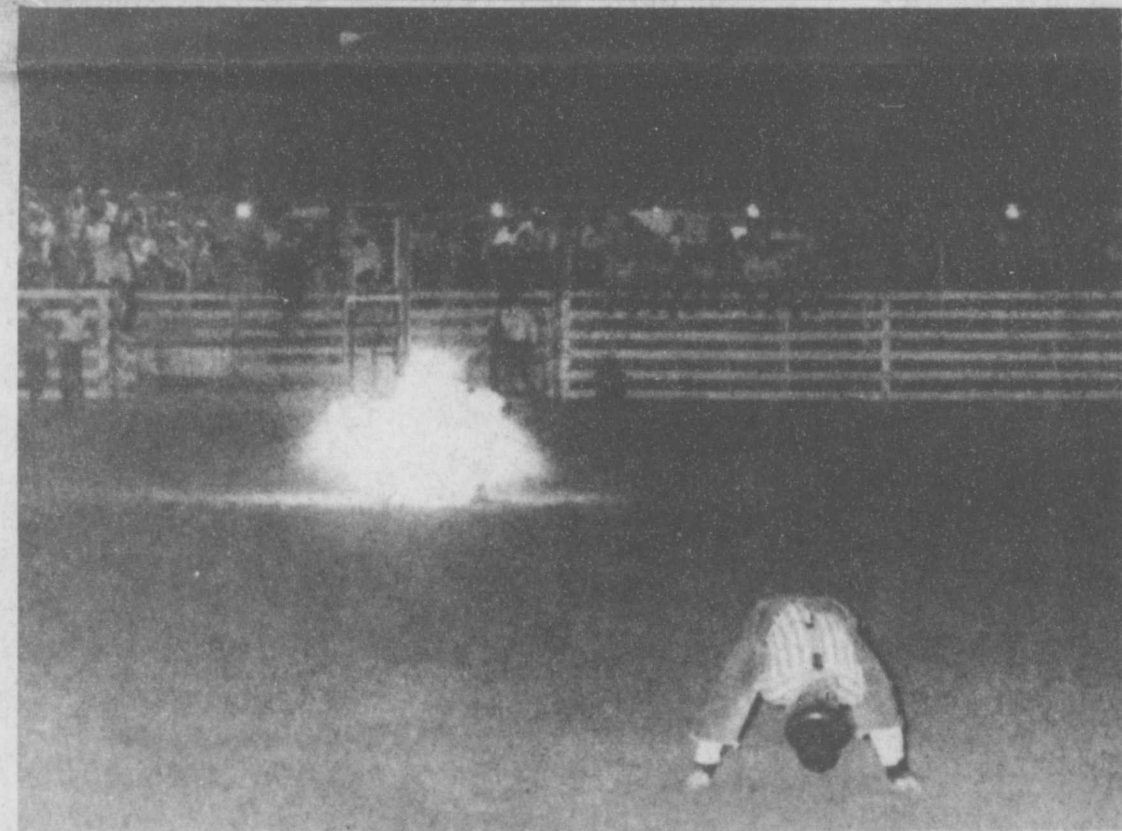


prised the largest spring graduating class in the university's 79-year history.

### Computers To Help Communities Attract New Industry

The Texas Industrial Commission is offering every community across the state the modern technology of computers in seeking new industry.

"This new program will give Texas communities a rifle rather than shotgun approach in attracting industry," Chester Wine of Corpus Christi, chairman of the Industrial Commission, said in announcing the recently approved plan using existing computers owned by the state.

The Industrial Commission offered use of the four phase program to Chambers of Commerce across the state recently in asking Chamber managers to assist as Computer Program Evaluators.

"By serving as evaluators, local leaders will have the opportunity to get a comprehensive look at the program being developed before its introduction later this year," Wine said.

Four basic programs are to be offered in the industry-attracting plan. It will give communities an instant site location service for national companies seeking to locate branch plants in Texas; printouts for existing Texas companies of the export potential for their products; matching of location resources with location requirements for each of the more than

Less than 1/2 inch of rain has fallen in the Gatesville area in June and temperatures are reaching toward 100 degrees. The Gatesville Country Club has seemingly found the answer in a new irrigation system which began pumping water into the course Wednesday.

Club President, Joe Shelton, watches as a single sprinkler head sprays water 90 feet in one direction. The 40 horse-

power electric motor at the heart of the system will operate nine sprinklers like the one pictured and pump 450 gallons per minute.

Present plans are to water only the greens until a larger supply of water can be assured. The pump lowered the level of the present water source over 18" in about two hours.

Brush and weed control from post-establishment weed control to herbicide residue problems will be discussed by Texas A&M research and extension personnel, Novosad said.

A field trip to the A&M Plantation to observe new grasses will conclude the afternoon session.

On the June 27 morning session, forage and pasture programs for beef cattle producers, including trends and developments in cow-calf and stocker operations will be discussed. Range cow-calf and stocker programs and forage programs for dairy men will conclude the morning discussions.

The entire afternoon session will be devoted to discussions and research results covering such new grasses as Coast-cross-1, Kleingrass, Wintergreen Hardinggrass, Buffleg and other new species which are showing promise, Novosad said.

He noted that quality pastures are basic for improving cattle profits and a logical starting point for an improvement program. He said that past experiences of cattlemen attending the short course indicate that many have been able to use the information gained to spot the weak spots in their

forage production programs. This year's discussions should supply the same type of information.

Novosad said the short course is sponsored by A&M's Soil and Crop Sciences Department and that local county agents can supply detailed information on speakers and subjects. Attendance is open, he added, to any person interested in improving forage production on his farm or ranch.

## Central Texas T.B. Association Holds Quarterly Meeting

Involvement of board members with the program of the tuberculosis association can lead to better public understanding and aid eradication of the disease. This was the consensus of a panel discussion Saturday at a quarterly meeting of the Central Texas Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association's board.

Dr. Robert B. Morrison of Austin presided at the board meeting of the 25-county association held in Belton. The panel discussion took place following a luncheon and business meeting.

Mrs. Joel Rudd and John Kemp of Austin, Mrs. Roy Bland of Taylor and Howel W. Woodfin of Waco made up the panel. Their objective was to suggest ways to make board meetings more productive and meaningful to members.

The group is now in its second year of area supervision over TB and respiratory diseases. Previously, county organizations worked independently under state supervision. The group now works on an area basis with professional supervision, maintains its headquarters in Belton, and provides funds for research, education, nurses' workshops, and the child-centered program. The work is supported by the annual Christmas Seal campaign.

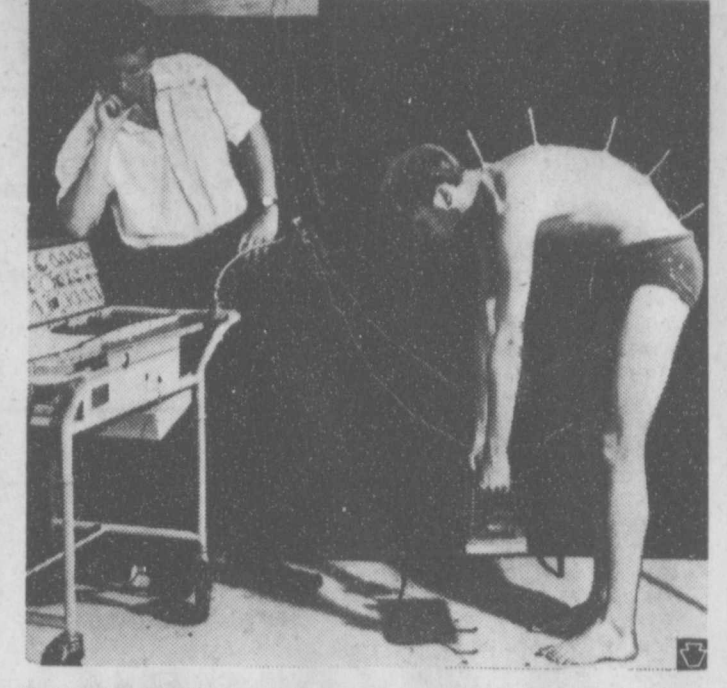

The ache could mean nothing more than a simple pain that adults suffer from every so often. Or, it could be more serious — a spinal injury, caused by lifting loads in the way this photo shows.

The young man, looking much like a human pin cushion, is being monitored in British tests for spinal curvature and contraction, while displaying just the lifting style that frequently does damage to the spine.

Because his knees are straight, when they should be bent, and because his back is bent, when it should be erect, it is the spine that bears the full burden of the load carried — rather than the more muscular thighs and legs.

1969 World Health theme points up occupational health.

Americas, its regional office the Pan American Sanitary Bureau, highlights a health topic through a theme.

1969's theme of "Health, Labor, and Productivity" is significant to all countries, developed and developing alike. For the theme makes the point that the world can, and indeed, must, prevent the illnesses caused by accident, dust, heat, noise, or for that matter, by any job-induced injury or disease.

It must do so for the obviously humanitarian reasons, but also because

health is a prerequisite to economic development.

1969 also marks the 21st anniversary of the coming into force, on April 7, 1948, of WHO's constitution — a milestone in world public health history scheduled to be commemorated this year, not at WHO headquarters in Geneva, Switzerland, but in Boston, Mass.

From July 7 through 25, on invitation of the United States, one of its 131 member nations, WHO is holding its annual World Health Assembly there.

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## DON'T FENCE ME IN!

American industry is concerned about mandatory controls on investment abroad. The controls are part of a package which was designed to reduce the overseas overflow of U.S. capital during the international monetary crisis associated with the devaluation of the British pound and the run on gold.

Rep. Tunney (D-Calif.) has pointed out sound reasons for the elimination of these controls:

"Foreign investment has consistently been a 'plus' in our balance-of-payments picture, returning more capital than it has drained off. Between 1950 and 1966, U.S. private foreign investment totaled \$39 billion. These investments returned \$58 billion to the United States during the same period.

"The controls run counter to the historic interest of the United States in progressively reducing the barriers to worldwide commerce, trade and investment.

"The controls were imposed without any direct authorization, or supervision, by Congress."

Such controls are contrary to the principles of our free economy and are a step backward from the movement toward greater freedom in international transactions. They are damaging to our economy in both the short and long run. They are useless as a remedy for the balance-of-payments difficulties of the U.S. and if long continued will cause them to become much worse. A schedule of dates should be promptly announced for the termination of these controls.

400 specific types of industry; and studies for communities to compare their facilities with other cities of similar size.

The site location service will provide manufacturers with the opportunity to specify up to 700 requirements for characteristics the company considers suitable for location of a new plant. Given these requirements, the computer would scan the bank of information on every town in Texas, pulling out the specifications requested.

Texas manufacturers can check their export potential through a printout of overseas countries in which their particular marmet with names and addresses of contacts in the markets.

Communities can take advantage of the candidate industry phase of the program, checking to determine which types of industry they would most likely attract, and names and addresses of national concerns in these areas.

Communities will also be able to request a printout comparing local facilities such as hospitals, recreational areas, community services, etc., with cities of similar size. This phase of the program will allow communities to establish specific goals for improving their attractiveness to industry in the next decade.

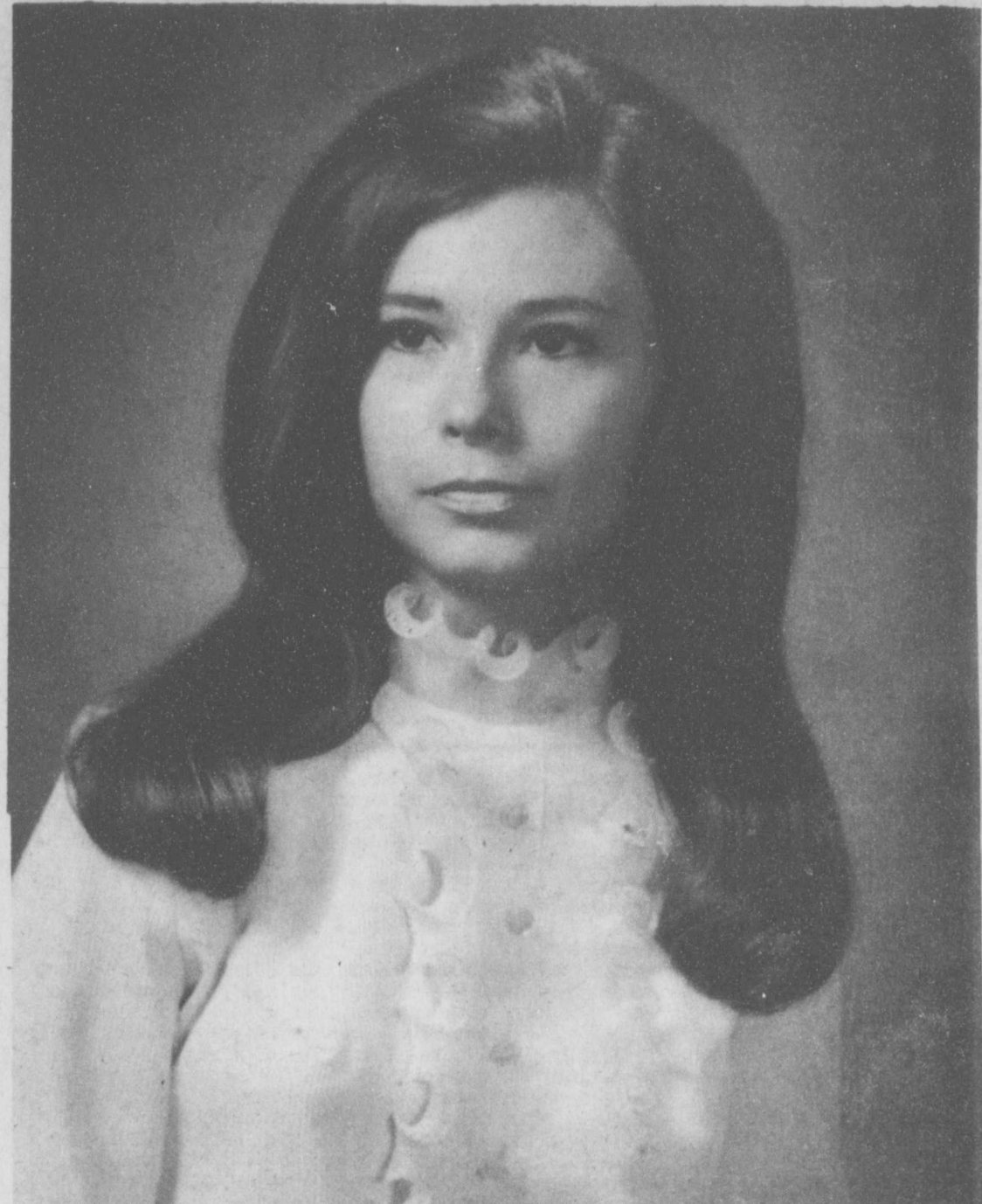

WEDDINGS AND FESTIVITIES - accompanying them are an important part of social life in most communities. Needless to say June is the month for weddings and it makes for a much happier occasion if you're at ease, as does anything else. Here are suggestions that may help you to meet your responsibilities as a guest graciously.

OBLIGATIONS - Often you wonder what, as a guest, your obligation is when invited to a bridal shower. Usually only close friends and relatives are invited. If you must decline an invitation be sure it is done with grace, and a "thank you" is in order.

With the many showers and teas a bride-to-be receives today you are likely to get an invitation to more than one; but it's proper and correct to attend and give at one shower while you forego others with a suitable excuse. If by chance you are unable to attend, send a gift in advance to the home of the hostess.

If you are a hostess, state the kind of shower - kitchen, linen or what ever.

SHOWER GIFTS - do not take the place of a wedding present, so should not be expensive, but should be chosen with an eye to quality and workmanship. Remember, a gift with a personal touch is always appreciated. Do avoid useless gadgets. If an item in color is chosen be thoughtful enough to pick something that will harmonize with her color scheme. White is always appropriate. Any items monogrammed should carry three initials.

WEDDING GIFTS - It is customary to give a wedding gift if you accept an invitation to the reception or if you were given a gift by the bride or groom. However, in many areas where living is informal, the shower gift and wedding gift are combined and are one.

It is traditional to give the couple something for the home such as her preference of silver, china or crystal. It is also tradition to send the present addressed to the bride only, to her home the day before the wedding.

CONCERNING THE WEDDING INVITATION - A wedding invitation requires no acknowledgment unless it includes the reception, which should be acknowledged promptly.

The wife acknowledges all invitations; in the third person if the invitation is in the formal third person, or with an informal note if the invitation is informal.

Never ask permission to bring a child or other relative if they have not already been invited.

WHAT TO WEAR - A woman should avoid wearing all white or black, but should choose bright or pastel ensembles with gloves and a hat or veil. In most communities men will be suitably dressed for an informal wedding if they wear a dark suit, white shirt, dark tie and black shoes and socks.

SEATING ARRANGEMENTS - We all know that at a church wedding the guests should be seated before the brides mother is escorted to her pew, so it's up to you as a welcome guest to arrive well in advance.

A woman is led down the aisle by the usher and her husband follows. It is not proper to ask to be seated in a place other than the ushers designation.

If attending a small church wedding without ushers, sit near the front.

At small home weddings the guests usually stand in the foreground.

WEDDING BEHAVIOR - If guests are still assembling when you arrive feel free to talk, but quietly and only to those seated nearest you.

Though different church groups will widely differ in wedding customs, keep in mind that reverence and dignity are always necessary.

Guests remain in their pews till the bridal party and close relatives have left the church.

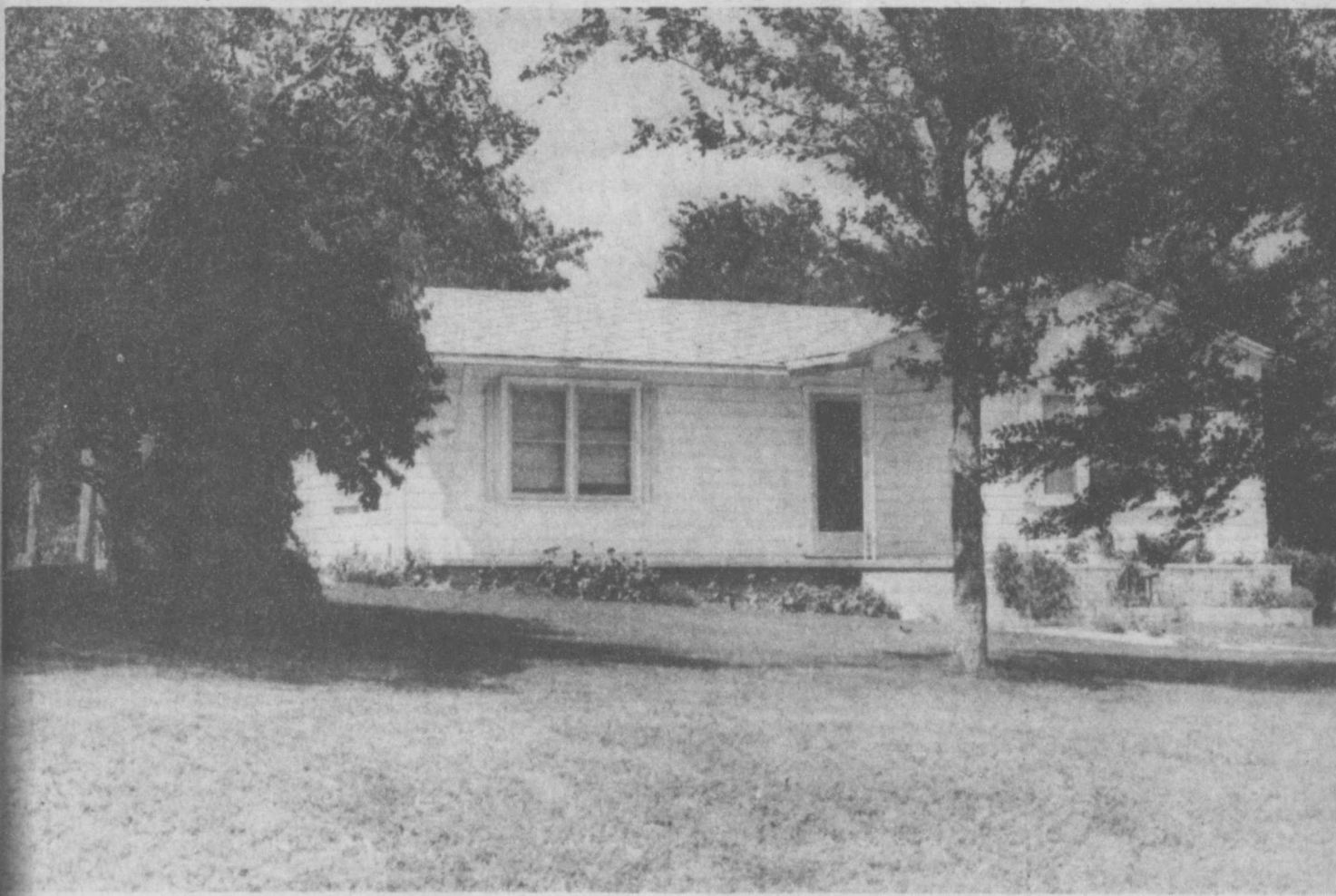
RECEPTION BEHAVIOR - The bridal couple receives guests at the reception, so before leaving the church be considerate enough to give the reception line ample time to form. Don't hold up the reception line, and in order not to, engage in no more than the briefest exchanges. The groom is always congratulated and the bride wished much happiness.

At such an occasion, conversation shouldn't be a problem with beautiful decorations, brides maids' dresses, reception music, ect.

Even if you do not choose to drink the beverage served you should at least raise the glass to your lips when the bridal couple is toasted, and the wedding cake should be accepted even if only a small portion is eaten.

TAKING LEAVE - Only after the bridal pair has left should you take leave. It's thoughtful to tell the brides and grooms parents good-bye on leaving. And did you know it's correct and a very nice gesture to send flowers and a card to the brides mother the next day expressing your pleasure at being included in the happy occasion.

AFTERWARDS - can be a host of delightful memories if you were a poised guest; keep these rules in mind and you will have nothing to fear.

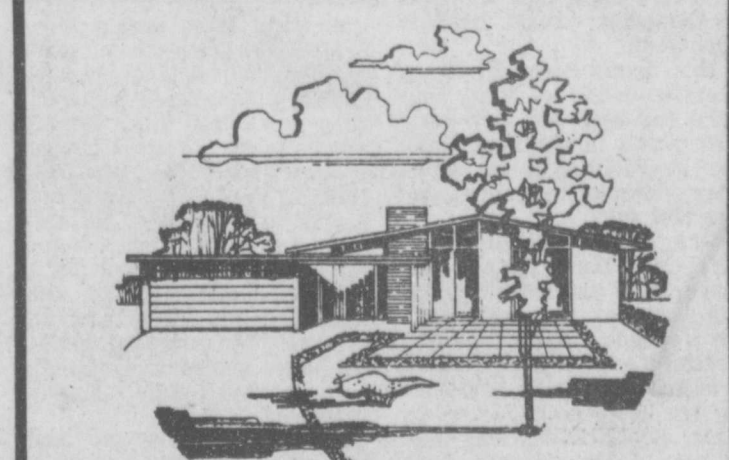

### Food For Thought Mrs. B. A. Snoddy

"Then said David to the Philistine, Thou comest to me with a sword, and with a spear and with a shield; but I come to thee in the name of the Lord of hosts, the God of the Armies of Israel, whom thou hast defied" I Sam. 17:45.

We want to consider, in this weeks writing, the power of faith in the Lord.

Bible students know that the above scripture has to do with the time when the armies of the Philistines came against the children of Israel, in the time of the reign of King Saul, the first King over Israel. The Philistines were always enemies of Israel. At this time the Philistines were on a mountain, on one side, and the armies of Israel were on a mountain, across a valley from them (I Sam. 17:3). Among the Philistines there was a giant of a man, about 9 1/2 feet tall, who came out every morning and evening, across the valley from the Israelites, and boasted of his power and strength, and dared them, so to speak, for anyone to come out against him. He came out dressed in a heavy armour of brass, with a brass helmet on his head, and with a heavy spear in his hand, and a man bearing a shield went before him. He seemed to want to fight a duel, with some man of Israel, but they were afraid of Goliath, this giant, and fled from him (24th verse).

To me, this is something that can be compared to the giants, in our beloved country, today - not men, literally, but giants of strife, discord, campus riots hatred, atheism, anti-Americanism, and well-organized schemes of crime, and revolution.

To quote this giant Goliath, he said: "I defy the armies of Israel this day" I Sam. 17: 10. He thought he was so well protected by his armour of brass that he couldn't be hurt, and much of the destruction and demands being made in our land today is being done under the name of being protected by our own Constitution namely, Freedom of speech, and assembly. Even to speak words of dishonor to our Flag, and Government, and most of all, to our God.

But there came a little shepherd boy to bring food, and inquire as to the welfare of his three brothers who were in the army of Israel. He heard the boastings of the old giant, and wondered what they were going to do about him, and even inquired what reward would be given to the man that killed Goliath. And told King Saul he would go and fight with the giant, but because of his youth, the King thought it would be a very foolish thing to let him do. But David had already proven the God, whom he served. He had already had the strength and power to kill a bear, also a lion that had attacked his fathers sheep, whom he cared for, and he said this Philistine would be no more than these, since he had defied the armies of the Living God, I Sam. 17:32-36. So Saul consented to let David try it, against Goliath. They put the regular armour of brass upon him, and a helmet of brass on his head, and he also girded a sword upon himself but David didn't like that; he hadn't proven that arrangement.
