



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

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CHILDREN LOVE PARTIES - and make wonderful enthusiastic guests. They also make good host and hostesses.

A successful party will require careful planning in advance such as invitations, games, decorations, favors and what you will serve. Plan far enough in advance you can allow the child to help plan the party which will be a good experience and make the child even more eager.

WHY HAVE PARTIES - your may ask. Well, parties are usually to have fun, but they also can be an experience through play that can teach a child how to work and play with other people, how to entertain and how to be a guest.

YOU CAN BE ASSURED - of the best party ever if you decide on a date, time, guests, theme, refreshments and invitations two weeks before the important date.

At least a week before the party, send out the invitations, purchase game material, favors and order the cake unless you will be baking it yourself.

IF THE CHILD'S HOME - is the place chosen for the party, and it usually is, because this is most likely where he will feel more secure, make sure it takes place, if possible in a room with spill-proof floors and washable furniture. These features make everybody concerned more comfortable.

IF POSSIBLE - the guests should be within a few months or a year of the party child's age.

BEFORE-HAND - decide where the presents will be placed and at what part of the party he will open them. Guests should not buy elaborate gifts. Two dollars is adequate, and something that costs less might be more pleasing to the honoree.

IT'S ALWAYS GOOD - to take snapshots for permanent family records. Better still use a movie camera and if a tape recorder is available it can prove to be amusing and cherished

in the future years.


USE THESE SIMPLE - rules for a party you will love giving and one that will not be forgotten in a hurry.




