

HOT DRY WEATHER CONTINUES FOR CORYELL

Dry hot weather holds on to Coryell County despite thunderstorm warnings and rains in the Central Texas area.

Tuesday night high winds lashed Coryell and neighboring counties. The Copperas Cove area was hardest hit in Coryell County with winds being broken and tree limbs falling under the force of the storm.

A new theater in the Cove shopping center was damaged between \$10,000 and \$12,000 when the storm twisted the steel framework.

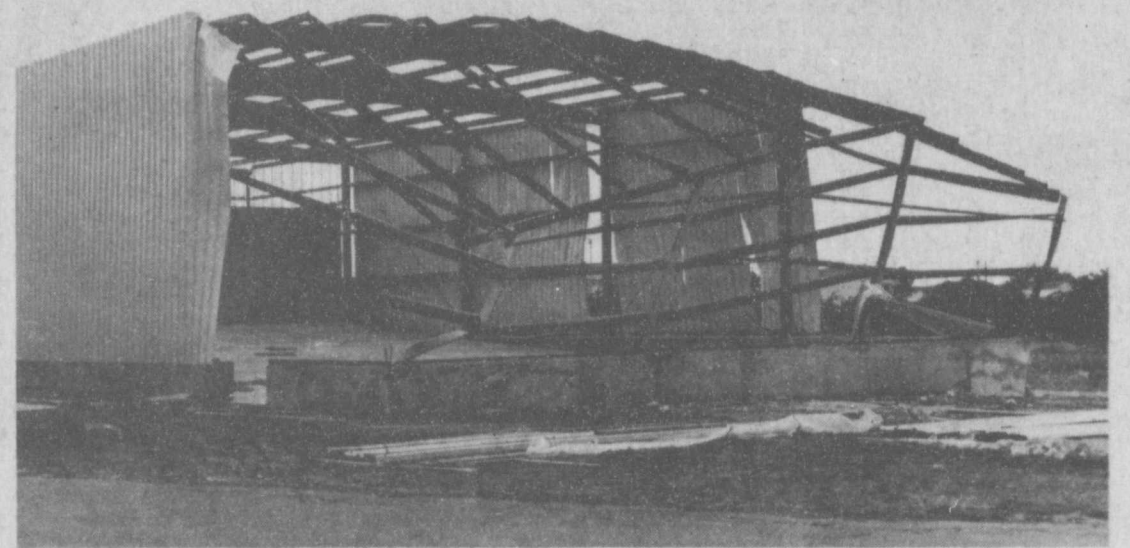
The Gatesville area received winds estimated as high as 55 mph. Damage was light in this area.

The Gatesville area received only traces of rain, this week with thunderstorms and building up each afternoon, but no moisture resulting.

High winds and high temperatures have added to the dry conditions in the county. Farmers are watching as crops in many areas are burning up from the combination of high temperatures, high wind and no rain.

Temperatures in the Gatesville area reached 100 degrees on June 19, to begin the heat wave. The temperatures for the past week are Friday, June 20, 102; Saturday, June 21, 103; Sunday, June 22, 100; Monday, June 23, 101; Tuesday, June 24, 99; and Wednesday, June 25, 96.

Rain is still in weather bureau forecast, but locally it seems hard to believe.



SNEAK PREVIEW - The framework of the new Theater, being built in the Cove Shopping Center, was buckled by high winds early Tuesday. CITY COUNCIL REVIEWS COMPREHENSIVE PLAN-LIBRARY

The Gatesville City Council heard a report on the city Comprehensive Plan, Tuesday night at the regular meeting of the council at 7:30 p.m. in City Hall.

Tom Herring of the State Department of Health reviewed with the council the many studies and information reports that will be involved in the "Master Plan".

Mayor Bob Miller noted Thursday that the "Scope of services" included in the plan were revised. Miller noted that the consultants on the study would concentrate on mapping, land use studies, and capital improvements studies.

Proposals and uniform policies will also be formulated said Miller. The plan will consider future development of the city with uniform and fair agreements between the city and developers.

The "Master Plan" will cost on estimated \$15,000 of which the federal government will pay approximately \$10,400. The cost to Gatesville is estimated at \$5,668.

The city council voted to reduce the speed limit on West Main Street from 45 mph to 30 mph at the request of the State Highway Department. The widening of the Leon River Bridge on Main Street is the reason for the speed reduction. The speed limit change extends the 30 mph zone from Wells Park, West to the intersection of Levita Road and Highway 84.

Also at the request of the State Highway Department the Council passed an ordinance establishing no parking zones in the Elementary School area, along Highway 84. The no parking zones will extend east and west of the intersection of Lovers Lane and Highway 84.

TWO INJURED IN WEDNESDAY COLLISION

Two persons were injured one seriously, when an auto and pickup truck collided at dusk Wednesday in extreme southern Hamilton County.

Rodney Dismore, hometown unknown, and Ronny Ashmore of Jonesboro were taken by emergency ambulance to Hamilton hospital.

Dismore, driver of the auto sustained chest injuries and is listed in serious condition that hospital. Ashmore was reported not seriously hurt.

The accident occurred 1.5 miles west of Jonesboro on Texas 36 between 7 and 8 p.m.

Investigating offices speculate the Dismore auto strayed onto the gravel shoulder where Dismore apparently lost control and crossed the center stripe.

Ashmore, traveling east toward Jonesboro, attempted to dodge the oncoming car but the collision occurred off of the roadway.

The Gatesville ambulance had mechanical trouble en route to the crash scene and Hamilton was called in.



Kristi Brown Killed In Car Crash

Kristi Lynn Brown, 16, was killed in a head on collision about 10 p.m., Monday with a pickup truck reportedly driven by James M. Adams of Gatesville.

Adams was treated at Coryell Memorial Hospital for a broken leg.

The accident occurred on Highway 36 about 6.5 miles south of Gatesville on a straight stretch of road.

DPS Patrolman, David Jund, investigated and reported, Miss Brown, traveling alone, was headed south toward her home in Flat and Adams was headed north toward Gatesville. Jund noted that the truck apparently swerved into the southbound traffic lane.

The two vehicles were completely demolished by the impact.

Miss Brown was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Loy Gene Brown of Flat. She was a junior at Gatesville High School.

Funeral services for Miss Brown were held Wednesday at the Evans Funeral Home in Evans at 4:00 p.m.

Irrigation Rights To Be Discussed At Meeting

The Gatesville Chamber of Commerce has called a special meeting of all farmers, ranchers, and interested persons for July 7 at 8:00 p.m. in the Civic Room of the National Bank, concerning the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967, and its effect on the Leon River as an irrigation source.

Bob Edwards, president of the Chamber of Commerce reported this week that the meeting is aimed at answering questions and explaining requirements required under the 1967 act.

Edwards deemed this an important meeting for all persons owning property near the river.

The Water right Adjudication Act of 1967 gives the Texas water rights Commission the right to apportion the waters of the Leon River and its tributaries among riparian land owners.

This is a new law and it may take many years for the Commission to complete the set-up. But you may lose some valuable rights, unless you file your claims now.

It seems that the Commission is committed to the policy of "FIRST COME FIRST SERVED".

If you have been irrigating, file your claim before September 1, 1969 or you may lose your preference right.

If you have not been irrigating you can start now and file a claim on proposed plans under construction and file additional application before July 1, 1971.

Some things that have not been passed on by the Water Rights Commission, but they are possibilities and probabilities.

1. That the Leon River and its tributaries from Proctor Dam to Belton Dam will be one central segment.

2. A water master working

3. It will be on first come first served basis. 4. If your rights are subordinate a land owner in Bell County or Comanche County might use up available water supply before your time came. 5. Certainly we will eventually stop flood water gushing down the river and flowing into the Gulf and wishing we had it six months later.

6. When flooding is prevented the amount of available water from the river will be greatly increased, and your chance for irrigation water greatly improved.

CHILDREN LOVE PARTIES - and make wonderful enthusiastic guests. They also make good host and hostesses. A successful party will require careful planning in advance such as invitations, games, decorations, favors and what you will serve. Plan far enough in advance you can allow the child to help plan the party which will be a good experience and make the child even more eager.

WHY HAVE PARTIES - your may ask. Well, parties are usually to have fun, but they also can be an experience through play that can teach a child how to work and play with other people, how to entertain and how to be a guest.

YOU CAN BE ASSURED - of the best party ever if you decide on a date, time, guests, theme, refreshments and invitations two weeks before the important date.

At least a week before the party, send out the invitations, purchase game material, favors and order the cake unless you will be baking it yourself.

O. K. Davis Sr. was taken by private auto to Lowrey Clinic for treatment.

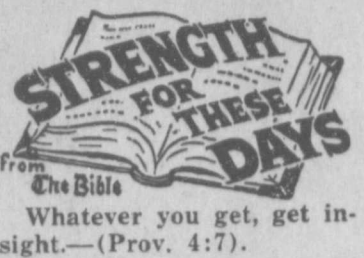
Mrs. Davis was also in the Davis pickup and was uninjured in the crash.

This slaughter and maiming of people on our streets and highways is a blight on mankind and his survival.

In 30 years the economic loss from U.S. traffic accidents has reached an astounding \$175 billion. Last year the economic loss reached a new high of \$14,249,000,000 or an average of approximately \$286 for each family in the United States.

More than \$50 million annually has been invested by industry to educate the public on traffic safety.

However, the real answer is up to each individual. The tremendous loss of life and property must be reversed. The time to start is on this Fourth of July weekend and continue throughout the year.

We all know the rules of the road—obey them. When we are not in condition to drive—don't. We know what seat belts and shoulder harnesses are for—then use them. Always drive defensively. Be careful!

Food For Thought Mrs. B. A. Snoddy

"Even as Abraham believed God, and it was accounted to him for righteousness, know ye therefore, that they, which are of faith, the same are the children of Abraham." Gal. 3:6-7

I would like for us to consider a great Bible character, Abraham, for this weeks writing. The word Abraham, or Abram means exalted Father. (Bible dictionary). He was one of the great patriarchs in the Messianic lineage, and was divinely called of God, and was

promised to become a great blessing to all peoples of the earth, in that the Messiah would be brought forth, from the nation of which Abraham was the founder. Gen. 12:1-4.

This is the first great call recorded in the Bible; in the covenant God made with Abraham, three things were promised: the land, a posterity (when, as yet, he had no heir) and to become a blessing to all the peoples of the world.

Go then, to find one worthy to be given such great promises, we would like to bring out a few thoughts about him.

July 4 Fido and Firecrackers

To any sensitive dog, the Glorious Fourth is a pain in the sacrum. Literally. If you could hear sounds two full octaves above the range of the human ear, you'd cower in the corner too.

Although in most states it is now illegal to sell fireworks, you may be sure at the dawn's early light bombs will be bursting in air—to the kiddies' delight and Fido's distress.

This national pastime is a hard habit to break, in spite of numerous injuries and frequent deaths, not only to human beings, but to dogs. Last year a puppy in Colorado suffered a burned leg and untold psychological trauma when youngsters tossed a Roman candle at him. And a German Shepherd, enjoying his fenced-in yard, was blinded when a lighted firecracker exploded in his face.



Even if your Fido is indoors during the celebrations, don't be surprised if he starts to howl at the first BANG, says Bob Bartos, Manager, Friskies Nutrition Research Kennels. He may be used to shotguns and the hunt, or the backfiring of city cars, but he can turn craven when "crackers" start popping. If your pup shows stress on July 4, don't lecture him on fortitude. He can't help it. His nervous system is quivering, and what he needs most is solitude and a safe retreat, preferably under the bed or in a nice dark closet.

If Fido is a shambles even under this considerate treatment, ask your veterinarian for a sedative. He'll come through the holiday a little groggy, but better a sleepy pup than a canine casualty.

As we have already said, he was divinely called, and chosen of God. Abraham was blessed of God, and became very rich in cattle, silver, and gold. Gen. 13:2.

He was a man who wanted no strife, among his fellow kinsmen and himself. "Let there be no strife, for we be brethren," he said. This was part of the standard which pleased God.

He didn't doubt the messenger of the Lord who came to tell him that his barren wife should bear a son unto him, after they were both old, he believed God was a miracle worker, and that nothing was too hard for him, Gen. 18th Chap.

And the sacrifice which Abraham made to confirm the promise God had given him, that the fowl—assumed it not. He drove them away, which makes me ask this question: Do we carefully watch over our vows which we make unto the Lord, and earnestly desire to perform them? or when the crisis is passed, do we forget what we've promised the Lord?
