brutality have been leveled at the Gatesville and Mountain View Schools for Boys by Rep. Curtis Graves of Houston, This time in a federal Senate.

Rep. Graves was a member of the subcommittee investigation group which made an inspection tour of the Mountain View School in January of 1969.

At that time, Rep. Vernon Stewart of Wichita Falls lead the investigating team which reviewed several case histories and had interviews with inmates as they inspected the Mountain View complex.

State School and Mountain View administrators necessarily made no comment on this latest round of charges.

Associated Press sources in Washington gave the following account of Rep. Graves' testimony in Washington.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congress was told Friday that an inmate of a correction institution for juveniles in Texas was sprayed with tear gas when he suffered an epileptic attack in a solitary-confinement cell.

Rep. Curtis Graves, a Democratic state legislator from Houston, testified before a Senate subcommittee investigating juvenile delinquency that that a guard at the Gatesville State School told him he had used the gas in the belief it would calm the vouth.

Graves, who was very critical of institutional conditions in his state, told the subcommittee headed by Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., that he came to Congress only after being convinced that Texas officials were not going to make any reforms.

Acknowledging that the Gatesville inmates would not be classified as "good boys," Graves said he triple checked every complained-of instance before reporting it to the subcommittee

He said he had more than 200 documented cases of what he termed brutality involving the school.

Parents of the epileptic in-mate, Richard Vargas, have prepared a suit against the school, Graves said.

He said another boy was forced to sign a statement that he was a homosexual and that he had been bruised when fending off advances from another

The truth was that the guards had beaten the the two youths, Graves said, after they didn't run fast enough in what was termed the institution's game of punishment; carrying a shovel of dirt at a dead run between two holes.

Rep. Graves Carries Brutality

SMITH TO INVESTIGATE INSURANCE RATES

Governor Preston Smith said Thursday he will launch a "fullscale" investigation into the spiraling private passenger auto mobile insurance rates in Texas.

"The annountement Tuesday that the Insurance Commission staff has recommended an 11.4 percent increase in private auto rates borders on catastrophe and has become intolerable for many of our citizens," the Governor said.

One of the first steps the Governor plans is to call a meeting in Austin, "as soon as possible" of a representative group of presidents of insurance firms in the state.

He also said he is exploring the possibility of naming a small select panel of lay citizens outside the insurance industry to make a thorough study and recommendations.

'There also is pending in both the House and Senate appointment of interim study commit-tees of Legislators to look into auto insurance rates," the Governor added.

He said he is hopeful combined efforts on all fronts can "come up with some solid recommendations and steps which the Legislature can take at its next regular session.

We must face the fact, Smith said, "that Texas is one of the few states in the nation which still maintains a controlled rate system on auto insurance."

The vast majority of states are under a competitive system or utilize some form of the merit system which Texasonce

sure insurance companies received a fair and equitable rate of return and citizens were not charged exorbitant rates. "We are not going to 'pick

on' the insurance companies," Smith said. "We all realize the com-

panies must make reasonable profits to stay in business, but," the Governor continued, "it is up to the elected of-ficials of our state to do everything in our power to see that Texans are not being overcharged and that profits are not excessive to companies writing insurance."

But, the Governor stressed, "This will not be an attempt to drive insurance companies out of our state or to make it impossible to buy insurance."

The Governor continued "there has been some talk that the federal government might move into certain segments of the insurance industry.

"This would be detrimental to our society. I have never been in favor, nor am I in favor now, of federal intervention into private or state's rights," said Smith.
"But," he warned, "unless

state officials assume our responsibilities now we might not have a choice fater on".

He cited a story in a recent issue of a national publication (U. S. News and World Report) predicting the United States is rapidly moving toward

The legislator said Dr. James Turman, director of the Texas Youth Council which oversees the state schools, "is either the blindest man in Texas or the cleverest person I have ever seen to have covered up this activity."

Graves also disapproved of having Texas Rangers investigate allegations of brutality at the schools

"To have the Texas Rangers investigate the Gatesville School is the same as having a chicken snake investigate a henhouse," he said. "One state agency is not qualified to investigate another." He said also that Texas re-

lies frequently on Dr. Austin MacCormick of Usborne Association of New York to clear, as Graves put it, the state schools of any charges. Dodd said he was particularly intrigued by Graves' mention of MacCormick. He said Arkansas state officials hired MacCormick to evaluate their prisons after bodies were found

buried in the prison yard. Graves said the National Council on Crime and Delinquency offered Texas officials their services as an impartial

evaluation service. "When they started to uncover the truth the state quickly let them go," Graves said. Last May, the Texas Senate Youth Affairs Committee reported that there has been some "excessive physical force" at

Gatesville, but no brutality. The report was made on the committee's investigation of brutality charges at Gatesville and at a similar institution at Mountain View.

The report said there is room for considerable difference of opinion as to whether the activities of two or three Texas Youth Council employes in slapping several boys in the face and hitting them in the stomach for having their pants legs rol-led too high are brutal acts.

The law permits corporal punishment in certain cases, but the employee manual for con-death, but they wouldn't com-trol at both schools forbids it promise God's standards, and trol at both schools forbids it in all cases. some 47 employes at Gatesville were released for use of unnecessary force furing the five year period from January 1, 1963 to December 31, 1968. 21 employes of the Gatesville school had been attacked by students at the school during the same period of time.







It was on July 26, 1899, that a Gustine couple, Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Mitchell, began life together when they were married in Bell County, Texas. Since then, they have lived on farm in Bell, Coryell, McLennan, Mills and Comanche counties. Early in their married life they farmed places owned by "Ma" Ferguson's family, as well as one owned by Jim Ferguson, himself. They recall that, in spite of the Ferguson's generally controversial position, they were liked and admired in their home community of Little River. They farmed in Coryell County in 1916, and in McLennan County near Mc Gregor, 1917-1923. Mr. Mitchell served several terms as school trustee in both Bell and Mills County where the family moved, west of Mullin on Pecan Bayou, in 1929. In 1939 the savings of a life time of sharecropping went into the purchase of a 55 acre farm, three miles north of Gustine in Comanche County. There the couple and their daughter, Gladys, lived until moving into Gustine about three years ago. Their son, Ulysses, continues Gustine about three years ago. Their ties go back to the dim past, indeed, but they are very much people of the present. Their greatest pleasures come from visiting with their children and other relatives, and members of their church and community. They are members of the Gustine Church of Christ and were faithful in attending until advanced age intervened. Mr. Mitchell was born in Jackson County, Alabama, on August 11, 1878. Although he lost his sight a few years ago, both retain relatively good health and enjoy talking old times.
