

# LIGHT TURN OUT SEEN FOR AMENDMENT ELECTION TUESDAY

An estimated 1200 voters will be cast in the Tuesday August 5, Amendment Election in Coryell County.

County Clerk, Bubba Henson, estimated the light turn out noting that only 17 absentee votes have been cast. There are 6,326 registered voters in Coryell County this election year.

Henson estimated that only 500 votes would be cast in the three Gatesville boxes this time.

The new voting precinct lines will be used during this election for the first time. The county will vote in 15 voting precincts: Three in Gatesville, two in Copperas Cove, Turnersville, Jonesboro, Pearl, Evant, Levita, Purnela, The Grove, Coryell City, Flat, and Oglesby.

In Gatesville, voting will be held in three places this time. Precinct #2 will ballot in the courthouse, Precinct #3 will ballot in the Gatesville High School, and Precinct #4 will ballot in the City Hall fire sta-

tion. Precinct lines in the Gatesville city limits have become complicated to meet Spreme Court requirements of one-man one vote.

Precinct #4 includes all area north of Main Street from the east city limits to the Leon River on the West. Precinct #3 includes the area south of Main Street in side a line west on Main to seventh Street, South of Seventh to College, east on College to Foust Street south on Foust on South Street east on South street to Live Oak, north on Live Oak to Bridge, east on Bride to High 36, and south on 36 to FM 107.

(All area inside the loop is included in Precinct #3. By imagining you were driving according to the above instructions, if you live to the left of the street inside the loop, you would be in Precinct #3 it is a shame it is so complicated.)

Precinct #2 covers all area in West Gatesville, west of the Leon River and all area west

and south of Main Street, not included in the Precinct #3 loop.

Texas voters will be voting on the following ten amendments to the constitution:

No. 1 - So-Called Clean-up Amendment. Purports to make no substantive changes, but merely to eliminate obsolete, superfluous or unnecessary sections of the constitution.

No. 2 - Increasing Water Development Bonds-\$3.5 billion. Granting the powers and flexibility of operation of the Texas Water Development Board necessary to develop sufficient water resources for present and future economic development of the state.

No. 3 - Authorizing the legislature to set the salary of the lieutenant governor and the speaker of the house of representatives at not more than one-half of the salary of the governor and to set the salary of other members of the legislature at not more than the salary of a district judge.

No. 4 - Exempting nonprofit water supply corporations from ad valorem taxation.

No. 5 - Increasing ceiling on assistance to four classes of needy to maximum of \$80 million from state funds.

No. 6 - Authorizing removal of constitutional interest-rate limitations on certain bonds subject to limitations imposed by the legislature.

No. 7 - Providing for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees and agents, including members of organized fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties.

No. 8 - Authorizing the legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under The Texas Opportunity Plan.

No. 9 - Providing for annual sessions of the Texas Legislature.

## Refund Due Consumers For Antibiotic

### Purchases For Period 1954-1966

Attorney General Crawford C. Martin today urged Texas consumers to check their records and file refund claims for broad spectrum antibiotics purchased during the years 1954 through 1966.

August 16, 1969, is the deadline for mailing a notarized claim to the Clerk, United States District Court, P. O. Box 745 Bronx, New York, 10451.

Texas consumers will receive a share of \$100 million offered by five large drug manufacturers in settlement of multiple civil antitrust actions filed against them by Martin and the Attorneys General of other states.

Forms may be picked up at the County Clerk's office in each Texas county. Many newspapers are also printing copies of the form which can be used

by consumers. The drugs involved are Aureomycin, Terramycin, Achromycin, Mystecilin, Panalba, Panmycin, Polycycline, Steclin, Tetracyclin and Tetrex.

If a person fails to file a claim, it will constitute authorization to use the money recovered in his behalf for the benefit of all consumers in a manner directed by the Federal Court.

"Thousands of Texans are eligible to make claims and I hope they will avail themselves of the opportunity," the Attorney General said. "The form is a simple one, providing for estimates of the total dollar amount a consumer purchased and the names and addresses of the drugstores where the purchases were made in the years 1955-1966.

Other than these two changes the budget reflex no new programs included in this year's budget.

## COUNTY BUDGET FOR 1970 SET AT \$650,235.28

The 1970 budget proposed totaling \$650,235.28 has been prepared for presentation to Commissioners on August 11, announced County Judge Norman Storm, this week.

The budget proposed \$51,190.05 above last year's approved budget of \$599,045.23. Judge Storm noted that this year planned right of way purchases for Highway 190 in widening will cost \$50,000. The Law-Library Fund is up \$1100 over the 1969 budget.

Storm noted that road and bridge expenditures are proposed at \$384,919,00 up \$43,000 over last year's, but down when the right of way funds are

included. Law-Library Funds is budgeted for \$2,200 twice the amount allotted last year.

The general fund, which has been under close economic supervision this year, will be \$263,116.28 for 1970 up approximately \$6,000.

A budget hearing will be held on August 18.

## \$80,000 LAW SUIT FILED AGAINST TWO WACO MEN

A petition asking \$80,000 in damages was filed Wednesday morning in 52nd District Court against two Waco men.

The petition list as plaintiffs in the case, eight men employed at the Mountain View School for Boys. Those listed are W. E. Wimberly, Kermit Miller, David M. Wells, Robert

L. Ballard, Barney Ray, Elwood Walker, William B. Brown, and Jimmy G. Christian all of Coryell County.

Named as defendants in the petition are John M. McBride and Bob Carroll both of Waco. Attorney Bob Cummings of Gatesville representing the plaintiffs was in Waco, Wednesday to serve the petitions. Cummings noted late Wednesday that the defendants will have 20 days from the date the petition is served in which to

file an answer to the petition. The petition alleges that the two defendants, McBride and Carroll made statements in area

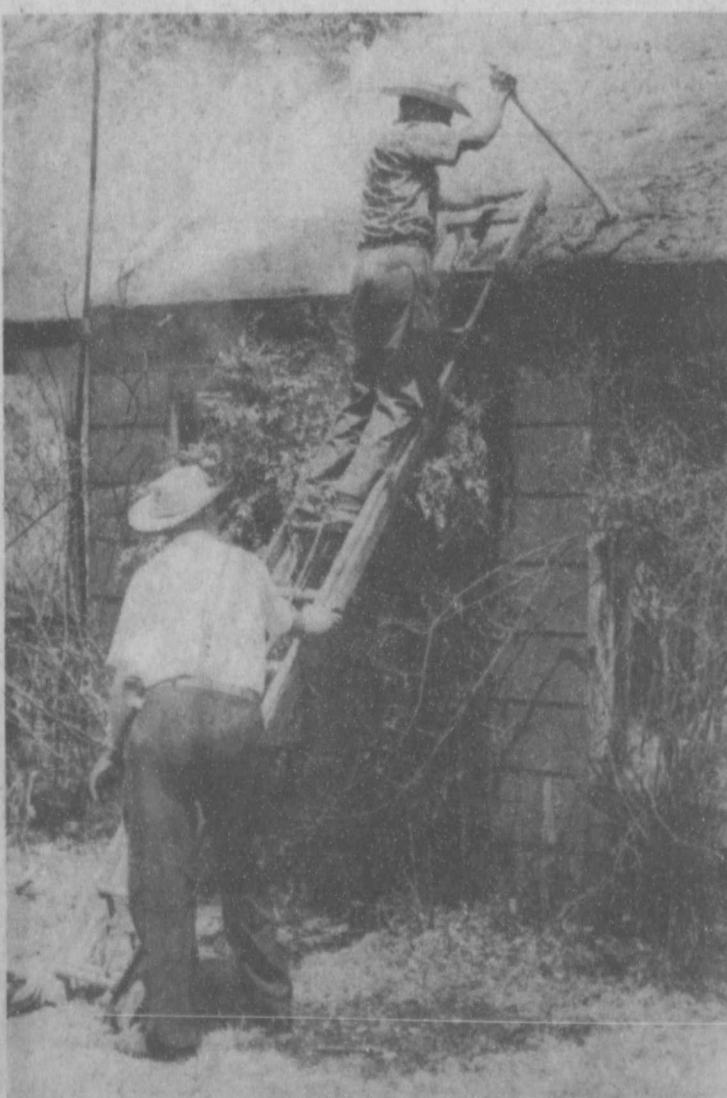

#### Rostrum Fixed For Fall Term

The Oglesby School Board completed its faculty rostrum for the coming school year. this week, said Supt. Morris Owens.

The board hired Mrs. Cynthia Nesbitt, at their Monday night meeting, to teach first and second grade at the eastern Coryell County community.

Mrs. Nesbitt, a mid-term graduate of Baylor University will be at her first teaching job. Her husband, Bill, is a third year law student at Baylor. Owens said Mrs. Nesbitt will be pep-squad sponsor at Oglesby this fall.

Owens added that Mrs. Frances Baldwin, who resigned from the Oglesby School earlier this summer will return to the system this fall. Mrs. Baldwin is the wife of Rev. Dewey Baldwin, pastor of the College Avenue Baptist Church of McGregor. She will teach remedial reading next fall.

School Tax Assessor-Collector Lawton Searcy reported little complaint, concerning the recent increase of school property tax evaluation from 25 percent to 33 1/3 percent. Owens said the people seem to realize the school's need for more money.

Concerning maintenance work this summer, Owens said, water was piped to the football field, the gymnasium was painted inside and out, 100 chairs were refinished and all the woodwork was varnished.

The administrator added that plans were made for paving the parking area in front of the building.

Owens said he has applied for a new school bus for the fall. Oglesby operates on three buses in the existing system.

Among the new items that Oglesby students will use this fall are 16 new Royal typewriters and one new course has been added -- economics. Owens said he will teach the year-long course.

## Citizens Now Receiving New BankAmericards

Anyone can consolidate their purchases and receive only one monthly statement from the Computer Center and have to write only one check. We want to furnish the best and most up to date service to our local citizens."

An owner using the BankAmericard will receive a monthly statement from the BankAmericard Computer Center which will contain a copy of the sales slip of each purchase made. Pay the amount in full within twenty five days and there is no charge for the service. A revolving monthly credit plan is available for those who desire it.

BankAmericard reported a 179 percent gain in cardholders and 159 percent gain in merchant outlets during the first half of 1969, according to Oscar C. Lindemann, President of the Dallas license, Texas Bank & Trust Company. He states: "This tremendous growth record is dramatic evidence that American Consumers and businessmen have accepted the bank credit card, and made it a part of their way of life."

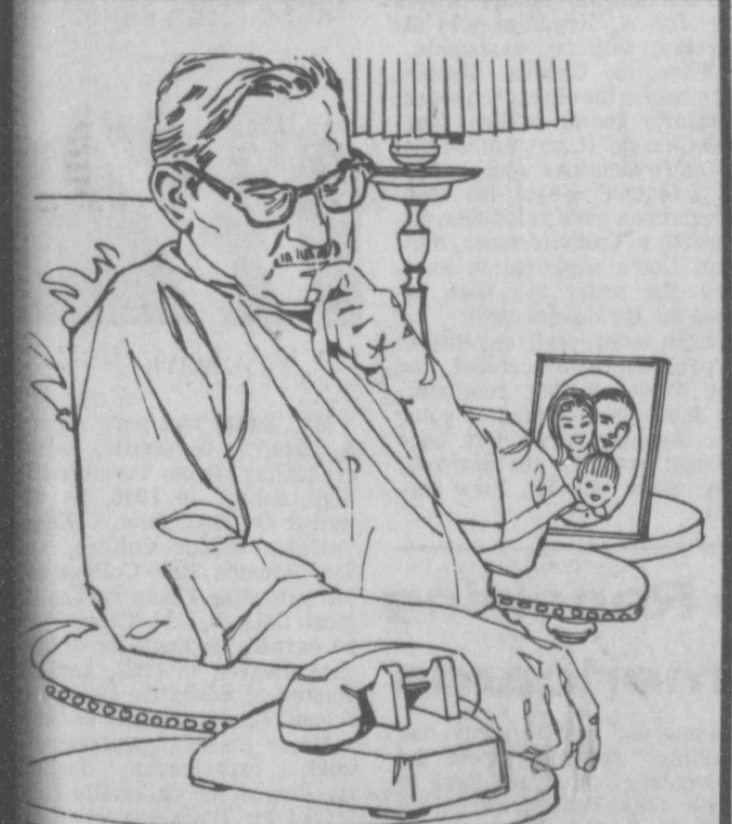

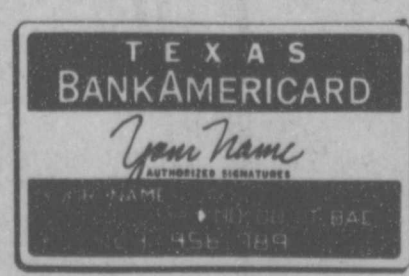

What relationship they have with parents is very little. They see each other on a daily basis, but only from five to seven in the evening. These visits are kept private between parent and child, but the visits are strictly for recreation. All problems the child has is taken to the metapelet or to the kibbutz education committee.

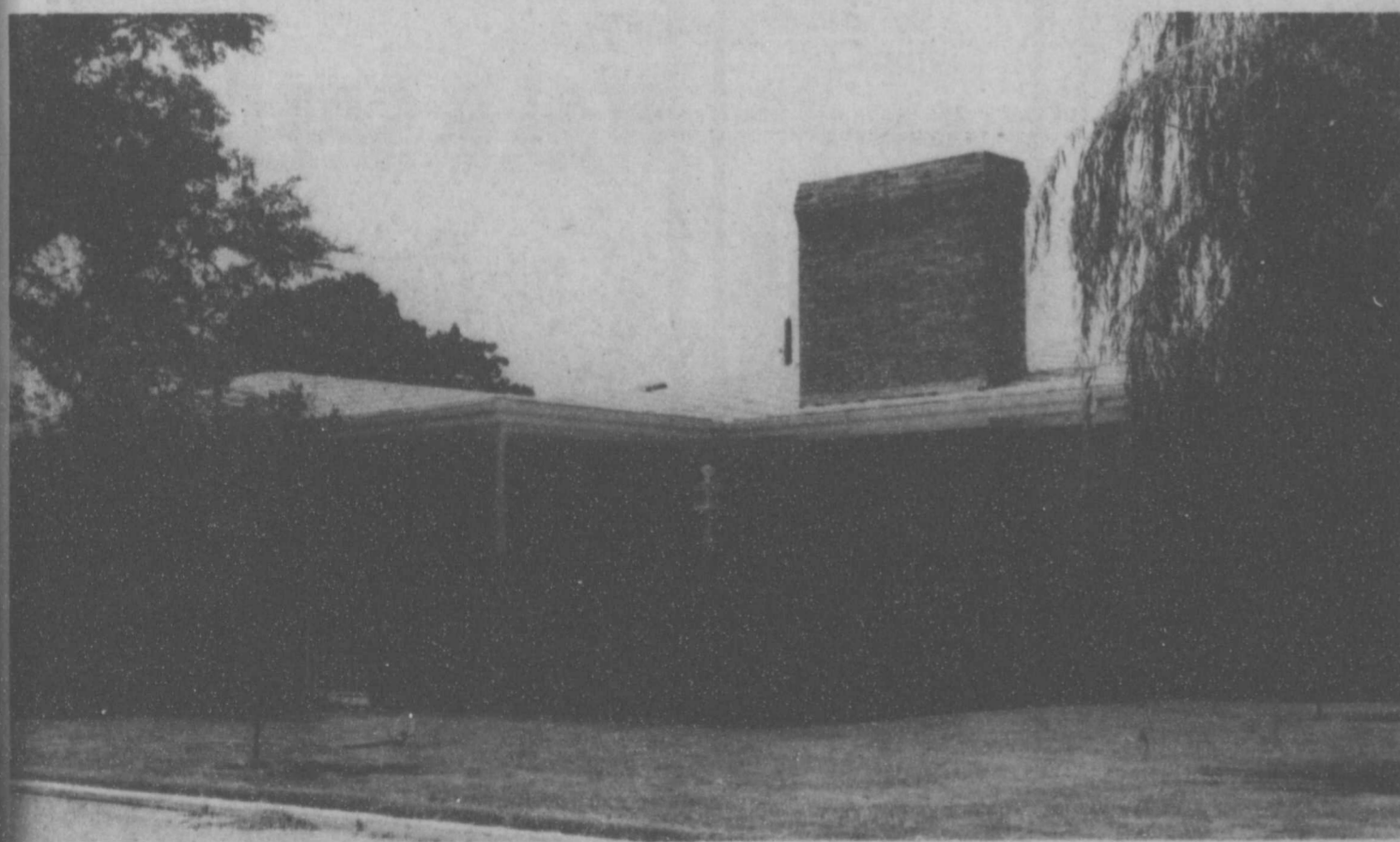
There may be some good in this child care plan, still being used, but I fail to see it.

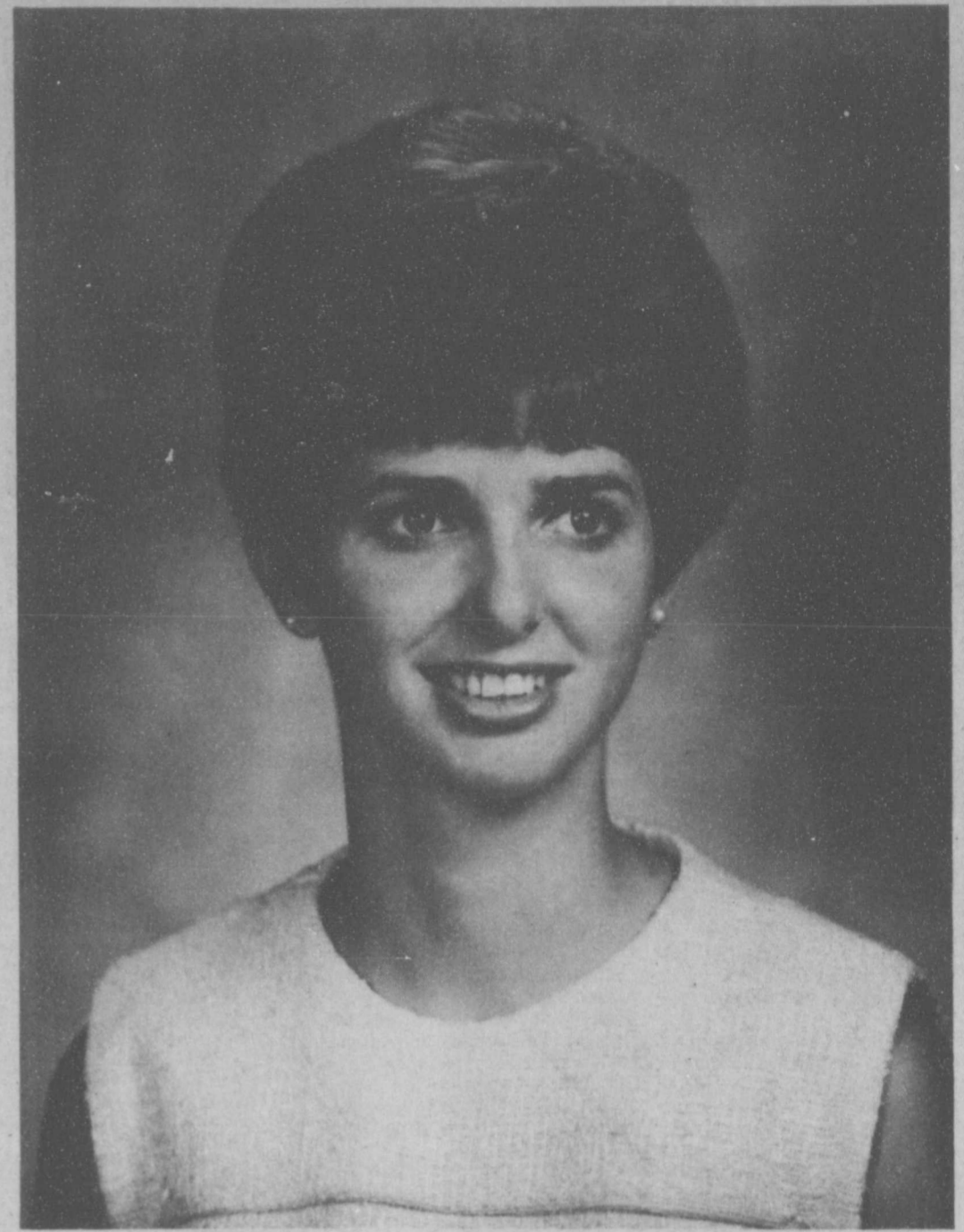

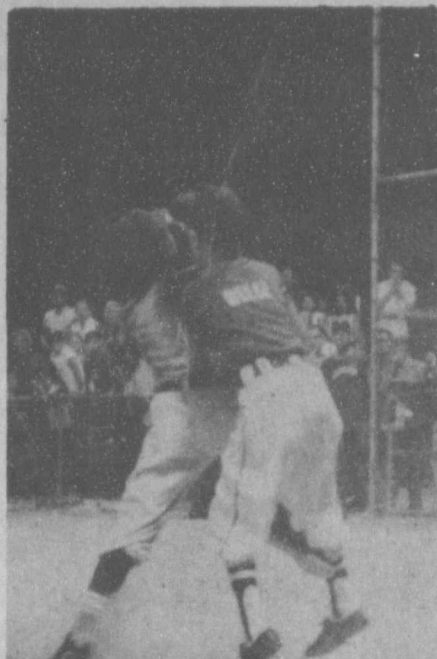

30 Youths To Attend 15th Annual Range Management Conference

Thirty of the state's most outstanding 4-H and FFA boys in the field of range management will attend the 15th annual Range Camp at Junction, July 23-August 2.

B. J. Ragsdale, Extension range specialist at Texas A & M University, said the camp would be held at the A & M Adjunct under sponsorship of the Texas Section, American Society of Range Management.

Studies will include determination of range conditions, wildlife management, ranch planning and field trips to a Kimble County ranch and the Sonora Ranch Experiment Station.

Section members will serve as camp directors and in addition to Ragsdale, include Dan Rodgers, Dwight Harkey, Glynn Hill, Don Pendleton, Gary Cunyus, Dr. Gary Donart and Rev. Joe Feseli, Texas President Joe Schuster will present awards to the outstanding campers at the concluding session of the camp on August 2.

Ragsdale said scholarship for each of the boys had been provided by local banks service clubs, soil conservation districts, livestock associations, farm organizations, parents and others.
