Texas voters will be voting on the following ten amendments to the constitution:

No. 1 - So-Called Clean-up Amendment. Purports to make no substantive changes, but merely to eliminate obsolete, superflous or unnecessary sec-

No. 2 - Increasing Water Development Bonds \$3.5 billion. Granting the powers and flexibility of operation of the Texas Water Development Board necessary to develop sufficient water resources for pesent and future economic development of the state.

No. 3 - Authorizing the legislature to set the salary of the lieutenant governor and the speaker of the house of representatives at not more than onehalf of the salary of the governor and to set the salary of other members of the legislature at not more than the salary of a district judge.

No. 4 - Exempting nonprofit water supply corporations from ad valorem taxation.

No. 5. - Increaseing ceiling on assistance to four classes of needy to maximum of \$80 million from state funds. No. 6. - Authorizing removal of constitutional interestrate limitations on certain bonds subject to limitations im-

posed by the legislature. No. 7 - Poviding for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees and agents, including members of organized fire departments and certain orzanized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties.

No. 8 - Authorizing the legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under The Texas Opportunity

No. 9 - Providing for annual sessions of the Texas Legis-





Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum, Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to September 9, 1969, may obtain one at his local County Agent's office.

THE CHILDREN OF THE DREAM - is a book written by Bruno Bettelheim. It's a different book about some young people, who had grown up in European ghettos, back twenty-five years ago. These people went to Israel filled with a new joy for living and were determined their children would be free. They decided their children should be raised in a kibbutz, which is a special house the children are raised in from the time they

are four days old. A metapelet (an adult who specializes in child care) supervises four or five. Then when the child turns two, he is moved with his group to the toddler house and on to kindergarten when of age. They are taught that all material things belong to the group, even toys and clothing.


What relationship they have with parents is very little. They see each other on a daily basis, but only from five to seven in the evening. These visits are kept private between parent and child, but the visits are strictly for recreation. All problems the child has is taken to the metapelet or to the kibbutz education committee.

There may be some good in this child care plan, still being used, but I fail to see it.

I would rather love, discipline and share what ever experience my child might have; because to me, this is the joy of living. How about you?


