Advance To State Tourney

Bankers Win District Tourney With Double Win Saturday Night

Jerry Blanchard looks to have tip toed passed the Clifton

Blanchard scored the winning run in the game, when Billy Bartlett hit a single with two outs in the bottom of the seventh

In a last inning rally, the National Bank team of Gatesville pushed across five runs to win a double header from the tough Clifton team, and advanced to the State Junior Teenage League

Tournament. The last half of the seventh inning of the second part of the championship double header started with the National Bank behind by four runs.

Clifton had beaten the Bankers 11 to 1 on Thursday night and in this final game of the District 5 Tournament, Clifton hit their way into a command-ing four run lead in the top of the sixth and seventh innings.
The last of the seventh fea-

tured hard play from both teams and resulted in some tough close calls by umpires.

James Box started the bottom of the seventh with a hard hit grounder and out-ran, the ball to first base, Ronald Brown then watched four balls pass and walked to first.

Glenn Vernon, playing short stop, blazed a hard single to left field to load the bases. Still no outs.

Steve Palmer, left fielder, dropped in a single to center field and Box and Brown headed home for the National Bank first scores. Vernon moved to second and Palmer was on first.

Don Jones then hit a hard

grounder to short stop and on a fielders choice, Vernon was forced out at third base.

Still two runners on base, Tommy Tatum attempted a bunt down the left field line. The ball popped just over the pit-cher, Claude Outlaw's glove.

Tatum beat out the bunt to load the bases again. Manager, James Box, called for a bunt from Jerry Blanchard next. Outlaw pitched high and baserunner, Steve Palmer, was caught between third and home for the second out. Jones advanced to third base

and Tatum moved to second. Blanchard, still at bat, rapped a good single to right field, scoring and Jones and Tatum raced for the plate. Tatum slid in safe for the tieing run. Blanchard moved to second on the play at the plate.

TAX LEGISLATION DUE IN AUSTIN STATE EMPLOYEES TO RECEIVE RAISES

The Texas Legislature, now in a 30-day special session, is working out the state financial problems with the end of the State's fiscal year, September 10, only 37 days away.

Recently two states, Ohio and California were unable to reach agreement on financial legislation by the end of the year with a very unsettling effect on government operations for a

Deadline pressure and need to act on several other pieces of legislation could force differing factions to agree or could push aside further apart.

Rep. Bob Salter reported this weekend that two versions of tax bills are receiving consid-

The House Bill proposes a tax package of \$285 million for the 1970 year. Senate Bill proposes a 325 million tax package. Salter noted that final action will probably come on a compromise very near the Se-

Other reports estimate a tax bill of at \$300 million will be needed to balance the State

Concerning state employee raises, Salter said the House Appropriations bills proposes to "Two step" raise (3,4%) for the first year of the bienyear. The Senate proposed calls for a "two step" raise the first year and a "one step" raise the second year with merit raises possible.

Salter noted that the Senate proposed in the state employee raises question is equivalent to approximately 1/2 of a group

Dickie Appointed To State Bar Committee

Salter noted that the Senate proposal seem to have favor in the special session.

He noted that the Tax Committee met Wednesday and com-

mittee chairman, Ben Atwell of Dallas encouraged the revamp-ing of the sales tax possibly raising the limit by one per-cent or 1/2 percent with removal of more exemptions.

The House is expected to vote on a bill today. The Senate probably will not take action for another week.

NEW LAWS FOR MOTORISTS IN EFFECT SEPTEMBER 1

A number of changes in the State's motorists, were made by the Texas Legislature during its 61st regular session.

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, noted that the new laws will all be in effect by September 1, and pointed out that Department of Public Safety patrolmen will begin enforcement on that date.

While the measures range from one establishing new motor vehicle inspection procedures to allowing the owner of a parking lot to remove cars parked on the lot without his consent, one of the most important is the new "implied consent" law covering breath testing of drivers.

Under the terms of this law, a motorist is "deemed to have given consent" to a breath test if arrested for any alleged offense arising out of his actual operation or physical control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. Refusal to take the breath test may lead to suspension of the suspect's driver license for up to one year.

Another measure which directly involves drivers is one which requires that slow-moving vehicles, that is, vehicles traveling at less than the normal speed of traffic, be driven in the right-hand lane or as as practicable to the right hand curb or edge of the roadway except when passing.

Also effective on Spetember 1 is an act which establishes new intersection right-ofway law for the State of Tex-Under this, there are four rules governing the right-ofway at intersections. In cases of collision, it will be presumed that the driver did not

yield the right-of-way if the four conditions have not been

The Legislature also made changes in the "following too closely" law. Drivers, after the effective date, must give due regard to the speed of the vehicles, traffic upon and condition of the street or highway, to insure that their motor vehicle can be safely brought to a stop without colliding with the preceding vehicle or bearing into other vehicles, objects or

A change in the Motor Vehicle Inspection Act places Texans on a 12 month inspection period, raises the inspection fee to \$2.00 and moves the location of the inspection sticker from the right of the windshield to the left. It also adds exhaust emmission systems on 1968 or later vehicles, and exhaust systems on all vehicles, to the list of items to be in-

Still other new laws remove the restriction on protuberances, such as studs on tires, which do not injure the roadway; adopt a slow-moving vehicle emblem; prevent racing, horn blowing, contests for speed, etc., in privately owned parking areas; and make it illegal to modify any passen-ger vehicle so that the lower most portion of the vehicle has less clearance than the lower most portion of any rim or any wheel in contact with the road-

Another measure, which does not become effective until Jan-uary 1, 1970 makes an officer's accident report available to the public upon the payment of a \$2.00 fee.

Other articles in this series will review the more important law changes in depth.



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

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
