



COMMISSIONERS APPROVE 1970 COUNTY BUDGET

County Commissioners approved a budget of \$650,000 for 1970 at their meeting, Monday August 18.

The budget includes \$50,000 for purchase of right of way for widening of highway 190 from Coryell County Line West to Copperas Cove.

Other expenditures expected by commissioners are similar to 1969 budget figures.

Coryell County Judge, Norman Storm, anticipates the county tax rate will remain at \$.95 per hundred in 1970. Storm noted that the budget approved, Monday was based on

a \$.95 rate and a \$23 million evaluation.

The tax rate will be officially set by Commissioners during their September 8 regular meeting.

Judge Storm reported that the Neighborhood Youth Corp program conducted this summer was completed Thursday with fourteen boys earning over \$300 each. The youths worked for county and city projects including hospital, road commissioners and courthouse work. Boys and girls were allowed to work 26 hours each week for \$1.30 per hour. Total payroll for the summer program was \$4200 all paid from federal sources.

Judge Storm noted this week that ground work on the new Highway 36 Association was underway. The organization will work toward improving traffic on Highway 36.

Concerning the possibility of a by-pass of Gatesville by Highway 36, Storm said, "I have received some comment on the by-pass, most of which is favorable." Storm anticipated Commissioners Court action on the "East Loop" decision on Monday, August 25.

Street Improvements Underway

Work on the city's streets began this week with base work beginning on Live Oak Street.

The city council passed an ordinance calling for the street improvements and work is scheduled for Leon, Live Oak, Pidcocke, South and Oak Park Circle.

First city sales tax payment totaling over \$10,000 which is presently ear-marked for street improvements.

Waco Man Injured In Monday Night Attack

Monday night two State School escapees allegedly attacked A. D. Katcher of Waco at the Rainbo Bread warehouse at Spindletop and Leon, reported Police Chief, Gene Goins.

Goins received a call at about 11:20 p.m., Monday to investigate a strangling attempt at the address.

Chief Goins said that Horace Knight of Gatesville discovered Katcher with a "coat hanger" around his neck.

Local law enforcement officers apprehended the two escapees soon after the incident. The two youths are 14 years old and one 16 year old were brought before Juvenile Court Judge Truman Roberts, Thursday to determine whether they should be tried as adults or returned to juvenile custody.

Mr. Katcher is still hospitalized as a result of the attack.

Defendent In Law Suit Files Answer

Bob Carroll, one of two defendants in an 85,000 law suit filed recently in 52nd District Court, filed an answer to the suit Thursday morning.

Carroll's original answer, "denies each and every, all and singular the allegations contained in plaintiffs original petition.

The "short answer" ask that no damages be paid to plaintiffs in the suit.

John M. McBride, the other defendant, in the law suit has not answered the plaintiffs petition to date. Should McBride fail to answer the petition by Monday, August 25 a default judgment will be awarded to the plaintiffs.

Plaintiffs in the case are eight employees of the Mountain View School for Boys, who allegedly were damaged by statements made by McBride and Carroll at a press conference in Waco, on July 23, 1969.

Five Mountain View Youths Escape Tuesday

Five Mountain View Youths made good on an escape from the maximum security unit, Tuesday.

Mountain View School for Boys Superintendent, George Adams, reported the five youths, two caucasians, and three latin Americans, made their escape using a "horse trailer frame" as a ladder to clear the first fence.

The escape was discovered at about 9:40 p.m., by school employees. Adams reported that the two white youths were apprehended in the Hay Valley area around 12:00 p.m.

The trail of the three latins lead to an area north of the Mountain View complex near Coryell Creek before the trail ended.

Wednesday night two of the latins were caught near Valley Mills and returned to the school. One boy is still at large. Several months ago three youths escaped from the school by a similar method. Mr. Adams noted that no trace of these three boys has been found yet.

Range Fire Destroys Over 1000 Acres East Of Town

Firemen from seven cities battled an unpredictable range fire just east of Gatesville, Wednesday afternoon.

The alarm was answered at about 4:00 p.m. by units of the Gatesville Fire Department. Shortly after the first alarm units from surrounding towns were called for help. Units from McGregor, Oglesby, Hamilton, Evant, Copperas Cove, State School For Boys, and three local units fought the blaze for three hours before gaining control of the blaze. The fire is alleged to have started near a wrecking yard on Highway 84 about three miles east of Gatesville.

Flames quickly spread over a ridge and moving northwest with a strong breeze blowing.

Within a short time earth moving equipment of the Texas Highway Department was at the scene to clear a fire break to stop the uncontrolled flames.

First efforts to stop the wind swept flames was in a low area just south of the unoccupied house on the old Osage Road. Highway equipment had cleared a wide area below a stock tank as flames worked down the ridge above them.

Flames jumped the clearing at one point and spread westward into an open field. Site seers and fireman were threatened at the old house when flames reached the road before

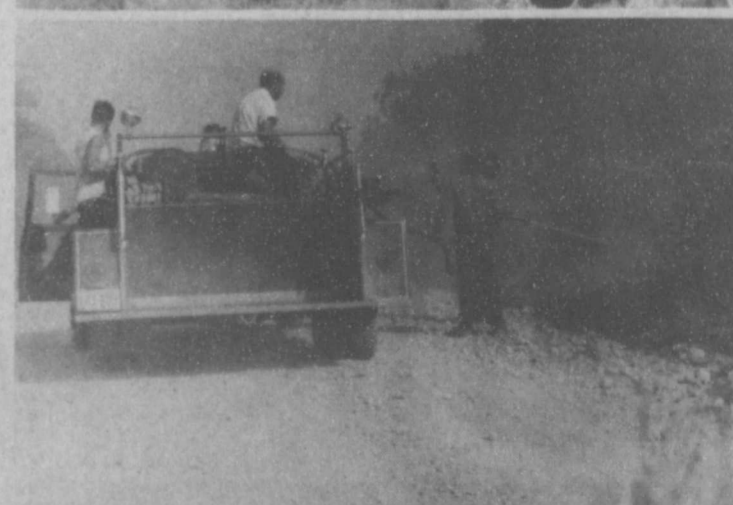

New Proposal Would Reduce Farm Quotas

"Farmers who have been suffering under the unworkable and ineffective burden of government supply-management welcome the effort to allow them to earn higher net incomes," according to Charles B. Shuman, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation.

"Consumers wishing a continued supply of high quality food and fiber, and taxpayers who resent huge government expenditures for outdated farm programs, will support the legislation calling for a basic change in government farm policy," he added.

The proposed Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1969 is an amendment to the current farm program and would take effect January 1, 1971. It would direct the Secretary of Agriculture to retire at least 10 million acres from production each year in 1971, 1972, 1973, 1974, and 1975, or at least 50 million acres by the end of the five year period. It also calls for a phase-out over the same period of acreage controls, base acreages, marketing quotas, processing taxes and direct payments for wheat feed grains and cottons.

A second part of the Act is intended to help needy farm families enter more gainful employment outside of agriculture through retraining grants and adjustment payments.

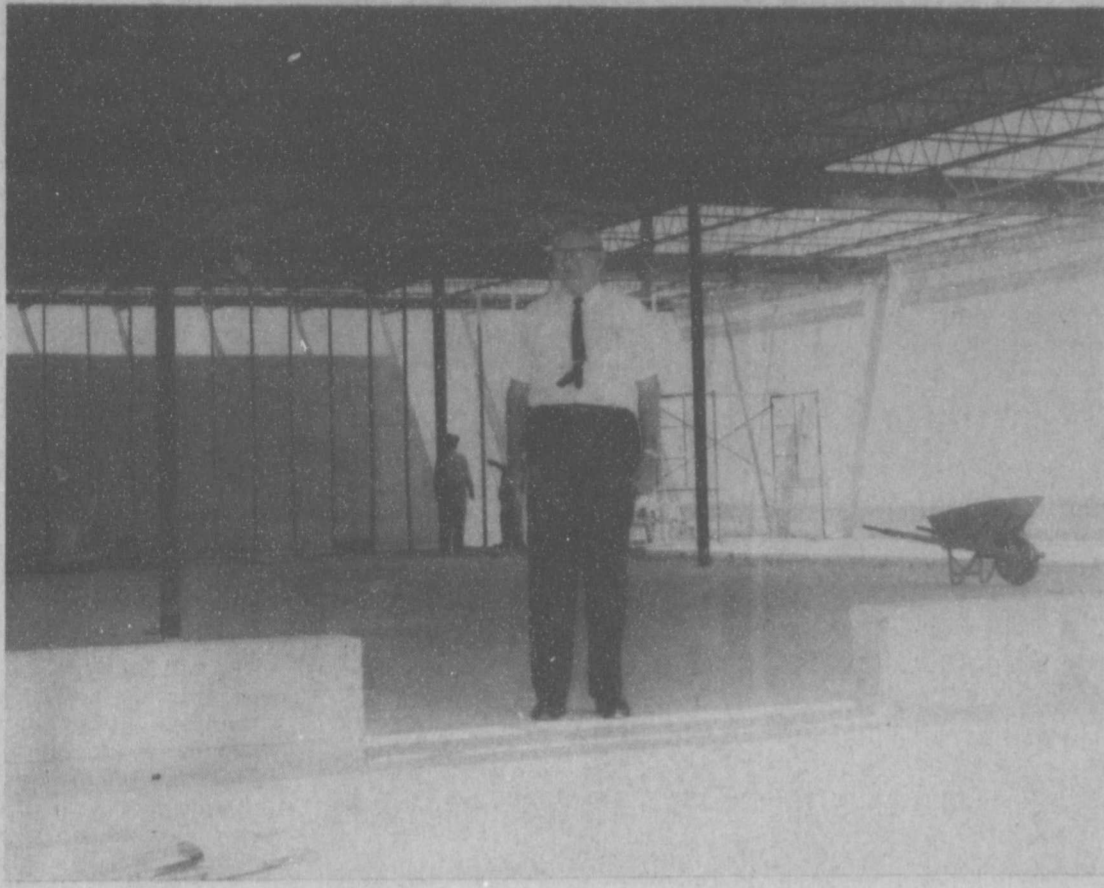

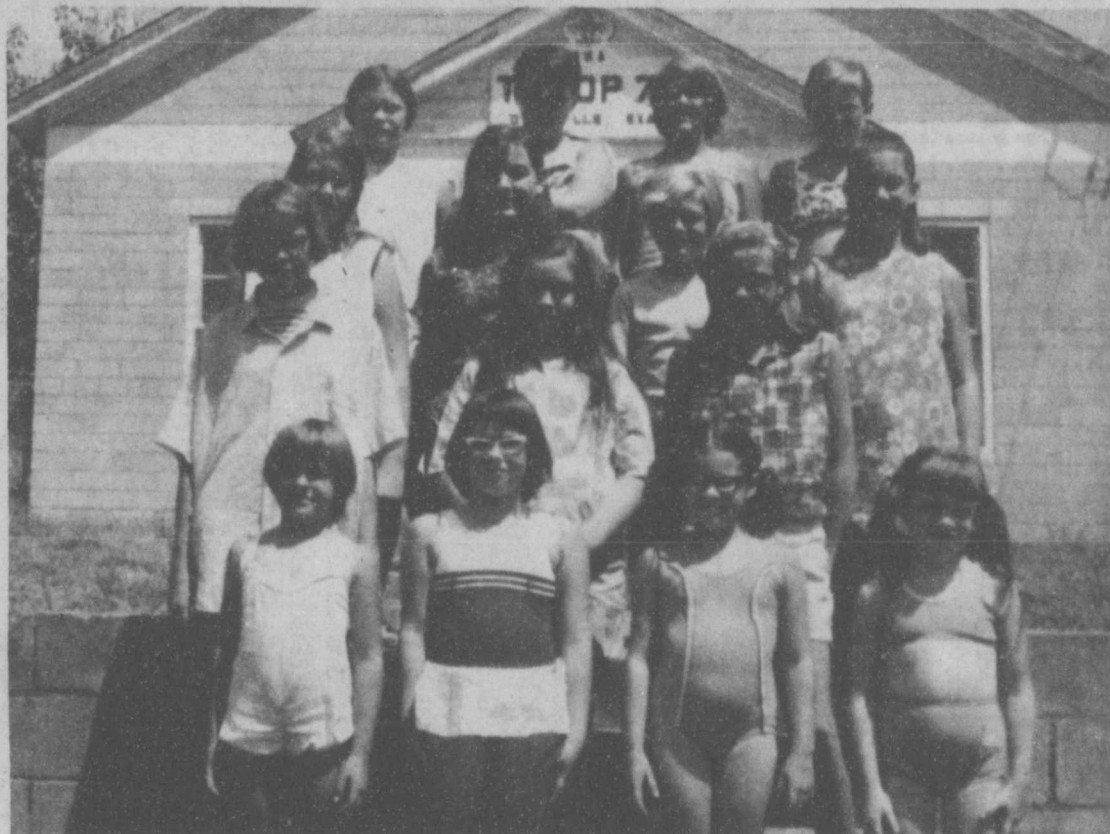

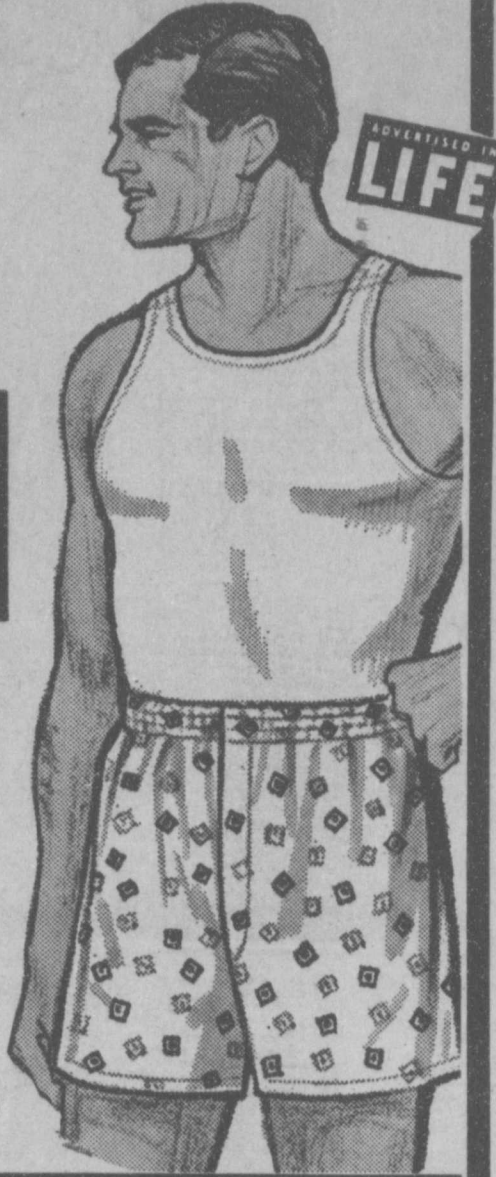

appearances was an unpleasant duty for me to perform, but each was, nonetheless, a duty. It was a duty because the State Constitution requires that the Governor make recommendations for financing state government, and because I recognize that we cannot, as a state, afford to cut back on the services we offer our people. Thusfar, none of my recommendations or any other taxations proposals have been adopted. The House of Representatives and the Senate have each passed a different tax bill. The bills have differences that are not, in my opinion, too great to be bridged by reasonable compromise. Any tax bill is unpleasant for legislators as well as for taxpayers. And any tax bill requires compromise.

The Governor, the House, and the Senate have, I believe, already agreed in principle on enough items to finance adequate appropriations over the next two years. Some members of the Legislature have, however, seemed more eager to insure that the Governor is blamed for whatever taxes are passed than they have been to discharge their own responsibilities. The question is not who is to blame if they fail, and we are forced to cut back on state services. The answer will be evident. I hope a decision will be reached on taxation and appropriations in time for other important legislation, such as the creation of needed new courts and adequate provision for the preservation of antiquities, to be considered. However, time is quickly slipping away. The Special Session, by law, must close by midnight, August 26. The conference committee, appointed by the leaders of the House and Senate to resolve the differences in the two tax bills,

held its first meeting Tuesday and adjourned without beginning its discussions. Shortly after the close of the Special Session, I shall hold a series of regional meetings over the State for the express purpose of personally reporting to the people on what this Special Session accomplished and why those things had to be accomplished for Texas.

Madera Valley Water System Opened August 19

The age-old problem of scarce and unfit water supply is giving way to the growth of modern, city-style water and sewer systems in small towns and farm areas of Texas. The opening August 19 of the Madera Valley water system, linking eight small communities in Reeves County south of Pecos, will mark the 500th water system completed in Texas' Rural Water Facilities (Poage-Aiken) Program. Development is carried on by local governments and non-profit corporations, with financing through the Farmers Home Administration, a U. S. Department of Agriculture agency. Texas leads the nation in the program, with 5,000 projects built or approved in the nation to date. The first system in Texas was located at Golinda, in Falls County south of Waco. Golinda's system supplied 27 homes when originally built in 1959, now serves 70 after ten years of community growth nourished by the water lines. The Madera Valley system takes water from a deep well near the Fort Davis Mountains in Jeff Davis County and distributes it northward to the vicinity of Pecos. A 127-mile pipeline system reaches the communities of Toyahvale, Baragosa, Brogoda, Saragosa, Verhalen, Alamo, Hoban, and Valley Farm. Four hundred homes, farms and other establishments will be served. The new system ends their dependence on water hauled from points such as Pecos and Balmorea--only towns in the area previously equipped with water systems. The Madera Valley system was built with a \$571,000 Farmers Home Administration insured loan to the non-profit Madera Valley Water Supply Corporation. With its completion, the advantage of modern water service now has been brought to 250,000 rural Texas people in the past ten years.

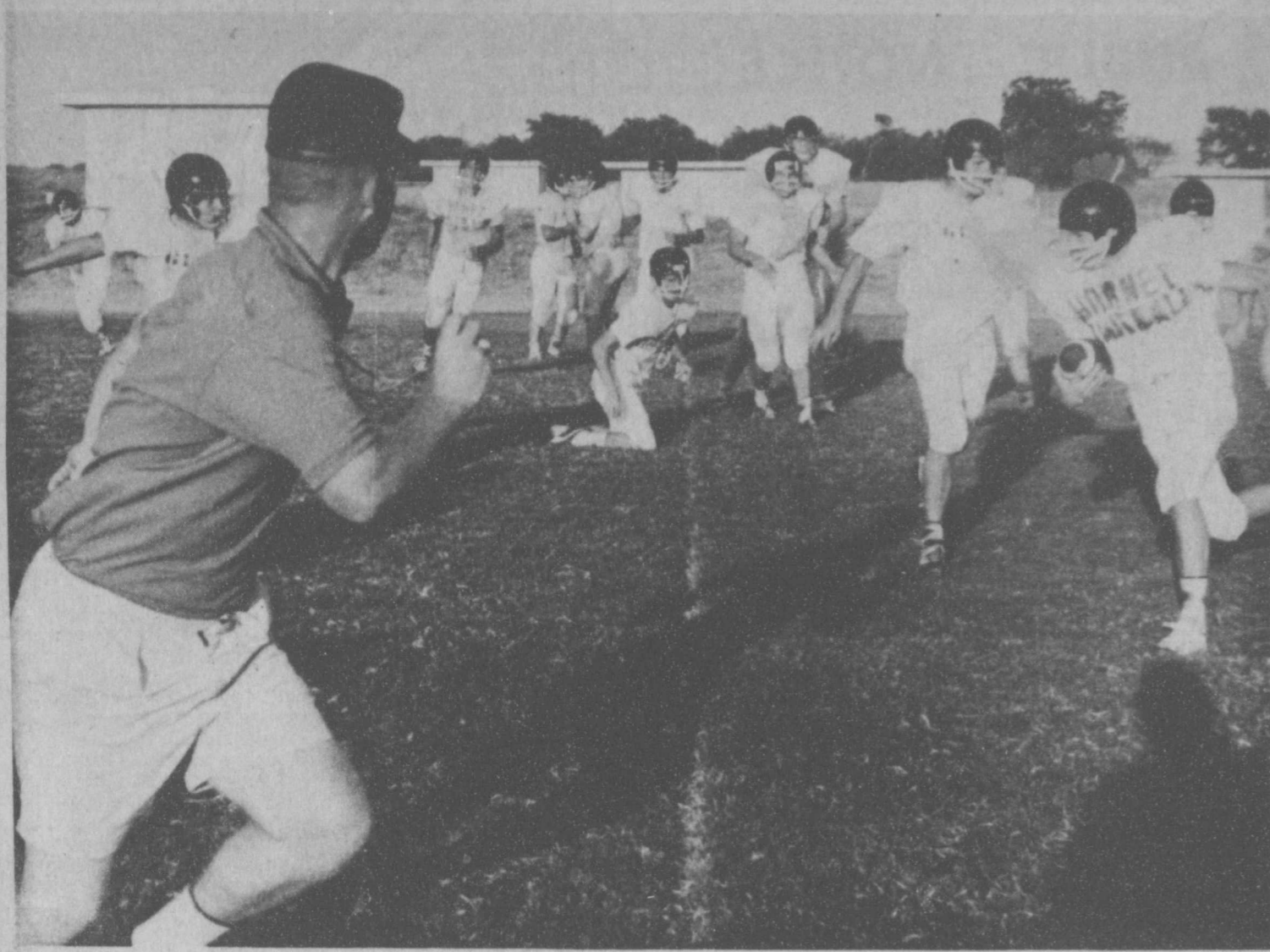

The massive traffic jam could be untangled. No injuries were received in the incident, but incident was potentially dangerous.

Firemen then took up positions on the newly construction section of Osage Road where the blaze was stopped by firemen.

Firemen were able to stop the eastward movement of the fire on relatively clear land, but the fire moved north through a wooded area where trucks and fire equipment were unable to maneuver.

The Hodge and Brim homes located on Osage Road were seemingly in the direct line of the fire, but with night fall, winds decreased and the blaze was snuffed out in the low areas of the hilly area.

A check of the area early Thursday showed that Highway Department work was effective to the east of the old home-site. A field of dry grass was not burned. The open field could have carried flames to the Hodge home about 300 yards north of the field.

Secondary fire lanes were cleared by Highway department equipment around both threatened homes. Back fires were set in potential dangerous areas to help stop the fire.

Fire Chief, Pat Patterson, estimated near 1,000 acres were scorched by the fire. Patterson said that nine units and over 100 firemen were involved in the fire fight.

Club Pro, Dave Shackelford explained the competition will be in three flights, championship, first and second flights with a flight for girls.

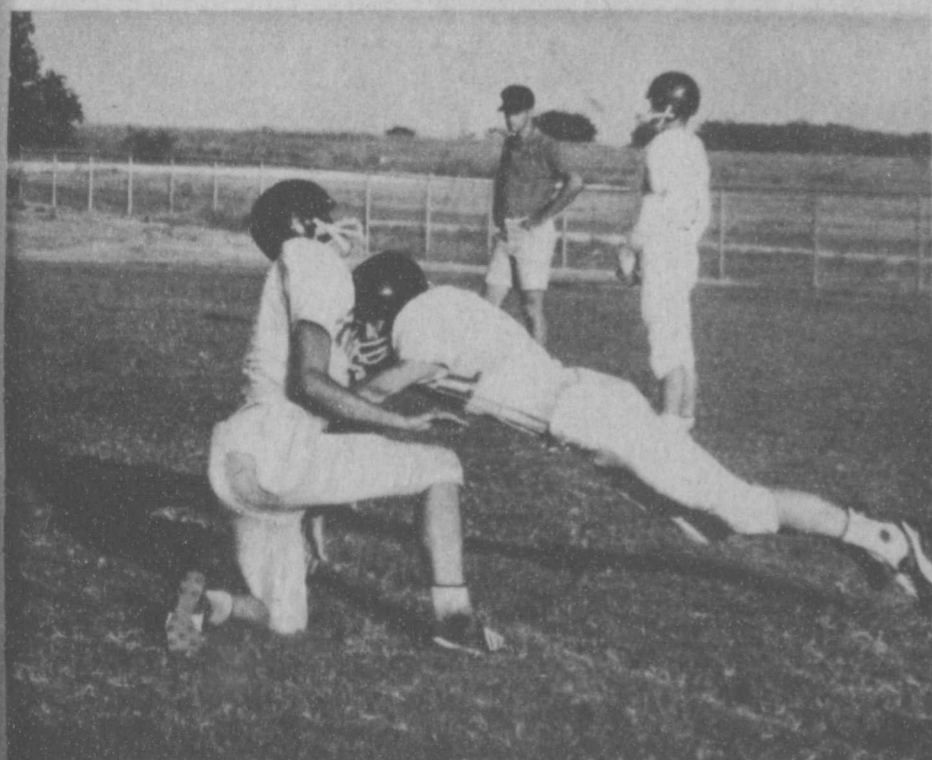
Shackelford said, "We have 18 entries and winners of each flight will be awarded trophies. . . also we will have a trophy for best putter of the tournament."
