## **COMMISSIONERS APPROVE** 1970 COUNTY BUDGET

County Commissioners approved a budget of \$650,000 for 1970 at their meeting, Monday

The budget includes \$50,000 for purchase of right of way for widening of highway 190 from Coryell County Line West to Copperas Cove.

Other expenditures expected by commissioners are similar

to 1969 budget figures. Coryell County Judge, Norman Storm , anticipates the county tax rate will remain at \$.95 per hundred in 1970. Storm noted that the budget approved, Monday was based on

Judge Storm reported that the Neighborhood Youth Corp program conducted this summer was completed Thursday with fourteen boys earning over \$300 each. The youths worked for county and city projects including hospital, road commissioners and courthouse work, Boys and girls were allowed to work 26 hours each week for \$1.30 per hour. Total payroll for the summer program was \$4200 all paid from federal sources.

Judge Storm noted this week that ground work on the new Highway 36 Association was underway. The organization will work toward improving traffic on Highway 36.

Concerning the possibility of a by-pass of Gatesville by Highway 36, Storm said, "I have received some comment on the by-pass, most of which is favorable." Storm anticipated Commissioners Court action on the "East Loop" descision on Monday, August 25.

### Five Mountain View Youths Escape Tuesday

Five Mountain View Youths made good on an escape from the maximum security unit,

Moutain View School for Boys Superintendent, George A-dams, reported the five youths, two caucasions, and three latin Americans, made their escape using a "horse trailer frame" as a ladder to clear the first

The escape was discovered at about 9:40 p.m. by school employees. Adams reported that the two white youths were apprehended in the Hay Valley area around 12:00 p.m.

The trail of the three latins lead to an area north of the Mountain View complex near Coryell Creek before the trail

Wednesday night two of the latins were caught near Valley Mills and returned to the school. One boy is still at large. Several months ago three youths excaped from the school by a similar method. Mr. Adams noted that no trace of these three boys has been found yet.

# Range Fire Destroys Over 1000 Acres East Of Town

Firemen from seven cities battled an unpredictaale range fire just east of Gatesville. Wednesday afternoon,

The alarm was answered at about 4:00 p.m. by units of the Gatesville Fire Department. Shortly after the first alarm units from surrounding towns were callled for help. Units from McGregor, Oglesby, Hamilton, Evant, Copperas Cove, State School For Boys, and three local units fought the blaze for three hours before gaining control of the blaze, The fire is aledged to have

started near a wrecking yard on Highway 84 about three miles east of Gatesville. Flames quickly spread over a ridge and moving northwest

with a strong breeze blowing. Within a short time earth moving equipment of the Texas Highway Department was at the

scene to clear a fire break to stop the uncontrolled flames. First efforts to stop the wind swept flames was in a low area just south of the unoccupied house on the old Osage Road. The "short answer" ask Highway equipment had cleared that no damages be paid to a wide area below a stock tank as flames worked down the ridge

above thm.

Flames jumped the clearing at one point and spread westward into an open field. Site seers and fireman werethreatened at the old house when flames reached the road before see FIRE page 8





appearances was an unpleasant duty for me to perform, but each was, nonetheless, a duty. was a duty because the State Constitution requires that the Governor make recommendations for financing state government, and because I recognize that we cannot, as a

state, afford to cut back on the

services we offer our people. Thusfar, none of my recommendations or any other taxations proposals have been a-The House of Representatives and the Senate have each passed a different tax bill. The bills have differences that are not, in my opinion, too great to be bridged by reasonable compromise. Any tax bill is unpleasant for legislators as well as for taxpayers. And any tax bill requires compro-

I am confident that the Legislature can and will approve a fair and adequate two-year bill this week. I would accept any of the taxes that have been passed by either House during the Special Session, and I would accept any of the taxes that I have recommended if they were passed by the Legislature.

There are always those who say they will not vote for any tax bill. And there are always those who will not vote for a speicfic tax bill because it contains or does not contain a certain item. But there are usually enough others with a broader outlook to reach a realistic settlement.

The Governor, the House, and the Senate have, I believe, already agreed in principle on enough items to finance adequate appropriations over the

next two years. Some members of the Legislature have, however, seemed more eager to insure that the Governor is blamed for whatever taxes are passed than they have been to discharge their own responsibilities. The question is not who is to blame if taxes pass, but who is to blame if they fail, and we are forced to cut back on state services.

The answer will be evident. I hope a decision will be reached on taxation and appropriations in time for other important legislation, such as creation of needed new courts and adequate provision for the preservation of antiquities, to be considered. However, time is quickly slipping away. The Special Session, by law, must close by midnight,




