NEW SWIMMING POOL MAY BE FUNDED LOCALLY

Plans for a new swimming pool-recreation area were discussed again at the City Council's Tuesday night meeting. Recent councils have all made efforts to finance and construct a new pool recreation facility. Estimates of cost range upward to \$60,000.

Council plans call for relocation of the swimming pool on the site of old Holms Stadium in the northwest corner of Raby Park. The pool is tentatively set to be located at the south end of the old playing field with tennis courts and other playground facilities at the north end.

Length discussion of the project with pool designers have been held and at the September meeting of the Council, Parks Recreation officials, Gene Chitwood, chairman, will present a proposal.

Mayor Miller, said, "if we anticipate having a pool by next year, we probably will need to sign contracts by October."

The present pool has been in operation since the 1930's

COUNCIL WORKS ON 1969-70 BUDGET

The City Councilmen discussed many municipal projects at a late night session of the council. The meeting adjourned at about 12:15 a.m., Wednesday with only two pieces of official action.

The council reviewed the list of applicants for the council seat vacated by Creston Brazzil last month. Mayor Miller reported Thursday that no action was taken but he indicated that probably a new council representative would be appointed at the regular September meeting of the council.

The council met with some residents on Leon Street concerning questions about curb

and gutter work. The council spent some time working on a budget proposal for the 1969-70 year which starts October 1, 1969.

Miller noted that the present tax rate of \$1.35 will be left the same for the 1969-70 year.

Commenting on the budget Miller said, "it will be larger this year due to the City Sales Tax revenue. Miller estimated revenue from the tax at \$45,000 however, the base could be broadened by the State Legislature in the second special session."

Miller estimated that 30 percent of all tax money will be used for street improvements,

G.S.I.D. 1st. Day Enrollment 1780

First day enrollment in the Gatesville Independent School District totaled 1780 as the areas youngsters returned to the classrooms for another year.

Enrollment is up 48 students over the first day 1733 last year and only two less than the 1967-68 opening day.

First day enrollment figures by school officials are as follows: elementary 712 up four over the 1968-69 school year, junior high 465 down five over last year and high school 604 up 48 over the 1968-69 school year.

Elementary school is anticipating a post Labor Day influx of new students which could put the total enrollment over 1800 again this year.

The fourth grade at elementary is almost averaging 31 pupils per classroom teacher. Last year elementary started the school year with 707 enrolled and quickly expanded to 760.

Default Judgement Awarded In Law Suit

John M. McBride did not answer the original petition seeking \$85,000 damages for eight plaintiffs in the prescribed 20 days and District Judge, Truman Roberts awarded six of the eight plaintiffs a default judgement.

David M. Wells and Jimmy G. Christian, two plaintiffs in the suit, took non-suits against McBride and all eight plaintiffs took non-suits against Bob Carroll.

The default judgement returned by Judge Roberts awarded Kermit Miller, Robert L. Ballard, William B. Brown, W. E. Wimberly, Barney Ray, and Elwood Walker each \$5000 actual and \$5000 exemplary damages. The default judgement totaled \$60,000.

BUSINESS LEADER FORM INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT CORP.

A group of business leaders and interested citizens have organized the Gatesville Development Corporation, non-profit, to establish connections with industrial prospects.

Following an organization meeting, Wednesday morning at 7:30 a.m., the directors of the new corporation met and elected Dr. Joe Kenworthy, president; Bobby L. Cummings, vice-president; Curtis Logan, secretary-treasurer; with Joe Skelton, Charles Wise, Price Neeley and Erle Powell as directors.

The interesting factor behind the formation of GDC was a

financial need of LTC, the new recreation facility planned just south of the Gatesville Country Club. L. T. C. considered application for a Small Business Administration (SBA) loan for construction.

During inquiries individuals hit on the idea of the GDC, which acts as a community interest in SBA, 502 loans.

The 502 loans are industrial business loans for capital improvements. Under the loan program, the SDA works with a community development corporation to complete loans to private business firms.

Corporation director - officer, Curtis Logan explained that the SDA is seeking to involve the local community in loans made to businesses. Logan noted that with the formation of GDC prospects interested in building branch plants or other facilities in the Central Texas area will possibly consider Gatesville.

The SBA receives applications all the time from firms planning re-locations of facilities.

The new organization's president, Dr. Joe Kenworthy, has had experience with SBA operations and explained Wednesday that the SBA 502 program is aimed at helping industrial development through community development.

Kenworthy told a group of 16 Gatesville citizens at the organization meeting that the GDC would "act as middlemen" in SBA Loans. He noted that through loan investigations and with community development a major factor of the SBA has had a 1/19 of one percent rate of failure on this type of loan.

Money loaned through the 502 program is financed at five percent interest. The SBA contributes 45 percent of the total loan, local or area banks participate for 40 percent and the community development corporation supplies the remaining 15 percent of the loan.

The SBA met with the LTC directors, last week to discuss the loan possibilities. A statistical paper showing the impact of a 100 worker plant on a community was presented to the group.

Statistics show that 100 new workers mean 359 more people in the area, 100 more in personal income per year, \$329,000 increase in bank assets, three new retail firms, 97 more passenger cars, 65 more persons employed in non manufacturing and \$331,000 more in retail sales per year.

The effects of 100 new workers touches in all aspects of community life to some degree.

One community in North Carolina accomplished a complete "about face" from a steady decline to expanding industrial area.

Coryell Receives Grazing Privileges

Coryell County has been included in an eight county Central Texas area now eligible for special grazing and haying privileges because of drought conditions.

The local ASCS office received notification and instructions concerning the special privileges, Tuesday.

Office Manager, Clois Stone reported, "There are 749 farms in Coryell County who could

be eligible under the grazing-haying program." He noted, "Farmers will be permitted to lease acres used for diverted acres from the reduction on wheat and feed grain programs."

The special privileges allow farmers to lease diverted acres for 30 day intervals, not to exceed October 14, 1969.

At the ending date all land will be released back to the farm at no charge. Charges for haying and grazing privileges will be \$1.00 per acre for each 30 day period.

Stone indicated that the permit had been authorized due to long period of dry-hot weather. Stock farmers have been found to sell cattle and calves at below normal weights and to sell parts of foundation herds.

Some local agriculture men estimate that the weather will have an effect for at least two years. Loss to grassland was extensive and the late August rains were a welcome sight.

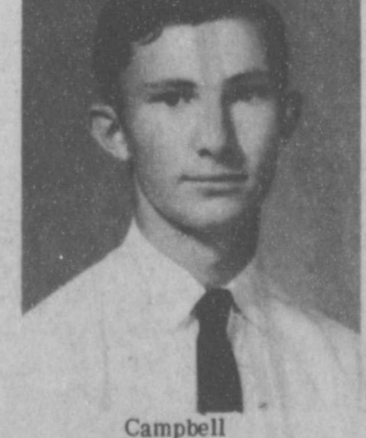

Early in September, Carolyn Delano will join us as our newest V. O. E. trainee.

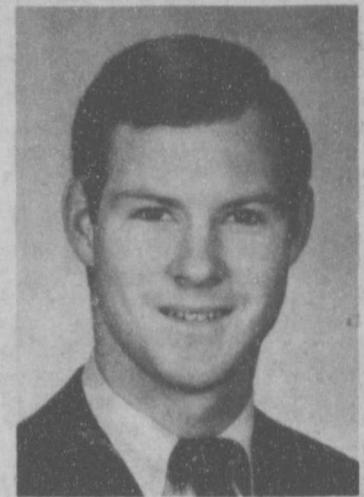

missible to include items bearing commercial names. If questions arise about the appropriateness of an item being considered, clearance should be made with the Chapter office before commitment is made.

Items are:

Ballpoint pens, pen-sized flashlights with batteries, small pen knives, windproof - type cigarette lighters with accompanying package of lighter flints, plastic soap case, small packages of writing paper with self-seal envelopes, small address book, plastic toothbrush holder, terry washcloth (other than white or red), nail clipper, plastic cigarette case, comb, mailing-size voice tapes (reels of 3" tapes - 150" length), small tins of nuts or nonmelting candies - vacuum packed, small plastic snapshot holders, small kitchen size and sand-which-type plastic bags (minimum of 3 - not wax paper type), "Wipe and Shine" - packet black shoe polish, Pocket games (small enough to put in pocket or plastic bag, small decks of playing cards, chess, pinocle), pocket or diary-type calendars, wash and dries, pre-moistened towelettes, adhesive bandages - approximately 1" x 3", "C" batteries (long-life type) for transistor radios, white cotton socks, soap holders (suction type).

Do not include the following: Gifts in breakable containers, food packed in nonvacuum containers, medicaments (including foot powder and insect repellent), reading and printed or advertising materials, alcoholic beverages, sports items, (like softball), religious material.

Provision should be made with representatives of groups participating in this program to assure that no inappropriate items are included.

Now THEREFORE, he is ordained by the City of Gatesville, Texas acting by and through its City Council, Section 1.

That before any construction, maintaining or repairs by any Public Utility, contractor or repairman is made a permit be obtained from the City Secretary of the City of Gatesville, Texas showing the scope of work to be done, time, place and plans for restoring the street, alley or public property to its original state as time of beginning such construction, maintenance or repairs.

Section 2
Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction be fined in any sum not exceeding two hundred and no/100 dollars.

Section 3
All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are to the extent of such conflict is hereby repealed.

Section 4
The fact that there is no adequate ordinance in effect to prohibit the ditching or openings in the streets, alleys or on public property within the City of Gatesville, Texas, creates an emergency and a public necessity requiring the suspension of the Charter rule which requires that all ordinances be passed on three separate readings and such rule is hereby suspended and this ordinance is finally passed of its introduction as an emergency ordinance and of its publication.

PUBLIC NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE DITCHING OR EXCAVATING INTO ANY STREET, ALLEY OR PUBLIC PROPERTY FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSTRUCTION, MAINTENANCE OR REPAIRS BY ANY PUBLIC UTILITY, CONTRACTOR OR REPAIRMAN WITHOUT FIRST OBTAINING A PERMIT FROM THE CITY SECRETARY OF THE CITY OF GATESVILLE BEFORE ANY CONSTRUCTION OR REPAIR IS MADE; FIXING A MAXIMUM PENALTY; AND, DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS: the ditching, openings for maintenance or repairs in the streets, alleys and public property within the city has interfered with the flow of traffic, creating hazards, inconvenience to the public and failure to restore the openings to a state of repair within the city.

Section 1
That before any construction, maintaining or repairs by any Public Utility, contractor or repairman is made a permit be obtained from the City Secretary of the City of Gatesville, Texas showing the scope of work to be done, time, place and plans for restoring the street, alley or public property to its original state as time of beginning such construction, maintenance or repairs.

My Dear Gatesville Friends,

Each new contact is an experience of giving and receiving in itself - an experience upon which character and personality can be framed and molded.

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Pecan Weevils Will Soon Emerge

The Pecan Weevil, a very destructive insect of pecans, will soon be putting in an appearance. The weevils begin emerging from the soil in August and early September, says L. R. Green, assistant Extension entomologist at Texas A & M University.

The adult weevil is a brownish "snout beetle" that resembles the boll weevil but is much larger. The female has a snout which is as long as her body; however, the male has a somewhat shorter snout.

The adults feed on pecans before the shells begin to harden and the feeding punctures often cause the nuts to drop, says Green. A second type of damage occurs after the nut kernels have begun hardening. The female chews a hole in the pecan hull and deposits her eggs in small pockets in the nuts. White legless grubs hatch from the eggs and feed inside the nuts during the fall, causing destruction of the kernel and adherence of the shuck to the shell. As the grubs mature, they emerge from the nut, drop to the ground and burrow into

the soil for pupation. The entire life cycle requires from two to three years, explains Green.

Control is based upon application of insecticides after the adult weevils begin to emerge from the soil. To be effective, insecticides must be applied before extensive egg laying has occurred, emphasizes the entomologist. Trees should be examined each year in early August.

Inspection for the weevil is relatively simple. A canvas or sheet should be spread on the ground under the pecan tree. The lower limbs then may be jarred to cause the weevils to fall to the cloth below. Nut clusters should also be checked for egg-laying punctures.

When three or more weevils per tree are found, insecticides should be applied for control, DDT or carbaryl (Sevin) are suggested for use in home orchards. Asinphosmethyl (Guthion) or EPN are effective and labeled for use in commercial orchards or by professional applicators. Instructions and waiting periods given on the insecticide containers should be closely followed, cautions Green. Additional information on control of the pecan weevil is available from the offices of county agricultural agents, Green said.

Poage Set For Election

As most of you know I am at this time in Texas. Congress is in recess but we are trying to be as helpful as we can to those who have problems they want to discuss. There will be some member of my staff in the Waco Office every day during this recess. I will personally be in most parts of the District at one time or another.

As I see it, your Representative cannot represent you without some firsthand familiarity with the conditions, the problems, and the people of the area he represents. I, therefore, feel that these contacts at home are one of the most important functions of my office and I always make it a point to try to visit in as many parts of our District as possible each year. While I hope to be home later in the Fall, and of course, while I will be home a good deal next Spring, if I should have an opponent in the primary, I want to see as many of our people as possible this Summer that they may express themselves on matters now pending before the Congress.

I like to think of the Congressman as doing an output job in Washington. Of course, the output can never rise any higher than the intake. That intake job must be done, from the standpoint of local representation, in the District the Congressman represents. From the standpoint of national interests it must be done all over the country and indeed in view of our tremendous obli-

gations and world commitments it must be done all over the world. Our Presidents, regardless of party, have long recognized this. They properly make periodic visits to all parts of the world.

If the Legislative Branch is to remainco-equalwith the Executive Branch, Members of Congress must do the same thing, especially where their Committee obligations involve a special knowledge of conditions in widespread areas.

I think the Members of our Agriculture Committee should have firsthand knowledge of agriculture in every section of the United States, and for that matter in the lands which are competitive with our producers, and certainly we need to make all the contacts possible in areas where we may sell American agricultural products. There is, of course, never sufficient time for any one individual to see and to know all that he should but I am so convinced of the importance of the intake work that I never look upon a visit home as a

vacation but merely as an opportunity to do work which is just as important as that which is done in Washington.

Need Federal Law For Interstate Taxes

There ought to be a law setting federal standards for taxation of companies which do business in several states, according to the National Association of Manufacturers. The Association says one firm in Maryland with neither assets nor employees outside its Maryland location, but wishing to make an effective selling effort to customers in Alabama, is called on to file, in addition to required state returns, more than 110 separate local sales tax and use tax forms.

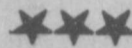

Mrs. Pancake reported they traveled to Thurmont, Maryland near Camp David and went sight-seeing as far as was allowed.

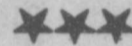
