Work Begins On New Library

Work began Tuesday on the new Gatesville Public Library facility as workmen began taking off the top floor of the old Chamlee Building. The initial stage of construction involves removal of the upper floor in a 30 day period.

An estimated 3000 board feet of lumber will be removed along with tons of stone from the thick walls.

The initial project will leave only the east and west walls one-story high and the structural roof. The project cost will be nearly \$100,000, 50 percent of which is paid for under a federal grant. The new library should be completed by January 20, 1970, the last day of the construction contract.

THREE HOMES ENTERED OVER LABOR DAY

Three homes were reported broken into over the Labor Day weekend, reports Sheriff Winfred Cummings.

The H. O. Walker home near Arnett, the Burt Wittie home on FM 1829, and the Ray Hines home on Coryell Creek were all reported broken into, Sunday.

At the Walker home many valuable items were taken including an old Seth Thomas clock, a set of silverware service for eight, a toaster, a dozen men's shirts, four pairs of

pants, one suit, bed sheets, pillow cases, and two shot guns.

At the Wittie home, thieves made off with a table radio, a 1/2" electric drill, eleven ladies dresses, two house coats, and a window fan.

Sheriff Cummings said that the Ray Hines place could have been broken into in the last seven months. "It could be that the three 'Breakins' are connected", said Cummings.

The Hines home was ransacked completely. Taken were a bed, a pair of box springs, two mattresses, a combination record player and radio, a coffee table, two end tables, a large mirror, a yellow chair, a brown chair, a ladies suit, several ladies dresses, several pair of shoes, many kitchen items, a rifle, garden tools, an air conditioner, two heaters and an ice chest.

The estimated loss at the Hines home will be nearly \$700. Investigation into the three incidents will continue reported Sheriff Cummings.

SCHOOL IS OPEN

1970 Wheat Allotment Set For Coryell County

The 1970 Wheat Allotment for Coryell County is 10,397 acres, according to Robert L. Melbern of the Coryell County Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

All wheat allotments notices will be mailed at one time and will be mailed today, September 5, 1969, Melbern said.

The 1970 national wheat allotment of 45.5 million acres was announced by Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin on August 11. This is a 12 percent reduction from the 1969 national allotment of 51.6 million acres.

"The 1970 wheat program is expected to help give the nation a better position in world trade while at the same time it tries to bring wheat production more into line with needs," said the ASC chairman.

Features of the 1970 Wheat

Program, according to Chairman Melbern, include:

1. The national average price-support loan level will be \$1.25 per bushel, unchanged from recent years. This level is being maintained in an effort to achieve maximum utilization of wheat through increased exports and continued large livestock feed use.

2. A diversion program at the maximum payment rate of 50 percent of county loan rates is aimed at avoiding production of 80 to 90 million bushels of unneeded wheat. This feature will allow producers to tailor their plantings by diverting up to one-half of their acreage allotments while maintaining incomes through diversion payments.

FOUR CASES SET FOR COUNTY COURT TUESDAY

Two negligent homicide cases, a DWI case and a violation of the school attendance law was set for trial in County Court, September 9.

A petit jury list of 24 Coryell County citizens was mailed this week for possible jury duty.

The negligent homicide cases came after a head-on collision of two pickups last January 16 just east of Gatesville. The accident killed Robert Charles Gribble, then 19, of Gatesville.

The January 16 accident injured five other youths ranging in age from 16 to 22.

The two cases of negligent homicide involved the alleged drivers of the two pickups in the January 16 crash. Named in the two complaints are Joe Ed Tatum and Ellery Ross Sheets.

Judge Norman Storm indicated this week that the court docket schedules testimony in the Joe Ed Tatum case first.

Other cases to be held during this session of county court include one DWI case, an appeal of a speeding violation from justice court and a violation of the compulsory school atten-

The legislative leadership deserves whatever kicking around comes its way over the child of darkness called a tax bill.

This is not to judge the bill on its merits — or lack thereof — for certainly the big food tax and little gas tax have been indicted venomously already.

But what else could be expected from the shuttered rooms where a handful of men, brazen with power and seniority, gave birth to the thing — with only a tight clique of lobbyists for midwives.

The whole story of the tax bill has been one of the leadership making mockery of the idea of doing the public's business in public.

There are honest and logical and legitimate reasons for working out knotty problems in private, without the hot winds of pressure blowing over the shoulder. But if that be true and if that be the decision, then it should be honestly announced as the policy.

From the secret sessions of the conference committee to the final, ludicrous bomb threat lock-out of the press from the House chamber, the leadership has thumbed its nose repeatedly at the public and the press.

Gov. Ben Barnes and speaker Gus Mutscher must accept the blame, for the fault lies with them and their chosen henchmen.

Barnes is the prime offender, but let it be said in fairness that he does less complaining when the news media makes its points about the secrecy. Barnes also is much more polished than Mutscher in slipping it to the public.

Barnes coordinated and hosted most of the secret sessions of the conference committee writing the tax bill. The lieutenant governor's sent man for the tax bill, Sen. Bill Moore of a rural district around Bryan, is from the old school of politics, a school that gave America the "smoke-filled room" and perpetuated itself in office

without worry about its image or its public.

Moore was the man — call it haughty or call it gutsy — who emerged from secret sessions of the tax conference to announce that the bill would exempt auto race tracks from admissions taxes because a big, new track is being built in his district.

The rest of the Senate "team" is less strongly than Barnes and Moore; in fact, perhaps they are go-along-to-get-along people. But they deserve to be on the same secret session indictment: Doc Blanchard, Lubbock; Don Kennard, Fort Worth; Jack Strong, Longview, and Ike Harris, Dallas.

Mutscher began his role in the trail of secrecy by breaking a promise to Rep. John Hannah of Lufkin.

On the day of the appointment of the conference committee, Hannah tried to sponsor a resolution binding the House conferees to attend only open meetings. But Mutscher made him pull down the resolution, promising that he would see to it that all meetings were open.

The meetings were closed. It was brought to Mutscher's attention. He did nothing.

Mutscher's counterpart for Moore is Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria, a tough little lawyer who knows he can't be hurt politically by the big city newspapers which cover the capitol.

That same assumption goes for the bulk of Mutscher's team — Bill Healy, Paducah; John Traeger, Seguin; and Forest Harding, San Angelo.

The titular chairman of the House conferees, Rep. Ben Atwell of Dallas, largely ignores most of what is going on and being said. He is well entrenched in the Legislature and in Dallas, so your opinion doesn't really cut much ice.

Is it really surprising that the folks paying the bills — grocery bills and tax bills — didn't give the legislators a pay raise in the Aug. 5 election?

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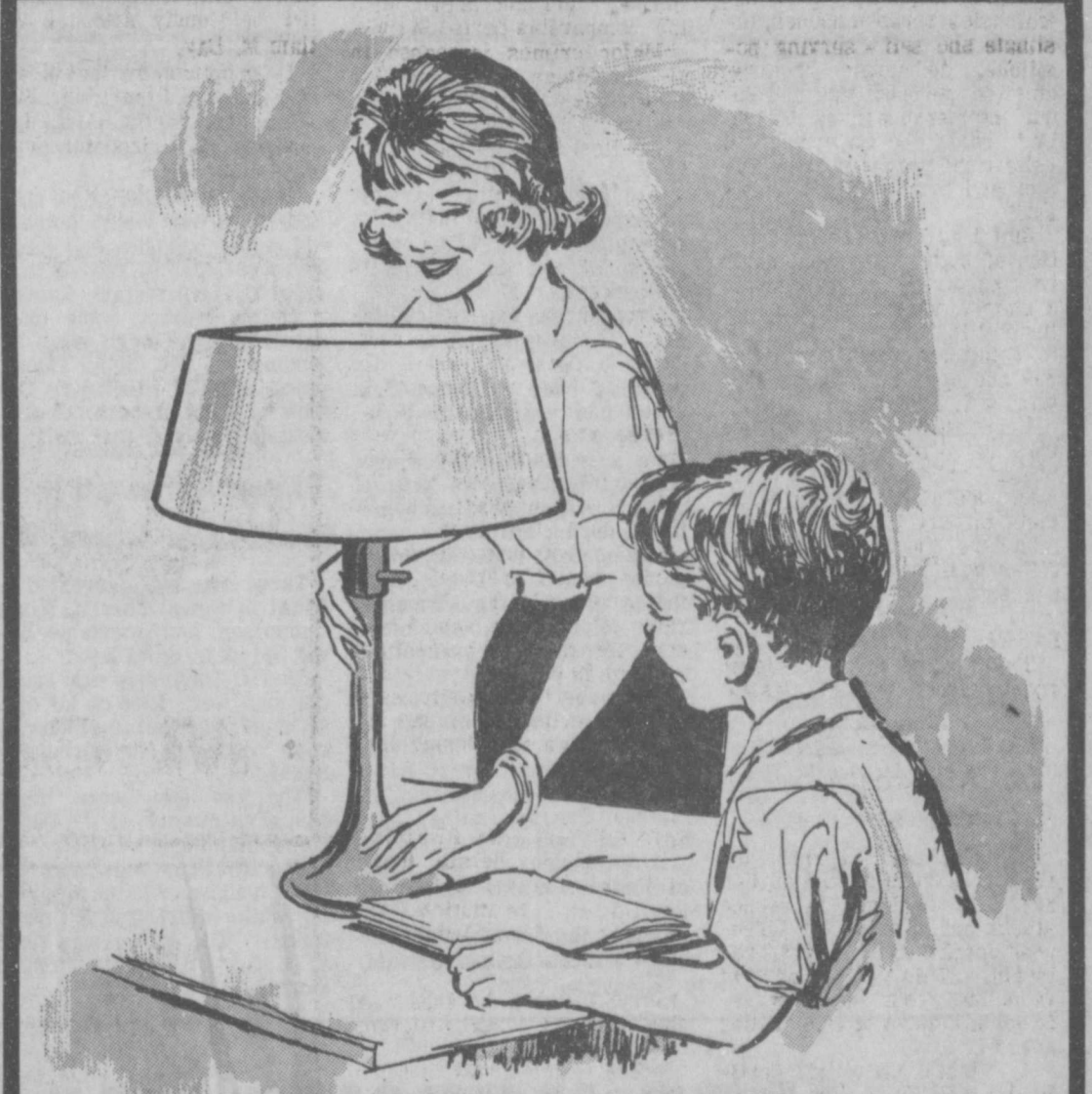

A majority of colleges give some attention to state and local government in introductory reading assignments and lectures, but only a handful give substantial coverage in basic courses, according to a survey by the U. S. Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations.

The situation is "even more bleak" at the intermediate and advance course levels, the Commission said. It urged strengthening of political science courses dealing with local and state governments and intergovernmental relations.

Students "cannot really come to grips with the roots of the urban crisis, the plight of rural America and the pathology of racial discord if intergovernmental dimensions of these critical public policy questions are ignored in the classroom," it said.

ROAD PROGRAM APPROVED

State Highway Department has approved a \$52 million highway safety and farm to market road improvement program for 1970.

Projects include construction work on 6,373 miles, to cost \$51.2 million; and right of way and relocation assistance totaling \$94.7 million. Some \$871,000 was reserved for later assignment.

About 55 percent of the work will be on state and U. S.-numbered highways. Forty five percent is assigned to Texas' farm to market road system.

Most of the work will serve to increase safety on the highways, and a large portion will go to reconstruction.

HAULING JURISDICTION

Railroad Commission has agreed to let more than 100 oilfield haulers pool their efforts to get a broader authority for hauling. The 100 companies are asking the Railroad Commission to expand their jurisdiction to include hauling of any "iron and steel

articles." If jurisdiction is granted, any oilfield hauler could carry any iron or steel material.

Common carriers, who have jurisdiction to haul anything, and oilfield haulers with wide jurisdiction to haul iron and steel are opposing the application.

INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE

That "no transfer" rule of the University Interscholastic League will be the subject of an interim House study. During the first special session of the Legislature, Rep. Bill Swanson of Houston gained passage of a resolution calling for the study.

Swanson said the UIL also thinks there should be some appeal of the one-year bar for athletes who change schools, so the committee will look for an acceptable means.

SHORT SNORTS

Agriculture Department has given Rio Grande Valley cotton farmers in Cameron, Willacy and southern parts of Hidalgo and Starr counties until September 15 to clear fields of stalks under the pink bollworm control program.

Attorney General Martin says he will go to Washington to oppose that section of tax bill now being considered by a U. A. Senate Committee that would remove the exempt status of municipal bonds.

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LAWMAKERS NOW IN SECOND SPECIAL SESSION

With the first special session of the Legislature a failure, Gov. Preston Smith called lawmakers back for a second try at writing a biennial budget and a balancing tax bill.

Midnight gavels fell August 26 with neither task accomplished after tax conference committees were unable to break a stubborn deadlock.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes blamed the first session impasse on House refusal to Place beer and liquor under the sales tax. House Speaker Gus Mutscher said that was a "smokescreen" masking other reasons for the Senate's refusal to come to terms with the Representatives.

A Senate proposal to place food under a 2.5 percent (reduced rate) sales tax was batted down unanimously (147-0) by the House. Thereafter, negotiations never budged beyond that point.

In calling for the second session, Governor Smith laid it on the line.

"We have been treated to a spectacle of petty quarreling, jealousies between houses, obstinate and self-serving positions, demagogic rhetoric, childish personalities and undue interference from the lobby," said the Governor, "I believe the people of Texas are sick and tired of it. I know I am."

Smith warned that every function of state government would be "paralyzed or thrown into a state of uncertainty and confusion" if the new session failed to come up with a certifiable revenue appropriation by September 1.

Legislature responded by banging through emergency 60-day budget proposals which would operate the state government through October 31 while members sought to reconcile differences over long-range finances.

3. The national wheat acreage allotment of 45.5 million acres is designed to reduce stocks and reverse the three-year upward trend in carryover levels. This is a 12 percent reduction from the 1969 national allotment of 51.6 million acres.

4. Wheat marketing certificates will be paid on 48 percent of the projected production on the allotted acres of participating producers. For 1969, certificates at a record \$1.52 per bushel are being paid on 43 percent of projected production. They are adding more than \$800 million to the farm value of wheat. Payments per bushel reflecting the difference between wheat parity on July 1, 1970, and the average loan rate announced today will be as high or higher for the 1970 crop.

5. The option under which a producer can substitute the planting of wheat for feed grains or feed grains for wheat in any combination will be available. This increases farm efficiency by providing producers the flexibility of adjusting acreages to field sizes and of producing the more suitable crop for their particular operations.

Details of the 1970 wheat acreage allotment program will be publicized, "just as soon as we on the county committee become fully acquainted with them," he said. The details will be much the same as for the 1969 crop. He pointed out that payments to be made would be subjected to any limitations that might be required by Congress.

The ASC Chairman also said, "Wheat farmers will be interested in Secretary Hardin's

safety program, but a new plan now has been submitted.

Highway Safety Bureau of the U. S. Department of Transportation is reviewing the second effort.

Governor Smith was notified by Robert Brenner, acting director of the bureau, that the plan presented last December, before Smith took office, was incomplete.

Comments on the new plan are encouraging, says Smith, but final action is not expected until fall.

Meanwhile, said the governor, safety efforts are continuing through the Texas Education Agency, the State Highway Department, the Department of Public Safety and the Texas Department of Public Health.

CRIME RATE UP

Col. Wilson Speir, Department of Public Safety director, says Texas crime rate for the first six months of 1969 was 7.7 percent higher than the comparable period in 1968.

Major crimes increased in all categories except murder and homicide, where the rate declined 8.8 percent.

Greatest increase was in robbery, . . . up 31.2 percent. Aggravated assaults increased 20.9 percent, auto theft 14.8 percent, burglary 9.7 percent, rapes 7.2 percent and thefts 3.9 percent.

Urban areas experienced the greatest increase--8.5 percent. In rural areas, the average hike was less than one percent. In cities over 100,000, the increase was almost nine percent. In those from 50,000 to 100,000, increase was 7.1 percent and in cities of 25,000 to 50,000, 18.8 percent.

Crime clearance rates for the period was 27 percent . . . the same as 1968. Clearance rate for murders was 84 percent, for rapes 66 percent and robbery 39 percent.

DPS noted that statistics show a major crime every one and one-third minutes during January-June.

SADLER CENSURE REFUSED

After lengthy debate, House of Representatives rejected a proposed resolution reprimanding Texas Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler for failing to cooperate with lawmakers.

Rep. Francis Farenthold of Corpus Christi introduced the resolution (and resubmitted it to the second called session) charging that Sadler misled a House committee inquiring about his handling of salvage operations on ancient Spanish ships which sank off Padre Island more than 400 years ago.

Sadler, appearing before the House rules committee, admitted his original testimony on the issue was evasive and misleading. However, he claimed his tactics were necessary because of the delicate nature of the subject under inquiry.

In an opinion for the guidance of Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar, Martin clarified securities authorized for school depository funds.

In a third opinion, Martin said that a new law does not define

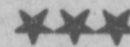

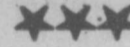

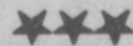

The bride chose a blue double knit dress with white accessories and carried the gamilla from her bridal bouquet.

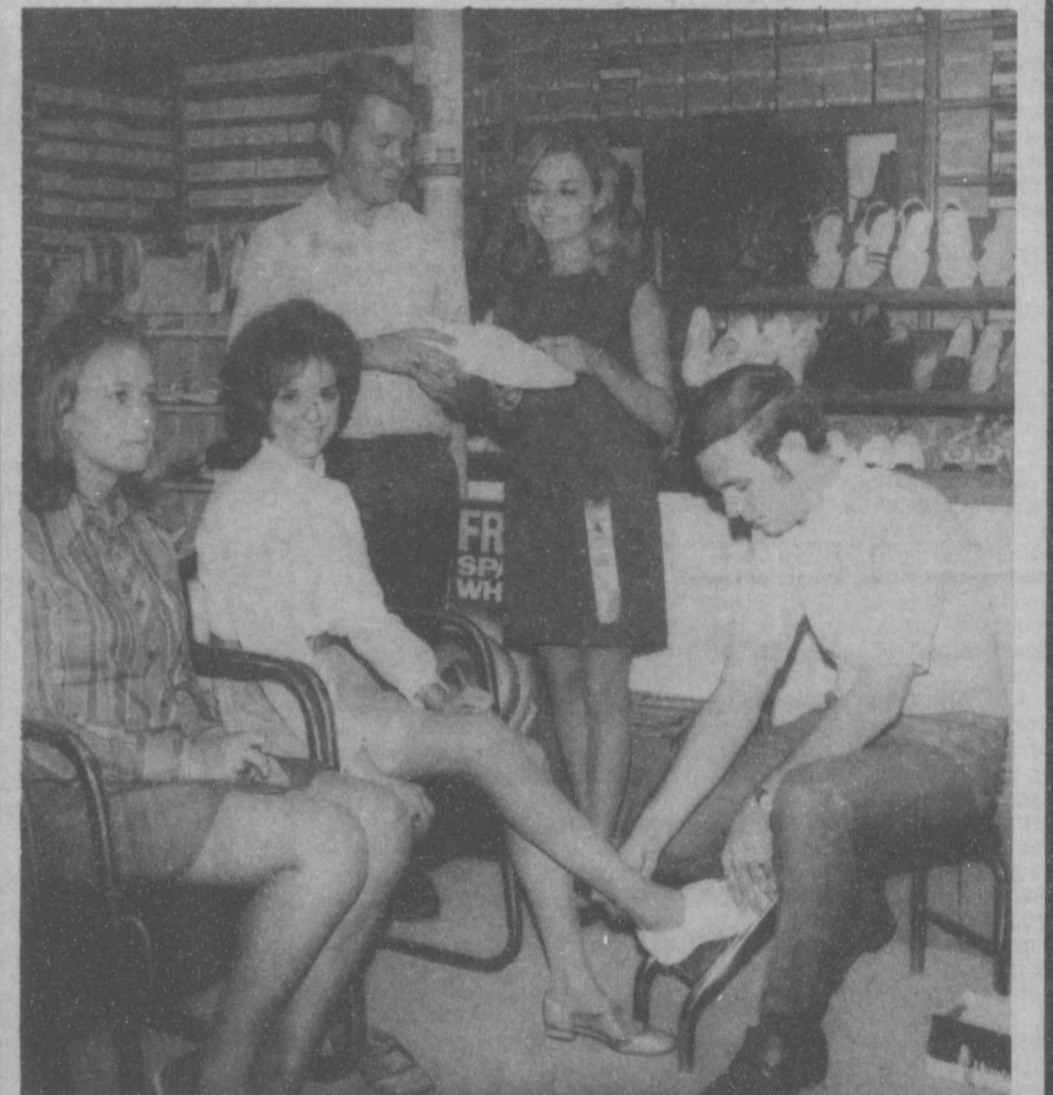

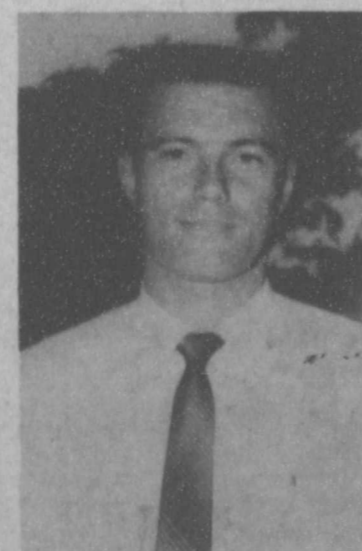

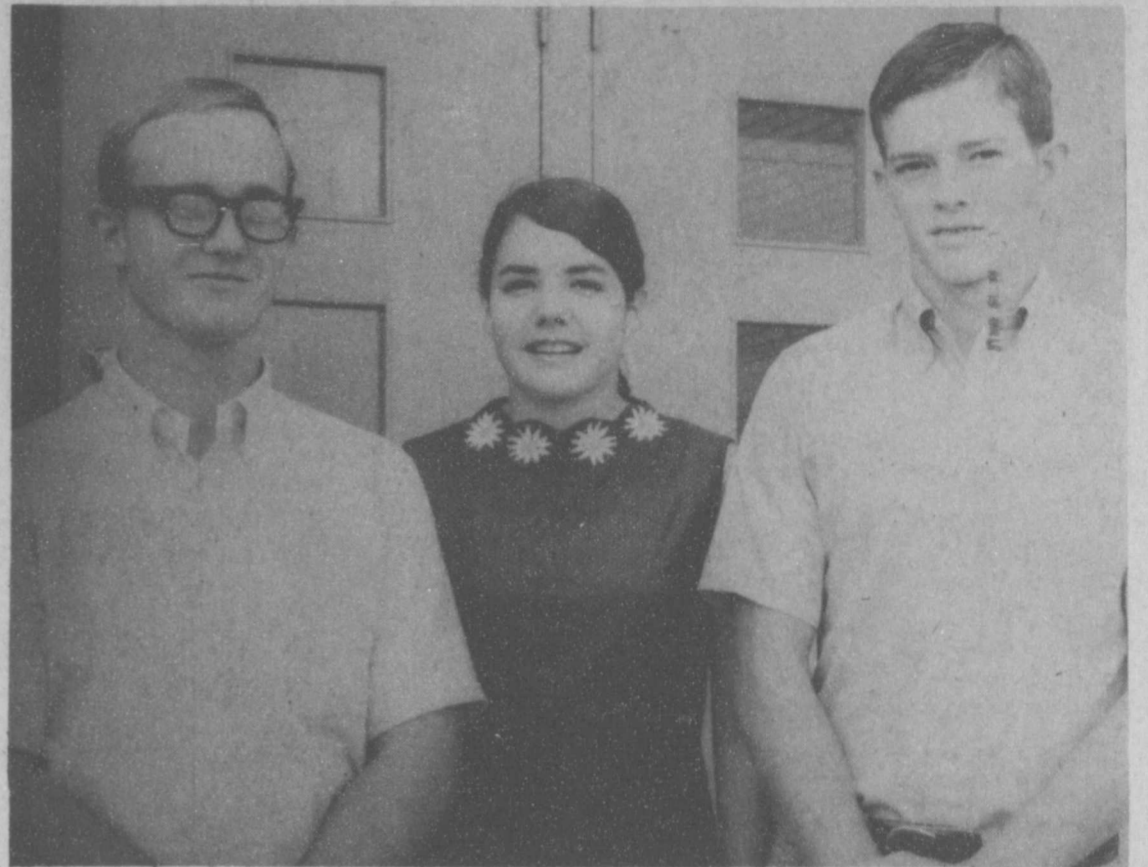
