Miller and the council are hoping to effect the annexation petition of the people of


Mrs. Clara Anice Turner Here

The plan accepted by the council varies only slightly from preliminary plans worked up in recent weeks. The time table for the construction of the pool are set to complete work on the pool for use next summer.

The bid advertising should take place within the next two weeks with contract signing hoped for in October by city officials.

Financing the pool construc-tion will be by time warrants. Cost of the swimming pool have been estimated at \$65,000.

Parks and Recreation De-partment head, Gene Chitwood, describes the pool as in the shape of a "plus sign". One quadrant of the pool will be deep water for diving purposes with three diving boards placed around the 12 feet deep water.

All other areas of the pool are described by Chitwood as "swimming water", at depths from under two feet deep to four feet deep. The shallowest water will be in the quadrant opposite the "diving well" and will have a "bubbling fountain" serving a two-fold pur-

Permanent Extension of National

Wool Act Recommended by TS & GRA

"We recommend that the National Wool Act be extended permanently with no limitations set on payments," said Joe York, Jr. of Brackettbille, president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, when making the organization's wishes known to U. S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Clifford Hardin.

York also presented eight other recommendations to the Secretary during a recent "Listening Congerence" at Texas A & M University in College Station. Hardin was in Texas to hear the agricultural woes of ranch and farm organizations. This was the fifth meeting of this type in the

"We are not going to spell out a complete farm program to Congress. It might be called a department disposal of some type, but we want to sharpup the problems as we see them and will attempt to present possible alternatives for improving the operation of the various commodities and the total farm progarm," said


Among the other recommen-

dations made by TS & GRA President York were: "Sec. 708 of the National Wool Act to include Market and applied research, new product development, promotion and advertising for wool and mohair; Finding methods of controlling predators that do not require so much labor; Top priority should be given to the total eradication of screwworms from the North American continent; Wool and lamb imports should be placed under limitation controls to protect domestic producers and related industries;

Immediate assistance is needed in correcting the shortage of shearers and other ranch labor; An in-depth study is needed to determine the solution to problems confronting mohair on the export market; Acceleration of research programs; Limits on FHA operation and acquisition loans need to be adjusted to current economic situation

In summarizing the day's activities, Secretary Hardin expressed his belief that the end result of these meetings would be beneficial to both the producers and the nation.

1 head iceberg lettuce 2 chicken bouillon cubes,

34 cup water

2 tablespoons margarine

2 tablespoons lemon juice

Creamy Iceberg Soup

1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon white pepper

1/2 cup onion rings

spoons corn starch

2 cups milk 1/4 cup white wine or 3 tablespoons water and 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Croutons, garnish Core, rinse and drain lettuce; shred enough to measure 4 cups, packed. Chill any remaining lettuce for later use. Mix shredded lettuce with bouillon cubes, water and lemon juice in blender; whir until smooth. Saute onion in margarine in saucepan until tender-crisp; remove onion from pan. Mix corn starch, salt, pepper and nutmeg into margarine in pan; stir in milk. Cook, stirring until mixture comes to a boil and is thickened. Mix in wine and lettuce mixture. Add sauteed onion; heat. Serve hot with croutons. Makes 4(3/4 cup) servings.

Sponsors Hearing Aid Course



Growing public interest in hearing aids and the search for solutions to hearing problems has prompted the creation of a new course at New York City Community College, entitled "Hearing Aid Dispensing." The National Hearing Aid Society

has donated educational materials and textbooks for the course, taught by NHAS official Alfred R. Dunlavy, New York City, (above, right.)

Raymond Z. Rich, president of NHAS, explains that the course has been designed to educate persons interested in hearing problems and the use of hearing aids. Study included proper fitting of hearing aids, and the evaluating of their effectiveness. Technical aspects of hearing aids, such as circuitry, frequency responses, sound physics, and ear anatomy were also coversive view of the subject.

The inauguration of the college course is only part of the NHAS efforts to accommodate the public need for information about the hearing field The Society has recognized the importance of reaching the many hearing handicap ped persons in the country who are reluctant to seek corrective help.

Over 60,000 copies of the popular NHAS booklet "How to Choose the Right Hearing Aid for You" have been distributed in the last few years. The booklet answers the most commonly asked questions about hearing aids and hearing aid dealers. Such questions as, "If I wear a hearing aid will I become too depen-dent on it?", "Can I wear a hearing aid that cannot be seen?", and "How can I make sure that I choose a reputable hearing aid dealer?" It also features a special section explaining how to determine if there is a hearing loss, and

what can be done about it. Rich indicated that a new, updated edition of the booklet is coming off the press. It will cover much material included in earlier editions, but with special attention to current problems and solutions.

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

TAX REFORM—1969 EDITION

We are all interested in sound, constructive tax reform. It should be based on a careful analysis of the nation's needs and the most equitable way to attain them.

The recently passed House bill, "Tax Reform Act of 1969," adopted after only two days of consideration of the 368-page document, contains serious distortions which should be rectified before the Senate approves it.

One of the most serious drawbacks is the bill's long-term negative implications for capital formation. We should be thinking of the kind of tax system that will be appropriate to the economic conditions that will prevail for the long term after the boom is over. The tax system should not penalize job creating, domestic capital formation.

Serious consideration should be given to possible economic and other effects, and indeed, to whether or not capital gains should even be considered part of regular income taxation.

The proposed change of rules governing the taxation of deferred compensation is a striking example of complicating the tax even though no abuse has been shown and where there is only a slight revenue effect.

These are but a few examples of areas where it is hoped the Senate Finance Committee will give serious consideration, before releasing the bill for a vote on the floor.

Taxes will be with us for a long time-so why rush legislation through-when a little more time will result in a better tax code for all concerned?

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

Rye bread: baked ham; corned beef, horseradish and salad dressing; shredded carrot and raisin with mayonnaise; salmon salad; swiss cheese.

Cinnamon Bread: cream cheese and chopped nuts; diced apple and dates with salad dressing. Raisin Bread: pineapple and cream cheese

Weiner Buns: grilled weiners; creamed turkey. Hamburger buns: egg salad; dark turkey meat; hamburger. Although diet-conscious folks have made bread a shippingboy, Mrs. Clyatt says it is an important source of essential protein, iron, niacin, thiamine and riboflavin as well as energy. Breads store best in a freezer. The next preferred storage is a well-ventilated bread box with the bread wrapper closed

after each use, she says. Bread stored in the refrigerator will develop a harsh crumb rapidly but mold will be retarded,

In-store demonstrations are scheduled every Wednesday Thursday and Friday through out the state. The purpose o the demonstration is to acquain the consumer with new ways to


Radio tapes and TV program: featuring different ways o serving rice will dominate the airways, in conjunction with newspaper coverage.


