The dinner, sponsored by the Coryell County Farmers' Union and the agri-business community of Coryell County, will honor Congressman Poage for his many years of service to the 11th Congressional District and his active role in the agricultural area.

A planning meeting for the dinner was held Tuesday in the National Bank Civic Room to work out details and distribute tickets to the dinner. Coryell Memorial Hospital Financial Report Issued

The Coryell Memorial Hospital annual financial report was issued this week showing a net profit for the past year of \$13,469.11.

The report, compiled by County Auditor Newton Sanford, indicated the net profit after the 1968 fiscal year's \$18,054.35 loss.

The hospital raised the room rates over the past year which helped to raise income by \$34,494.04. Sanford said much of the income gains came from increased medical activity over the 1968 year.

In the past year the increased capital accounts by \$27,828.97. New air conditioning equipment amounted to \$24,000 and a total of \$3,465.20 was used for other building improvements.

Bad debts and charity expense totaled \$19,734.77 which

is down approximately \$6000 from the 1968 year.

Current assets are down \$14,000 from the 1968 figure of \$94,980.06. Certificates of Deposit have decreased from \$54,836.66 to \$0 in the past two years to take care of last year's net loss and help meet ever-increasing operating expenses which climbed another \$16,639.37 in 1969.

Total income in 1969 was \$346,383.66 with regular inpatients accounting for the amount of \$154,411.80 and Medicare inpatients accounting for \$153,589.90.

Total expenses amounted to \$332,914.55 in 1969 with salaries of \$184,658.76; drugs and medical supplies of \$42,426.36 and bad debts-charity a total of \$19,734.77 accounting for over two-thirds of the expense.

Storm to Head CTCOG Executive Board

County Judge Norman Storm has become the President of the Central Texas Council of Government following the resignation of Bell County Judge J. F. Clawson who was appointed to the 169th Judicial district judgeship.

Storm will serve as the six-county Council of Government head of the executive board of directors. Storm explained that "regional planning commissions and councils of government are now sub-divisions of state government." He said, "the CTCOG acts in a manner similar to county and municipal governments."

The CTCOG does not assess and collect taxes, however, it does receive annual dues for memberships, and it receives state financial aid. The CTCOG is aimed at providing the six-county area with a comprehensive expansion and development program in governmental activities.

Storm noted that presently the big project being handled by the CTCOG is to develop a comprehensive six-county water and sewage plan for Housing and Urban Development files.

Hornets Open District Play In Del Valle Tonight

Tonight the Hornets open District 13 AAA play with possibly the best chance to win district in several seasons. No one seems to talk about the Hornet chances, but with supreme effort and some luck in crucial games, it is a possibility.

The Hornets face a potent offensive team in the Cardinals, and the Hornet defense will receive another biggest. The Hornets have proved themselves defensively in the three non-district outings this year. First against Robinson, the Hornets stopped a passing attack. Then Marlin posed another passing threat, and the Hornets stopped them cold. Against Killeen, the Hornets provided the home crowd with an exciting first quarter of defensive football.

"Del Valle piled up 464 yards total offense against Smithville last week but lost by two points," noted Coach Jack Moss. The Cardinal offense contains some familiar faces from last year when the Red Birds piled up a 27 to 12 victory against the Hornets. Edwin Collins, a 170-pound Senior, will be playing quarterback this week. Collins had been at tailback, but last week the starting quarterback broke a collar bone. Coach Moss explained, "Collins is a good football player. He will handle the signal calling duties effectively." Moss pointed out Collins' running ability as a definite threat on every play.

Also junior running back, Woody Benford, will be back this year. The 6 foot 3 inch 160 pounder made two long runs against the Hornets last year totaling 120 yards. Both long runs, 70 and 50 yards, resulted in touchdowns.

To stop the Cardinal offense, Coach Moss pointed out that the Hornet defense would have to "stop the big plays." He explained that of approximately 120 plays a game, about five or six go for big yardage. Moss remembered the Marlin quarterback sneak three weeks ago. "We could not stop him short of the goal line, and against Del Valle we will have to stop them."

The Hornet defense has two new faces in it this week with Larry Harrington and Bobby Hodge taking up positions at linebacker and guard, respectively.

Harrington, with hustle and hard hitting, gained himself a position as starting center earlier this year and has turned in a fine performance. With Steve Palmer sidelined with an operation, Harrington will fill the key linebacking job for the Hornets. Moss said of Palmer, "He is a quick reacting boy, and he was just reaching a peak when this operation came along."

Moss noted that Palmer played his best game defensively against Killeen making seven unassisted tackles. Harrington has looked good at linebacker this week and should be well versed on his responsibilities by kick-off tonight. At 248 pounds, Hodge will be tough to block at defensive guard. "Hodge has come a long way, and he is putting out more effort in recent weeks," noted Coach Moss.

The Hornet offense remains much the same as against Killeen except for the loss of Palmer at fullback. Coach Moss has been working Billy

Hord at the fullback spot all year, and Hord will move right up to share the fullback duties with Randy Schoenewolf. Hord is a hard-hitting player, both defensively and offensively. Moss noted, "He is a punishing

to Get There

Since this is the first year for Journey Boosters to journey to Del Valle, the News is providing directions for reaching Cardinal Field. There are two routes - a quick one and a sure one. We give you both in hopes everyone will get there in time for the 8:00 kickoff.

First for the quick route - you will loop Austin and miss the traffic! As you approach Austin, you will be traveling south on IH 35, just north of Austin, exit east on state 183 (Lampasas-Lockhart), proceed east on 183. You will loop Austin, following signs directing you to Bergstrom AFB. At the junction of 183 and state 290, bear left (east) on 290 toward BAFB. (At this point you should see the stadium lights.) At the end of the overpass in front of BAFB, make a left turn to Del Valle ISD and Cardinal Field.

For those who don't mind through-town traffic, we have another route. Drive all the way through Austin on IH 35. At the intersection of state 290 (Johnson City) turn left (east) toward BAFB. Turn left to Cardinal Field across from BAFB.

In order for the buses to make their regular runs and leave for Austin, on Friday, Oct. 10, elementary school will dismiss at 2:10, junior high and senior high at 2:25. The buses will run at those times.

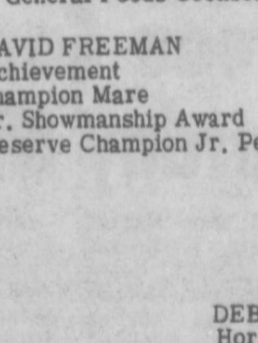

Food For Thought

"Wherefore, I take you to record, this day, that I am pure from the blood of all men; For I have not shunned to declare unto you, all the counsel of God."

Acts 20:26-27. I have been studying the above scripture the last few days, and would like to pass on to you some food for thought--

The above scripture was a quotation from Paul, the great Bible missionary. We take from this, that should he fail to give out all the counsel of God, the blood of men would be upon him.

Counsel means to give advice to or to recommend as an act, or course to follow according to Webster's Dictionary.

Paul said he gave out all the counsel of God, or the advice, or recommendation God had given him.

In Solomon's writing in Proverbs 19:21: "There are many devices in a man's heart; never the less, the counsel of the Lord, that shall stand--"

Isaiah 28:29: "This also cometh forth from the Lord of hosts, which is wonderful in counsel, and excellent in working." Jer. 32:17-19 reads: "Ah, Lord God, behold though hast made the heaven and the earth by thy great power, and stretched out thy arm, and there is nothing too hard for thee: Thou showest loving kindness unto thousands and recompenseth the iniquity of the fathers into the bosom of their children after them: The Great, the Mighty God, the Lord of hosts, is his name, Great in Counsel, and mighty in work."

Hebrews 6:17-20 speaks of the immutability of his counsel, and Webster's Dictionary defines immutable as or invariable--so we find that the counsel which God gave to Paul to give out to all the people, is still the counsel which is good for the people today, which leads us to want to search out what Paul preached.

After Paul was converted, straight way he preached Christ, that he is the son of God--but, the people were afraid of him, for it was he who had persecuted the early Christians so severely, even unto death. It was he, who stood by and held the garments of those who stoned Stephen to death, but after he saw the Lord, and heard him speak, on the road to Damascus, he confounded the Jews, proving that this is very Christ.

"We preach Christ crucified" Paul wrote to the Corinthian church - I Cor. 1:23. He preached that through Jesus is preached unto the forgiveness of sins, Acts 13:38-39. Paul preached that Jesus rose from the dead, Acts 17:3, 22, 27, 30, 31. And that God commandeth all men everywhere to repent because he hath appointed a day in the which he will judge the world in righteousness. Acts 17:30, 31.

We may fail to meet an appointment with our lawyer, our doctor, or our friend, but this appointment with God, not any of us will fail to meet.

Paul preached the Baptism of the Holy Ghost, Acts 19:1-7, and

taught us that we are the temple of the Holy Ghost, I Cor. 6:19-20. And God wrought special miracles by the hand of Paul, Acts 19:11-12.

And when the people tried to worship, Paul and Barnabas because of the healing of a man, being a cripple from his mother's womb, they cried out: "We also are men of like passions with you." (Acts 14:15) and admonished the people to worship God.

Not only did he preach many great messages, but most of the letters in the New Testament, to the churches, were written by Paul.

I will only highlight a few of his sayings to the churches: "I beseech you, therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice holy acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service, and be not conformed to this world; but be ye transformed, by the renewing of your mind that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God, Romans 12:1-2.

"There is therefore, now, no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the spirit." Romans 8:1.

"Yield your members, servants unto righteousness." Romans 6:19.

Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus, Phil. 2:5. "Wherefore, come out from among them and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing, and I will receive you, II Cor. 6:17-18.

"Stand fast in the Lord." Phil. 4:1.

"The time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine...and they shall turn away their ears from the truth." II Tim. 4:3-4.

Let no man deceive you by any means; for that day shall not come except there come a falling away first, and that man of sin be revealed, the son of perdition." II Thess. 2:3.

"The Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout," I Thess. 4:16.

Paul's writings are too many to even scarcely touch upon, but he finishes with this great admonition to Timothy, his spiritual son:

"Preach the word! II Tim. 4:2-8. He adds that the time had come to be offered, and his departure was at hand.

He continues by saying: "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my cause, I have kept the faith, Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge shall give me at that day, and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing."

It behooves us to take time out of our busy hurried lives, to think of the Counsel which God gave unto Paul, and if it gave Paul the assurance of receiving a crown, the unchangeableness of his counsel will bring the same, in our own lives.
